Handle With Care

- **Handle With Care was first created and piloted in West Virginia in 2013.**
- **Currently utilized in many states across the US.**
- **New Jersey's Attorney General issued a statewide Handle With Care mandate in October 2020.**



Problem

Students may experience trauma as a result of an exposure to events or incidents that occur at home or in the community, such as domestic violence, drug overdoses, and systemic issues like racial injustice or the COVID-19 pandemic.

Such students have increased risk for negative outcomes such as poor academic performance, emotional and behavior problems, dropping out of school, and delinquency.

What is Handle With Care?

Handle With Care is a program that enables local law enforcement to notify school districts when they encounter a child at a potentially traumatic scene so school personnel can handle the child with care.

HWC Program Required Components

- 1) Training
- 2) Notification
- 3) Capacity to Provide: Counseling/Counseling Referral

How can HWC help?

If local law enforcement, emergency management services, and fire departments notify school staff when a student is present at the scene of any incident, and

If school staff have training and resources to recognize and support symptoms of trauma in students they serve,

Then they can identify students who need interventions and provide appropriate supports or refer them to mental health services,

Thus, improving students' behavioral, social-emotional, and academic outcomes.

Implementing the HWC program in schools



A **school or district contact** receives the HWC notice from law enforcement and/or other first responders.



The school contact informs the appropriate **admin, teachers, and school staff** (e.g., school counselors, nurses) about the notice.



Teachers and school staff observe the **student** to determine whether the student needs additional support and offer appropriate trauma-sensitive support as needed.



LAW ENFORCEMENT

Following a traumatic event, law enforcement officer will contact the designated school personnel and provide initial information through a Handle with Care notice. Only three words: "Handle with Care" are given. No other details are given.

SCHOOL

The designated school personnel will then ensure notification is provided to the child's school admin and support personnel.

Possible calls that may lead to a Handle With Care notification

- A child being a victim of violence, abuse, or neglect;
- Witnessing violence in the home or community;
- The death of an immediate family member or guardian;
- A significant car accident with injury or loss of life;
- The arrest of a household member or execution of a search in the home;
- Being forcibly displaced from a home by a fire, eviction, or other event; or
- Having a family member/close friend overdose or attempt or die by suicide.
- House fire



Law Enforcement:

- Ultimately, if you have to ask yourself, “Should I add a HWC alert?” then you should probably add the alert.
- Send an alert on every child involved in the incident no matter their reaction—because they may have been affected but just aren’t showing.

Impact on Students

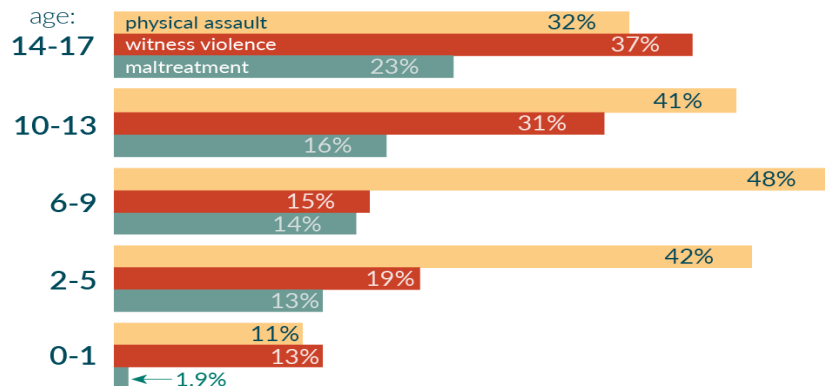
- Physical symptoms such as headaches, stomachaches, poor appetite, and decline in self-care
 - Intense feelings of fear, anxiety, and concern for their safety
 - Difficulty identifying how they are feeling and controlling their emotional reactions
 - A desire to withdraw from peers and adults
 - A tendency to engage in risk-taking behaviors
 - Trouble trusting adults and peers, reading social cues, and building relationships
- Difficulty paying attention and learning
 - Angry or aggressive outbursts
 - More time out of the classroom
 - Increased isolation
 - School absences
 - More suspensions or expulsions
 - Higher referral rates to special education
 - Poor test scores and an increased risk of failing grades



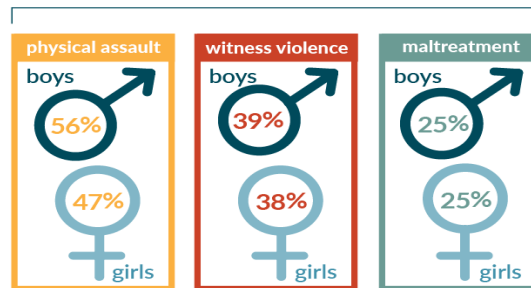
2 of 3 children & youth were exposed to violence in the past year

Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACE) Study

1 in 5 adults report **3 or more** adverse experiences as children



Adverse experiences include:

- Physical abuse, emotional abuse, and sexual abuse
- Emotional and physical neglect
- Household substance abuse
- Household mental illness
- A mother treated violently
- Parent separation or divorce
- Incarcerated household member

As rates of adverse childhood experiences go up, so does **high risk behavior, illness, and early death**

What is Trauma

Children facing trauma face higher referrals for behavioral problems, special education and diagnosis for ADHD, as well as absenteeism, suspension or expulsion, dropping out, or criminal activity. Childhood trauma, often called Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACEs), is an event that can have negative, lasting effects on a child's mental and physical well-being. Trauma causes stress, which is anything that disrupts the physiologic or emotional balance of a child. Childhood trauma and the resulting stress can interrupt normal brain and body development; undermine a child's focus and ability to learn in school; increase risk for engagement in negative coping behaviors and involvement in the criminal justice system; and increase risk for chronic mental and physical health problems. Trauma can impair a child's brain development, socioemotional and behavioral development, academic learning and achievement, and overall health and well-being

PEOPLE WHO HAVE EXPERIENCED TRAUMA ARE:



30% – 60%
of perpetrators of intimate partner violence also abuse children in the household.



The single best predictor of children becoming either perpetrators or victims of domestic violence later in life is whether or not they grow up in a home where there is domestic violence. Studies from various countries support the findings that rates of abuse are higher among women whose husbands were abused as children or who saw their mothers being abused.



Boys who witness domestic violence are **TWICE AS LIKELY** to abuse their own partners and children when they become adults.

♂ MALES exposed to domestic violence as children are more likely to engage in domestic violence as adults.

FEMALES are more likely to be victims as adults. **♀**

Children who were exposed to violence in the home are **15x more likely** to be physically and/or sexually assaulted than the national average.



IMPACT OF TRAUMA ON STAFF

- Increased anxiety
- Reduced energy and focus
- Trouble regulating emotions
- Difficulty managing responses to students and parents
- Diminished capacity to maintain positive teacher-student and teacher-parent relationships
- Poor attendance or work performance
- Vicarious or Secondary Trauma



What do we do?

All staff is asked to do is observe the student's behavior and academic performance and be prepared to provide trauma-sensitive support as needed.



Refer to a counselor, social worker, or nurse if the child displays problems behaviorally or academically.

- Over or under reaction to physical contact, sudden movements and sounds
- Poor control of emotions
- Complaints of headaches, stomachaches or fatigue
- Unpredictable or impulsive behavior

- Separation anxiety or clinginess towards teachers
- Decreased interest in or withdrawal from friends and normal activities



THINGS I MIGHT DO

- Let relationships be the focus
- Develop consistent routines
- Provide daily-check ins
- Clarify expectations
- Teach coping skills such as breathing
- Provide opportunities to regulate
- Create safe, calming spaces
- Focus on your own wellness and self-care
- Create opportunities for expressing a range of emotions

- Provide empathy and sensitivity to what the student may be experiencing
 - Practice patience and compassion
 - Show care instead of consequences
 - Give grace, allow extensions on tests, give second chances, offer a nap in the nurse's office, ensure they have had breakfast.
- DO NOT ASK QUESTIONS
 - Do not investigate
 - Do not discuss HWC notification with student
 - Do not share HWC notification with others

Why Handle With Care

Relationships with stable, caring adults buffer the harmful effects of trauma. When all school personnel—administrators, teachers, counselors, nurses, cafeteria staff, custodial staff, bus drivers, etc.—understand the impact trauma has on a child and are equipped with trauma-sensitive approaches, they can help students feel safe, which is critical to help them focus, behave appropriately, and learn. Through the Handle With Care program, schools get a heads-up from police to provide trauma sensitive support and connect students and families to mental health services. This helps to mitigate negative affects experienced by children's exposure to trauma. Handle With Care sets schools up to be proactive, rather than reactive. This can reduce disciplinary action and absenteeism, build resilience, self-respect and confidence.

**Memorandum of Understanding Between
Meade School District, and
the Sturgis Police Department**

I. PURPOSE.

To further implement an initiative aimed at addressing children's exposure to violence and trauma. Childhood exposure to violence and trauma, without the right supports, is often associated with increased risk of poor outcomes in emotional, behavioral and physical health over the life span. Children exposed to violence and trauma are also at a higher risk of poor school related outcomes and are more likely to enter the criminal justice system later in life, which can contribute to generational cycles of violence and system involvement. This project directly addresses the goal of mitigating these negative impacts of exposure to trauma when it does occur, by providing support and on-site, trauma focused interventions by school staff and/or mental health providers, if necessary, to children identified by local law enforcement and school personnel.

Notification of Exposure to Trauma. Acknowledging the collaborative work already underway in the community around trauma and specifically around social and emotional health within the school system, this Memorandum of Understanding (“MOU”) will focus on notification to the school system by law enforcement when a child is exposed to trauma in the home or in the community to enable the child’s school to handle the child with care upon his or her arrival at school the next school day following the incident. For the purpose of this MOU, the phrase “exposed to trauma” shall be construed broadly and by way of example and not by way of limitation, shall mean and include any event where a child is a victim or witness, experiences or is involved in, or is questioned relative to, any of the following: the abuse of a family member, loved one, or pet; abuse or neglect; child custody, visitation or support or other domestic relations controversy where there is law enforcement intervention; community violence; the commission of a crime; loss of a family member or friend; an overdose; the arrest of a family member; racism or any other form of discrimination; homelessness; mental illness and /or substance abuse by a parent or caregiver; hospitalization or family illness; incarceration of a parent or family member; sudden, unexpected or frequent changes in caregiver, school, program or home life; natural disasters; or similar acts or experiences. Should a law enforcement officer be uncertain as to whether or not to give notice to the school, judgment should be exercised in favor of notification.

II. STURGIS POLICE DEPARTMENT (COLLECTIVELY “LE”) RESPONSIBILITIES.

- A) Enter notification identifying children that have been present for police interactions or otherwise exposed to violence or trauma in the community following the notification protocol as outlined below.
- B) Notification shall be given by sending an email to school district personnel, district social worker, stating the child’s name and date of birth under the alert – Handle With Care.
- C) Notifications will contain no specific information about the incident in order to maintain privacy of the student and their family.
- D) Otherwise maintain the confidentiality of students and their families.

III. MEADE SCHOOL DISTRICT’S RESPONSIBILITIES.

- A) Receive notifications, as described in section II A and B above from LE and disseminate them to the designated point persons, district school social worker, with Meade School District by forwarding to them the HWC e-mail notification from LE.
- B) Upon receipt of a Handle with Care notification identifying a child who has been exposed to trauma, the designated point person, school social worker, will then disseminate the notification to appropriate administration, teachers, nurse, social worker, school counselors, and any other relevant staff.
- C) Provide identified students who are exhibiting behaviors that are not consistent with their normal manner a safe person and space where they can receive additional supports, such as postponing a test, accepting a missed assignment, or allowing the student to rest if he or she is having a hard time focusing or staying awake, but otherwise not addressing the child about the incident.
- D) Determine need for on-going counseling or other intervention if the student is not currently involved with mental health services.
- E) If necessary, the school may contact parents or guardians to obtain appropriate consents for on-going mental health services for the student.
- F) Provide education on trauma informed care to all school personnel, parents and guardians, as requested and/or as required by law.
- G) Maintain the confidentiality of student’s information, including but not limited to academic records, health records, and mental health services. Notifications may be maintained for any purposes consistent with the purpose of this MOU, but shall not be part of any student’s permanent record.

IV. TIMELINE FOR IMPLEMENTATION

- A) 2022/2023 school year, Whitewood Elementary staff will complete ACE’s & HWC training.
- B) 2023/2024 Whitewood Elementary will begin implementation of HWC.
- C) 2023/2024 school year, all Meade Schools staff will complete ACE’s & HWC training.
- D) 2024/2025 school year, all Meade School District schools will implement HWC.

IV. TERMINATION, ADDITIONAL AGENCIES, AND LIABILITY:

- A) Either agency has the right to cancel this MOU with 30 days written notice to the other parties. Should any LE agency terminate this MOU, then the MOU shall remain in effect as to all other agencies.
- B) Additional agencies, whether or not a law enforcement agency, may become parties to this MOU with the agreement of "Meade Schools", which may be effected by the execution of an addendum to this MOU by such agency and "Meade Schools".
- C) Each party shall be responsible for the actions committed by that party and its agents. No party assumes any liability for any actions committed by any other party. However, each party to this Agreement agrees to cooperate fully with the other party in the defense of claims, pursuant to these provisions. This cooperation will include, but is not limited to, the following:
 - 1) Immediate notification to the other party of any accident or incident resulting in personal injury, damage or having the potential for liability;
 - 2) Immediate notification to the other party of any claim made against it alleging liability;
 - 3) Permit a party of this Agreement to conduct a parallel independent investigation of any incident, and/or
 - 4) Make personnel and records available for purposes of the investigation or defense of any claim and/or legal proceeding to the extent permitted by law.

This MOU shall remain in effect until terminated as provided herein.

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III. MEADE SCHOOL DISTRICT’S RESPONSIBILITIES.

- A) Receive notifications, as described in section II A and B above from LE and disseminate them to the designated point persons, district school social worker, with Meade School District by forwarding to them the HWC e-mail notification from LE.
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 - 3) Permit a party of this Agreement to conduct a parallel independent investigation of any incident, and/or
 - 4) Make personnel and records available for purposes of the investigation or defense of any claim and/or legal proceeding to the extent permitted by law.

This MOU shall remain in effect until terminated as provided herein.

Creating Connections to Support Meade Schools Youth

The Whitewood Police Department, Sturgis Police Department, Lawrence County Sheriff's Office, Meade County Sheriff's Office, Summerset Police Department, and Meade School District plan to launch the 'Handle with Care' Program to support children facing trauma. Some children experience traumatic events in their lives and then must report to school the next day and perform as though nothing happened.

The "Handle with Care" program enables police to notify schools if they encounter a child at a traumatic scene, so schools and mental healthcare leaders can provide trauma-sensitive support.

(Meade County & Lawrence County, SD) – Beginning with the **2023-2024** school year, children and youth in **Meade Schools** will be "handled with care" in their school following a distressing event that requires intervention from local fire, EMS and law enforcement responders.

This past year, police, school leaders, mental health professionals, and other stakeholders met to learn about, and discuss the program. Since then, they have established a notification system, and joined more than 65 other U.S. cities that have started their own "Handle with Care" program.

Handle With Care provides the school with a "heads up" when a child is at the scene of a traumatic event such as a house fire, domestic violence situation, or a motor vehicle accident.

"As a Captain with the RCPD when the Handle with Care Program was developed in the RC School District I have seen it in action, and have seen it work. Now, as the Chief Deputy for the Meade County Sheriff's Office, I know the potential of what can be done! (HWC) is an incredible program. So very simple, but so impactful on the lives of an innocent child. My experience has been that teachers and staff benefit tremendously as well. When a teacher knows something happened, it's easier to provide an extra moment and a little grace for that kid. Everyone wins when everyone understands! Little understanding goes a long way." - Chief Deputy James Johns, Meade County Sheriff's Office

Handle with Care has three components:

· When a first responder encounters a child during a call, the child's name and three words, HANDLE WITH CARE, are forwarded to the school for passive support of that child. Deputies with the Meade County Sheriff's Office, Lawrence County Sheriff's Office, or an officer with the Sturgis, or Whitewood City Police Department will send a notification to the Meade School district social worker when they encounter a child at a traumatic scene. Police don't discuss incident details with schools, just: "Handle with Care" and the child's name.

· The District's social worker will distribute the notification to the appropriate administrator and/or counselor so they can monitor the student's behavior and determine what trauma-sensitive support the child may need at school, such as reteaching lessons, giving more time on tests, sending the student to the nurses office to sleep, or sending the student to the counselor.

· If needed, the counselor/social worker will make a referral to a mental healthcare provider who will coordinate with the parents/caretakers and the school to provide therapy on site or in the community.

Staff Opportunity and support:

· As part of the Handle With Care program all district staff will participate in Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACES) training and its impact on children's growth and development (CEU's available), and Handle With Care program. Yearly refresher courses and/or book studies will continue to be offered. These trainings will help staff help children struggling with trauma through observation and support; they do not discuss the incident with the child and can provide extra support and accommodation as needed.

About Handle with Care

In 2011, the West Virginia Children's Justice Task Force, in collaboration with the U.S. Attorney's Office for the South District of West Virginia, formed a subcommittee to explore the problem of children's exposure to trauma and violence and programming to mitigate the negative effects of trauma. They developed Handle with Care, and in 2013, piloted the program in one elementary school. Since then, over 65 cities across the country have implemented the program.

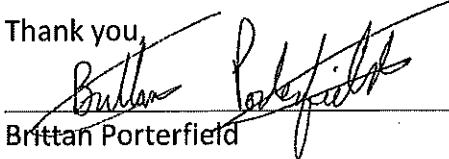
Mr. Wormstadt and BOE,

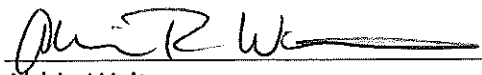
Handle With Care is a program that enables local law enforcement to notify school districts when they encounter a child at a traumatic scene. This provides an opportunity for school personnel to implement trauma informed practices while the student is at school, and also provides an opportunity for students to be referred to appropriate supports within the school and community as needed. As we know, exposure to trauma can result in negative educational outcomes for youth. By supporting students exposed to trauma and making appropriate referrals to supports, we can assist in mitigating the long term impacts of trauma and promote positive educational outcomes.

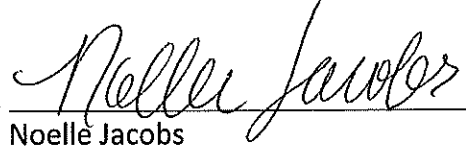

- I. **Stephanie Nesselhuf** will be responsible to the Special Services Director, Chrissy Peterson. Stephanie will work up to 10 hours in a district building of Chrissy Peterson's discretion per week. If necessary, Stephanie may be available for more than one day with enough notice. There is potential for flexibility as necessary. SN Psych Associates, LLC provides a computer, transportation to Sturgis and Meade Schools will provide cognitive assessments and protocols.

Because the students were able to take Algebra I as 8th graders, students have more room in their high school schedules to take the advanced math courses offered at the high school level, which better prepares them for the math skills required on the ACT. Therefore, having the waiver increases educational opportunities for students to reach their full potential.

Review Section V of the school district's application for the waiver. Explain how the waiver has satisfied the stated reasons for the waiver. The Meade School district has been able to provide HS credit to those earning the credit in 8th grade over the last five years. Many of those same students go on to take the advanced math courses at the high school.

Section III - Administrative Rule Intent

The intent of administrative rule waivers is to allow (1) students in a grade prior to grade nine to earn high school credit, (2) a high school age student to earn credit by exam.

Describe in this section how the district is ensuring that this requirement is being met. The Meade School district offers Algebra I (02052.8) to 8th graders in our district. The Algebra I course is aligned in multiple ways to the HS course, 02210A. The first way is the curriculum. Teachers teaching Algebra I through out the district are using the school board adopted curriculum for Algebra I. Another way these courses are aligned is by having a qualified teacher in the classroom who is both endorsed in teaching upper math and middle school math. Finally, at the end of the course, all students, both those in the middle school and those in the high school, take the same assessment for credit and it is weighted the same. The assessment is evaluated every year to ensure that it's rigor matches the depth and intention of the standards addressed in the course. Thus, what we offer to the 8th graders meets the statutory requirements for credit.

Section IV - Waiver Implementation

Explain the methods used to implement the waiver: The methods used to implement the waiver include building the pacing guide for Algebra I and selecting the same formative assessments for each Algebra I topic. Then, administrators ensure we have a qualified teacher for the course, which is then built in Infinite Campus, Finally, Data from the state assessment determines which 7th grade students are eligible for the advanced math course. This is determined by three factors: 1) the SDSA cut score of 2600 on the general Math test, 2) an end of year minimum score of 236 on the NWEA math Assessment, 3) Cumulative GPA of a 3.0. Students meeting the criteria for all three are automatically placed in Algebra I with parent approval. A letter is sent home explaining the advanced placement benefits.

Explain the methods used to evaluate learner outcomes: Currently the method used to evaluate learner outcomes is the number of students who successfully complete the Algebra I course and receive credit.

Describe methods used to assist students who do not succeed in the course to which the waiver has been applied: Through NWEA progress monitoring and the preselected formatives, we identify students who are at risk of not earning credit. Their parents are notified early and the students are encouraged to attend the group study sessions that are provided at both schools. Additionally, teachers assign intervention resources through Khan Academy and the Savvas Envision platform to bolster skills. The platforms both provide skill-specific instruction for students.

Student success is measured in the following ways:

1. Topic assessments at the end of each topic
2. Weekly spiral checks
3. NWEA Progress three times per year
4. SDSA FIAB aligned to concepts taught
5. the SDSA comprehensive tests for Math CAT and Math PT

Policy JECB: OPEN ENROLLMENT

Status: ADOPTED

Policy

State law provides nonresident parents and students an opportunity to apply for enrollment within the District. It also allows resident parents and students an opportunity to apply for enrollment in an attendance center within the District other than that to which the student has been assigned.

The parent or legal guardian of a South Dakota kindergarten through twelfth grade student, or a student who is at least 18 years old, and resides in another school district (i.e., nonresident student), and who wishes to enroll the student in the District, or the parent or legal guardian of a South Dakota kindergarten through twelfth grade student, or a student who is at least 18 years old, and resides within the District and wishes to enroll the student at an attendance center within the District other than that to which the student has been assigned, must apply to open enroll in the School District.

- (1) Nonresident student open enrollment: The District shall grant a request for a transfer into the district of a child who is a resident of another school district unless the transfer would result in an inability to provide a quality educational program based on criteria established by the District pursuant to statute and this policy.
- (2) Nonresident alternative instruction student open enrollment: The District shall grant a request to admit into the district a child who is a resident of another school district and who is receiving alternative instruction in the resident district pursuant to law, unless admitting the nonresident child would result in an inability to provide a quality educational program based on criteria established by the District pursuant to statute and this policy.
- (3) Resident student open enrollment to different attendance center: The District shall grant a request from a resident of the District for a student transfer to an attendance center within the District other than that to which the student has been assigned unless the transfer would result in an inability to provide a quality educational program based on criteria established by the District pursuant to statute and this policy.

A copy of this policy will be provided to parents, guardians and emancipated students who wish to submit an open enrollment application. It shall also be provided to any other interested person upon request.

GENERAL RULES:

1. Transfers from another school district into the District may only take place prior to the last Friday in September during the first semester of any school year, and prior to the last Friday in January during the second semester of any school year. If the District approves an application for such a transfer after the deadline in the first semester, the transfer will occur at the start of the second semester. If the District approves an application for such a transfer after the deadline in the second semester, the transfer will occur at the start of the following school year. The deadlines for transfer do not apply if:

- a. A student is seeking to transfer to an alternative school or a specialized nonpublic educational program;
 - b. A student enrolls in a school district after the deadline in either semester; or
 - c. The District's Superintendent determines that special circumstances exist and allows a student to transfer into the District after the deadline.
2. All nonresident requests for open enrollment into the District must be submitted to the District's Superintendent on the official application form provided by the South Dakota Department of Education.
3. Nonresident student open enrollment applications to attend school within the District will be reviewed and acted upon in the order in which they are received. However, if the applicant is a sibling of a student accepted into and currently enrolled in the District, that student's application shall take priority over all other applications.
4. The Superintendent shall either approve or deny the application for open enrollment. A decision of the Superintendent to deny an open enrollment application may be appealed to the School Board. A decision of the School Board to deny student's application for open enrollment may be appealed to the circuit court pursuant to State Law. (a)
5. Decisions to accept or reject open enrollment applications will be based on the criteria listed in "Open Enrollment Application Standards" (Section C).
6. The applicant and the resident school board will be notified within five days of the decision.
7. An application may be withdrawn by the applicant prior to the approval of the request and upon written notification to the District's Superintendent.
8. Once approved by the District, the approved application serves as the applicant's notice of intent to enroll in the District and obligates the student to attend school within the District during the school year, unless the affected school board or boards agree in writing to allow the student to transfer back to the resident district or assigned school, or unless the parents, guardians, or emancipated student change residence to another district. A decision by either school board to deny a request to return to the resident school district may be appealed to circuit court pursuant to law.
9. Once enrolled under open enrollment in the District, the student may remain enrolled and is not required to resubmit annual applications.
10. If, after the conclusion of a school year, a student who is open-enrolled into the District wishes to return to the student's resident school district or assigned school, the student's parent or legal guardian shall, or the student (if the student is emancipated) shall, on forms provided by the Department of Education, notify the affected school board or boards of the student's intent to return to the resident school district or previously assigned school. The affected school board or boards must receive written notice of the student's intent to re-enroll in the resident school district or previously assigned school no later than August first. However, if the affected school board or boards determine that special circumstances exist, a student may be allowed to transfer to the student's resident school district or assigned school after the deadline.
11. The parent or legal guardian of a student who has been accepted for transfer under open enrollment is responsible for transporting the student to and from school without reimbursement. (b)
12. The District shall accept credits for any course completed in any other accredited school district but shall award a diploma to a nonresident student only if the student satisfactorily meets the District's graduation requirements.

13. If two or more nonresident students from the same family, residing in the same household, request open enrollment into the District, all requests from that family must be either approved or denied and the District shall not deny an application if doing so would result in children from the same household enrolling in different school districts. However, if the District cannot provide an appropriate education for a child in need of special education or special education and related services, the District may deny that child's application for open enrollment.
14. Any student under long term suspension or expulsion will not be allowed to open enroll until the suspension or expulsion is completed. (c)
15. The rules of the South Dakota High School Activities Association will govern eligibility for participation in activities.

B. RESIDENT STUDENT TRANSFERS:

The provisions of this policy apply to resident student transfers (applications to attend an attendance center different than that to which the student is assigned) except as modified below:

1. Resident student open enrollment applications to attend an attendance center within the District other than that to which the student has been assigned will be reviewed and acted upon in the order in which they are received. However, if the applicant is a sibling of a student accepted into and currently enrolled in the attendance center to which the applicant is wishing to enroll, that student's application shall take priority over all other applications.
2. If a student is transferred from one attendance center to another attendance center within the District at the request of the student's parent or guardian, the District shall not provide transportation services to the student. (d)

C. OPEN ENROLLMENT APPLICATION STANDARDS: (e)

The following standards will be used to accept or reject nonresident student open enrollment applications to enroll within the District and resident student applications to attend an attendance center within the District other than that to which the student was assigned:

Open enrollment requests will be granted on a space available basis at the time the request is considered. The approval of an open enrollment request may not result in exceeding the average student to teacher ratio, program capacity, or building capacity criteria listed below. **The ratios listed for grade level student to teacher ratios are for open enrollment purposes only and actual class sizes may be greater than the capacity listed below because of students residing within the school district and school attendance center area.**

- Kindergarten: The student to teacher ratio shall not exceed 19 students in each grade as a result of open enrollment.
- 1st Grade: The student to teacher ratio shall not exceed 21 students in each grade as a result of open enrollment.
- 2nd Grade: The student to teacher ratio shall not exceed 22 students in each grade as a result of open enrollment.
- 3rd Grade: The student to teacher ratio shall not exceed 23 students in each grade as a result of open enrollment.
- 4th Grade: The student to teacher ratio shall not exceed 24 students in each grade as a result of open enrollment.

- 5th Grade: The student to teacher ratio shall not exceed 24 students in each grade as a result of open enrollment.
- Grade six through grade eight: The student to teacher ratio for core classes may not exceed 25 students in each grade as a result of open enrollment.
- Grade nine through grade twelve: Enrollment may not exceed attendance center building capacity.
- An open enrollment transfer may not cause a building or program to exceed capacity, including special education programs.
- Open enrollment of a special education student will not be approved if the students cannot be accommodated at current staffing levels or the program is at capacity.

D. OPEN ENROLLMENT OF SPECIAL EDUCATION STUDENTS:

1. A request to transfer a student in need of special education or special education and related services may be granted only if, after a review of all relevant student education records and direct communication with the student's parent or guardian and representatives of the resident district, the School District determines that the district can provide an appropriate instructional program and facilities, including transportation if required as a related service, to meet the student's needs. If the request to transfer is granted, the district is responsible for the provision of a free appropriate public education for the student in need of special education or special education and related services. If the student requires transportation as a related service, the district shall provide or ensure the provision of transportation within the boundaries of the District.
2. If the District is not able to confirm that the District can provide an appropriate instructional program, facilities, and transportation if necessary, based on the records review and communication with the student's parent or guardian and representatives of the resident district, the District shall initiate an individual education program team meeting consisting of representatives from the District, the resident school district and the parents or guardians, to determine whether the District can provide an appropriate instructional program, facilities, and transportation necessary.
3. A request to transfer a student in need of special education or special education and related services may be denied only pursuant to the "Open Enrollment Application Standards" (Section C) or if the individual education program team as set forth in "Open Enrollment of Special Education Students" (Section D.2.) determines that the District cannot provide an appropriate instructional program and facilities, including transportation, to meet the student's needs.
4. If a parent or guardian of a student in need of special education or special education and related services request to transfer the student back to the resident district, the affected school boards must agree in writing to allow the student to transfer back to the resident district or unless the parents, guardian, or emancipated student change residence to another district.
5. If two or more students from the same family residing in the same household request open enrollment and the District determines it can provide an appropriate special education or special education and related services for the special education student(s), the applications shall be approved subject to consideration of the Open Enrollment Application Standards (Section C). However, if the District cannot provide appropriate special education or special education and related service for one or more of the students in need of special education or special education and related services, the District may deny the application for open enrollment related to the individual special education student(s).

6. If it is determined that a parent or guardian of a student, or an emancipated student, in need of special education or special education and related services submitted a request for an open enrollment transfer, but did not indicate on the application that the student has an IEP and needs special education services, as required on the form, any approval by the District of the open enrollment transfer application will be deemed void.

Notes:

(a) SDCL 13-28-43 says the School Board or the Board's designee may approve or disapprove the application. ASBSD recommends that the Superintendent be designated by the Board as most school boards meet only once a month on the second Monday of the month.

(b) For nonresident open enrollments, SDCL 13-28-45 states that the parents/guardians are responsible for transportation, without reimbursement, of the student but the District may provide the transportation, and if provided, the District may charge a reasonable fee if the student uses District provided transportation. SDCL 13-28-45 also says school boards of both the receiving school district and the resident school district must annually approve the pick-up locations for those students within any incorporated municipality but this requirement does not apply to any school district defined as a sparse school district pursuant to § 13-13-78.

(c) SDCL 13-32-4.3 states that if a student is under suspension or expulsion in a South Dakota school district, the student may not enroll in any other school district until the suspension or expulsion has expired, and also that the superintendent of a school district may prohibit a student from enrolling in that school district if the student is under suspension or expulsion in a school in another state or in a nonpublic school in this state.

(d) SDCL 13-28-41.1. School district not required to provide transportation to student transferred within district. If a student is transferred from one school to another school within a school district at the request of the student's parent or guardian, notwithstanding any other provision of law, the school district is not required to provide transportation services to the student.

(e) SDCL 13-28-44 states that "Standards shall be limited to the capacity of a program, class, grade level, and school building operated by the board and the pupil/teacher ratio. Discrimination based on race, gender, religious affiliation, or disability is prohibited" a school board may or may not want to have capacity of the program, class or grade level specifically identified in the school district policy.

ASBSD sample policies are intended to be a guide for school districts. As is the case with any policy, a local school district's unique circumstances, challenges and opportunities need to be considered.

POLICY

The board seeks to provide enrollment options that meet the diverse needs and interests of district students. In assigning students to the district's schools, the board will, to the best of its ability, provide equal educational facilities, abide by parental wishes, and consider the best interest of all students.

The board's authority to offer enrollment options extends to residents of the district as well as non-district residents applying under South Dakota's open enrollment laws.

The Superintendent, or designee, shall establish procedures for the selection and transfer of students among schools in accordance with law, board policy, and administrative recommendation.

Policy JFCL: STUDENT REGISTERED SEX OFFENDERS

Status: ADOPTED

Original Adopted Date: 05/01/2010 | Last Revised Date: | Last Reviewed Date:

The District is committed to the safety of students, employees and other persons on school property. In order to effect this commitment, the following policy is adopted.

If a student enrolled in the District is registered as a sex offender under SDCL 22-24B-2, the student, if age 18 or older, or the parent(s)/guardian(s) of a student age 17 or younger, shall inform the Superintendent or Building Principal of the student being registered as a sex offender. The Superintendent or designee will arrange a meeting for the student to include the student, the student's parent(s) or guardian(s) if the student is age 17 or younger, school resource officer, District administrators and guidance counselors, to determine the student's background, conditions of parole, the safety risk posed by the student, and any other relevant factors affecting the student and the safety of other District students. The student's parole or probation/court services officer will be invited to attend the meeting. If the student is age 18 or older, the student may invite, but is not required to invite, the student's parent(s)/guardian(s).

Students who are registered sex offenders shall not be denied the opportunity to receive a free education from the school district solely on the basis of being a registered sex offender. The school district may consider a student's status as a registered sex offender in determining the student's educational placement and program. The Superintendent or designee may establish restrictions for the student registered sex offender, which may include, but is not limited to, the following:

- A. No attendance at a building where there are daycare centers or younger students, and/or which are located near a private daycare, and/or buildings attended by the offender's adjudicated victim or a victim's sibling, and/or any other location that would violate the offender's parole or probation conditions; and/or
- B. A behavior contract with school officials, signed by the student if at least age 18 or by the student and parent(s)/guardian(s) if the student is age 17 or younger, which may include a prohibition on leaving campus during the school day; and/or
- C. Require periodic meetings with the school counselor and/or school resource officer; and/or
- D. Attendance in an alternative educational program or instruction through remote or distance learning.
- E. Such student shall not participate in any extracurricular or cocurricular activities.

If a student subject to this policy is a student with disabilities and/or who is eligible for special education and related services, the student's educational services placement and program will be provided in accordance with federal and state law.

Under no circumstances is any student registered sex offender permitted to loiter on District property in violation of SDCL 22-24B-22(2) and 24.

If the student registered sex offender violates any of the restrictions or conditions established by the District under this policy, or otherwise poses a risk to any student in the opinion of the Superintendent or designee, the Superintendent or designee may take immediate action to address the situation for the safety of other students or District employees.

The student, if at least age 18, or the parent(s)/guardian(s) of a student age 17 or younger, may appeal the placement and program provided to the student pursuant to this policy. If the placement and program was determined by the Superintendent's designee, the appeal shall be to the Superintendent. A decision by the Superintendent may be appealed to the School Board. A written appeal must be submitted within ten (10) school days of the designee's or Superintendent's decision.

An elementary aged child who has been attending an unaccredited school in another state or country or has been receiving alternative instruction and seeks to enroll in the District shall be placed at the child's demonstrated level of proficiency as established by the standardized test administered to enrolled students in that grade in this District. Such child's placement may be in one grade level higher than warranted by the child's chronological age assuming entry into the first grade at age six and annual grade advancement thereafter. After initial placement the child may be advanced according to his or her demonstrated performance.

A child of secondary school age who has been attending an unaccredited school in another state or country or has been receiving alternative instruction who seeks to enroll in the District shall be placed in English and math at the level of achievement demonstrated by standardized tests administered to enrolled students of that age, and in all other subjects on a review of transcripts according to this policy. The child's placement may be in one grade level higher than warranted by the child's chronological age assuming entry into the first grade at age six and annual grade advancement thereafter. After initial placement the child may be advanced according to his/her demonstrated performance.

Procedures for determining units of credit for high school age students who have attended an unaccredited school or alternative program:

1. The principal shall appoint a credit review committee consisting of the high school staff deemed appropriate, and the parents or guardians. The purpose of the credit review committee is to make recommendations to the principal regarding which high school credits should be awarded to the applicant for work completed in the unaccredited school or alternative instruction program.
2. The credit review committee shall ensure that the student enrolling has completed at least one standardized achievement test in the areas of English and Math selected by and administered by the school district.
3. The credit review committee shall recommend to the principal units of credit for English and Mathematics based on the student's composite Subtest achievement scores in Reading (English) and Mathematics as deemed appropriate by the committee.
4. The credit review committee shall recommend to the principal units of credit for subjects other than English and Mathematics based upon factors, including but not limited to the following: classes taken, transcripts, class or course syllabus for each course taken, and District approved minimum competency tests in particular subject areas.
5. Should there not be a consensus within the credit review committee, the committee shall submit to the principal the differing recommendations and the rationale for each recommendation given.
6. Upon receipt of the credit review committee recommendations, the principal shall determine which credits are to be applied for purposes of grade and class placement and toward graduation credits. Any credits awarded will be awarded as a pass (P).
7. All students who have attended an unaccredited school or alternative program and enrolling in the District shall be required to meet District graduation requirements before being issued a diploma.

Any parent or guardian who is dissatisfied with the District's placement of the child may appeal it to the secretary of the Department of Education.

The following procedure shall be used to address an appeal of the Principal's placement decision.

1. The appeal shall be in writing. The appealing party must attach the Principal's written decision.
2. In the Superintendent's sole discretion, the Superintendent may (a) meet and discuss the matter with the Complainant, (b) meet and discuss the matter with the Complainant and Principal, or (c) meet and discuss the matter with the Principal.
3. Within ten (10) business days from the date the appeal was filed with the Superintendent, the

Superintendent shall render a decision in writing. The time frame for rendering a decision by the Superintendent may be extended by the Superintendent for good cause and upon written notification to the Complainant and Principal; the notification shall identify the reason for the extension and the date on or before which the decision shall be rendered. The Complainant and Principal shall receive copies of the decision. The Superintendent may uphold, reverse or modify the Principal's decision. The Superintendent may also refer the matter back to the Principal for further investigation. The Principal may uphold, modify or reverse his or her initial decision. After a matter has been referred back to the Principal, and the Principal rendered a second decision, that decision may also be appealed to the Superintendent.

4. The Superintendent's decision may be appealed by the Complainant to the Secretary of Education within (10) ten business days of receipt of the Superintendent's written decision.

ASBSD sample policies are intended to be a guide for school districts. As is the case with any policy, a local school district's unique circumstances, challenges and opportunities need to be considered.

Assessment:

Due to the back to back snow storms in late March and early April, the state extended the testing window by one week, making the new closing date for the testing window May 12. As results trickle in, the assessment office will spend the next few weeks compiling the results using new target reports offered by the state. These reports isolate student performance on the most important target standards to give districts a clear place to focus efforts for school improvement.

Professional Development:

In the last few months, the Mentoring committee has been working toward streamlining the on-boarding process for new hires to the district. The mentors brainstormed a list of the most important skills and district processes that a teacher needs in order to be successful in the Meade School District. Additionally, the mentors discussed whether or not our past practice has provided adequate training. As a result of these discussion and planning sessions, we are excited to begin in July with a new training process in which new hires will have three days of orientation prior to the start of the school year in addition to the traditional opening inservice days.

While identifying these focus areas, the mentors also identified which processes should be more clearly defined and standardized throughout the district. These areas include standard reporting practices in high stakes situations, de-escalation practices for behaviors, and procedures for recommending a student for services, to name a few. The curriculum director has enlisted district experts to assist in clarifying Meade's approach to the identified areas.

Technology

May 5th marks the beginning of a busy time in the technology department as devices are set to arrive. Technicians will have eight weeks to prepare just over 2200 devices for staff and students. The intention is to make sure that old devices are collected on the last day two days of school and new ones given out at the same time. The technology department will be sharing the process with principals and requesting feedback to make the transition as smooth as possible.

Standards & Curriculum

Over the last year, the curriculum department has made a concerted effort to conduct a district inventory of all physical and digital curriculum with the intention of not purchasing excess materials. Science and Social Studies curriculum contracts expire at the end of fiscal year 2023, so fill-in orders must be placed to bridge the gap until our next adoptions. By conducting a thorough inventory, the department ensure that we are purchasing just what we need without excess or waste.

The state officially adopted the Social Studies standards and is working closely with curriculum directors and social studies teachers from around the state to develop a feasible plan for training staff and providing resources. The process is ongoing, with training and workshops dates set to be released early the second week of May. With those resources and the assistance of a focus group, Meade will create a plan to navigate the new standards.

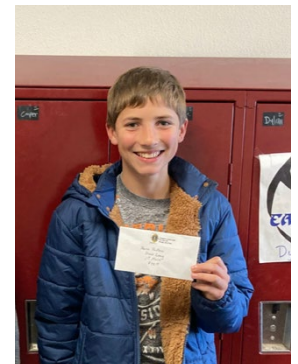
Other Items:

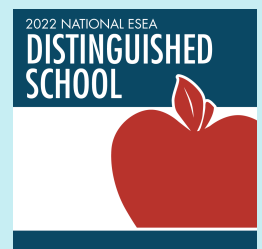
