Texas authorities believe Lincoln murder suspect took his own life

A Lincoln man who was arrested last month and was awaiting extradition in connection with a double slaying in Houston in 1990 has died, the Lancaster County Sheriff's Office says.

Floyd Parrott, 64, had been set for court later this week.

Courtney Fischer, a spokesperson for the Harris County District Attorney's office, told the Houston Chronicle that authorities believe he took his own life ahead of the Thursday hearing.

At a news conference Tuesday afternoon, Chief Deputy Sheriff Ben Houchin didn't elaborate on a suspected cause of death but said Parrott was alone in his cell at the Lancaster County jail when he was found.

"I know the public is very interested in what happened, and we will release information as it comes," he said.

Houchin said at 7:23 a.m. Tuesday, staff at the Lancaster County Department of Corrections found Parrott unconscious in his cell, began CPR immediately and called

for medical services. He said they will review video, conduct interviews and look at the autopsy results. It could be a while before they know everything, Houchin said.

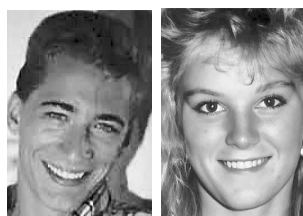
"Everybody wants us to make sure we do a complete investigation, and I want to make sure I'm 100% satisfied with our findings before we release the cause of death," he said. An autopsy was scheduled for Wednesday morning.

A grand jury will be called to review his death. A month ago, the lead prosecutor in the Lovers Lane Murders in Texas shared photos of the suspect and his car from that time period and called on locals to come forward with information.

"We truly believe there are more victims out there," Harris County District Attorney Sean Teare said at a news conference after Parrott's arrest.

An FBI SWAT team arrested Parrott on March 25 at the Northridge Heights Apartments in north Lincoln where he lived. He was being held without bond at the Lancaster County jail while Teare's office worked to get a governor's warrant.

Lancaster County Attorney Pat Condon said they had expected to serve a governor's warrant on Parrott within the next couple of days that would have initiated the



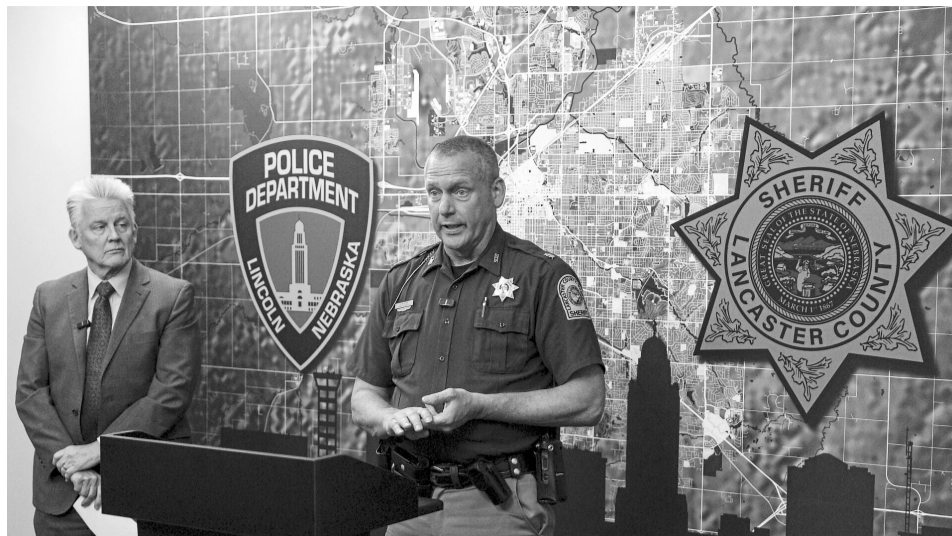

proceedings to return him to Texas involuntarily.

According to the criminal complaint filed in Texas, Houston Police believe Parrott tied up and murdered Andy Atkinson and raped and murdered Cheryl Henry on the night of Aug. 22, 1990.

The next day, a security guard found a purse with Henry's ID in it on the passenger floorboard of a Honda Civic left in a remote cul-de-sac and learned family had reported her missing that morning after she didn't show up for work. Police searched the wooded area near the car and found her body, with fatal injuries to her neck from a knife or other sharp object. Then, they found Atkinson's body about 150 or 200 yards away, tied and propped up against a tree, his neck cut.

Teare said they didn't know yet when Parrott came to Lincoln but believe he had been living here for a period of months. Teare said the 64-year-old has lived in the Houston area for the vast

majority of his life and left less than two years ago.

Lincoln Police said they had no recorded contacts with him. Teare said in Texas Parrott had been holding himself out to be law enforcement for years and may have done it to approach Henry and Atkinson. He had worked just over a mile from where the bodies were found.

"We believe that there are victims of numerous different types of crimes that are still living with it right now. We need to know the full picture

of what Floyd William Parrott was doing in our community," he said last month.

Teare credited a tip that gave police Parrott's name as a possible suspect and the fresh eyes of a Houston Police investigator, who started looking at the case late last year. In a statement Tuesday, Samantha Knecht, division chief prosecutor of the Cold Case Division of Teare's office, said they ache for the victims' families, "who were denied their day in court."

"Our anger for what Parrott took from them is matched only by our determination to keep going," she said. "Yes, we are still working. Parrott's death does not erase his crimes or end our motivation."

Knecht said they were in Louisiana now seeking to close a cold case linked to him, confirming that new survivors had come forward following their call for information last month.

Protein craze has farmers betting on peas, lentils

Aaron Smith, a fifth-generation pea and lentil farmer in northern Idaho, says the dizzying rise of GLP-1 medications and a social media-fueled protein craze may be his farm's only path to profit this year.

The farm economy has been pummeled by low crop prices caused by a grain oversupply, tit-for-tat tariffs triggered by President Donald Trump's trade war and skyrocketing prices of fertilizer and diesel. But pulses — which include peas, lentils and chickpeas — have been a bright spot due to rising demand for protein-infused foods beyond traditional sources like meat, poultry and fish.

Growers of the protein-rich crops see planting them as a way to weather an agricultural economy that has been in a yearslong downward spiral. U.S. farmers are facing the fourth straight year of low-to-negative profit margins despite near-record government payouts, and farm bankruptcies increased by 46% from 2024 to 2025, court records show.

"We've been waiting for this moment to happen," Smith said, noting that he is swapping wheat acres for pulses this year with prices of the former so low. "This can be a gamechanger."

These foods are at the center of an innovation boom that has taken off since the pandemic, led in part by social media influencers, some of whom are making dubious claims that raise concerns that this is another fad-driven diet due to expire. Still, planted acres of yellow peas have risen 55% over the past 15 years, according to U.S. Department of Agriculture data. At the same time, U.S. yellow pea exports dropped 81% between 2021 and 2025, according to U.S. Customs data, showing that the additional crops are being consumed in the U.S., experts said.

Toast Crunch cereal made by General Mills in partnership with Ghost, a sports nutrition brand, features 17 grams of protein per serving, compared to 2 grams in the original version.

Protein isolates extracted from peas are being infused into fruit-flavored sodas, while lentil flour is increasingly being processed into pastas.

McKade Mahlen, a fourth-generation farmer in Montana's rolling prairie, said peas and lentils may be his only two crops that generate a profit this year. He estimated he'll lose roughly \$35 for every acre of wheat planted, but will make \$8 for every acre of lentils.

"Finally, we've found something that has a positive margin for us," Mahlen said, without providing additional details on his plantings.

Many farmers already rotate grain plantings with pulses to prevent disease and imbue the soil with nitrogen crucial for healthy crop growth. The seeds are relatively cheap, and the nitrogen means they require little additional fertilizer to grow, a quality that has made them more attractive as the U.S.-Iran war chokes off the flow of fertilizer.

"Pulses have the most hope for coming out of this in better shape because input costs are so low," said Tim McGreevy,

a farmer and CEO of USA Pulses, an Idaho-based trade organization.

Protein craze

Nutrition experts said the protein boom is out of step with actual dietary needs.

The average American already eats one gram of protein per kilogram of body weight, according to Johns Hopkins University, more than the 0.8 grams per kilogram recommended by many experts. The U.S. Department of Health and Human Services in January controversially raised its recommended daily protein intake for adults from 0.8 grams to 1.2 to 1.6 grams per kilogram of body weight.

"There is no epidemic of protein underconsumption. You don't need protein water, protein waffles, protein chocolate," said Stuart Phillips, nutrition and exercise researcher at McMaster University in Hamilton, Ontario.

TikTok influencers are pushing "protein maxxing," encouraging followers to consume enormous amounts of protein with every meal, often with dubious claims that it will cure chronic illnesses, help with weight loss and improve skin. Other influencers touting high-protein diets include moms sharing recipes for protein banana bread that they say will help rebuild muscle after giving birth.

GLP-1 users, a fast-growing group that made up around 12% of the U.S. population in 2025, often seek protein-dense food to avoid muscle loss, a common side effect.

"Marketers of protein are exploiting this," said Marion Nestle, professor of nutrition, food studies and public health at New York University. "It's nutritionally hilarious."

Major agricultural companies have invested in pulses

since about 2020. Grain giant Archer-Daniels-Midland touts its line of pea protein products that can be used in everything from cupcakes to protein bars. Cargill in 2018 partnered with Minneapolis-based Puris, a niche company that turns peas into protein isolates used in snacks and drinks.

Puris CEO Tyler Lorenzen said demand for pea protein, mostly sourced from farmers in the U.S., soared during the pandemic as Americans became more health-conscious.

"It's the same foods people already love to eat, but they're more rich in protein," Lorenzen said. "Protein is more in the mainstream zeitgeist today than it has ever been."

Nestle, however, said people shouldn't be fooled into thinking soda is now a health food.

"It's about selling products. The sodas, waters, everything," she said. "Just eat food. If you want pea protein, eat peas. If you want lentil protein, eat lentils. If you want whey protein, eat cheeses or yogurts or whatever."



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Poll: Americans divided on birthright citizenship

WASHINGTON — A majority of Americans believe all babies born in the country should automatically be granted citizenship, according to a Reuters/Ipsos poll carried out as the U.S. Supreme Court prepares to rule on President Donald Trump's effort to end the practice.

The high court is poised to rule in the coming weeks on a range of polarizing issues — from immigration policy and transgender rights to rules on

how to count mail-in ballots — that could help define the Republican president's legacy and set key rules for the Nov. 3 midterm elections.

The poll, conducted nationwide April 15-20, found that 64% of Americans oppose ending birthright citizenship, while 32% support scrapping it as Trump ordered in January 2025.

Trump's executive order was challenged in court, and Supreme Court justices are expected to rule by the end of June in what will be a landmark civil rights case

and a test for Trump's hard-line immigration agenda. The high court, which has a 6-3 conservative majority, appeared unlikely to side with Trump during an April 1 oral argument.

Public perception of birthright citizenship is split along party lines, the Reuters/Ipsos poll found. Only 9% of Democrats think the policy should be scrapped, but Republicans are divided, with 62% supporting an end to birthright citizenship and 36% in favor of keeping it.

JOINT RESOLUTION 2026-11

OF THE

CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF YORK, NEBRASKA

AND THE

BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS OF YORK COUNTY, NEBRASKA

A JOINT RESOLUTION APPROVING AND AUTHORIZING AN AMENDMENT TO THE INTERLOCAL COOPERATION AGREEMENT TO PROVIDE AMBULANCE SERVICE BETWEEN THE CITY OF YORK AND THE COUNTY OF YORK, ORIGINALLY DATED JULY 16, 2019, TO REVISE THE METHOD OF CALCULATING YORK COUNTY'S ANNUAL CONTRIBUTION TO REFLECT ACTUAL NET EMERGENCY MEDICAL SERVICES COSTS AND ACTUAL PERCENTAGES OF YORK COUNTY 911 DISPATCHED CALLS; TO REMOVE THE TRANSFER AND HOSPITAL LANGUAGE FROM SECTION (1); AND TO DELETE SECTION (4) REGARDING PRIVATE AMBULANCE PROVIDERS.

RECITALS

WHEREAS, the City of York, Nebraska (the "City") and the County of York, Nebraska (the "County") entered into an Interlocal Cooperation Agreement to Provide Ambulance Service, dated July 16, 2019 (the "Agreement"), pursuant to the Interlocal Cooperation Act, Nebraska Revised Statutes §§ 13-802 et seq., under which the City provides Emergency Medical Services ("EMS") and ambulance services throughout York County, Nebraska, through the City's Fire Department; and

WHEREAS, the City and County have determined that the fixed payment structure with annual three percent (3%) increases does not adequately reflect the actual net costs incurred by the City in providing EMS and ambulance services, nor does it account for the actual proportion of 911 dispatched EMS calls originating from areas of York County outside the corporate limits of the City of York; and

WHEREAS, the City and County desire to amend the Agreement to establish a cost-sharing formula based on actual net EMS costs — defined as total EMS expenditures less EMS revenues — multiplied by the percentage of York County 911 dispatched EMS calls attributable to the areas of York County served under this Agreement, thereby more equitably and accurately reflecting the County's proportionate share of the cost of services provided; and

WHEREAS, under the revised formula, the City shall send the County a written notice each year by May 1 setting forth the calculation of the County's annual contribution based on the costs, revenues, and call percentages from the previous

City of York budget year, and shall invoice the County quarterly in equal installments based on that calculated amount; and

WHEREAS, Section (1) of the Agreement currently provides that the City will continue to provide EMS and ambulance services within York County, "including transfers, both emergency and non-emergency, to major hospitals outside York County as may be required," and the City and County have determined that this transfer and hospital language should be removed from the Agreement, as such services are no longer within the intended scope of the County's contribution obligation under this Agreement; and

WHEREAS, Section (4) of the Agreement currently provides that the City and County will, if permitted by law, take authorized legal actions and enact all necessary ordinances or resolutions to prohibit all private ambulance and/or emergency medical services providers from operating within York County during the term of the Agreement, and the City and County have determined that this provision should be deleted in its entirety from the Agreement; and

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of York and the Board of Commissioners of York County have each determined that the proposed amendment serves the public interest and that it is in the best interest of their respective constituents to approve and authorize said amendment in accordance with the Interlocal Cooperation Act, Nebraska Revised Statutes §§ 13-802 et seq., and Nebraska Revised Statutes § 13-303.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT JOINTLY RESOLVED by the City Council of the City of York, Nebraska, and the Board of Commissioners of York County, Nebraska, as follows:

SECTION 1. RECITALS INCORPORATED.

The foregoing recitals are incorporated herein by reference as if fully set forth.

SECTION 2. APPROVAL OF AMENDMENT.

The City Council of the City of York and the Board of Commissioners of York County hereby approve and authorize an amendment to the Interlocal Cooperation Agreement to Provide Ambulance Service dated July 16, 2019, to: (i) replace the fixed annual payment structure set forth in Section (5) of the Agreement with the net cost formula described herein; (ii) amend Section (1) of the Agreement to remove the transfer and hospital language; and (iii) delete Section (4) of the Agreement in its entirety.

SECTION 3. REVISED COST-SHARING FORMULA.

Section (5) of the Agreement is hereby amended to provide that the County's annual contribution to the City shall be calculated as follows:

(a) Formula. The County's annual payment shall equal the Net EMS Costs multiplied by the County Call Percentage, where:

$$\text{Net EMS Costs} = \text{Total EMS Expenditures} - \text{Total EMS Revenues}$$

County Call Percentage = the percentage of total York County 911 dispatched EMS calls attributable to the service districts within York County outside the corporate limits of the City of York served under this Agreement for the preceding City of York budget year.

(b) Annual Notice. On or before May 1 of each year, the City shall provide the County with a written notice setting forth the calculation of the County's annual contribution, based on the actual EMS costs, revenues, and County call percentage from the previous City of York budget year.

(c) Quarterly Invoicing. The City shall invoice the County in four equal quarterly installments, on the same quarterly dates specified in the Agreement, based on the annual contribution amount calculated pursuant to subsection (a) and communicated pursuant to subsection (b).

SECTION 4. AMENDMENT TO SECTION (1) — SCOPE OF SERVICES.

Section (1) of the Agreement is hereby amended to delete the phrase "including transfers, both emergency and non-emergency, to major hospitals outside York County as may be required." As amended, Section (1) shall read as follows:

"(1) That the City will continue to provide EMS and ambulance services within the County of York."

SECTION 5. DELETION OF SECTION (4) — PRIVATE AMBULANCE PROVIDERS.

Section (4) of the Agreement, which provides that the City and County will take authorized legal actions to prohibit private ambulance and/or emergency medical services providers from operating within York County during the term of the Agreement, is hereby deleted in its entirety. The remaining sections of the Agreement shall be renumbered accordingly.

SECTION 6. REMAINING TERMS UNCHANGED.

Except as expressly amended herein, all other terms, conditions, and provisions of the Agreement dated July 16, 2019, including without limitation the termination provisions and compliance with public hearing requirements under Nebraska Revised Statutes § 13-303, shall remain in full force and effect.

SECTION 7. AUTHORIZATION OF OFFICIALS.

The Mayor of the City of York and the Chairman of the York County Board of Commissioners, together with the respective clerks of each governing body, are hereby authorized and directed to execute the Amendment to the Agreement and any other documents necessary to effectuate the intent of this Joint Resolution.

SECTION 8. PUBLIC HEARING COMPLIANCE.

This Joint Resolution and the Amendment to the Agreement are conditioned upon compliance by both the City and the County with the public hearing requirements of Nebraska Revised Statutes § 13-303, and appropriate action by ordinance

or resolution by each respective governing body. In the event this Amendment is not approved by either the City or the County following such public hearing, or approval is otherwise not obtained, the Amendment shall be of no further force and effect.

SECTION 9. EFFECTIVE DATE.

This Joint Resolution and the Amendment to the Agreement shall take effect upon execution by both parties and shall govern the County's annual contribution beginning with the 2026/2027 City of York budget year.

ADOPTED AND APPROVED by the City Council of the City of York, Nebraska, at a duly noticed public meeting, this 16th day of April, 2026.

RESOLUTION NO. 2026-12

A resolution to authorize the designation of school crossing zones and to authorize the amendment of speed limits, and the placement of signs to mark the school crossing zones and speed limits as authorized by this resolution.

WHEREAS, the City Council has been made aware of traffic conditions existing in areas of school crossings within the City and the need to adopt additional safety measures to provide for the safety of pedestrians in the areas designated by school crossing zones; and

WHEREAS, the City has received an engineering study regarding traffic conditions and pedestrian activity in the areas in proximity to schools; and

WHEREAS, the engineering study has recommended that the City establish school crossing zones and adjust the speed limits in the areas to include and surrounding said school crossing zones, which study was conducted for the purpose of improving public safety of pedestrians in such areas.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT HEREBY RESOLVED by the Mayor and City Council of the City of York, Nebraska, that the following areas shall be designated to be school crossing zones and appropriate signs placed to provide for safety of pedestrians in such zones:

York Elementary School: North Delaware Avenue and East 14th Street for northbound and southbound traffic; East 12th Street and North Delaware Avenue for eastbound and westbound traffic; North Maine Avenue and East 14th Street for northbound and southbound traffic; East 12th Street and Wisconsin Avenue for northbound, southbound, eastbound and westbound traffic; Washington Avenue and East 15th Street for northbound and southbound traffic.

York Middle School and High School: East Avenue and East 18th Street for northbound and southbound traffic; East Avenue and East 14th Street for eastbound and westbound traffic; East 19th Street and North Linden Avenue for northbound, southbound, eastbound and westbound traffic; East 19th Street and North Blackburn Avenue for eastbound and westbound traffic; North Blackburn Avenue and Duke Drive for northbound and southbound traffic; East 14th Street and Blackburn Avenue for eastbound and westbound traffic; North Blackburn Avenue and East 12th Street for northbound, southbound, eastbound and westbound traffic; North Delaware Avenue and East 12th Street for northbound, southbound, eastbound and westbound traffic; North Delaware Avenue and East 14th Street for northbound and southbound traffic; North Delaware Avenue and Duke Drive for northbound, southbound, eastbound and westbound traffic; North Delaware Avenue between Middle School and High School drives for northbound and southbound traffic.

Emmanuel Lutheran School: Academy Avenue and West 6th Street for northbound and southbound traffic; West 6th Street and Division Avenue for northbound, southbound, eastbound and westbound traffic; West 6th Street and North York Avenue for northbound and southbound traffic; North Beaver Avenue and West 6th Street for northbound and southbound traffic; North Beaver Avenue and West 8th street for northbound, southbound, eastbound and westbound traffic; North Beaver Avenue and West 9th Street for eastbound and westbound traffic; North Platte Avenue and West 8th Street for northbound and southbound traffic; North Grant Avenue and West 8th Street for northbound traffic; North Nebraska Avenue and West 8th Street for northbound and southbound traffic; North Nebraska Avenue and East 7th Street for northbound and southbound traffic.

St. Joseph Catholic School: East 6th Street and East Avenue for northbound, southbound, eastbound and westbound traffic; East 6th Street and High Street for eastbound and westbound traffic; East 4th Street and East Avenue for eastbound and westbound traffic; East 4th Street and College Avenue for northbound, southbound, eastbound and westbound traffic; Thompson Avenue and East 4th Street for northbound and southbound traffic; East Avenue and 3rd Street for northbound and southbound traffic.

The following speed limit of 20 mph while children are present shall be adopted and appropriate signs placed to designate such speed limits in the following locations:

York Elementary School: East 15th Street between Maine Avenue and Pennsylvania Avenue for eastbound and westbound traffic; East 14th Street between Maine Avenue and Indiana Avenue for eastbound and westbound traffic; Pennsylvania Avenue between East 12th Street and East 15th Street for northbound and southbound traffic; Indiana Avenue between East 12th Street and East 14th Street for northbound and southbound traffic; Wisconsin Avenue between East 12th Street and East 14th Street for northbound and southbound traffic; East 14th Street between Wisconsin Avenue and Washinton Avenue for eastbound and westbound traffic; Washington Avenue between East 12th Street and East 17th Street for northbound and southbound traffic.

York Middle School and High School: North Blackburn Avenue between East 19th Street and East 14th Street for northbound and southbound traffic; Duke Drive between North Blackburn Avenue and North Delaware Avenue for eastbound and westbound traffic; North Delaware Avenue between East 14th Street and East 19th Street for northbound and southbound traffic; North Maine Avenue between Meadow Lane and East 15th Street for northbound and southbound traffic.

Emmanuel Lutheran School: West 9th Street between North York Avenue and North Lincoln Avenue for eastbound and westbound traffic; West 8th Street between North York Avenue and North Lincoln Avenue for eastbound and westbound traffic; West 6th Street between Academy Avenue and North York Avenue for eastbound and westbound traffic; North Beaver Avenue between West 7th Street and West 10th Street for northbound and southbound traffic; North Platte Avenue between West 7th Street and West 10th Street for northbound and southbound traffic.

St. Joseph's Catholic School: East Avenue between East 6th Street and East 4th Street for northbound and southbound traffic; College Avenue between East 6th Street and East 4th Street for northbound and southbound traffic; East 4th Street between East Avenue and Thompson Avenue for eastbound and westbound traffic.

**By the Mayor of the City of York, Nebraska
A Proclamation for the National Day of Prayer 2026**

WHEREAS: Since the early days of the colonists, governing authorities in our nation have appointed a Day of Humiliation, Fasting and Prayer, to implore Providence's mercy and intervention as they faced drought, various trials, dangers and threats.

WHEREAS: Less than two months after the battle of Lexington and Concord, the First Continental Congress encouraged a National Day of Prayer that "with united hearts and voices, unfeignedly confess and deplore our many sins and offer up our joint supplications to the All-wise, Omnipotent and merciful Disposer of All Events, humbly beseeching Him to forgive our iniquities."

WHEREAS: The second Continental Congress authorized a Day of Prayer in May 1776 "to acknowledge the over ruling providence of God,...[in] prospering our strenuous efforts in the cause of freedom, virtue, and posterity...Earnestly beseeching him to bless our civil rulers, and the representatives of the people...to give wisdom and stability to their counsels."

WHEREAS: George Washington, the first president of the United States, in his first Inaugural Address offered "my fervent supplications to that Almighty Being who rules over the universe, who presides in the counsels of nations, and whose providential aids can supply every defect, that His benediction may consecrate to the liberties and happiness of the people of the United States a government instituted by themselves for these essential purposes."

WHEREAS: During the Civil War, President Abraham Lincoln proclaimed a National Day of Prayer, stating: "We have forgotten God...We have vainly imagined, in the deceitfulness of our hearts, that all these blessings were produced by some superior wisdom and virtue of our own. Intoxicated with unbroken success, we have become...too proud to pray to the God that made us! It behooves us then to humble ourselves before the offended Power, to confess our national sins."

WHEREAS: In 1952, the United States Congress passed Public Law 82-324, Sec. 119, and signed by President Dwight Eisenhower that the President shall proclaim a suitable day each year as a National Day of Prayer.

WHEREAS: In 1988, the law was amended by the United States Congress and signed by President Ronald Reagon that the first Thursday of May annually be recognized as the National Day of Prayer.

WHEREAS: In every state across America the observance of the National Day of Prayer will be held on Thursday, May 7, 2026, with the theme “Glorify God Among the Nations, Seeking Him in All Generations.” The theme is based on the Bible verses found in I Chronicles 16: 15 and 24: “The LORD our God remembers his covenant for a thousand generations...Tell of His glory among the nations.”

WHEREAS: Unified prayer is mobilized across America on the National Day of Prayer, as neighbors come together to join their hearts and voices in reading sacred Scriptures and seeking God for their city and country where they live, learn, work, worship, serve, and desire all to thrive in this 250th year of America’s freedom and independence; and

WHEREAS: We express our faith and exercise our freedom in prayer, unite our hearts and voices in personal prayer and public gatherings across America with fervent praise, repentance, love and humble intercession for our neighbor, our city and nation, and invite God’s glory to fill the City of York.

ORDINANCE NO. 2435

AN ORDINANCE TO AUTHORIZE THE PURCHASE OF REAL ESTATE BY THE CITY OF YORK AND TO ESTABLISH THE EFFECTIVE DATE OF THIS ORDINANCE.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF YORK, NEBRASKA:

SECTION 1. Pursuant to a Notice of public hearing that has been properly published to authorize the acquisition of real estate by the City of York, Nebraska as provided by Neb. Rev. Stat. §18-1755 (Reissue 2022) and a public hearing held upon said Notice before the York City Council, the Council hereby authorizes the acquisition of the following described real estate on behalf of the City of York which property is to be acquired and maintained for the purpose of a public park:

Lot 1, McGowan Subdivision, Part of the Northeast Quarter (NE $\frac{1}{4}$) of Section Twenty-four (24), Township Ten (10) North, Range Three (3) West of the 6th P.M., York County, Nebraska, EXCEPT that part conveyed to the City of York, Nebraska, a Municipal Corporation in Warranty Deed filed March 4, 1997, Book 176, Page 338.

SECTION 2. The City of York, Nebraska is authorized to purchase the real estate described above from the owner for the sum of Sixty Seven Thousand and no/100 Dollars (\$67,000.00) plus closing costs.
