Prairie chicken tours are booming north of Odessa

Spring in central Nebraska isn't just about sandhill cranes. It's about prairie chickens, too — specifically, their mating habits.

The males inflate orange air sacs on the sides of their necks. They snap their tails. They dance. They leap into the air. They scoot around on their tiny feet, all to impress the females.

"I think of it as a combination of a junior high school hallway and a college bar," Robyn Hubbard, a retired teacher, said.

Since 2022, she and her husband Kent have offered Prairie Wind Birding Tours on their 1,200-acre farm roughly three miles north of Odessa. Tour-goers spend roughly three hours in blinds early in the morning watching prairie chickens' mating rituals.

The Hubbards launched tours on March 6. Tours will continue through Saturday (April 11). The breeding rituals continue for about two months in the early spring.

Five days a week, an hour or so before sunrise, roughly 20 guests a day arrive at the Hubbard farm, grab a small bottle of water or a granola bar, then climb into a pickup for the one-mile ride out to unheated blinds.

Inside the blinds, they sit on easy chairs under a blanket or two and watch the prairie chickens' mating ritual, or "lek." The males use visual and aural displays to attract females.

The farm has been in the Hubbard family for a century. One year, a neighbor told them that the chickens were "booming" out there — booming grounds being the area in which they perform their displays in hopes of attracting females. "We could hear them from the house," Kent said.

At a fundraiser several years ago at Rowe Sanctuary, the Hubbards met Carol Schlagel from McCook, who runs prairie chicken tours at her own lek there. One idea led to another. Soon Kent, a retired farmer, built a blind from a remodeled stock trailer, and Prairie Wind Birding Tours was born.

They drew 46 guests in 12 days that first year. "It wasn't packed, but we said, 'We kinda like this,'" Kent said.

The second year, they drew 280 people. Kent built a second blind. They created rack cards about their tours and placed them at the Kearney Visitors Bureau and Rowe Sanctuary.

Now in its fourth year, their business is just like the prairie chickens. It's booming.

Out-of-towners

The Hubbards host more out-of-towners than locals. "People come to Kearney to see the cranes, and they look for more to do," Robyn said. Monday's group of 19 included visitors from Olympia and Puyallup, Washington, Baltimore, Gainesville, Florida, and Polk City, Iowa.

They've had a Chinese group from New York. Classes come from the University of Nebraska at Kearney to get a first-hand look at the birds. Writer Amy Tan came out when she was in Kearney to speak at a Rowe Sanctuary event last month. On Monday, Janet and Jeff Rathner were in the group.

The Richmond, Virginia, couple had watched sandhill cranes in the blinds at Rowe Sanctuary in both the morning and evenings last week, and "we wanted to see what else was around," Janet said.

Monday morning, before the group headed out, Robyn gave a brief introduction to prairie chickens.

"We're closer to the breeding season, so activity is higher now than it was maybe a month ago," Robyn told them. "Typically, the birds are 20 yards from the blind, but it could be 10 feet at times."

"The birds mate in the short grass areas. Females nest in the tall grass. They

eat grain this time of year, then, after planting, move into pastures for seeds and bugs. They don't migrate. They stay all year," she said.

She reminded the crowd to speak softly in the blinds and to silence their phones. The group then headed out in the predawn darkness.

Sunrise

The birds' low boo-boo-boo sounds rippled through the darkness. Prairie chickens arrive on the lek before dawn and stay for roughly three hours. When the females fly off around 9 or 10 a.m., the males leave, too.

The Hubbards' lek is considered large. It has between 20 and 25 birds. By early April, more females show up. Monday morning, Kent counted 15 females. After all the dancing and courting rituals, a dominant male will emerge, and he'll do 90 percent of the breeding.

The breeding season lasts roughly two months. Females build nests about one mile from the booming grounds and lay between four and 17 eggs, one each day. They sit on the nest for about 23 days.

It's illegal in Nebraska to destroy a lek, but the increasing number of homes being built on pivot corners in the country is threatening the birds, Kent said. Wind energy could have an impact as well.

The prairie chicken breeding season will last until April 20 or so, but the Hubbards will wind up their season after Saturday's tour. "We're getting more and more people," Robyn said. "We're retired. We don't have to do anything that's not fun. We love it, but after five or six weeks, we're tired."

NOXIOUS WEEDS MUST BE CONTROLLED

You are required to control noxious weeds on your property.

The noxious weeds are: Musk Thistle, Plumeless Thistle, Canada Thistle, Leafy Spurge, Knapweed (spotted and diffuse), Purple Loosestrife, Saltcedar, Phragmites, Knotweed (Japanese and Giant) and Sericea Lespedeza. Notice is hereby given this 9th day of APRIL, 2026, pursuant to the Noxious Weed Control Act, section 2-955, subsection 1(a), to every person who owns or controls land in York County, Nebraska, that noxious weeds being grown, or growing on, such land shall be controlled at such frequency as to prevent establishment, provide eradication, or reduce further propagation or dissemination of such weeds.

Upon failure to observe this notice, the county weed superintendent is required to:

1. Proceed pursuant to the law and issue legal notice to the landowner of property infested with noxious weeds and giving such landowner 15 days to control the noxious weed infestation. Conviction for noncompliance may result in a \$100 per day fine to the landowner, with a maximum fine of \$1,500; or
2. Should more immediate control be required, proceed pursuant to the law and have the weeds controlled by such method as he/she finds necessary, the expense of which shall constitute a lien and be entered as a tax against the land, and be collected as other real estate taxes are collected, or by other means, as provided by law.

Also, the public is notified that noxious weed seed and propagative parts may be disseminated through the movement of machinery and equipment, trucks, grain and seed, hay, straw, nursery stock, fencing materials, sod, manure, and soil as well as articles of similar nature. Methods of treatment have been prescribed by the Director of Agriculture and may be obtained from the county weed control authority.

City Administrator Report

Dr. Crawford told the Council the Fire Station is going through the final checklists to verify everything is being completed to satisfaction. A contract was recently approved with Wilkins ADP for space optimization study of two city buildings and the initial meeting for that is happening on Friday. She stated there was a zoom update from Retail Coach.

Annual Police Department report with Chief Tjaden

Chief Tjaden gave an overview of his department for his annual report. He stated there has been a sharp increase of physical assaults, health and human services calls and community special services. He also noted there has been an increase in mental health concern calls. There are not usually as many resources for more rural communities, so those calls become the responsibility of his department. Annual calls for service have increased significantly over the last several years. There are 16 staff primarily taking calls and the increased call volume results in approximately 157 extra calls per person per year. Depending on the type of call, the time can vary greatly. With numbers continuing to rise, he shared with the Council that he would likely be asking for more staff in the future. Chief Tjaden answered questions of the Council.

Update and Tower Crossing Recommendations with Retail Coach

Kyle Cofer, with Retail Coach, updated the Council of the work the Retail Coach has been doing for the City. They have been actively recruiting for ten months. Specific names cannot be mentioned until final deals are completed. The following types of business were mentioned to have interest in possibly starting a business in York: brunch, sandwich, coffee, hardware, small grocer, chicken, junior clothing retail, pizza and Mexican. Space requirements were discussed along with housing availability within York. He stated they will represent the City of York at a convention in Las Vegas in mid-May. He answered questions of the Council. Willard Peterson stated the city needs a fish restaurant.

AGENCY AGREEMENT

Project No. 3-31-0104-020/021-2026 (R04)

This is an agreement between the City of York, Nebraska, hereinafter referred to as the "Airport Sponsor" and the Nebraska Department of Transportation, Division of Aeronautics, hereinafter referred to as the "Division," made and entered into in accordance with, and for the purpose of, complying with the laws of the State of Nebraska.

The Airport Sponsor desires to develop the York Municipal Airport and to use federal airport aid funds available for that purpose. Therefore, the Airport Sponsor hereby designates the Division as its agent in accordance with §3-124 and §3-239, Neb. Rev. Stat. (Reissue 2016), and the Division hereby accepts such designation and agrees to act as the agent of the Airport Sponsor.

It is mutually understood and agreed between the parties that the Airport Sponsor has submitted to the Division its proposed project for the development of said airport, and that such project has been approved by the Division, in accordance with §3-239, Neb. Rev. Stat. (Reissue 2016).

The Airport Sponsor hereby warrants, undertakes, and agrees that if the Federal Aviation Administration makes a grant offer, and the Airport Sponsor executes a Grant Agreement, it will develop and manage said airport in the manner set forth in the Grant Agreement and abide by the conditions, rules, and regulations of the Federal Aviation Administration.

The terms and conditions of this Agency Agreement and the respective duties, undertakings, and agreements of the parties with respect to this Agency Agreement and with respect to the project of airport development, are as follows:

- A. The Division shall accept, receive, receipt for, and disburse all funds granted by the United States for airport aid in accordance with federal laws, rules, and regulations and in accordance with §3-101 to §3-154 and §3-239, Neb. Rev. Stat. (Reissue 2016), as the agent of the Airport Sponsor.
- B. Upon receipt of such federal funds, the Division shall deposit them in the State Treasury, according to law, and shall cause disbursement to be made therefrom as follows:

FIRST: If the Division advances funds to the Airport Sponsor as the equivalent of the United States' share of allowable project cost, the Division shall reimburse itself for any such advancement out of such federal funds thereafter received.

SECOND: The Division shall cause the balance of such federal funds due the Airport Sponsor to be paid promptly to the Airport Sponsor.
- C. The Division shall maintain accurate records of all the funds received and expended by it in connection with the project. These records shall be open to inspection by the Airport Sponsor, the Federal Aviation Administration, and their authorized representatives in the offices of the Division at all reasonable times.

The Airport Sponsor reserves the right, power, and authority to execute the Application for Federal Assistance, the federal Grant Agreement, all construction and engineering contracts, all agreements related to the purchase of land and all amendments to these items. Aside from the matters so reserved, the Division shall, as agent for the Airport Sponsor, process, execute and submit to the Federal Aviation Administration all papers, forms and documents required by that agency for the approval, carrying out and completion of the project.
- E. The Airport Sponsor agrees to reimburse the Division for its administrative costs of furnishing all services performed by it as agent of the Airport Sponsor, including, but not limited to, the services set forth in the attached Exhibit A, "Administrative Services". Division administrative costs charged to the project are considered allowable costs for federal and state participation. These costs will be charged according to the "Schedule of Fees and Charges" shown in the attached Exhibit B, which schedule shall be subject to change upon notification in writing by the Division to the Airport Sponsor.

As used herein, the following words, terms and phrases shall have the meanings herein given:

- "Application for Federal Assistance" means the document prepared as the formal application submitted to the Federal Aviation Administration for a grant of federal funds.
- "Develop" means to plan, construct, or improve the airport as defined in the Application for Federal Assistance.
- "Project" means a plan of action for the accomplishment of specific airport developments.
- "Grant Agreement" means the contract between the United States of America and the Airport Sponsor in which the Federal Aviation Administration, on behalf of the United States, agrees to pay a portion of the allowable costs of the project.

RECITALS

WHEREAS, the City of York, Nebraska (the “City”) and York Public Schools District No. 12 (the "School District") entered into an Interlocal Agreement on August 28, 2014 (the "Interlocal Agreement"), pursuant to the Interlocal Cooperation Act, Nebraska Revised Statutes §§ 13-801 through 13-827, and pursuant to Nebraska Revised Statute § 77-27,142, authorizing additional sales tax authority for public infrastructure purposes; and

WHEREAS, on November 4, 2014 the question of whether to approve an additional one-half cent (½¢) sales tax was submitted to the electors of the City at a general election and the electors voted to approve said sales tax; and

WHEREAS, the York City Council passed Ordinance No. 2120 on November 20, 2014 which amended section 35-2(a) of the York City Code to continue the one and one-half percent (1 ½%) sales and use tax imposed by that section, and imposed an additional one-half of one percent sales and use tax in the City of York as authorized by Neb. Rev. Stat.

§77-27,142 et. seq. (Cum. Supp. 2013), pursuant to approval of the electors of the City at the general election held on November 4, 2014; and

WHEREAS, the Interlocal Agreement created the York Community Infrastructure and Recreation Committee (the “Committee”) to make recommendations on projects to be funded with the additional one-half cent sales tax revenue; and

WHEREAS, Neb. Rev. Stat. §77-27,142 (Reissue 2018) authorizes revenue obtained from a municipal sales tax in excess of one and one-half percent to be used for public infrastructure projects as provided in subsection (2)(b)(ii), which projects include buildings and capital equipment used in the operation of municipal government; and

WHEREAS, the Committee has recommended that \$500,000 in funds generated from the additional one-half cent sales tax be used for the construction of a workforce development center by the Southeast Community College, which facility shall be used for workforce development, i.e. development of job skills and training of prospective employees in the York community, which will facilitate economic development of the York community, and which qualifies as the use of a building in the operation of municipal government as provided in §77-27,142; and

WHEREAS, City Ordinance No. 2120 authorizes the additional one-half of one percent sales and use tax generated to be used for specific projects provided in the ordinance “and all other projects for the betterment of the community of the City”, and the creation of a Workforce Development Center by the Southeast Community Project will serve the betterment of the community of the City; and

WHEREAS, the York City Council and the York Public Schools Board of Education agree that a pledge of payment of Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$500,000) in support of the Southeast Community College Workforce Development Center is an authorized use of such sales tax revenue pursuant to Nebraska statutes, City Ordinance No. 2120, and the Interlocal Agreement; and

WHEREAS, the York City Council and the York Public Schools Board of Education desire to jointly commit and pledge said funds for inclusion in the 2026-2027 fiscal budget year.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT JOINTLY RESOLVED by the City Council of the City of York, Nebraska, and the York Public Schools Board of Education as follows:

Sec. 1. Pledge of Funds.

The City of York, Nebraska and York Public Schools District No. 12 jointly pledge payment of the sum of Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$500,000) in support of the Southeast Community College Workforce Development Center (the “Project”) to be funded through additional one-half cent sales tax revenues generated pursuant to the Interlocal Agreement dated August 28, 2014, as approved by the electors of the City of York, Nebraska on November 4, 2014 and as provided in Ordinance No. 2120 passed on November 20, 2014, and authorized under Neb. Rev. Stat. §77- 27,142. Said funds shall be included and appropriated in the entities’ respective 2026/2027 fiscal year budgets, subject to the availability of funds and in compliance with applicable Nebraska law.

Sec. 2. Designation as Public Infrastructure.

The York City Council and York Public Schools Board of Education hereby find and declare that the Southeast Community College Workforce Development Center constitutes a public infrastructure project within the meaning of Neb. Rev. Stat. §77-27,142(2)(b)(ii), the Interlocal Agreement and Ordinance No. 2120. The building and all associated improvements comprising the Project are hereby designated as qualifying infrastructure, and the expenditure of additional sales tax revenues for the Project is authorized accordingly.

Sec. 3. Authorization of Officials.

The Mayor of the City of York and the Superintendent of the York Public Schools District No. 12, together with all such other officers and staff as may be necessary, are hereby authorized and directed to take all actions, execute all documents, and make all appropriations necessary or desirable to implement this Joint Resolution and effectuate the pledge set forth herein, consistent with the terms of the Interlocal Agreement, Ordinance No. 2120, and applicable Nebraska law.

Sec. 4. Effective Date.

This Joint Resolution shall take effect immediately upon its adoption by the York City Council and the York Public Schools Board of Education.

ADOPTED AND APPROVED by the City Council of the City of York, Nebraska, at a duly noticed public meeting, this ___ day of ___, 2026.

Dr. Mitch Bartholomew, 1720 Duke Circle, York, Nebraska, shared that this was the first time in a decade to possibly partner with Southeast Community College. This project will cost SCC 6–7 million and local input will total 3–4

million. The vision is a facility between 20,000 to 40,000 square feet, where teenagers and adults alike would be able to advance their skill set and businesses could develop their workforce locally. This would be located on the York Public Schools campus and would offer dual credit classes for YPS and regional students. Lisa Hurley, 601 N. Lincoln Ave, York, Nebraska, stated this was truly an economic development project. It would give the community the ability to develop, retain and expand the workforce. This facility would utilize SCC's staff, teachers and programming. SCC has the infrastructure backbone which helps make this project sustainable, with support from the schools and local employers. Councilmember Sheppard spoke on behalf of the LB357 Committee. She shared there is enough money in the fund to cover all bond obligations and also commit this \$500,000 to the project. The LB357 Committee is in support of this project. The attorney advised this project meets the parameters of the LB357 obligations for funding. Willard Peterson stated this would be an amazing opportunity for so many of our young people in the community.

Motion to approve Resolution 2026-10, a joint resolution between the City Council of the City of York, Nebraska and the York Public Schools Board of Education, pledging five hundred thousand dollars (\$500,000.00) in support of the Southeast Community College Workforce Development Center. 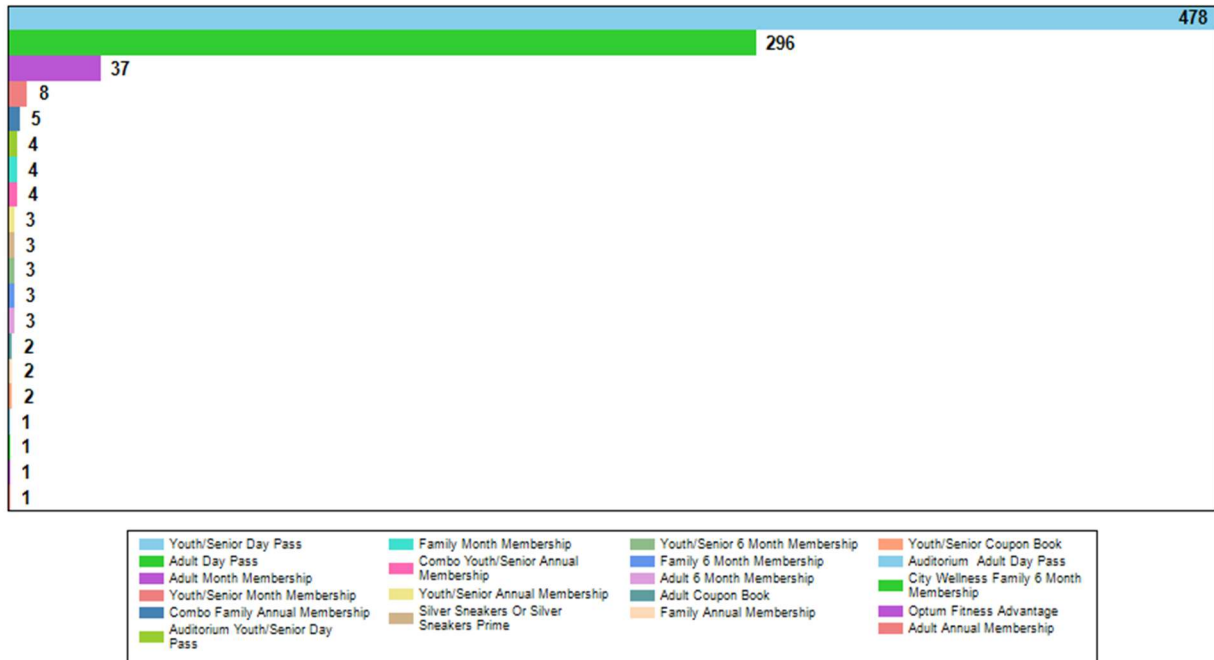

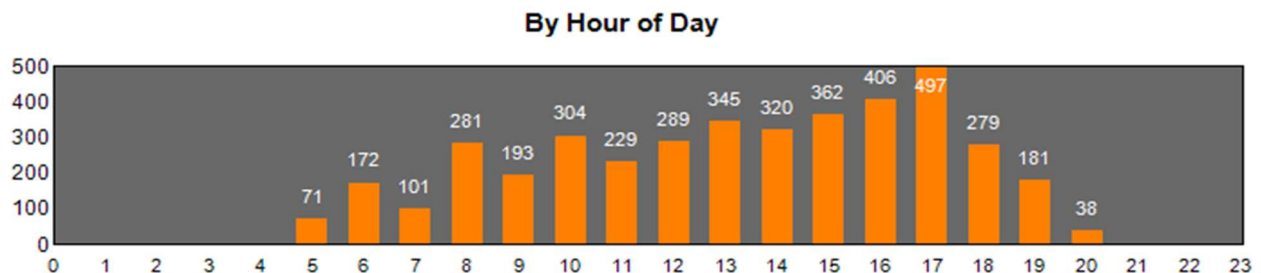
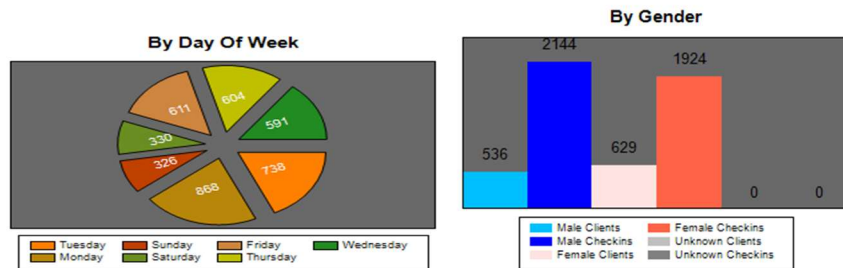

York Fire Department
Monthly Report – March 2026

The York Fire Department responded to 128 calls for service during March. Of these, 91 were 911 responses, 24 were interfacility transfers from York County hospitals to larger hospitals for a higher level of care, and 13 were fire-related calls.

Of the fire calls, 2 were carbon monoxide alerts, 3 were automatic fire alarms, and 8 were outside fire calls. There was no monetary damage reported from these incidents. March was extremely dry, and only a limited number of burn permits were issued.

Department activities during the month focused primarily on the move to the new fire station. Crews spent significant time organizing, packing, and preparing equipment. Volunteers assisted with these efforts on March 10 and March 17.

On March 12, Corteva provided 15 employees to assist with moving larger items from the old station. Their help significantly reduced the workload, and the department expressed its appreciation by providing lunch.

After coordination with the construction contractor and approval from the Nebraska Fire Marshal, the department moved into the new station on March 17. Communications, alerting systems, and telephone services were coordinated for the transition. Vehicles were moved at 0700 hours, and operations were fully functional that day at 1714 North Lincoln Avenue. While the process required considerable effort, the new station is a valuable addition, and the department appreciates the support from the city council and administration.

The Fire Chief conducted a fire extinguisher training class at Perennial Power on March 4, with 32 employees in attendance.

Training during March was limited due to the relocation. However, personnel attended a Retention and Recruitment Leadership class hosted by the Nebraska Fire Chiefs' Association at the Holthus Convention Center on March 21. The session was presented by Chief Doug Cline of Horry County, South Carolina, and was attended by 62 firefighters from across Nebraska. Chief Cline also visited the new station and presented a program titled "Remembering Your Past While Looking Toward the Future."

The department continued fire academy training for three new members.

**ADDENDUM #4 ADDING FILLMORE COUNTY AS A PARTY TO THE
INTERLOCAL AGREEMENT
FOR COOPERATIVE PUBLIC SAFETY SOFTWARE, HARDWARE, AND RELATED
SERVICES BY AND AMONG
THE COUNTIES OF BUTLER, SALINE, SEWARD, YORK, AND FILLMORE
AND THE CITIES OF MILFORD, YORK, SEWARD, CRETE, AND DAVID CITY**

THIS AGREEMENT made and entered by and between the Counties of Butler, Saline, Seward, York, and Fillmore, and the participating Cities of Seward, York, Milford, Crete, and David City, all being political subdivisions of the State of Nebraska, hereinafter referred to collectively as the "Parties" and individually as a "Party."

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS the Interlocal Cooperation Act, *Neb. Rev. Stat. §§13-801 et seq.* (Reissue 2012), permits units of local governments in the State of Nebraska to cooperate with other localities on a basis of mutual advantage and thereby provide services in a manner that will best serve local communities; and

WHEREAS the *Neb. Rev. Stat. §13-801* provides that any one or more public agencies may contract with any one or more public agencies to perform any governmental service, activity, or other undertaking which each public agency entering into the contract is authorized by law to perform; and

WHEREAS, an interlocal was fully executed on January 14, 2020 creating a joint law enforcement case management system consisting of eight (8) agencies, including Seward County Sheriff, Seward Police Department, Seward County 911 Communications Center, Saline County Sheriff, Butler County Sheriff, York County Sheriff, York County 911, and York Police Department; and

WHEREAS the Zuercher Interlocal Agreement, which was fully executed on January 14, 2020, provides for additional agencies to become part of the Zuercher Interlocal Agreement; Specifically, Paragraph 31 provides:

Additional Counties, Cities or Villages may become Parties to this agreement upon acceptance and execution of this agreement, and upon written approval by the governing bodies of all the Parties to this Agreement. It is understood that the addition of another Party(ies), may not have a financial impact on the current Parties (positive or negative) because Zuercher will bill the new Party directly and individually.

WHEREAS the Milford Police Department was added as an additional agency by Addendum #1 executed on or about January 17, 2023; and

WHEREAS the City of David City, the City of Crete, and Butler County 911 were added as additional agencies by Addendum #2, executed on or about June 30, 2025; and

WHEREAS, Fillmore County desires to enter into the Zuercher Interlocal Agreement, for the benefit of its agency Fillmore County Sheriff's Office, as an additional party and be bound to the conditions in the original Zuercher Interlocal Agreement; and

A JOINT RESOLUTION APPROVING AND AUTHORIZING AN AMENDMENT TO THE INTERLOCAL COOPERATION AGREEMENT TO PROVIDE AMBULANCE SERVICE BETWEEN THE CITY OF YORK AND THE COUNTY OF YORK, ORIGINALLY DATED JULY 16, 2019, TO REVISE THE METHOD OF CALCULATING YORK COUNTY'S ANNUAL CONTRIBUTION TO REFLECT ACTUAL NET EMERGENCY MEDICAL SERVICES COSTS AND ACTUAL PERCENTAGES OF YORK COUNTY 911 DISPATCHED CALLS; TO REMOVE THE TRANSFER AND HOSPITAL LANGUAGE FROM SECTION (1); AND TO DELETE SECTION (4) REGARDING PRIVATE AMBULANCE PROVIDERS.

RECITALS

WHEREAS, the City of York, Nebraska (the "City") and the County of York, Nebraska (the "County") entered into an Interlocal Cooperation Agreement to Provide Ambulance Service, dated July 16, 2019 (the "Agreement"), pursuant to the Interlocal Cooperation Act, Nebraska Revised Statutes §§ 13-802 et seq., under which the City provides Emergency Medical Services ("EMS") and ambulance services throughout York County, Nebraska, through the City's Fire Department; and

WHEREAS, the City and County have determined that the fixed payment structure with annual three percent (3%) increases does not adequately reflect the actual net costs incurred by the City in providing EMS and ambulance services, nor does it account for the actual proportion of 911 dispatched EMS calls originating from areas of York County outside the corporate limits of the City of York; and

WHEREAS, the City and County desire to amend the Agreement to establish a cost-sharing formula based on actual net EMS costs — defined as total EMS expenditures less EMS revenues — multiplied by the percentage of York County 911 dispatched EMS calls attributable to the areas of York County served under this Agreement, thereby more equitably and accurately reflecting the County's proportionate share of the cost of services provided; and

WHEREAS, under the revised formula, the City shall send the County a written notice each year by May 1 setting forth the calculation of the County's annual contribution based on the costs, revenues, and call percentages from the previous City of York budget year, and shall invoice the County quarterly in equal installments based on that calculated amount; and

WHEREAS, Section (1) of the Agreement currently provides that the City will continue to provide EMS and ambulance services within York County, "including transfers, both emergency and non-emergency, to major hospitals outside York County as may be required," and the City and County have determined that this transfer and hospital language should be removed from the Agreement, as such services are no longer within the intended scope of the County's contribution obligation under this Agreement; and

WHEREAS, Section (4) of the Agreement currently provides that the City and County will, if permitted by law, take authorized legal actions and enact all necessary ordinances or resolutions to prohibit all private ambulance and/or emergency medical services providers from operating within York County during the term of the Agreement, and the City and County have determined that this provision should be deleted in its entirety from the Agreement; and

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of York and the Board of Commissioners of York County have each determined that the proposed amendment serves the public interest and that it is in the best interest of their respective constituents to approve and authorize said amendment in accordance with the Interlocal Cooperation Act, Nebraska Revised Statutes §§ 13-802 et seq., and Nebraska Revised Statutes § 13-303.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT JOINTLY RESOLVED by the City Council of the City of York, Nebraska, and the Board of Commissioners of York County, Nebraska, as follows:

SECTION 1. RECITALS INCORPORATED.

The foregoing recitals are incorporated herein by reference as if fully set forth.

SECTION 2. APPROVAL OF AMENDMENT.

The City Council of the City of York and the Board of Commissioners of York County hereby approve and authorize an amendment to the Interlocal Cooperation Agreement to Provide Ambulance Service dated July 16, 2019, to: (i) replace the fixed annual payment structure set forth in Section (5) of the Agreement with the net cost formula described herein; (ii) amend Section (1) of the Agreement to remove the transfer and hospital language; and (iii) delete Section (4) of the Agreement in its entirety.

SECTION 3. REVISED COST-SHARING FORMULA.

Section (5) of the Agreement is hereby amended to provide that the County's annual contribution to the City shall be calculated as follows:

(a) Formula. The County's annual payment shall equal the Net EMS Costs multiplied by the County Call Percentage, where:

$$\text{Net EMS Costs} = \text{Total EMS Expenditures} - \text{Total EMS Revenues}$$

County Call Percentage = the percentage of total York County 911 dispatched EMS calls attributable to the service districts within York County outside the corporate limits of the City of York served under this Agreement for the preceding City of York budget year.

(b) Annual Notice. On or before May 1 of each year, the City shall provide the County with a written notice setting forth the calculation of the County's annual contribution, based on the

actual EMS costs, revenues, and County call percentage from the previous City of York budget year.

(c) Quarterly Invoicing. The City shall invoice the County in four equal quarterly installments, on the same quarterly dates specified in the Agreement, based on the annual contribution amount calculated pursuant to subsection (a) and communicated pursuant to subsection (b).

SECTION 4. AMENDMENT TO SECTION (1) — SCOPE OF SERVICES.

Section (1) of the Agreement is hereby amended to delete the phrase "including transfers, both emergency and non-emergency, to major hospitals outside York County as may be required." As amended, Section (1) shall read as follows:

"(1) That the City will continue to provide EMS and ambulance services within the County of York."

SECTION 5. DELETION OF SECTION (4) — PRIVATE AMBULANCE PROVIDERS.

Section (4) of the Agreement, which provides that the City and County will take authorized legal actions to prohibit private ambulance and/or emergency medical services providers from operating within York County during the term of the Agreement, is hereby deleted in its entirety. The remaining sections of the Agreement shall be renumbered accordingly.

SECTION 6. REMAINING TERMS UNCHANGED.

Except as expressly amended herein, all other terms, conditions, and provisions of the Agreement dated July 16, 2019, including without limitation the termination provisions and compliance with public hearing requirements under Nebraska Revised Statutes § 13-303, shall remain in full force and effect.

SECTION 7. AUTHORIZATION OF OFFICIALS.

The Mayor of the City of York and the Chairman of the York County Board of Commissioners, together with the respective clerks of each governing body, are hereby authorized and directed to execute the Amendment to the Agreement and any other documents necessary to effectuate the intent of this Joint Resolution.

SECTION 8. PUBLIC HEARING COMPLIANCE.

This Joint Resolution and the Amendment to the Agreement are conditioned upon compliance by both the City and the County with the public hearing requirements of Nebraska Revised Statutes § 13-303, and appropriate action by ordinance or resolution by each respective governing body. In the event this Amendment is not approved by either the City or the County following such public hearing, or approval is otherwise not obtained, the Amendment shall be of no further force and effect.

SECTION 9. EFFECTIVE DATE.

This Joint Resolution and the Amendment to the Agreement shall take effect upon execution by both parties and shall govern the County's annual contribution beginning with the 2026/2027 City of York budget year.

RESOLUTION NO. 2026-12

A resolution to authorize the designation of school crossing zones and to authorize the amendment of speed limits, and the placement of signs to mark the school crossing zones and speed limits as authorized by this resolution.

WHEREAS, the City Council has been made aware of traffic conditions existing in areas of school crossings within the City and the need to adopt additional safety measures to provide for the safety of pedestrians in the areas designated by school crossing zones; and

WHEREAS, the City has received an engineering study regarding traffic conditions and pedestrian activity in the areas in proximity to schools; and

WHEREAS, the engineering study has recommended that the City establish school crossing zones and adjust the speed limits in the areas to include and surrounding said school crossing zones, which study was conducted for the purpose of improving public safety of pedestrians in such areas.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT HEREBY RESOLVED by the Mayor and City Council of the City of York, Nebraska, that the following areas shall be designated to be school crossing zones and appropriate signs placed to provide for safety of pedestrians in such zones:

York Elementary School: North Delaware Avenue and East 14th Street for northbound and southbound traffic; East 12th Street and North Delaware Avenue for eastbound and westbound traffic; North Maine Avenue and East 14th Street for northbound and southbound traffic; East 12th Street and Wisconsin Avenue for northbound, southbound, eastbound and westbound traffic; Washington Avenue and East 15th Street for northbound and southbound traffic.

York Middle School and High School: East Avenue and East 18th Street for northbound and southbound traffic; East Avenue and East 14th Street for eastbound and westbound traffic; East 19th Street and North Linden Avenue for northbound, southbound, eastbound and westbound traffic; East 19th Street and North Blackburn Avenue for eastbound and westbound traffic; North Blackburn Avenue and Duke Drive for northbound and southbound traffic; East 14th Street and Blackburn Avenue for eastbound and westbound traffic; North Blackburn Avenue and East 12th Street for northbound, southbound, eastbound and westbound traffic; North Delaware Avenue and East 12th Street for northbound, southbound, eastbound and westbound traffic; North Delaware Avenue and East 14th Street for northbound and southbound traffic; North Delaware Avenue and Duke Drive for northbound, southbound, eastbound and westbound traffic; North Delaware Avenue between Middle School and High School drives for northbound and southbound traffic.

Emmanuel Lutheran School: Academy Avenue and West 6th Street for northbound and southbound traffic; West 6th Street and Division Avenue for northbound, southbound, eastbound and westbound traffic; West 6th Street and North York Avenue for northbound and southbound traffic; North Beaver Avenue and West 6th Street for northbound and southbound traffic; North Beaver Avenue and West 8th street for northbound, southbound, eastbound and westbound traffic; North Beaver Avenue and West 9th Street for eastbound and westbound traffic; North Platte Avenue and West 8th Street for northbound and southbound traffic; North Grant Avenue and West 8th Street for northbound traffic;

North Nebraska Avenue and West 8th Street for northbound and southbound traffic; North Nebraska Avenue and East 7th Street for northbound and southbound traffic.

St. Joseph Catholic School: East 6th Street and East Avenue for northbound, southbound, eastbound and westbound traffic; East 6th Street and High Street for eastbound and westbound traffic; East 4th Street and East Avenue for eastbound and westbound traffic; East 4th Street and College Avenue for northbound, southbound, eastbound and westbound traffic; Thompson Avenue and East 4th Street for northbound and southbound traffic; East Avenue and 3rd Street for northbound and southbound traffic.

The following speed limit of 20 mph while children are present shall be adopted and appropriate signs placed to designate such speed limits in the following locations:

York Middle School and High School: North Blackburn Avenue between East 19th Street and East 14th Street for northbound and southbound traffic; Duke Drive between North Blackburn Avenue and North Delaware Avenue for eastbound and westbound traffic; North Delaware Avenue between East 14th Street and East 19th Street for northbound and southbound traffic; North Maine Avenue between Meadow Lane and East 15th Street for northbound and southbound traffic.

Emmanuel Lutheran School: West 9th Street between North York Avenue and North Lincoln Avenue for eastbound and westbound traffic; West 8th Street between North York Avenue and North Lincoln Avenue for eastbound and westbound Traffic; West 6th Street between Academy Avenue and North York Avenue for eastbound and westbound traffic; North Beaver Avenue between West 7th Street and West 10th Street for northbound and southbound traffic; North Platte Avenue between West 7th Street and West 10th Street for northbound and southbound traffic.

St. Joseph's Catholic School: East Avenue between East 6th Street and East 4th Street for northbound and southbound traffic; College Avenue between East 6th Street and East 4th Street for northbound and southbound traffic; East 4th Street between East Avenue and Thompson Avenue for eastbound and westbound traffic.

ORDINANCE NO. 2434

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND CHAPTER 12, SECTION 12-2 OF THE YORK CITY CODE TO CORRECT A TYPOGRAPHICAL ERROR IN THE DATE OF THE LICENSE PERIOD SET FORTH IN THE ORDINANCE; TO REPEAL ALL ORDINANCES IN CONFLICT HERewith; AND TO PROVIDE FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE FOR THIS ORDINANCE.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF YORK, NEBRASKA:

Section 1. Chapter 12, section 12-2 of the City Code of the City of York, Nebraska is hereby amended to correct the dates of the license period as set forth below:

Each general contractor, construction contractor or sub-contractor doing business within the City is required to register with the City Clerk and obtain a license each year prior to January 1, which license shall be in force and effect from January 1 through December 31. The applicant shall pay the registration fee at the time of registration.

Section 2. All ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

Section 3. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage, approval and publication as required by law.
