## PROCEEDINGS OF CITY COUNCIL May 19, 2025

A regular meeting of the mayor and council of the City of Columbus, Nebraska, was convened in open and public session on May 19, 2025, at 6:03 p.m. in the Columbus Community Building, Community Room, 2500 14 Street, Columbus, Nebraska. Notice of this meeting was given in advance thereof by publication in the Columbus Telegram on April 30, 2025, with a copy of the proof of publication being on file in the office of the city clerk. Notice of this meeting was given simultaneously to the mayor and members of the city council, with a copy of the acknowledgment of receipt of notice being on file in the office of the city clerk. Availability of the agenda was communicated in the advance notice and in the notice to the mayor and city council of this meeting. All proceedings hereafter shown were taken while the convened meeting was open to the public.

- Bulkley announced that a copy of the Open Meetings Act is posted in the meeting room. Works Week and thanked the staff in the Public Works Department for all the work they do.

## 7. PUBLIC HEARINGS:

- 7.A. Public hearing Application from Jeyniel y Keileb LLC dba Tuyo y Mio for retail Class I liquor license at 1267 26 Avenue and Dayniel Betancourt Romero as manager. Tuyo y Mio manager Dayniel Betancourt Romero was available to answer questions. The public hearing closed with a motion by Jablonski and a second by Bahr. Alarcòn, Bahr, Hiemer, Jablonski, Lopez, Palensky, Roth, and Schilling voted "Aye" and none voted "Nay". A recommendation was made to the Nebraska Liquor Control Commission to approve the application from Jeyniel y Keileb LLC for a retail Class D liquor license and Dayniel Betancourt Romero as manager with a motion by Bahr and a second by Schilling. Alarcòn, Bahr, Hiemer, Jablonski, Lopez, Palensky, Roth, and Schilling voted "Aye" and none voted "Nay".
- 7.B. Public Hearing Authorization of purchase of real property located south of 12th Street between 33rd and 34th Avenues from Nebraska Department of Transportation. The public hearing closed with a motion by Schilling and a second by Hiemer. Alarcòn, Bahr, Hiemer, Jablonski, Lopez, Palensky, Roth, and Schilling voted "Aye" and none voted "Nay".
- 8. **PETITIONS AND COMMUNICATIONS:** None
- 9. REPORTS OF CITY OFFICES: Finance department report included in Consent Agenda
- 9.A. Update on Nebraska Department of Transportation 23rd Street Reconstruction project. Bogus noted that the project is on schedule with water and storm sewer upgrades currently underway, 23rd and 26th Avenues will be reopened temporarily until paving begins, and the intersection of 30th Avenue is expected to close soon as crews continue progressing west.
- 9.B. Update on Nebraska Department of Transportation Loup River South Bridges project. Bogus explained that traffic has been moved to the east side bridge and preparation for removal of the truss bridge has begun. He noted that the trail running under the bridge is now closed, however, the underpass will remain open to allow pedestrian access across the park. In mid-June, the underpass will close for reconstruction, at which point the trail will re-open. Bogus added that both the trail and underpass improvements are expected to be completed by August 1st with demolition of the truss bridge to follow. He clarified that, as a requirement of the project due to the historic nature of the truss bridge, a model of the bridge will be created and installed in Pawnee Park.
- 10. REPORTS OF COUNCIL COMMITTEES:
- 10.A. Committee of the Whole May 19, 2025
- 10.A.1. Request from Legacy Youth Foundation to use a portion of Pawnee Park Memorial Stadium for Drive-In Movie Theater. The Committee of the Whole

recommended approval. The report was adopted with a motion by Jablonski and a second by Hiemer. Alarcòn, Bahr, Hiemer, Jablonski, Lopez, Palensky, Roth, and Schilling voted "Aye" and none voted "Nay".

- Amend city code sections 133.03 through 133.05 regarding fireworks 10.A.2. discharge dates, discharge times, and sale dates. The Committee of the Whole recommended city code be amended as follows: the discharge of fireworks be permitted June 28th through July 2nd from 8 a.m. to 11 p.m. and July 3rd and 4th from 8 a.m. to midnight; the sale of fireworks be permitted June 28th through July 4th from 8 a.m. to 10 p.m.; no discharge or sales of fireworks be permitted in December; and to have an effective ordinance date of August 1, 2025. Jason Thiele, of Raymond and co-owner of Crazy Cracker Fireworks. spoke against the proposed changes noting that shortening the sale dates does not resolve the ongoing issue of enforcing the policy. He expressed concern that the change would be unfair to both the fireworks vendors and residents who comply with the rules. Jeff Peabody, supervisor of the Columbus High School fireworks stand, explained he was happy with the shortened sale dates as sales are fairly low the first three days and this would reduce staffing costs. Sara Abler, of Norfolk and co-owner of Fly by Night Fireworks, explained that the slower days offer more time for setup and the full ten days would allow for the possibility of two weekends of sales. She also added that these changes would require updates to advertisements and required signage at their sale location which would create additional costs. Vasicek clarified that this is the first reading of the ordinance and that a second and third reading will be held at the June 2nd and June 16th city council meetings allowing further discussion. The report was adopted with a motion by Roth and a second by Lopez. Alarcòn. Bahr, Hiemer, Jablonski, Lopez, Palensky, Roth, and Schilling voted "Aye" and none voted "Nay".

- 13. NEW BUSINESS:
- 13.A. Application from Rback Enterprises, LLC for preliminary plat of Reeder 2nd Subdivision (4th Street and 7th Avenue). (Planning Commission recommends approval.) The preliminary plat of Reeder 2nd Subdivision was approved with a motion Hiemer and a second by Schilling. Alarcòn, Bahr, Hiemer, Jablonski, Lopez, Palensky, Roth, and Schilling voted "Aye" and none voted "Nay".
- 13.B. Application from Knights of Columbus for special designated liquor license at 26th Avenue between 13th and 14th Streets for Columbus Days. The application from Knights of Columbus for a special designated liquor license was approved with a motion by Jablonski and a second by Bahr. Alarcòn, Bahr, Hiemer, Jablonski, Lopez, Palensky, Roth, and Schilling voted "Aye" and none voted "Nay".

- 13.C. Application from Barrel House for special designated liquor license at 2311 14 Street for a fundraiser. Barrel House owner, Nicole Saalfeld explained that the first-ever 'Picklefest' event is scheduled for June 14, 2025, and is a fundraiser to help raise money for Columbus in Action. She noted that the event will have over 40 vendors, live music throughout the day, and a pickleball tournament. The application from Barrel House for a special designated liquor license was approved with a motion by Jablonski and a second by Hiemer. Alarcòn, Bahr, Hiemer, Jablonski, Lopez, Palensky, Roth, and Schilling voted "Aye" and none voted "Nay".
- **13.D.** Application from Half Full, Inc. dba Infusion Brewing Co. for special designated liquor license at 2311 14 Street for a fundraiser. The application from Half Full, Inc. for a special designated liquor license was approved with a motion by Hiemer and a second by Lopez. Alarcòn, Bahr, Hiemer, Jablonski, Lopez, Palensky, Roth, and Schilling voted "Aye" and none voted "Nay".
- **13.E.** Appointment of Lynn Fear as police chief. Fear stated he is excited for the opportunity and ready to get started. He thanked the mayor, city administrator, former police chief, and Interim Police Chief Strecker for a smooth transition into this position. In the next few weeks, he looks forward to getting out into the community and meeting as many people as possible. The mayor's appointment of Lynn Fear as police chief was ratified with a motion by Hiemer and a second by Schilling. Alarcòn, Bahr, Hiemer, Jablonski, Lopez, Palensky, Roth, and Schilling voted "Aye" and none voted "Nay".
- **13.F.** Appointment of Andres Velazquez as police officer. Velzaquez thanked the council and the welcoming city staff who assisted throughout the hiring process. He is excited for the opportunity to serve. The mayor's appointment of Andres Velazquez as police officer was ratified with a motion by Alarcòn and a second by Lopez. Alarcòn, Bahr, Hiemer, Jablonski, Lopez, Palensky, Roth, and Schilling voted "Aye" and none voted "Nay".
- 13.G. Quote from Husker Auto Group in the amount of \$36,950 for pickup for wastewater treatment plant. CIP #25-56 Sliva clarified that an extended cab or four-door option was requested in order to store sampling equipment and samples inside the truck, as they must be kept at room temperature. The quote from Husker Auto Group for a pickup was accepted with a motion by Schilling and a second by Palensky. Alarcòn, Bahr, Hiemer, Jablonski, Lopez, Palensky, Roth, and Schilling voted "Aye" and none voted "Nay".
- 13.H. Plans, specifications, estimate of cost in the amount of \$850,000, and authorization to advertise for bids for Lift Station #15 (Westbrook) Relocation project. (Plans and specs on file in the engineering department.) CIP #20-93 The plans, specifications, estimate of cost, and authorization to advertise for bids for Lift Station #15 Relocation was approved with a motion by Palensky and a second by Bahr. Alarcòn, Bahr, Hiemer, Jablonski, Lopez, Palensky, Roth, and Schilling voted "Aye" and none voted "Nay".

**13.I.** Comments from mayor and city council members. Jablonski complimented the Business Improvement District Board on the new sculptures and flowers placed throughout the downtown area.

Hopkins explained that the Pioneer Consortium offers more updated software and would better meet the library's needs; therefore, she recommended withdrawing from the OneLibrary agreement. She added that joining the new consortium would save over \$4,000 annually. Resolution No. R25-77 entitled: A RESOLUTION OF THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF COLUMBUS, NEBRASKA TO EXIT AND WITHDRAW FROM THE ONELIBRARY CONSORTIUM INTERLOCAL AGREEMENT was adopted with a motion by Lopez and a second by Bahr. Alarcòn, Bahr, Hiemer, Jablonski, Lopez, Palensky, Roth, and Schilling voted "Aye" and none voted "Nay".

- 14.D. Resolution No. R25-78 approving Pioneer Consortium Joint Entity Agreement.
