

















Founding of the Community





Initially, the area around Bennet in Larimer County was inhabited by 25 Indian Americans who sold their land to local buyers. In 1850, Dr. Stephen Madison was the first settler, he sold tracts in the area, a milk ranch, and an adjacent 100-acre homestead. He owned 500 acres, 1100 acres and sold 1172 more acres. Madison, in turn, a stream of immigrants and farmers, as well as a major thoroughfare Larimer County on the west side of what is now the Snake River Valley. Madison then built a building, a store, a mill, a sawmill, and a mill, who sold goods, services and finally settled here in the city in 1850. The Bennet Aces

The first sport offered at Bennet School was boys' basketball, but by the 1920s, track, tennis and ping-pong for girls and boys were added. A baseball team started in 1921 and girls and boys football teams began in 1922. Football games were played on the lights if there were games as a six-man team, changing to eight-man in 1950. Girls' team sports began in the 1920s with volleyball and softball.















School News

Two schools were operating when the village of Bennet was established, one in Sed City and the other north and east of Bennet. Dr. Stephen D. Madison was the schoolmaster of Sed City in 1850. District 27, Bennet School was a main early school, built on the northeast corner of 15th and Hickman Road. The school master (District 27) gave the school to the district (District school) to be operated by local schools and was Bennet High School. The first schoolhouse in Bennet was built in 1850, which burned down and was replaced with a larger frame one in 1881. When this building burned down, the first schoolhouse was the building, giving the school 1000 square feet for 8 students and 130 students in 1885. It would remain until a new one was built in 1919 "When students from high school here, they might attend the Bennet House on the "Old Academy", which was referred to by many as the "Bennet Seminary" and later "Bennet Academy". This building could not give students a high level of education by George J. Jones. Although the school would close and be razed, a historic (Open House) will be a center of education.





Program Support: 2023-2024 School Year

The service units in Nebraska are required by law to provide [Core Services \(Rule 84\)](#) to member schools. In order to do that, the state provides some funding, which is based on the student enrollment numbers for each district. This information is shared with superintendents each year.

I have not received a draft from NDE regarding Core Services funds for 2023-2024. The amount for 2022-2023 is \$213,947.88.

Each service unit in the state is given the responsibility to define Core Services within the following prerequisites:

- A. Core Services shall be within the following service areas in order of priority:
 - a. Staff Development;
 - b. Technology; and
 - c. Instructional Material Services;
- B. Core Services shall improve teaching and student learning by focusing on enhancing school improvement efforts, meeting statewide requirements, and achieving statewide goals in the state's system of elementary and secondary education;
- C. Core Services shall provide schools with access to services that:
 - a. The educational service unit and its member school districts have identified as necessary services;
 - b. Are difficult, if not impossible, for most individual school districts to effectively and efficiently provide with their own personnel and financial resources;
 - c. Can be efficiently provided by each educational service unit to its member school districts;
 - d. Can be adequately funded to ensure that the service is provided equitably to the state's public school districts;
- D. Core Services shall be designed so that the effectiveness and efficiency of the service can be evaluated on a statewide basis; and

- E. Core Services shall be provided by the educational service unit in a manner that minimizes the costs of administration or service delivery to member school districts.

Statutes also state that in order for Core Services to be provided to member schools, two-thirds of the member districts representing a majority of the students must approve these services. The statute also has the same requirement for additional services provided by the ESU and funded by the general fund tax levy. In the past a district's participation in Core Service Programs has been identified by a resolution approved by the board of education for each district. Support services have been identified and supported by the unit's Advisory Committee. In addition to utilizing property tax receipts for support services, portions of those costs are paid for by the districts utilizing the services. This plan has been, and is discussed continually, and is supported by the ESU 4 Advisory Committee.

At this point, the amount of Core Services funding is not known. To meet the intent of the law in a professional manner given the financial constraints continues to be a challenge. The financial and professional support shown by our districts is wonderful and has been very beneficial. Such support allows the services to continue.

Instead of a resolution for this year for your board to pass, please sign this letter as your district's representative. I would ask that you also please share this letter with your Board of Education at your next meeting.

Thank you to your Board for the continued support for ESU 4's Core Services programs. As well, thank you for the endorsement of the identified support services we have provided and will continue to provide.

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I. Overview

A. Status of the Legislative Process

After 46 days of the 90-day session, not even one bill has been passed by the Nebraska Legislature. In fact, not even one bill has even reached Final Reading, the third and final stage of consideration. This is unusual in recent history of the Legislature and can be explained by the ongoing filibuster on nearly every bill during floor debate. Since most of the filibuster is focused on pending legislation related to transgender youth, the outcome of the debate on LB 574 (Kauth) will likely determine whether the filibuster will continue. (Another youth transgender bill, LB 575 (Kauth), is currently pending before the Education Committee.)

The session week of March 21-24 (March 20th is a recess day) is the last week of morning session days and afternoon hearings. All committees must wrap up hearing schedules by the end of next week. Full-day sessions and evening sessions will begin on March 28th. By order of Speaker Arch, lunch breaks will be reduced to one hour rather than the normal hour and a half. During late-night sessions, the body will take a half-hour dinner break and then continue business until 9:00 or 10:00 p.m. or later (up to 11:59 p.m.). “The specific adjournment time each evening will be dependent upon the Body’s progress on that day’s agenda,” said Arch.

B. Governor’s Agenda

The Governor is required by the Nebraska Constitution to submit a biennium budget proposal, which is actually a package of bills related to mainline appropriations, salaries for constitutional officers and senators, transfer of funds, etc.

In addition to those bills required upon the Governor to propose, there are other measures that he has requested to be introduced on his behalf. These measures include topics such as income tax rates, private school scholarship funds, and agricultural valuation, among others. To date, only two measures introduced at the request of the Governor have been advanced by their respective committees. Other measures are still pending and await final disposition by committees having jurisdiction over the bills.

Viewing the Governor’s overall agenda is at least one way to get an idea of where the Legislature’s agenda might lead. The budget package is the only constitutionally required part of the Legislature’s agenda. The body must pass a biennium budget. The remaining portions of the Governor’s agenda are open to the discretion and political will of the Legislature.

II. Legislation (Monitored by NCSA) Advanced from Committee

A. Measures on General File

The Business and Labor Committee advanced LB 15 by a 4-2 vote. LB 15 amends provisions of the Wage and Hour Act. The committee amendments (AM772) replace the original bill and provide that an employer may pay an employee who is at least 14 years of age but no more than 17 years of age a “youth minimum wage” of \$10.50 per hour.

Note: LB 327, introduced and prioritized by Senator Raybould, also amends the Wage and Hour Act. Some provisions of LB 15 are incorporated into the committee amendments of LB 327. (See LB 327 in this report)

The amendments also provide that an employer may pay a new employee who is at least 18 years of age but under 20 years of age and who is not a seasonal or migrant worker a “training wage” rate. The training wage rate would be:

- a. \$10.50 per hour through December 31, 2026; and
- b. A rate of 75% of the minimum wage rate that would otherwise be applicable on and after January 1, 2027.

The Government Committee advanced LB 53, introduced by Senator McKinney, by a 5-2 vote. Senators Brewer, Conrad, Hunt, Raybould, and Sanders voted in favor while Senators Halloran and Lowe voted against advancement.

LB 53 would designate May 19th as an official state holiday to recognize El-Hajj Malik El-Shabazz, Malcolm X Day. The bill requires schools to hold suitable exercises in recognition of the sacrifices of the late Nebraska Hall of Fame inductee El-Hajj Malik El-Shabazz, Malcolm X and his contributions to the betterment of society.

Note: At the hearing for LB 53 on February 22nd, the measure received wide support by organizations and individuals. The sole opponent was Kathy Wilmot, a member of the Board of Regents, who testified as a citizen and not on behalf of the University.

The Governor would be required, prior to May 19 of each year, to issue a proclamation inviting and urging the people of the State of Nebraska to observe El-Hajj Malik El-Shabazz, Malcolm X Day in schools and other suitable places with appropriate ceremony and fellowship.

The bill also requires NDE to make information available to the schools and all people of this state regarding El-Hajj Malik El-Shabazz, Malcolm X Day.

LB 141 sets forth findings that students can benefit from an opportunity for a moment of quiet reflection. The bill was advanced to General File by a 7-0 vote.

The very brief bill requires NDE to provide guidance to school districts that decide to provide a moment of silence each school day on the best way to implement the policy.

Note: The committee amendments (AM433) provide that by January 1, 2024, NDE must develop guidelines that school districts may use for the implementation of a moment of silence or quiet reflection during each school day.

The bill apparently does not require school districts to implement such a policy.

Current provisions of law relevant to property tax refunds (§ 77-1736.06) require that, within 30 days from the date the county assessor certifies the amount of the refund, the county treasurer must notify each political subdivision, including any school district receiving a distribution, of its respective share of the refund, except that, for any political subdivision whose share of the refund is \$200 or less, the county board may waive this notice requirement.

LB 147 provides that, for any political subdivision whose share of the refund is \$1,000 or less, the governing body of the political subdivision may waive the notice requirement by notifying the county treasurer in writing.

Notes: LB 147 is considered a relatively minor substantive cleanup in existing law. It was debated on February 23rd and 24th but was filibustered.

Senator Machaela Cavanaugh filed 36 motions and amendments to Senator Kauth's bill. Senator Kauth also introduced two transgender bills, which Cavanaugh opposes.

Notification would be by (i) first-class mail, postage prepaid, to the last-known address of record of the political subdivision or (ii) electronic means if requested in writing by the governing body of the political subdivision.

The concept behind LB 201 is similar to prior failed attempts in 2020 (LB 1089) and 2021 (LB 200) also sponsored by Senator Vargas.

LB 201 was advanced by the Education Committee to General File by a 5-1 vote (Albrecht voting against).

Students pursuing post-secondary education currently have the option to complete and file a Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) in order to be considered for federal (Pell Grant, Subsidized Stafford Loan, Federal Perkins Loan, Federal Work-Study Program), state-sponsored (Nebraska Opportunity Grant), and college-sponsored financial aid.

Note: LB 201 was opposed at the public hearing on February 13th by NCSA, STANCE, NRCSA, NASB, and the Nebraska Freedom Coalition.

The bill was supported by the American Civil Liberties Union of Nebraska, Coordinating Commission for Postsecondary Education, University of Nebraska System, and the Nebraska State College System.

Requirement: Beginning with the 2024-25 school year, LB 201 would require all public high school students to complete the FAFSA prior to graduation. LB 201 also includes an opt-out provision that can be completed by any parent, guardian, or other person standing in loco parentis to the student.

Compliance Information: The school principal or the school principal’s designee of each public high school is required to provide compliance information to the school district or governing authority for the public high school and to NDE without disclosing (for any student who has complied with the requirements of the bill) personally identifiable information distinguishing whether the compliance upheld the provisions of the bill.

The school principal or school principal’s designee must provide separately the aggregate number of students who have complied and who have not complied, unless otherwise prohibited by federal or state law regarding the confidentiality of student educational information.

Rules and Regulations: The State Board of Education is required to adopt and promulgate rules and regulations as necessary to implement provisions of the bill. The rules and regulations must include at a minimum:

- (a) A timeline for the distribution of the Free Application for Federal Student Aid and relevant forms;
- (b) Standards regarding the information that a public high school must provide to students regarding:
 - (i) Instructions for filling out the Free Application for Federal Student Aid;
 - (ii) The options available to a student if a student wishes to decline to complete and submit an application; and
 - (iii) The method by which a student may provide proof to the public high school that the student has completed and submitted an application; and
- (c) A requirement for each public high school to report the number of students who completed and submitted an application and the number of students who instead submitted a form to decline submitting an application.

LB 205	<i>Sponsor</i>	<i>Committee</i>	<i>Priority</i>	<i>Subject</i>
	von Gillern	Government	None	Adopt the Government Neutrality in Contracting Act

LB 205 was advanced to General File by a 5-3 vote (Senators Aguilar, Brewer, Halloran, Lowe, and Sanders voting yes and Conrad, Hunt, and Raybould voting against). The bill was heavily opposed by union organizations.

Note: Senator Mike McDonnell has filed 14 amendments to LB 205. Senator McDonnell is the current President of the Omaha Federation of Labor, AFL-CIO.

LB 205 creates the Government Neutrality in Contracting Act. The purposes of the Act are to provide for the efficient procurement of goods and services by governmental units and to promote the economical, non-discriminatory, and efficient administration and completion of construction projects funded, assisted, or awarded by a governmental unit.

The bill would apply to political subdivisions, including school districts, ESUs, and learning communities.

The bill requires a governmental unit to ensure that any requests for proposals or bid specifications for a public contract or the procurement procedures for a public contract do not contain:

- (a) A term that requires, prohibits, encourages, or discourages bidders, public contractors, or subcontractors from entering into or adhering to a collective-bargaining agreement relating to construction under the public contract;
- (b) A term that discriminates against bidders, public contractors, or subcontractors based on status as a party or nonparty to, or the willingness or refusal to enter into, a collective-bargaining agreement relating to construction under the public contract; or
- (c) Contract award pass or fail scoring criteria regarding a bidder's hiring requirements, labor assignments, local headquarters, political affiliation, political activity, or demographic makeup.

“Public contract” is defined as any contract, bid documents, or other controlling documents for the performance of construction between a governmental unit and a public contractor, including those between a public contractor and a subcontractor.

“Public contractor” is defined as any individual, firm, partnership, limited liability company, corporation, association, or other person engaged in construction for a governmental unit. Public contractor includes any subcontractor engaged in such construction and any person who is providing or arranging for labor for such construction for a contractor, either as an employee or as an independent contractor.

LB 277	<i>Sponsor</i>	<i>Committee</i>	<i>Priority</i>	<i>Subject</i>
	Brewer	Government	Hardin	Adopt the First Freedom Act and authorize the wearing of tribal regalia by students

LB 277 was advanced to General File by a 5-3 vote (Senators Aguilar, Brewer, Halloran, Lowe, and Sanders voting yes and Conrad, Hunt, and Raybould voting against).

Note: Both the United Church of Christ and the American Atheists organization opposed the measure.

LB 277 actually has two somewhat distinct parts. The first is the adoption of the First Freedom Act and the second is provisions related to the wearing of tribal regalia.

First Freedom Act

Perhaps in part to the recent pandemic and the restrictions on gatherings, LB 277 provides that a person or religious organization whose exercise of religion or religious service has been burdened or restricted, or is likely to be burdened or restricted, in violation of the First Freedom Act, may bring a civil action or assert such violation or impending violation as a defense in a judicial or administrative proceeding.

Tribal Regalia

LB 277 provides that a person who is a member of an indigenous tribe of the U.S. or another country and is a student attending an approved or accredited public school may wear tribal regalia in any public or private location where the person is otherwise authorized to be on such school grounds or at any school function.

The provisions of the bill are not meant to limit the authority of administrative and teaching personnel to regulate student behavior or the authority of a school to regulate student behavior to further school purposes or to prevent interference with the educational process.

The bill permits but does not require a school to adopt a policy to accommodate this legislation. The policy may specify the characteristics of any garment, jewelry, other adornment, or object that such school finds will endanger the safety of a student or others or interfere with school purposes or the educational process if worn by a student during a specified activity.

The bill defines “tribal regalia” as traditional garments, jewelry, other adornments, or similar objects of cultural significance worn by members of an indigenous tribe of the U.S. or another country. *Tribal regalia does not include any firearm or other dangerous weapon.* Tribal regalia also does not include, except in compliance with an appropriate federal permit, any object that is otherwise prohibited by federal law.

LB 285	<i>Sponsor</i>	<i>Committee</i>	<i>Priority</i>	<i>Subject</i>
	Walz	Education	None	Adopt the School Community Eligibility Provision Maximization Act

LB 285 creates the School Community Eligibility Provision Maximization Act.

The bill provides that each qualified public school that has an “identified student percentage” greater than or equal to

Note: NDE reports no state fiscal impact but some districts may have increased costs for meals if their ISP percentage is less than 62.5.

50% must operate under the community eligibility provision to maximize the federal reimbursement for eligible breakfasts and eligible lunches.

NDE may grant a waiver of the requirements noted above to a school district that is able to demonstrate that participation in the community eligibility provision is not financially viable for the district. The waiver may be of a specified length of time as determined by the department.

NDE must provide technical assistance to any school district that is granted a waiver to support the school district's adoption of the community eligibility provision in subsequent years.

The State Board of Education is required to adopt and promulgate rules and regulations to establish a process for granting an annual waiver, including a process and criteria for determining if participation in the community eligibility provision is viable for a school district.

“Identified student percentage” is defined as the identified student percentage calculated for high-poverty schools as specified under regulations promulgated by the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

“Qualified public school” is defined as a school operated by a school district that is participating in the school breakfast program or the national school lunch program under the federal Child Nutrition Act of 1966, or the federal Richard B. Russell National School Lunch Act.

LB 297	<i>Sponsor</i>	<i>Committee</i>	<i>Priority</i>	<i>Subject</i>
	Sanders	Government	Low	Adopt the Personal Privacy Protection Act

LB 297 creates the Personal Privacy Protection Act and applies to political subdivisions, including school districts and ESUs.

Note: LB 297 was advanced to General File by a 6-0 vote. ACLU of Nebraska supported the bill while Media of Nebraska opposed it.

Under the proposed white copy committee amendments (AM633), the bill provides that a public agency is prohibited from:

- (a) Requiring any individual to provide personal information or otherwise compelling the release of personal information;
- (b) Requiring any nonprofit organization to provide such public agency with personal information or otherwise compelling the release of personal information;
- (c) Publicizing, or otherwise publicly disclosing personal information in the possession of such public agency without the express permission of every individual who is identifiable from the potential release of such personal information, including individuals identifiable as members, supporters, or volunteers of, or donors to, a nonprofit organization; or
- (d) Requesting or requiring a current or prospective contractor or grantee to provide such public agency with a list of nonprofit organizations to which such contractor or grantee has provided financial or nonfinancial support.

Personal information would be exempt from disclosure under public records laws.

The legislation does not prohibit the following:

- (a) Any report or disclosure required by the Nebraska Political Accountability and Disclosure Act;
- (b) Any report or disclosure by a public agency regarding testimony received at a public hearing conducted by such public agency;
- (c) Any lawful warrant, subpoena, or order issued by a court of competent jurisdiction for the production of personal information;
- (d) Any lawful request for discovery of personal information in litigation if both of the following conditions are met: (i) The requestor demonstrates a compelling need for such personal information by clear and convincing evidence; and (ii) The requestor obtains an order barring disclosure of such personal information to any person not named in the litigation;
- (e) Admission of personal information as relevant evidence before a court of competent jurisdiction. However, no court may publicly reveal personal information absent a specific finding of good cause;
- (f) Any report or disclosure required by state or federal law or regulation for an employee of the University of Nebraska or any state college. Except as otherwise required by law, no report or disclosure will be subject to release under the state public records laws;
- (g) Any report or disclosure required by conflict of interest, conflict of commitment, or outside income policies for an employee or contractor of the University of Nebraska or any state college. Except as otherwise required by law, no report or disclosure would be subject to release under the state public records laws;
- (h) Any document required or permitted to be filed with the Secretary of State disclosing the identity of any director, officer, incorporator, or registered agent of a nonprofit organization;
- (i) (A) The Auditor of Public Accounts from accessing personal information during an examination undertaken pursuant to express statutory authority. The auditor may publicly disclose personal information obtained during such examination only if that information:
(I) Pertains specifically to a person who has violated or is alleged to have violated a state or federal law, rule, or regulation or an ordinance of a city or village; or (II) Pertains to a person directly associated with a violation.

(B) This subdivision would be strictly construed and only authorizes disclosure of a person who meets the criteria described in subdivision (A).

(C) All other personal information accessed by the Auditor of Public Accounts would be subject to the restrictions on working papers contained in section 84-311;
- (j) Any request for information required by the Uniform Credentialing Act or Health Care Facility Licensure Act or by a federal funding agency;
- (k) A request for information required for a criminal history record information check undertaken pursuant to express statutory authority, except that information may only be

used in connection with the specific criminal history record information check and for any related proceedings; or

- (1) Subject to compliance with section 8-112, any request for, or release of, information, a record, or a report, obtained by the Department of Banking and Finance from a nonprofit organization.

A person aggrieved by a violation of the Personal Privacy Protection Act may bring a civil action for appropriate relief. Appropriate relief includes:

- (1) The greater of actual damages or two thousand five hundred dollars in liquidated damages per violation; and
- (2) Such preliminary and other equitable or declaratory relief as may be appropriate.

The bill has an operative date of January 1, 2024. The severability clause is attached.

LB 303	<i>Sponsor</i>	<i>Committee</i>	<i>Priority</i>	<i>Subject</i>
	Linehan	Revenue	None	Change provisions relating to an annual estimate for necessary funding under the TEEOSA

LB 303 amends one of the few original sections of LB 1059 (1990), which created the Tax Equity and Educational Opportunities Support Act (TEEOSA). This section was last updated in 1999.

Note: The Revenue Committee advanced LB 303 by a unanimous 8-0 vote. Senator Linehan was the sole testifier on the bill.

Section 79-1031 requires NDE, with assistance from the Property Tax Administrator, the Legislative Fiscal Analyst, and the budget division of the Department of Administrative Services, to annually, by November 15, provide an estimate of the necessary funding level for the next school fiscal year under TEEOSA to the Governor, the Appropriations Committee of the Legislature, and the Education Committee of the Legislature.

LB 303 requires that a legal counsel or research analyst from the Education Committee and a legal counsel or research analyst from the Revenue Committee be included in the process of providing an estimate on funding level.

LB 312	<i>Sponsor</i>	<i>Committee</i>	<i>Priority</i>	<i>Subject</i>
	Low	Government	None	Change provisions relating to withholding money due to noncompliance with budget limits and annual audits for certain political subdivisions

Upon receiving notice from the Auditor of Public Accounts, LB 312 requires the State Treasurer to suspend distribution of state aid allocated to a governmental unit for noncompliance with budget limits and annual audits.

Note: Besides the introducer, the State Treasurer’s Office provided the sole support of the bill.

The governmental unit may continue to forfeit state aid until the governmental unit reaches compliance and the State Treasurer has received notification of such compliance from the Auditor of Public Accounts. All state aid that was forfeited would remain forfeited and redistributed to other recipients of the state aid in the county where such noncompliant governmental unit is located.

If any governmental unit fails to reach compliance within 12 months from the time of the order and notice of delinquency given by the Auditor of Public Accounts to the State Treasurer, such governmental unit would be ineligible for future distributions of state aid. Upon reaching compliance, the governmental unit would be eligible for future distributions of state aid.

LB 327	<i>Sponsor</i> Raybould	<i>Committee</i> Business and Labor	<i>Priority</i> Raybould	<i>Subject</i> Change provisions relating to the minimum wage under the Wage and Hour Act
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LB 327 was advanced by the Business and Labor Committee and was combined with portions of LB 15.

Note: LB 327 was supported by the Nebraska Grocery Industry Association. It was heavily opposed by labor groups.

Beginning on January 1, 2028, and each January 1st thereafter, LB 327 provides that the minimum wage would be increased by the lesser of:

- a. 1.5%, rounded to the nearest cent, or
- b. the increase in the cost of living measured by the percentage increase, if any, as of August of the previous year over the level as of August of the year preceding that year in the consumer price index for all urban consumers (CPI-U) for the Midwest Region, with the amount of the minimum wage increase rounded up to the nearest multiple of five cents.

Under the committee amendments (AM713), LB 327 also provides that an employer may pay a “youth minimum wage” of \$10.50 per hour to an employee who:

- Is at least 14 years of age but no more than 17 years of age; and
- Is not an emancipated minor.

LB 414	<i>Sponsor</i> Conrad	<i>Committee</i> Education	<i>Priority</i> None	<i>Subject</i> Change provisions relating to the enrollment option program
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LB 414 relates to the Option Enrollment Program “to ensure that children with disabilities not be denied opting into another school district due to their disability,” as noted in Senator Conrad’s Statement of Intent.

Note: According to the sponsor, LB 414 was introduced “in order to ensure that children with disabilities not be denied opting into another school district due to their disability.”

LB 414 permits a school board of the option school district to adopt by resolution specific capacity standards for acceptance and rejection of applications and for providing transportation for option students.

The bill provides that capacity for special education services operated by an option school district must be determined on a case-by-case basis. If an application for option enrollment received by a school district indicates that the student has an IEP or has been diagnosed with a disability, the application must be evaluated by the director of special education services of the school district who must determine if the school district has the capacity to provide the applicant the appropriate services and accommodations.

For all other students, capacity would be determined by setting a maximum number of option students that a district will accept in any program, class, grade level, or school building, based upon available staff, facilities, projected enrollment of resident students, and projected number of students with which the option school district will contract based on existing contractual arrangements.

If an application is rejected by the option school district or if the resident school district rejects a request for release, the rejecting school district must provide written notification to the parent or guardian stating (a) the specific reasons for the rejection including, for students with an IEP, or with a diagnosed disability, a description of services and accommodations required that the school district does not have the capacity to provide, and (b) the process for appealing such rejection to the State Board of Education. Such notification would be sent by certified mail.

The bill eliminates provisions in existing law (§ 79-244) stating that a child with a disability receiving services from another district under a contract due to lack of appropriate programming in his/her resident school district is not eligible to transfer as an option student into the district currently providing services but is eligible to transfer as an option student into any other district which accepts option students and has an appropriate program. Thereby making such students eligible to option enroll.

Note: LB 414 was advanced with committee amendments attached. AM689 provides that, beginning July 1, 2024, and by each July 1st thereafter, each school district must provide to NDE information relating to all applications rejected by the option school district. The information would include:

- a. the number of applications rejected in each public school in such district;
- b. an explanation why each application was rejected;
- c. whether each application for option enrollment indicated that the student had an individualized education plan under the federal IDEA, or had been diagnosed with a disability as defined in section “79-118.01”^{**}; and
- d. whether information regarding the requirements of section 79-238(4) was provided to the applicant.

NDE is required to annually compile the information received and annually provide a report to the Legislature.

** Since 79-118.01 does not exist, it is assumed that amendment refers to 79-1118.01.

LB 585	<i>Sponsor</i> Hughes	<i>Committee</i> Education	<i>Priority</i> Speaker	<i>Subject</i> Change a duty of the state school security director and require behavioral and mental health training for certain school personnel
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LB 585 changes the duties of the state school security director and changes the training requirement for schools.

The bill changes the list of duties of the state school security director to provide for the oversight of behavioral and mental health training, with a focus on suicide awareness and prevention in public schools.

Note: LB 585 was supported by NCSA, NSEA, NRCSA, and ESUCC. There was no opposition testimony at the public hearing on February 7th.

The bill expands the existing requirement that all public school employees who interact with students and any other appropriate personnel, as determined by the school superintendent, must receive at least one hour of behavioral and mental health training with a focus on suicide awareness and prevention training each year. This provision would be operative beginning in the 2023-24 school year.

LB 585 requires that the training may include topics such as identification of early warning signs and symptoms of behavioral and mental health issues in students, appropriate and effective responses for educators to student behavioral and mental health issues, trauma-informed care, and procedures for making students, parents, and guardians aware of services and supports for behavioral and mental health issues.

LB 630	<i>Sponsor</i> McKinney	<i>Committee</i> Education	<i>Priority</i> Speaker	<i>Subject</i> Provide a duty to the State Department of Education and require a school board to adopt a written dress code
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By July 1, 2025, each school board must adopt a written dress code and grooming policy to be implemented at the start of the 2025-26 school year that is consistent with a model policy developed by NDE in accordance with this bill and may include any other procedures and provisions the school board deems appropriate.

Enforcement of violations of the written dress code and grooming policy would:

Note: LB 630 was supported by Stand for Schools, Voices for Children in Nebraska, Nebraska Indian Education Association, and the ACLU of Nebraska, among others. There was no opposition testimony at the public hearing on February 14th.

- (a) Be treated as minor on the continuum of school rule violations and would not constitute student conduct subject to long-term suspension, expulsion, or mandatory reassignment;
- (b) Not require the student to miss substantial classroom time, instruction time, or school activities; and
- (c) Not, under any circumstance, allow an administrator, teacher, other member of the staff, or contractor to permanently or temporarily alter or cut a student's hair.

No student may be disproportionately affected by a dress code or grooming policy enforcement because of the student's gender, race, color, religion, disability, or national origin.

Model Dress Code and Grooming Policy

By December 1, 2024, NDE is required to develop and distribute a model dress code and grooming policy for schools that facilitates and encourages an inclusive and positive learning environment while complying with any applicable health or safety law, rule, regulation, ordinance, or resolution. Such model policy may not:

- (a) Target, disproportionately impact, discriminate, or be applied in a discriminatory manner against any students on the basis of race, religion, sex, disability, or national origin;
- (b) Prohibit a student from wearing attire, including religious attire, natural and protective hairstyles, adornments, or other characteristics associated with race, national origin, or religion; or
- (c) Require a student's hair to be permanently or temporarily altered.

The model policy must include a statement that specifies that enforcement of a violation of such policy would be done in a manner that is consistent with a school's overall discipline plan and in a consistent manner.

NDE may develop as part of the dress code and grooming policy a “health and safety standard” that allows for the regulation of characteristics associated with race, national origin, or religion in the dress code and grooming policy under certain circumstances. The standard must:

- (a) Demonstrate that without the implementation of the standard, it is reasonably certain that the health and safety of the student or another individual will be impaired;
- (b) Require adoption of the standard for nondiscriminatory reasons;
- (c) Require that the standard be applied equally;
- (d) Require that the school engage in a good faith effort to reasonably accommodate the student and notify the student's parent or guardian, in a language that such parent or guardian understands, of such an attempt to accommodate the student's appearance or any attire, tribal regalia, hairstyles, adornment, or other characteristic associated with race, national origin, or religion;
- (e) Provide a process to obtain consent from a student's parent or guardian prior to altering a student's appearance or removing or altering a student's attire, tribal regalia, hairstyle, adornment, or other characteristic associated with race, national origin, or religion; and

- (f) Provide a process to ensure records are kept on each effort to reasonably accommodate a student's appearance, attire, hairstyle, adornment, or other characteristics associated with race, national origin, or religion occurring at school, on school grounds, or at a school-sponsored event and ensure that such records allow for analysis of related data and delineate: (i) The reason for such referral; and (ii) Federally identified demographic characteristics of such student.

Note: The bill defines “tribal regalia” as natural and protective hairstyles and traditional garments, jewelry, or other adornments or similar objects of cultural significance worn by members of an indigenous tribe of the U.S. or another country. Tribal regalia does not include any dangerous weapon or, except in compliance with an appropriate federal permit, any object that is otherwise prohibited by federal law.

LB 647	<i>Sponsor</i>	<i>Committee</i>	<i>Priority</i>	<i>Subject</i>
	McDonnell	Education	Speaker	Change provisions relating to the purchase and loan of textbooks for children enrolled in kindergarten to grade twelve of a private school

LB 647 amends the Textbook Loan Program.

Beginning on July 1, 2024, NDE is required to purchase and loan textbooks, upon individual request, to children who are enrolled in K-12 of a private school that is approved for continued legal operation.

The bill permits the Legislature to appropriate funds to carry out the provisions of the bill. NDE is not obligated to spend any money for the purchase and loan of textbooks to children enrolled in private schools other than funds specifically appropriated by the Legislature. NDE may utilize up to 5% of the appropriated funds to administer the provisions of the bill.

Notes: LB 647 was supported by NCSA, NSEA, and NRCSA.

NDE reports that it will need to hire a staff person to manage this program in addition to the five percent allowed for administrative money allowed for the program.

NDE may contract with a third-party vendor to assist in carrying out the provisions of the bill.

“Textbook” is defined as any instructional material, including digital, electronic, or online resources, that is designated for use by an individual student in classroom instruction as the principal source of study material.

LB 650	<i>Sponsor</i>	<i>Committee</i>	<i>Priority</i>	<i>Subject</i>
	McDonnell	Government	None	Allow certain cybersecurity records to be withheld from the public

LB 650 amends the Public Records Law.

Note: LB 650 was supported by the League of Nebraska Municipalities and the Nebraska Association of County Officials.

The bill permits the withholding of records relating to the nature, location, or function of cybersecurity by the State of Nebraska or any of its political subdivisions, including, but not limited to, devices, programs, or systems designed to protect computer, information technology, or communications systems against terrorist or other attacks.

The Nebraska Information Technology Commission is required to adopt and promulgate rules and regulations to implement the provisions of the bill.

The emergency clause is attached.

LB 787	<i>Sponsor</i>	<i>Committee</i>	<i>Priority</i>	<i>Subject</i>
	Wayne	Education	None	Adopt the STEEM Development Act

LB 787 creates the STEEM Development Act and declares that creating, expanding, and upskilling Nebraska's workforce is essential for (a) retaining and expanding businesses in and attracting businesses to Nebraska, (b) boosting innovation and productivity across Nebraska business sectors, and (c) attracting and retaining investment capital in Nebraska.

Note: LB 787 intends to appropriate \$5 million each fiscal year to NDE to carry out the STEEM Development Act.

The bill provides that any developer may apply to NDE for a grant under the STEEM Development Act to develop and provide a learning platform that:

- (1) Is designed to teach information related to chemistry and physical science or business;
- (2) Aligns with chemistry and physical science or business standards established by the State Board of Education;
- (3) Connects such standards with real-world technologies and applications; and
- (4) Highlights science, technology, engineering, entrepreneurship, and mathematics career pathways in Nebraska.

Any developer that receives a grant under the STEEM Development Act would provide access to and use of its learning platform to all Nebraska school districts.

LB 805	<i>Sponsor</i>	<i>Committee</i>	<i>Priority</i>	<i>Subject</i>
	von Gillern	Education	von Gillern	Require schools to allow certain youth organizations to provide information, services, and activities

LB 805 requires school districts to allow youth organizations to provide information about the services and activities they offer to the students. At least one time each school year, and also when requested, a school district must allow a representative of a youth organization to present oral or

written information to the students of the school regarding the organization and how the organization furthers the educational interests and civic involvement of students consistent with good citizenship and provides services and activities to any student from the school who is a member of their organization. The school district must make a good-faith effort to select a date, location, and time for the organization to make its presentation to the students.

Note: LB 805 is promoted by the Boy Scouts of America. Since its introduction, eight senators have added their names to the legislation, including Senators Halloran, Dover, Kauth, Erdman, Wayne, Clements, McDonnell, and Brewer.

Prior to the presentation to the students, the representative must pass a background check that will be conducted by the Nebraska State Patrol (NSP) at the expense of the representative or the youth organization. Each school district can set the parameters of the background check as long as they are within the rules and regulations of the NSP.

LR 1CA	<i>Sponsor</i>	<i>Committee</i>	<i>Priority</i>	<i>Subject</i>
	Blood	Government	Blood	Constitutional amendment to require the Legislature to reimburse political subdivisions as prescribed

LR 1CA is a proposed constitutional amendment to change provisions within Article III of the Nebraska Constitution, relating to the Legislature and legislative powers and duties.

Note: A similar amendment was offered by Senator Blood in 2022 (LR 263CA), which advanced to Select File but did not receive a final vote.

LR 1CA was advanced by a unanimous 8-0 vote. The committee amendments (AM591) replace the original language as follows:

Beginning on January 1, 2025, if the Legislature by general law imposes a program upon any political subdivision of the state, or increased level of expenditure required under an existing program upon any political subdivision of the state, as those terms are defined by the Legislature, the costs of such programs or increased level of service shall be reimbursed by the state in such manner as the Legislature may prescribe.

The Committee Statement for LR 1CA explains that, “The amendment also rewords the substance of the bill to reframe it as a conditional requirement on the Legislature rather than as a prohibition on the Legislature with an exception.” In truth, the revised language may actually reduce the overall impact of the constitutional measure in comparison to how it was originally introduced.

If approved by the Legislature, the measure would appear on the November 2024 General Election ballot.

LR 14CA is a proposed constitutional amendment to change provisions within Article XVII of the Nebraska Constitution, relating to state offices and officeholders.

Note: There was no opposition to the measure. Since there is no such procedure in current statute, the Legislature would need to create a statutory procedure if the amendment is approved by the electorate.

The resolution provides that the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Secretary of State, State Treasurer, Attorney General, Auditor of Public Accounts, or any member of the Legislature may be recalled from office through the procedure and in the manner provided for by law. The procedure would be known as recall and would be in addition to any other method of removal from office provided by this Constitution.

If approved by the Legislature, the measure would appear on the November 2024 General Election ballot.

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The Legislature’s Executive Board advanced LR 22CA to change legislative term limits to three consecutive terms. Senators Arch, Bostar, Geist, Lowe, Riepe, and Vargas voted in favor while Senator Slama voted against advancement.

Note: LR 22CA has 39 co-sponsors.

The amendment would increase the number of consecutive terms from the current two terms to three terms.

If approved by the Legislature, the measure would appear on the November 2024 General Election ballot.

If the county assessor receives the copy and full legal description prior to July 1 or, for bonds of a city of the metropolitan class, prior to August 1, the valuation of the real and personal property subject to the bond would be included in the value certified by the county assessor for the current year. If the county assessor receives the copy and full legal description on or after July 1 or, for bonds of a city of the metropolitan class, on or after August 1, the valuation of the real and personal property subject to the bond would be included in the value certified by the county assessor for the following year.

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In addition to the main sponsor, twenty-five lawmakers signed onto this legislation. It appears to be an alternative approach to “constitutional carry” through statutory means.

Note: LB 77 was advanced to Select File by a 36-12 vote.

The bill states that counties, cities, and villages would not have the power to: (a) Regulate the ownership, possession, storage, transportation, sale, or transfer of firearms or other weapons, except as expressly provided by state law; or (b) Require registration of firearms or other weapons. Any county, city, or village ordinance, permit, or regulation in violation of the provisions of the bill would be declared to be null and void.

LB 77 amends many provisions within the Concealed Handgun Permit act and states that nothing in the Act would prevent a person not otherwise prohibited from possessing or carrying a concealed handgun by state law from carrying a concealed weapon without a permit.

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On March 16th, the Legislature briefly debated LB 103 before advancing the measure to Select File on a unanimous vote. Introduced by Senator McDonnell, Chair of the Retirement Committee, LB 103 includes a number of technical cleanup and minor substantive changes for the State Employees’ and School Employees’ Retirement Plans.

Note: LB 103 was advanced to Select File by a 32-0 vote.

Currently, in addition to all school employees, certain state employees are eligible to be members of the School Plan, including (1) an individual employed by NDE after July 1, 1989, as a state school official, and (2) an individual who is employed by any state agency in a position covered by the association and who is required to hold a certificate for such position.

LB 103 adds a third category for eligibility. The bill provides that an individual who is employed by any state agency NOT in a position covered by the association who is required to hold a certificate for the position in which such individual is employed.

Under the School Plan, “Association” is defined as the State Code Agency Teachers Association, or its equivalent successor, recognized by the State of Nebraska as the exclusive and sole collective-bargaining agent for all teachers other than temporary teachers employed by an agency of the State of Nebraska.

Note: LB 103 also includes provisions from LB 104 and LB 105 to accommodate changes in federal law.

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LB 298 provides that, by July 1 of each year, each school district must provide to NDE, on forms prescribed by the department, information relating to dyslexia. - (a) Tested for dyslexia and the results of such tests;
- (b) Identified as exhibiting characteristics of dyslexia; and
- (c) Diagnosed with dyslexia or identified as exhibiting characteristics of dyslexia that, as a result of such diagnosis or identification, have improved their reading levels or are reading at grade level.

The bill requires NDE to annually compile the information received and provide a report on such information electronically to the Legislature by September 1 of each year. The State Board of Education is authorized to adopt and promulgate rules and regulations to carry out the provisions of the bill.

within each such school district or educational service unit, a majority of the qualified electors voting on the question voted in favor of issuing the bonds.

The joint entity must give notice of the election at least 50 days prior to the election. The question of issuing bonds may be submitted at the statewide primary or general election.

The question of bond issues, when defeated, may not be resubmitted in substance for a period of at least six months after the date of the election.

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LB 753 would allow individuals, pass-through entities, estates, trusts, and corporations to claim a nonrefundable income tax credit of up to 50 percent of their state income tax liability on contributions made to nonprofit organizations that grant scholarships to students to attend private school.

Note: After a successful cloture motion (33-12), LB 753 was advanced to Select File by a 31-12 vote.

The scholarships would be used to pay tuition and fees at qualifying privately operated elementary or secondary schools.

The adopted committee amendments replaced the contents of the original bill. Among the changes, the committee amendments would allow the state Department of Revenue to grant \$25 million in credits in 2024, 2025, and 2026. After that, if at least 90% of the credits in any given year are claimed, the annual limit would increase by 25%. Under the amendments, annual increases could continue until the total credit amount reaches \$100 million.

The amendments also cap contributions from individuals, pass-through entities, and corporations at \$100,000 and limit contributions from estates or trusts to \$1 million.

The Education Committee has designated LB 385 (Linehan) and LB 705 (Murman) as priority bills. LB 385 pertains to teacher retention and LB 705 pertains to lottery funds dedicated for educational purposes. 

Option Enrollment

A. Process and Time Lines to Option In

For a student to attend District OR-1 Public Schools as an option enrollment student, the student's parent or legal guardian must submit an application to the Board of Education of the District OR-1 Public School District between September 1 and March 15 for enrollment during the following and subsequent school years (the "application period").

Upon receipt of an application, the Superintendent or the Superintendent's designee shall provide the resident school district with the name of the applicant on or before April 1 or, in the case of an application submitted after March 15, within sixty days after submission.

Provisions for Waiver of Application Deadline (Choose one or modify as desired):

Option 1 (Waiver unless at capacity):

The application deadline will be waived by the School Board for applications to option into the District OR-1 Public School District, provided that the application contains a release approval from the resident district and satisfies any other requirements of law. Further, the application deadline shall not be waived if the application is for enrollment in any program, class, grade level or school building or in any special education programs operated by this School District which have been determined by the School Board to be at capacity in accordance with the capacity standards (Appendix "1"), and no waiver of the deadline shall be made for such an application regardless of whether such capacity determinations are declared invalid for any reason.

Option 2 (Limited Deadline Waiver):

The application deadline will **not** be waived by the School Board for applications to option into the District OR-1 Public School District, except in the following circumstances:

1. Siblings: The application deadline will be waived where the application is for a student who is the sibling of a student attending District OR-1 Public Schools as of the time the application is filed, provided the application is filed at least 30 days prior to the semester in which first enrollment is sought. A "sibling" for this purpose means a child who resides in the same household on a permanent basis with a student who is currently attending District OR-1 Public Schools and who has the same natural or adoptive parent or who is a stepbrother or stepsister.
2. Kindergarten: The application deadline will be waived where the application is for a student who is seeking to enroll and attend the Kindergarten grade level provided the application was filed on or before June 1 prior to the first semester of the next school year.
3. Release Approval: For the foregoing exceptions, the application must contain a release approval from the resident district.
4. Other Conditions: The waiver of the deadline in the above circumstances does not require acceptance of the application, as such applications may be rejected for reasons other than late filing.

5. Capacity: For the foregoing exceptions, the application deadline shall not be waived if the application is for enrollment in any program, class, grade level or school building or in any special education programs operated by this School District which have been determined by the School Board to be at capacity in accordance with the capacity standards (Appendix "1"), and no waiver of the deadline shall be made for such an application regardless of whether such capacity determinations are declared invalid for any reason.
6. Capacity for Late Filed Applications: Where an application is filed for enrollment in the same school year in which enrollment is sought, the "projected enrollment" determinations made pursuant to paragraph D shall be replaced with the "actual enrollment" as of the first day of school for the year of application, as determined by the Superintendent or the Superintendent's designee, but only in the event such actual enrollment is higher than the projected enrollment. Actual enrollment shall include all students in attendance and all students registered to attend (even if not in actual attendance on the first day).

B. Rejection of Applications; Reasons

1. Capacity: An option enrollment application shall be rejected in the event the capacity of a program, class, grade level, or school building or the availability of appropriate special education programs operated by the School District would be exceeded by acceptance of the application, and an option enrollment application shall be rejected in the event the application is for enrollment in a program, class, grade level, or school building which has been declared unavailable to option students due to lack of capacity.
2. Timeliness: An option enrollment application shall be rejected in the event the application is not filed on a timely basis and the filing deadline has not been waived.
3. Previous Option Enrollment: An option enrollment application shall be rejected in the event the student has previously filed an option enrollment application for enrollment in any School District and has had such application accepted, unless a statutory exception to the "one-time" rule is applicable to the student's circumstance.
4. Other Reasons: An option enrollment application may be rejected in the event the Superintendent, the Superintendent's designee, or the School Board determines: The application is not submitted on a form prescribed by the State Department of Education, is not completely and accurately filled in, is not received within the time required by law, or any additional information requested to be supplied is not supplied to the School District within the time lines indicated; or in the event acceptance of the application is not required by law. Matters which are legally prohibited from being considered as standards for acceptance or rejection of applications (including "previous academic achievement, athletic or extracurricular ability, disabilities, proficiency in the English language, or previous disciplinary proceedings" and further including, without limitation, race, national origin, and gender) shall not be considered as reasons for acceptance or rejection.

C. Priority of Acceptance

Priority shall be accorded in the following order: (1) first, to those applications required to be given priority by law, (2) second, to those with a sibling in attendance at District OR-1 Public Schools, with priority within this group being given to those who had earliest filed applications, and (3) third to those without an option student sibling in attendance at District OR-1 Public Schools, with priority within this group to those who had earliest filed applications.

Filing date determinations are made by the Superintendent, or the Superintendent's designee. In the event applications within a group are received at the same or substantially the same time, priority as between such same-date applications shall be determined on the basis of random drawing.

D. Determination of Capacity

The School Board will determine and set, on an annual basis, the maximum number of option enrollment applications the School District will accept in any program, class, grade level or school building or in any special education programs operated by this School District, based upon available staff, facilities, projected enrollment of resident students, projected number of students with which this School District will contract based on existing contractual arrangements, and availability of appropriate special education programs, and may declare a program, class or school unavailable to option students due to lack of capacity. Such determinations may be made in the form of an Appendix "1" to this Policy. The determination and declaration made for any school year shall continue in effect for the next and subsequent school years unless otherwise determined and/or declared.

E. Releases for Options Out**Provisions for Release (Choose one or modify as desired):**

Option 2 (Release unless Expulsion is Pending):

A request for release of a resident student of the District OR-1 Public School District who submits an enrollment option application after March 15 or any other statutory deadline will be granted unless the release shall not be granted if the administration is considering or has recommended expulsion of the student at the time the application is filed, and the administration determines it is appropriate to complete the expulsion process.

Option 2 (Release Conditions):

A request for release of a resident student of the District OR-1 Public School District who submits an enrollment option application after March 15 or any other statutory deadline will be granted only on the following conditions:

1. Kindergarten: A release will be granted where the application is for a student who is seeking to enroll and attend the Kindergarten grade level provided the application was filed on or before June 1 prior to the first semester of the next school year.
2. Siblings: A release will be granted where the application would allow the student to attend the same school as a sibling, provided the application is filed at least 30 days prior to the semester in which first enrollment is sought. A "sibling" for this

purpose means a child who resides in the same household on a permanent basis with a student who is currently enrolled in the option district and who has the same natural or adoptive parent or who is a stepbrother or stepsister.

3. Educational Programming: A release will be granted where the needs of the student require the District to obtain additional staffing or equipment and it is in the best interests of the District and the student to enroll in the option district. The determination of whether this condition is met shall be made by the Superintendent or the Superintendent's designee.
4. No Pending Expulsion: The deadline shall not be waived if the administration is considering or has recommended expulsion of the student at the time the application is filed, and the administration determines it is appropriate to complete the expulsion process.

The Superintendent or the Superintendent's designee is hereby authorized to execute such releases on behalf of the School Board and the School District, subject to subsequent ratification by the School Board.

F. Notification of Acceptance or Rejection

In the case of an application to option enroll into the District OR-1 Public School District, the Superintendent or the Superintendent's designee shall notify, in writing, the parent or legal guardian of the student and the resident school district whether the application is accepted or rejected on or before April 1 or, in the case of an application submitted after March 15, within sixty days after submission.

If an option enrollment application or a request for release is rejected by the District OR-1 Public School District, the Superintendent or the Superintendent's designee shall provide written notification to the parent or guardian stating the reasons for the rejection and the process for appealing such rejection to the State Board of Education. Such notification shall be sent by certified mail.

G. Applications Subsequent to Relocations or Mergers

An option enrollment application does not require a release and shall be accepted or rejected within forty-five days after filing in the following circumstances:

1. the student relocated to a different resident school district after February 1, or
2. the student's option school district merged with another district effective after February 1, and
3. the application is for attendance during the immediately following and subsequent school years.

H. Status of Option Student

A student who is admitted under the enrollment option program shall be treated as a resident student, and in such regard shall be required to provide such enrollment information and documentation as is required for enrollment of other students (e.g., certified birth certificate and evidence of physical examination, visual evaluation and immunization), shall be required to be enrolled on a full-time basis, and shall be required to adhere to student conduct rules. The building assignment for an option student, as well as classroom and grade level assignments, shall be determined by the administration.

An option student shall not be entitled to transportation except as required by law. Transportation or transportation reimbursement will be provided in the following circumstances:

1. The District OR-1 Public School District may, upon mutual agreement with the parent or legal guardian of an option student, provide transportation to the option student on the same basis as provided for resident students. The school district may charge the parents of each option student transported a fee sufficient to recover the additional costs of such transportation.
2. Option students who qualify for free lunches are eligible for either free transportation or transportation reimbursement from the option school district.
3. For option students receiving special education services, the transportation services required in the student's Individualized Education Plan shall be provided by the resident school district.

I. Information Regarding Schools, Programs, Policies and Procedures.

As part of the option enrollment program, the administration shall make information about the District OR-1 Public Schools and its school, programs, policies and procedures available to all interested persons and shall have a copy of the option enrollment policy and regulations available at each school building.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Option Enrollment Policy presented to the School Board as Policy 5006, and Appendix “1” to such Policy 5006, should be and the same are hereby adopted, and any previous policy or interpretation or application of the option enrollment program which is or has been inconsistent with the Policy 5006, and Appendix “1” to such Policy 5006, are repealed effective on the date of the passage of this resolution,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that all paragraphs, subparagraphs, and portions of words of this Resolution, of Policy 5006, and Appendix “1” to such Policy 5006 are severable and that in the event any of the same are determined to be invalid for any reason, such determination shall not affect the validity of any of the remainder of the same.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that policies and specific standards for acceptance or rejection of option enrollment applications should be and are hereby adopted, for applications filed after adoption of this resolution, and are hereinafter set forth:
