This pamphlet has been developed to help the general public attending a meeting of the Board of Education to understand the internal operation of the Board. It is hoped that this pamphlet will foster improved relations between the Board and the citizens it serves.

Meetings of the Board

When

- The Board of Education convenes once each month on the second Monday except in the months that have five Mondays. In months with five Mondays, the Board convenes on the third Monday of the month. Holidays and unexpected conflicts may create exceptions to this practice.
- The Board of Education will convene in special session whenever it is deemed necessary for the efficient operation of the school district.
- Board of Education meetings are called to order at 7:00 p.m. unless another time is stipulated.

Where

- Regular and special meetings of the Board of Education will be held in the Board Room on the Valley Campus at 401 S. Pine St., in Valley, unless another location is specifically identified.
- Whenever public participation dictates the need for a larger meeting room, the Board will convene in the High School library.

Notice of Meetings

- Official notice of the time and place of the regular board meetings are posted on the doors of the schools, banks in Valley and Waterloo and the Valley City Hall.
- Notice of special meetings will be posted at least 24 hours in advance. Hearings will be published in The Omaha Daily Record.

Business of the Board

Agendas

- Agendas for the regular meeting on the second Monday of the month will be prepared in advance and kept current and available in the superintendent's office. Business items of an emergency nature may be placed on the agenda by a majority vote of the Board of Education.
- Parents, employees and patrons may request items placed before the Board of Education for consideration by contacting the Superintendent at least three business days in advance of a regular meeting.

Public Participation

- The Board of Education invites you to offer comments during the Public Communication and Correspondence portion of the meeting. Public requesting to offer comments during the Public Communication portion of the meeting shall make a request to speak or complete the sign-in information sheet at the meeting. The individual is asked to state the purpose and general nature of his or her appearance before the Board. The Board President shall indicate to the individual how much time the Board will allot the individual. Speakers normally will be given five minutes with a maximum of 20 minutes set aside for such communications.
- Members of the public requesting to speak to an item considered New or Old Business on the Agenda will request time during the Public Communications portion of the meeting. Unless the comments are related to an agenda item no action will be taken by the Board. Questions or requests of the Board by the public will be taken under consideration. The Board will direct the Superintendent, or the Superintendent's designee, to respond in writing to any public

question or request brought before the Board. Equal time shall be allotted to individuals speaking for and against a proposal when opposing points of view are represented at the board meeting.

- The Board invites you to share any information you may have or address any question to any Board member or the Superintendent regarding new business in the week prior to the next meeting.
- If, at any Board meeting, any person shall conduct himself or herself in a disorderly manner and after notice of the president or the person presiding shall persist therein, the president or person presiding may ask the person to leave and if the person refuses, the president or presiding officer may order any law enforcement officer or any other person or persons to take him or her into custody until the meeting is adjourned.
- Meetings may be recorded. Recording must be done so as not to disrupt the meeting.
- Meetings of the Board of Education shall be conducted in compliance with appropriate policy, state statutes and open meeting laws.

CURRICULUM & INSTRUCTION

Music Curriculum Disposal

The 6–12 music department is seeking approval to dispose of outdated and no-longer-used print music that is no longer aligned to the current curriculum or performance needs. These materials have been reviewed by staff, removed from active inventory, and identified as obsolete instructional resources in accordance with district procedures for surplus materials. With the Board's approval, the department will follow established surplus and recycling processes.

Library Catalog System

We have made the decision to transition to Follett Destiny for our library catalog system, starting in the 2026-2027 school year. Adopting a modern catalog platform will streamline procedures for our teacher-librarians and enhance the student checkout experience. A key advantage of Destiny is its capability to provide families with timely, automated communication regarding the resources their children borrow.

Secondary College & Career Readiness Skills Pilot

7th- and 9th-grade students have now completed their self-reflections and participated in one-on-one data conferences with their teachers as part of the College & Career Readiness Skills Pilot. Both teachers and students have indicated that the process was highly valuable for increasing self-awareness, clarifying expectations, and identifying concrete next steps for growth. The same reflection and conference structure will be implemented again at the end of the unit to monitor progress and continue supporting students' development of key academic behaviors. Data will be shared with the Board at the end of the pilot.

High School ELA Course Trajectory

High School ELA teachers, building administration, the school counselor, and district directors recently collaborated to identify key student performance data points to ensure all students are placed in the appropriate grade-level ELA course and, when needed, an additional support class. This support class is designed to provide a "double dose" of instruction focused on grade-level standards so that students who require extra help receive targeted, timely support. This work represents a strategic and proactive step toward strengthening literacy outcomes and aligning course placement with student needs in a thoughtful, data-informed manner.

ASSESSMENT

PreACT and ACT: Testing Format and Date Change

Due to recent unforeseen technology challenges, we are making adjustments to our upcoming ACT and PreACT testing schedule. Both assessments will now be administered on Tuesday, April 7 and will be given in paper format. This change ensures the smoothest possible testing experience for our students.

Early Literacy Screener Change: From FastBridge to DIBELS in 27-28

The Nebraska Commissioner of Education has announced the selection of a state-required early literacy screener, and the state committee has chosen DIBELS as the official tool. As a result, we will no longer administer FastBridge, and students in Grades K–3 will be required to take DIBELS. As a district, we will also determine whether students in Grades 2–3 will continue to take MAP in addition to this new screener.

Because this decision is being communicated so late in the school year, we will delay implementation until the 2027–2028 school year. This timeline will allow us to provide thorough staff training, develop a thoughtful implementation plan, take advantage of any resources the state may provide, and clarify whether the screener will be funded at the state or district level. For the 2026–2027 school year, we will continue with the same assessment plan we followed this year.

PROFESSIONAL LEARNING

President's Day District Professional Learning Day

On February 16, during the district Professional Learning Day, ELA teachers engaged in focused work aligned to the DC West Philosophy of ELA Instruction. They reflected on how this philosophy shows up in their daily instructional practices and considered ways to strengthen that alignment. Teachers examined the current ELA landscape to develop a shared understanding of program strengths, areas of need, and priorities moving forward. They also identified key skills and concepts by engaging with relevant standards and guidelines, and deepened their understanding of the DC West Curriculum Framework components and how these elements are designed to support high-quality teaching and learning in their classrooms.

Special Education staff participated in a morning SPED training. All other staff members used the day to complete required curriculum updates, including revising the district curriculum log and shared-drive curriculum maps, and engaging in collaborative PLC work and advancing their individual professional goals.

Legislative Advocacy

On February 19, Mrs. Nicki Pechous and I met with Nebraska Senators Wordekemper and Sorrentino as part of the NASES Legislative Conference. During these conversations, I specifically shared concerns regarding Legislative Bill 1050. While I fully support the intent of the Nebraska Reading Improvement Act to ensure that every child is a proficient reader, we urged reconsideration of provisions that mandate the retention of third-grade students based on a "persistent reading deficiency.

Rather than mandatory retention, I advocated for the expansion of Multi-Tiered Systems of Support (MTSS) and other evidence-based practices already referenced in LB1050. Research shows that targeted intensive tutoring, expanded learning time, and high-quality preschool programs are more effective and less costly options for supporting all students in their development of literacy skills.

I urged the Nebraska Legislature to amend LB1050 to allow local school districts and parents to make promotion decisions based on a comprehensive view of the child's needs, rather than a mandatory retention gate. Asking for us to focus our resources on the science of reading and intensive remediation rather than a policy that research suggests will lead to higher dropout rates and long-term academic stagnation.

Gretna Public Schools Accreditation Team

On March 3-5, I served on the Gretna Public Schools External Visit Team as part of their state accreditation process. This work involved reviewing evidence of district practices, engaging in school and classroom visits, and collaborating with Gretna leaders to provide feedback aligned to Nebraska's accreditation expectations. Participating on this team is an opportunity to share my leadership and expertise on behalf of DC West, just as fellow Nebraska educational leaders have done for our district during our own external visits. This experience also brings back valuable insights and perspectives to inform our ongoing improvement efforts.

Superintendents' Early Childhood Plan Convening

On March 3, a team of district administrators, elementary principals, and our teacher leadership representative, Kelsy Nabity, attended the annual Superintendents' Early Childhood Plan Convening at The Salvation Army Kroc Center. The event featured family engagement expert Ernesto Mejia, updates on the Superintendents' Early Childhood Plan, and a moderated panel discussion with local school and district representatives. The team returned inspired and energized to continue advancing our work in early childhood education.

Due to recent technology issues, the Junior NeSA-ACT & 9-10 PreACT will be taken on paper rather than on school iPads. The testing date has also been moved from April 1st to April 7th to fit the required paper testing date. Freshmen and sophomores will be taking the PreACT while juniors will be taking the State NeSA-ACT test. Seniors will not have school on April 7th. The DC West NeSA-ACT composite score average last year was 19.5 while the state average was 18.2. In January and February, all juniors met individually with their math, science, and ELA teachers to set personal ACT goals for each subject area of the test. Five, two-hour sessions of John Baylor ACT test prep were also offered in January and February to help students prepare. Juniors will receive the results of the test at the beginning of May.

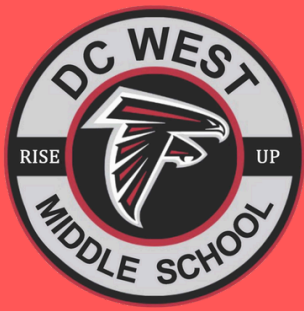

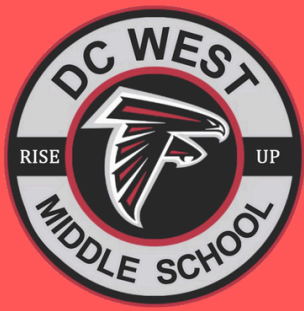

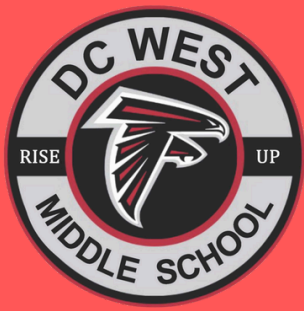
To minimize disruption and maximize student focus, we have coordinated specific "Block Period" testing for ELA and Math.

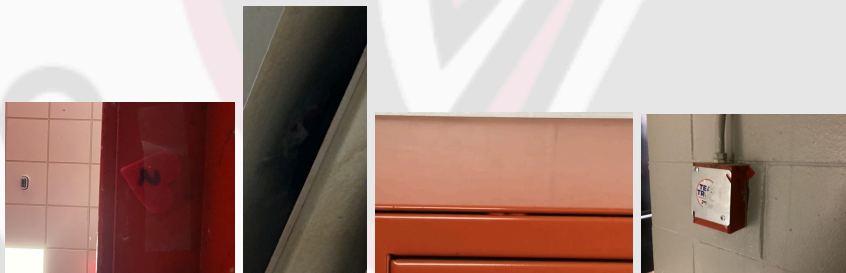

School Culture: "Stealin' Hearts" Hide & Seek

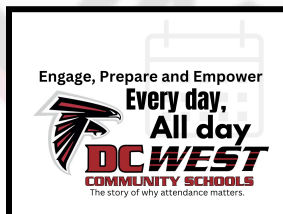

Staffing Updates

Behavior Advantage

In an effort to continue our support for students with significant behavioral challenges, we have subscribed to a service for our school psychologists to utilize to produce comprehensive functional behavioral assessments and behavior intervention plans. The system includes options for staff professional development around behaviors, data collection and graphing systems to better inform our practices, implementation fidelity checklists, and systems to support schoolwide Tier 1 and Tier 2 efforts, such as Check-In/Check-Out to help build strong staff-student relationships and implement evidence-based practices to support behavior. We are excited to have this resource available to us!

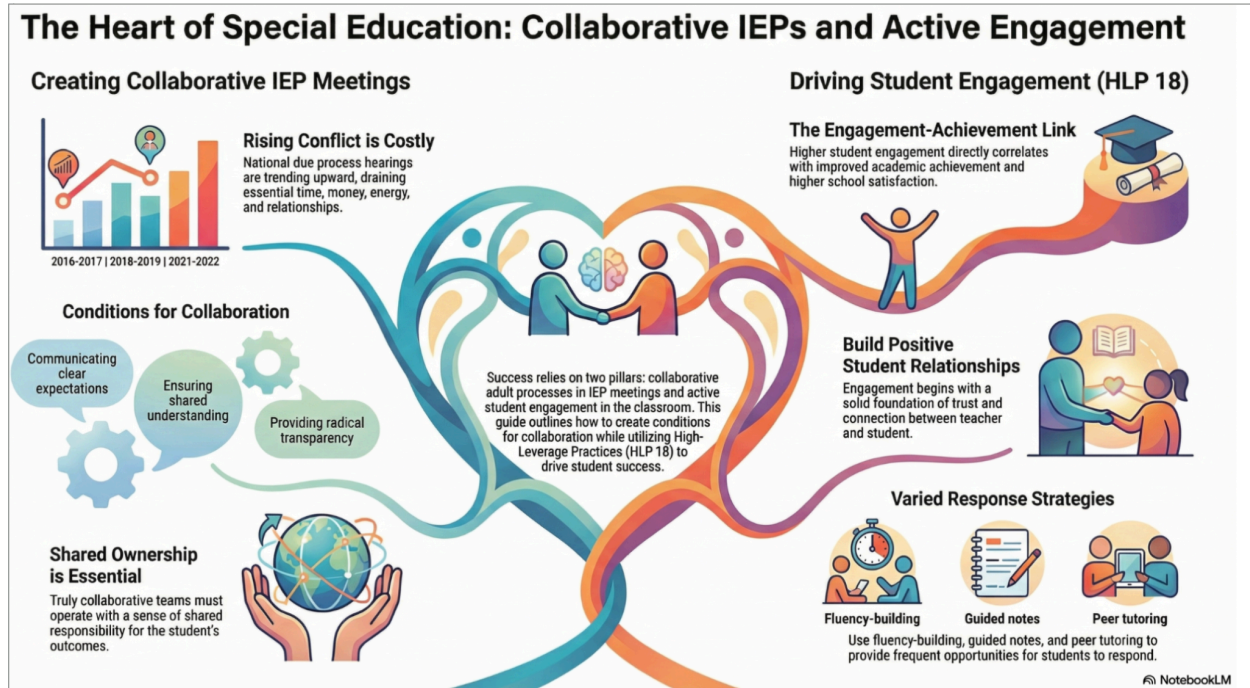
Special Education Information Night

Both agencies will provide information about services offered for students with disabilities as they transition to adulthood as well as how to apply for support. Presidents' Day Special Education PD

We had a great morning of professional learning for all of our district special education staff on February 16. Topics discussed are represented in the graphic organizer below and included specially designed instruction, active student engagement strategies, and creating conditions for collaborative IEP meetings with high levels of parent involvement.

District Safety Team and Crisis Response Team Annual Meetings

Our District Safety Team and Crisis Response Teams both held their annual meetings over the past month. The District Safety Team met with representatives from the Douglas County Sheriff's Office, Valley PD, and Valley Fire. We reviewed our NDE Rule 10 Compliance, our Emergency Operations Plan, Standard Reunification Plan procedures, Inter-agency Coordination and Collaboration, Policies and Procedures, and Training Needs. We discussed scheduling summer work time to work through our Reunification plans, planning time for training new staff on safety protocols as they are hired, and potentially scheduling a reunification drill in conjunction with local fire and police sometime next year.

NASES Legislative Conference

Dr. Marten and I were able to attend the NASES Legislative Conference in Lincoln last month and had the opportunity to visit with Senators Wordekemper and Sorrentino about our special education programming, work on literacy goals, and legislative bills impacting schools. We appreciated the opportunity to share our story with our elected officials.

Continuous Improvement and State Reporting

This month we are working on updating our Special Education Policies and Procedures to submit to the state at the end of the month. We are also working on our Targeted Improvement Plan, Maintenance of Effort reporting, and are awaiting the results of our Focused Monitoring file review. It's a busy time of year!

- Step 3: Cursory Options
- Step 4: Draft Initial Master Plan
- Step 5: Final Master Plan
- Step 6: Communication Plan

We will begin with some internal intro meetings in March to determine the process and engagement. If the Board has specific questions or input at any time, please contact me so we can address your goals and vision for the process.

Food Service Management Process Update

The request for proposals notification has gone out through a publication in the Omaha World Herald as well as been emailed directly to Food Service Management Companies who work in the State of Nebraska. To date, we have received eight companies who have expressed interest in additional information about the RFP. I met with our entire food service staff explaining the process to them and to dialogue about questions they had. We will be providing an on-site pre-proposal conference for interested companies at DC West on Monday, March 23rd during our lunch periods.

DCWYSO Summer Field Use

I recently met with the leadership of DCWYSO on their needs for summer field use at the fourplex on property. We were able to agree on a payment for field use and maintenance that will cover the expense of routine maintenance needed for the fields for the upcoming season of youth baseball and softball. I am very appreciative of the collaboration we have successfully had over the past year with our changes in fee arrangements while supporting the development of our Falcon youth programs.

Humanex Engagement Results

We have begun analyzing the data from our most recent Humanex engagement survey results for students, staff, and families. Our administrative team had a debrief and action planning session with consultants, our staff will engage in debrief and action planning sessions in early April, and we will present our findings and plans to the Board at an

upcoming meeting. These surveys continue to identify strengths and opportunities for continuous improvement throughout the district.

Superintendent/Parent Forums

I completed three Superintendent/Parent Forums this school year. The first forum had ten in attendance, the second had four, and the most recent had three. I still plan to host one more forum in the fourth quarter. Next year I am going to offer one forum in the first semester and one the second semester and try to publish the dates more in advance. If the Board has any other suggestions or feedback, please let me know.

Superintendent Goals 2026

- Facilitate the Master Planning process to approach Strategic Plan 5.1 & 5.3: creation of a comprehensive facilities plan to address both short term and long term goals including, but not limited to, new construction, renovation, and maintenance of facilities, and acquiring property to meet the future growth needs of the district and align district resources to support a quality education system and high-level learning environment by ensuring necessary staffing levels, space allocation, and resource expenditures
- Implement Strategic Plan Strategy 4.2 to increase communication to maintain perceptions of DC West by engaging students, families, employees, and the DC West community to promote and enrich the brand of DC West Community Schools.
- Lead the vision and support needed to implement strategic plan priorities in 2026. Specifically increase overall proficiency and/or growth in core areas of student achievement district-wide.
- Continue to unify, coach and lead the entire administrative team to excellence.
- Begin to develop a leadership succession plan within the district and a transition process to proactively identify and transition new leadership within the district (Strategy 3.4).

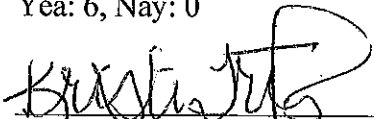

the Board asked questions and discussed how each firm's planning process would address the district's future needs.

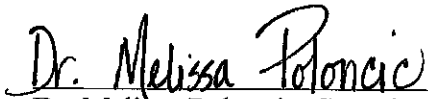

7. New Business

7.1. Discuss, consider and take all necessary action with regard to possible approval and authorization to sell and transfer an approximately 1-acre tract of real estate generally near 25808 Bennington Road and located in Section 8, Township 16 North, Range 10 East of the 6th P.M., Douglas County, Nebraska

The Board reviewed an update regarding a specific parcel of land discovered to be under the legal ownership of DC West Community Schools. Following a contact from a patron's legal counsel, it was determined that an 1884 deed—which was previously overlooked and is not reflected in the Douglas County GIS—serves as the definitive record of ownership. The District's claim to the land is established through a succession of mergers beginning in 1966 with the merger of District 35 into District 23, followed by the 2001 merger of District 23 into Valley District 33, and concluding with the 2005 merger of Valley and Waterloo to form the current DC West District 15. Because the property of a merged district legally vests in the surviving entity, DC West is the confirmed owner of the parcel. Rawhide/Bevington, the owner of all surrounding ground, has requested that the District convey the parcel to them. Legal counsel has advised that a direct conveyance is not permissible, as the Nebraska Department of Education maintains that school districts may not give property away. Consequently, the land must be transferred through a formal sale. A motion was presented to authorize the Superintendent and the Board President to negotiate the terms of this sale and execute the necessary quitclaim transfer documents to finalize the transaction.

Motion that the Board of Education of this School District approves the sale and quitclaim transfer to Rawhide Creek Reserve, LLC, a Nebraska limited liability company ("Buyer"), of the approximately 1.0 acres of real property originally acquired by School District No. 35, predecessor in interest to this School District, generally near 25808 Bennington Road and generally located in Section 8, Township 16 North, Range 10 East of the 6th P.M., Douglas County, Nebraska, the purchase price payable by the Buyer, and approving any recommended or necessary real estate purchase, sale and transfer documents for the sale and quitclaim transfer of such real property to the Buyer, and further delegates authority to the Board President or Superintendent of Schools to negotiate any sale and quitclaim transfer documents as determined in the best interest of the School District, and to sign, execute and deliver such finally negotiated documents and to cause to be delivered a quitclaim deed and other closing documents to the Buyer, all on behalf of the School District Passed with a motion by Jamie Jorgensen and a second by Luke Janke.

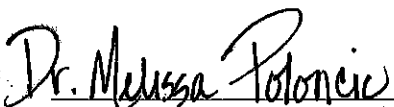
