- Grade nine through grade twelve: Enrollment may not exceed attendance center building capacity.

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The District recognizes that breastfeeding is the most healthful, natural and economic method of infant nutrition, and it is the policy of the District to support the needs of breastfeeding mothers when they return to work.

Maternity leave planning will address the transition from full-time maternity leave to full-time work and the impact that this may have on breastfeeding. Generally, maternity leave is a sufficient time to establish breastfeeding. Factors to consider include a combination of full-time and part time maternity leave, a flexible work schedule to accommodate breastfeeding needs, and break times to use a breast pump at work.

Breastfeeding employees are allowed a flexible schedule for nursing or pumping, with the schedule to be determined by the employee and employee's supervisor. The schedule requested by the employee will be approved unless the employee's supervisor has determined, in writing, that the requested schedule would impose an undue hardship by causing the District significant difficulty or expense when considered in relation to the size, financial resources, nature, or structure of the school district. Factors to determine when considering the schedule as proposed by the employee include, but are not limited to the following: the time requested would exceed the normal time allowed for lunch, breaks, student responsibilities at the time requested, sick/personal and annual leave, and adjustment of normal work schedule.

The District shall provide an appropriate room, other than a bathroom, for an employee to express breast milk where;

- a) nursing women can nurse an infant brought in during lunch or breaks
- b) nursing women can pump breastmilk to be stored for later use. (Each employee is responsible for proper storage of her milk using a personal storage cooler)
- c) the area for breastfeeding or pumping is located where a crying infant will not be disruptive to other employees;
- d) accessible electrical outlets for electric breast pump use and a sink close by with a clean, safe water source for hand washing and rinsing out breast pump equipment; and
- e) a comfortable chair and a table or desk is available for pumping;

Notes:

~~29 U.S. Code § 218d exempts employers of fewer than 50 employees "if such requirements would impose an undue hardship by causing the District significant difficulty or expense when considered in relation to the size, financial resources, nature, or structure of the District's business."~~

29 U.S Code § 218d states the following:

(a) In General. - An employer shall provide-

(1) a reasonable break time for an employee to express breast milk for her ~~nursing child~~ ~~for 1 year~~nursing child for 1 year after the child's birth each time such employee has need to express the milk; and

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(2) a place, other than a bathroom, that is shielded from view and free from intrusion from coworkers and the public, which may be used by an employee to express breast milk.

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(b) Compensation.-

~~(1) In~~ In General. ~~Subject~~ Subject to paragraph (2), an employer shall not be required to compensate an employee receiving reasonable break time subsection (a) for any ~~time spent~~time spent during the working day for such purpose unless otherwise required by Federal or State law or municipal ordinance.

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(2) Relief From Duties. - Break time provided under subsection (a)(1) shall be considered hours worked if the employee is not completely relieved from duty during the entirety of such break.

~~(c) Exemption for Small Employers. — An employer that employs less than 50 employees shall not be subject to the requirements of this subsection, if such requirements would impose an undue hardship by causing the employer significant difficulty or expense when considered in relation to the size, financial resources, nature, or structure of the employer's business.~~

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Discipline in the schools is critical to the provision and implementation of public education. The Board and school administrators have the legal authority to deal with disruptive students and student misconduct. The United States Constitution and The South Dakota Constitution entitle all students to due process when they are subjected to deprivation of a property right. The Board recognizes the importance of safeguarding a student's constitutional rights.

Due process is an established course for judicial proceedings or other governmental activities designed to safeguard the legal right of the individual.

A student whose conduct may warrant suspension or expulsion shall be provided with appropriate due process. Due process, in the context of the administrative proceedings carried out by school authorities, refers to the notification and hearing procedures established by the South Dakota Board of Education

Due process procedures shall be fair and apply equally to all. Fairly enforcing due process procedures involves:

- Adequate and timely notice and an opportunity to prepare a defense;
- An opportunity to be heard at a reasonable time and in a meaningful manner and;
- The right to a speedy and impartial hearing on the merits of the case.

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SPECIAL EDUCATION STUDENTS

Students who attend public school on an individualized educational program (IEP) are subject to due process procedures established by the South Dakota Board of Education under administrative rules for special education. The administration shall consult with a student's individualized education program (IEP) team to balance student disciplinary actions with the provision of a free and appropriate public education for students with disabilities.

~~SDCL 13-32-4. School board to assist in discipline—Suspension and expulsion of pupils—Hearings—Alternative settings. The school board of every school district shall assist and cooperate with the administration and teachers in the government and discipline of schools. The board may suspend or expel from school any student for violation of rules or policies or for insubordination or misconduct, and the superintendent or principal in charge of the school may~~

~~temporarily suspend any student in accordance with SDCL 13-32.4.2. The rules or policies may include prohibiting the following:~~

- ~~(1) The consumption or possession of beer or alcoholic beverages on the school premises or at school activities;~~
- ~~(2) The use or possession of a controlled substance, without a valid prescription, on the school premises or at school activities; and~~
- ~~(3) The use or possession of a firearm, as provided in SDCL 13-32-7, on or in any elementary or secondary school premises, vehicle, or building or any premises, vehicle, or building used or leased for elementary or secondary school functions or activities.~~

~~In addition to administrative and school board disciplinary action, any violation of SDCL 13-32-7 shall be reported to local law enforcement authorities.~~

~~The period of expulsion may extend beyond the semester in which the violation, insubordination, or misconduct occurred. Any expulsion for consumption or possession of beer or alcoholic beverages may not extend beyond ninety school days. If a student has intentionally brought a firearm onto school premises, the expulsion may not be for less than twelve months. However, the superintendent or chief administering officer of each local school district or system may increase or decrease the length of a firearm-related expulsion on a case-by-case basis.~~

~~The South Dakota Board of Education shall promulgate rules pursuant to chapter 1-26 to establish administrative due process procedures for the protection of a student's rights. The administrative due process procedures shall include a requirement that the school give notice of a student's due process rights to the parent or guardian of the student at the time of suspension or expulsion. Each school district board shall provide a procedural due process hearing, if requested, for a student in accordance with such rules if the suspension or expulsion of the student extends into the eleventh school day.~~

~~This section does not preclude other forms of discipline which may include suspension or expulsion from a class or activity.~~

~~This section does not prohibit a local school district from providing educational services to an expelled student in an alternative setting.~~

~~SDCL 13-32-4.2. Procedure for suspension—Appeal—Hearing.—The school board in any district may authorize the summary suspension of pupils by principals of schools for not more than ten school days and by the superintendent of schools for not more than ninety school days. In case of a suspension by the superintendent for more than ten school days, the pupil or his parents or others having custodial care may appeal the decision of the superintendent to the board of education. Any suspension by a principal shall be immediately reported to the superintendent who may revoke the suspension at any time. In event of an appeal to the board, the superintendent shall promptly transmit to the board a full report in writing of the facts related to the suspension, the action taken by him and the reasons for such action; and the board, upon request, shall grant a hearing to the appealing party. ~~renders its decision, unless in the judgment of the superintendent of schools, the pupil's presence poses a continuing danger to persons or property or an ongoing threat of disrupting the academic process, in which case the pupil may be immediately removed from school, and the notice and hearing shall follow as soon as practicable.~~

~~The Superintendent and Principals are hereby authorized to suspend District students as is set forth in SDCL 13-32-4, 13-32-4.2, and the related regulations.~~

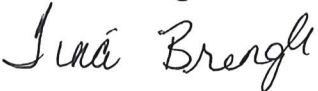

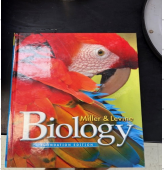
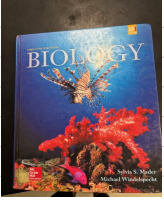

Due to ongoing budget reductions and the elimination of a teaching position, grade-level alignment adjustments will take place beginning the 2026–27 school year. As part of this transition, fifth grade students currently attending Whitewood Elementary School will move to Sturgis Williams Middle School, which serves students in grades 5–8.

The Meade School District Board of Education approved the transition during the November 10, 2025 board meeting. District leadership noted the change is intended to better align grade configurations across the district. Stagebarn Middle School serves grades 5-8. Sturgis Elementary & Piedmont Elementary serve grades KG-4.

(d) Explain how the intent of the administrative rule for which the waiver is being requested will be met if the waiver is granted.

The waiver is intended to help the district maximize staffing efficiencies, maintain financial sustainability, and better align instructional programming across grade levels. By placing fifth grade within a grades 5–8 middle school structure, the district anticipates increased collaboration among staff, improved access to middle-level academic opportunities and resources, and more efficient use of personnel and facilities.

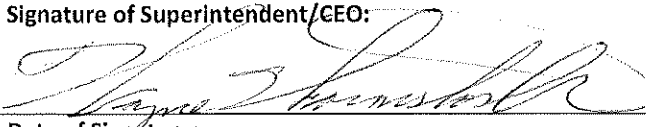
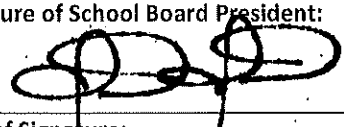

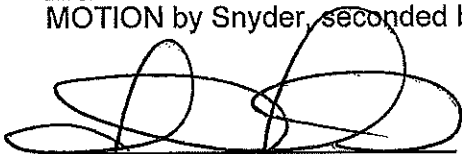

As part of this transition, fifth grade students currently attending Whitewood Elementary School will move to Sturgis Williams Middle School, which serves students in grades 5–8.

The Meade School District Board of Education approved the transition during the November 10, 2025 board meeting. District leadership noted the change is intended to better align grade configurations across the district. Stagebarn Middle School serves grades 5-8. Sturgis Elementary & Piedmont Elementary serve grades KG-4.

(d) Explain how the intent of the administrative rule for which the waiver is being requested will be met if the waiver is granted.

The waiver is intended to help the district maximize staffing efficiencies, maintain financial sustainability, and better align instructional programming across grade levels. Meade School District 46-1, 1230 Douglas Street, Sturgis, SD 57785 (hereinafter referred to as "Meade").

Harlow's and Meade are referred to herein individually as a "Party" and jointly as the "Parties".

RECITALS

A. On or about April 11, 2023, the Parties entered into a *Contract for Student Transportation Services* (hereinafter referred to as the "Contract") pursuant to which Harlow's agreed to provide to Meade certain bussing services. The Contract will terminate at the end of May 2026.

B. The Parties have agreed to remove certain routes from the Contact for the remainder of the 2025-26 school year. This Amendment only applies to such certain routes. The Parties hereby amend the Contract accordingly.

1. Amendments to Contract. The Parties hereby generally amend the Contract to provide that Harlow's will not service routes R9, and R13 on behalf of Meade as of the effective date hereof, and such routes are permanently removed from the Contract and Harlow's waives any right to service routes R9 and R13.

The compensation paid to Harlow's pursuant to the Contract shall be adjusted downward by reducing the mileage of routes R9 and R13 effective 4.30.2026 from the rate schedule for the remaining days of the 2025-26 school year.

ADDENDUM NO. 3 (adding Bus 9 AND Bus 13)

TO CONTRACT FOR STUDENT TRANSPORTATION SERVICES

This Addendum No. 1 (“Addendum”) is made and entered into by and between **Meade School District 46-1**, 1230 Douglas Street, Sturgis, South Dakota 57785 (hereinafter “MSD”), and **Dakota Bus Service, Inc.**, 631 S. 32nd Street, Spearfish, South Dakota 57783 (hereinafter “Contractor” or “Dakota Bus”).

This Addendum modifies and supplements the Contract for Student Transportation Services previously executed by the parties, which is scheduled to commence July 1, 2026, for the 2026–2027 school year through June 30, 2029 (the “Master Contract”).

1. Purpose

The purpose of this Addendum is to establish terms for **emergency student transportation services** for the remaining fifteen (15) scheduled school days of the 2025–2026 school year, prior to the commencement of the Master Contract term.

This Addendum covers the period of:

April 30, 2026 through June 30, 2026

This Addendum is temporary in nature and is intended solely to provide uninterrupted transportation services in advance of the Master Contract term beginning July 1, 2026.

2. Term

This Addendum shall be effective April 30, 2026, and shall terminate **automatically on June 30, 2026**, unless earlier terminated by mutual written agreement of the parties.

Services under this Addendum shall cover the remaining fifteen (15) scheduled school days for the 2025–2026 school year.

3. Scope of Services

Contractor shall provide student transportation services consistent with the operational, safety, insurance, compliance, and driver requirements set forth in the Master Contract.

Transportation services shall begin with the following designated routes:

- **Route R-9 – Roadrunner effective 30 April 2026**
- **Route R-13 – Foghorn Leghorn effective 30 April 2026**

Additional routes may be added upon mutual agreement of the parties as needed to meet district transportation demands. Any additional routes shall be billed at the daily rate set forth below unless otherwise agreed in writing.

All services shall comply with applicable federal, state, and local laws and regulations, including all provisions outlined in the Master Contract.

4. Compensation

MSD agrees to compensate Contractor at the rate of:

Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) per bus, per day

Payment shall be based on the number of buses assigned and operating per scheduled school day during the term of this Addendum.

Invoices shall be submitted monthly and shall be payable pursuant to the payment terms set forth in Section 11 of the Master Contract.

Fuel costs for services provided under this Addendum shall be handled consistent with the Fuel Pass-Through Clause outlined in Section 12 of the Master Contract unless otherwise agreed in writing.

5. Incorporation of Master Contract Terms

Except as expressly modified herein, all terms, conditions, insurance requirements, indemnification provisions, termination clauses, compliance requirements, and operational standards contained in the Master Contract shall remain in full force and effect and are incorporated herein by reference.

In the event of any conflict between this Addendum and the Master Contract, the terms of this Addendum shall control solely for the period of April 30, 2026 through June 30, 2026.

6. No Waiver of Future Contract Term

Execution of this Addendum does not modify, amend, or waive any provisions of the Master Contract scheduled to begin July 1, 2026. The Master Contract shall commence as originally agreed.

7. Entire Addendum

This Addendum constitutes the entire agreement of the parties with respect to emergency transportation services for the period stated above and may only be modified in writing signed by both parties.

School Resource Officer Program Agreement

This Agreement is made and entered into this ____ day of _____ 2026, by and between the MEADE SCHOOL DISTRICT 46-1 and the MEADE COUNTY SHERIFF'S OFFICE, 1425 Main Street, Sturgis, SD 57785.

RECITALS

WHEREAS, the Sheriff oversees the Meade County Sheriff's Deputy's;

WHEREAS, this Agreement will often refer to the Meade County Sheriff's Office as "Law Enforcement" for ease of reference;

WHEREAS, This Agreement will often refer to the Meade School District 46-1 as "School" for ease of reference.

WHEREAS, Law enforcement agrees to provide the Meade School District 46-1 a School Resource/Liaison Officer (hereinafter referred to as "SRO") Program in the School; and

WHEREAS, the Meade School District 46-1 and Law Enforcement desire to set forth in the SRO Agreement the specific terms and conditions of the services to be performed and provided by the SRO's in the Piedmont Valley Elementary and Stagebarn Middle School.

AGREEMENT

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual covenants, promises, and conditions contained herein, the Parties mutually agree as follows:

1. Cost of the SRO Program.

- A. The Parties hereto acknowledge that there is a financial agreement between the Parties. The Meade School District 46-1 will reimburse the Meade County Sheriff's Office for 50% of the actual wages of the Meade County Sheriff's Deputy for a nine-month school year. This wage will include any overtime worked by the SRO for each period. The invoice for payment in the amount of \$41,294.27 (50% of the Deputy's 9-month salary) will be submitted by the Meade County Sheriff's Office April 15, 2027.

- B. Continuing education in the areas of school-based law enforcement topics, child development, adolescent psychology, trauma, conflict resolution, mental health and addiction, children with disabilities, juvenile and education law and policy, and cultural competence are cornerstones of an effective SRO. The Meade School District 46-1 will reimburse Law Enforcement for up to a total of \$1000.00 annually for training cost when the SRO participates in school-related training and professional development. The training will be mutually agreed upon between the Parties to this Agreement. The costs shall include, but are not limited to, travel, lodging, per diem, and tuition.

2. Employment of School Resource Officers.

- A. The SRO shall be employees of Law Enforcement and shall be subject to the administration, supervision, and control of Law Enforcement.
- B. The SRO shall be subject to all personnel policies and practices of Law Enforcement except as such policies or practices may be modified by the terms and condition of this Agreement.
- C. Law Enforcement, in its sole discretion, shall have the power and authority to hire, discharge, and discipline the SRO.
- D. A joint committee composed of representatives of Law Enforcement, Piedmont Valley Elementary, Stagebarn Middle School and the Meade School District 46-1 shall make recommendations for the SRO positions to the Sheriff who shall assign such Deputies. If a principal is dissatisfied with an SRO who has been assigned to that principal's school, then that principal may request that the Sheriff assign a different deputy as the SRO for that School.
- E. SRO Assignments
 - 1. Piedmont Valley Elementary School will have one assigned SRO, and additional SRO duties assigned as needed for Stagebarn Middle School.
 - 2. Substitutions will be made in consultation with the school administration affected and will only be on a temporary basis.

3. Duty Hours

- A. Whenever possible, it is the intent of the parties that the SRO's duty hours shall conform to the school day. Reasonable efforts will be made to accommodate requests for the SRO to attend after-school activities, such as sporting events and dances.
- B. It is understood and agreed that time spent by the SRO attending circuit or magistrate court, juvenile court, and/or criminal cases arising from and/or out of their employment as an SRO shall be considered as hours worked under this

- Agreement. This includes all training required by the State of South Dakota or Law Enforcement to maintain certification as a law enforcement officer in good standing.
- C. In the event an SRO is absent from work, the SRO shall notify his or her supervisor in Law Enforcement and the principal of the Piedmont Valley Elementary School and Stagebarn Middle School to which the SRO is assigned. If an SRO is absent from work for more than five consecutive days, Law Enforcement will assign another officer, if available, to substitute for the SRO beginning the sixth consecutive day of absence.

4. Goals of the SRO Program.

This SRO Program is unique to the community, based on input from the school administration, teachers, faculty, families, and community members. The Program is designed to fulfill three overall roles:

A. Law Enforcement

B. Fostering Positive School Climate/Crime Prevention/ Mentor/ Role Model

C. Education

- A. **Law Enforcement** – SROs are responsible for the majority of law enforcement activities occurring at school, during school hours, but not general school discipline. The determination of whether an activity raises to the level of a Law Enforcement activity should be made in consultation with a school administrator. Parents, students, teachers, and other school personnel should bring complaints about student misbehavior to the school principal, or designee, rather than the SRO.
- B. **Fostering Positive School Climate/ Crime Prevention/ Mentor/ Role Model-** One of the primary role's SROs fulfill is fostering a positive school climate through relationship-building and crime prevention. Officers will engage in various activities, in consultation with school administration, teachers, and students, and should strive to build a school culture of open communication and trust between and among students and adults by focusing on officers getting to know students at the school, serving as a role model, and working with teachers and administrators to identify students who may be facing challenges and need additional resources or attention to be successful in school. Crime prevention activities include foot patrols, monitoring previous crime locations, speaking to teachers about reducing the opportunity for crimes to occur, analyzing possible crime patterns, and investigating crimes. Officers may also complete security surveys analyzing the physical security and safety of school property and facilities.
- C. **Education-** SROs should participate in the school community by becoming a member of the educational team and administrative staff, where appropriate and by representing law enforcement community to build positive relationships with youth, their families, and school staff.

Whether talking to students in the hallway or delivering a presentation in the classroom, SROs are embedded in the educational fabric of the school. SROs are expected to be proactive in creating and taking advantage of educational situations, and school administrators are encouraged to leverage this resource.

5. Duties of School Resource Officers

The SRO's duties will include, but not be limited to, the following:

- A. To be an extension of the principal's office for assignments consistent with this Agreement. SROs should be notified by the building principal whenever a situation arises that is or likely to become criminal in nature, a present or potential danger to the staff, students, visitors, or school property exists, or an issue that requires the assistance of additional personnel.
- B. To be a visible, active law enforcement figure on campus dealing with law enforcement matters and school code violations originating on the assigned campus. As to school code violations, the SRO will refer the student to the principal's office for discipline to be meted by school officials.
- C. To act as designee of the campus administrator in maintaining a safe environment as to law enforcement matters and school code violations. This includes building(s), grounds, parking lot(s), lockers, and other school property. As to school code violations, the SRO will defer to the principal's office for discipline to be meted out by school officials.
- D. To provide a classroom resource for law enforcement topics using approved materials. Materials will be approved by the Sheriff.
- E. To be a resource for students which will enable them to be associated with a law enforcement figure and role model in the students' environment.
- F. To be a resource for teachers, parents, and students for conferences on an individual basis dealing with individual problems or questions.
- G. To make appearances before parent groups, and other groups associated with the campus and as a speaker on a variety of requested topics, particularly drug and alcohol abuse.
- H. The SRO will be involved in school discipline, when it pertains to preventing a disruption that would, if ignored, place students, faculty, and staff at risk of harm, the SRO will resolve the problem to preserve the school climate. As to School code violations, the SRO will take the student to the principal's office for discipline to be meted out by school officials.
- I. It will be the responsibility of the SRO to report all crimes originating on campus. On occasion, as SRO may be assigned cases originating outside school which may involve students from their assigned schools.

- J. The SRO will share information with the administrator about persons and conditions that pertain to campus safety concerns.
- K. The SRO will be familiar with helpful community agencies, such as mental health clinics, drug treatment centers, etc. that aid students. Referrals will be made when necessary.
- L. The SRO and the principal will develop plans and strategies to prevent and/or minimize dangerous situations which might result in student unrest.
- M. The SRO will coordinate all his/her activities with the principal and staff members concerned and will seek permission, guidance, and advice prior to enacting any programs within the school.
- N. The SRO may be asked to provide community-wide crime prevention presentations that include, but are not limited to:
 - Drugs and the law – Adult and juvenile**
 - Alcohol and the law – Adult and juvenile**
 - **Sexual assault prevention**
 - **Safety programs – Adult and juvenile**
 - **Online safety and citizenship; and**
 - **Assistance in other crime preventions programs as assigned.**
- O. The SROs will wear approved department uniform to include vests, formal business attire or business casual with appropriate logos and name badges depending on the time of school year, the type of school activity or program, and the requests of the school and/or Law Enforcement. The Sheriff and the principal shall jointly set expectations and resolve disputes in this area.
- P. The SROs will wear their department-authorized duty weapons in accordance with department policy.
- Q. The SRO's will be required to take certain calls as needed in the area of Piedmont and along the I-90 corridor.

6. Chain of Command.

- A. As employees of Law Enforcement, SROs will be subject to the chain of command of Law Enforcement
- B. In the performance of their duties, SROs shall coordinate and communicate with the principal or the principal's designee of the school to which they are assigned.

7. Access to Education Records.

- A. School Officials shall allow law enforcement to inspect and copy any public records maintained by the school to the extent allowed by law.
- B. Law enforcement and school officials are permitted to openly share information in accordance with the standing 4th Circuit Judicial Order allowing

such sharing. The judicial order shall be periodically updated to reflect current information and to remain in compliance with the latest judicial guidance.

C. Law Enforcement should actively share information with school officials that would likely have a significant impact on the safety, well-being, or operation of the school or educational environment.

8. Terms of Agreement.

The initial term of this Agreement is one year commencing on the ____ day of August 2026 and ending on the ____ day of May, 2027. However, should any Party encounter budgetary constraints that make the continuation of this agreement impractical, then any Party may cancel this agreement upon sixty days' notice to the others. Following the initial three-year term, this Agreement shall be automatically renewed for successive one-year periods unless any Party requests termination or modification of this Agreement. This request must be made in writing.

You have requested that we audit the financial statements of the governmental activities, the business-type activities, each major fund, and the aggregate remaining fund information as of June 30, 2026, and for the year then ended and the related notes, which collectively comprise the District's basic financial statements as listed in the table of contents.

In addition, we will audit the District's compliance over major federal award programs for the period ended June 30, 2026. We are pleased to confirm our acceptance and our understanding of this audit engagement by means of this letter. Our audits will be conducted with the objectives of our expressing an opinion on each opinion unit and an opinion on compliance regarding the District's major federal award programs. The objectives of our audit of the financial statements are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance but is not absolute assurance and therefore is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America (GAAS) and in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*, and/or any state or regulatory audit requirements will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements, including omissions, can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if there is a substantial likelihood that, individually or in the aggregate, they would influence the judgment made by a reasonable user based on the financial statements.

The objectives of our compliance audit are to obtain sufficient appropriate audit evidence to form an opinion and report at the level specified in the governmental audit requirement about whether the District complied in all material respects with the applicable compliance requirements and identify audit and reporting requirements specified in the governmental audit requirement that are supplementary to GAAS and *Government Auditing Standards*, if any, and perform procedures to address those requirements.

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require that the included supplementary information, such as management's discussion and analysis and budgetary comparison information be presented to supplement the basic financial statements. Such information, although not a part of the basic financial statements, is required by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board, which considers it to be an essential part of financial reporting for placing the basic financial statements in an appropriate operational, economic, or historical context. As part of our engagement, we will apply certain limited procedures to the required supplementary information (RSI) in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. These limited procedures will consist primarily of inquiries of management regarding their methods of measurement and presentation and comparing the information for consistency with management's responses to our inquiries. We will not express an opinion or provide any form of assurance on the RSI.

The following RSI is required by accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. This RSI will be subjected to certain limited procedures but will not be audited:

- 1) Budgetary Comparison Schedules
- 2) Schedule of the District's Proportionate Share of the Net Pension Liability (Asset)
- 3) Schedule of Pension Contributions
- 4) Notes to Required Supplementary Information

Schedule of Expenditures of Federal Awards

We will subject the Schedule of Expenditures of Federal Awards to the auditing procedures applied in our audit of the basic financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling the schedule to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements or to the financial statements themselves, and additional procedures in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. We intend to provide an opinion on whether the Schedule of Expenditures of Federal Awards is presented fairly in all material respects in relation to the financial statements as a whole.

Also, the document we submit to you will include the following other additional information that will not be subjected to the auditing procedures applied in our audit of the basic financial statements:

- 1) Corrective Action Plan
- 2) List of School District Officials

Data Collection Form

Prior to the completion of our engagement, we will complete the sections of the Data Collection Form that are our responsibility. The form will summarize our audit findings, amounts, and conclusions. It is management's responsibility to submit a reporting package including financial statements, Schedule of Expenditures of Federal Awards, Schedule of Prior Audit Findings and Questioned Costs, and Corrective Action plan along with the Data Collection Form to the federal audit clearinghouse. The financial reporting package must be text-searchable, unencrypted, and unlocked. Otherwise, the reporting package will not be accepted by the federal audit clearinghouse. We will assist you in the electronic submission and certification. You may request from us copies of our report for you to include with the reporting package submitted to pass-through entities.

The Data Collection Form is required to be submitted within the *earlier* of 30 days after receipt of our auditors' reports or nine months after the end of the audit period, unless specifically waived by a federal cognizant or oversight agency for audits. Data Collection Forms submitted untimely are one of the factors in assessing programs at a higher risk.

Audit of the Financial Statements

We will conduct our audits in accordance GAAS, the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States of America; the audit requirements of Title 2 U.S. Code of Federal Regulations (CFR) Part 200, *Uniform Administrative Requirements, Cost Principles, and Audit Requirements for Federal Awards* (Uniform Guidance) and, if applicable, in accordance with any state or regulatory audit requirements. As part of an audit of financial statements in accordance with GAAS and in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*, and/or any state or regulatory audit requirements, we exercise professional judgment and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit.

We also:

- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error, design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks, and obtain audit evidence that is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control.
- Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the District's internal control. However, we will communicate to you in writing concerning any significant deficiencies or material weaknesses in internal control relevant to the audit of the financial statements that we have identified during the audit.
- Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluate the overall presentation of the financial statements, including the disclosures, and whether the financial statements represent the underlying transactions and events in a manner that achieves fair presentation.
- Conclude, based on the audit evidence obtained, whether there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about the District's ability to continue as a going concern for a reasonable period of time.

Because of the inherent limitations of an audit, together with the inherent limitations of internal control, an unavoidable risk that some material misstatements or noncompliance may not be detected exists, even though the audit is properly planned and performed in accordance with GAAS and *Government Auditing Standards* of the Comptroller General of the United States of America and, if applicable, in accordance with any state or regulatory audit requirements. Please note that the determination of abuse is subjective and *Government Auditing Standards* does not require auditors to detect abuse.

We have not concluded the planning stage of our audit. We believe the following significant risks identified in the prior period are still relevant. However, modifications may be made:

- Management override of internal controls
- Improper revenue recognition
- Compliance with federal grant requirements
- Budgetary compliance

Our responsibility as auditor is limited to the period covered by our audit and does not extend to any other periods.

We will issue a written report upon completion of our audit of the District's basic financial statements. Our report will be addressed to the School Board of the District. Circumstances may arise in which our report may differ from its expected form and content based on the results of our audit. Depending on the nature of these circumstances, it may be necessary for us to modify our opinions, add an emphasis-of-matter or other-matter paragraph(s) to our auditor's report, or if necessary, withdraw from the engagement. If our opinions on the basic financial statements are other than unmodified, we will discuss the reasons with you in advance. If, for any reason, we are unable to complete the audit or are unable to form or have not formed opinions, we may decline to express opinions or to issue a report as a result of this engagement.

In accordance with the requirements of *Government Auditing Standards*, we will also issue a written report describing the scope of our testing over internal control over financial reporting and over compliance with laws, regulations, and provisions of grants and contracts, including the results of that testing. However, providing an opinion on internal control and compliance over financial reporting will not be an objective of the audit and, therefore, no such opinion will be expressed.

Audit of Major Program Compliance

Our audit of the District's major federal award program(s) compliance will be conducted in accordance with the requirements of the Single Audit Act, as amended; and the Uniform Guidance, and will include tests of accounting records, a determination of major programs in accordance with the Uniform Guidance and other procedures we consider necessary to enable us to express such an opinion on major federal award program compliance and to render the required reports. We cannot provide assurance that an unmodified opinion on compliance will be expressed. Circumstances may arise in which it is necessary for us to modify our opinion or withdraw from the engagement.

The Uniform Guidance requires that we also plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether material noncompliance with applicable laws and regulations, the provisions of contracts and grant agreements applicable to major federal award programs, and the applicable compliance requirements occurred, whether due to fraud or error, and express an opinion on the District's compliance based on the audit. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance but is not absolute assurance and therefore is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with GAAS, *Government Auditing Standards*, and the Uniform Guidance will always detect material noncompliance when it exists. The risk of not detecting material noncompliance resulting from fraud is higher than for that resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control. Noncompliance with the compliance requirements is considered material if there is a substantial likelihood that, individually or in the aggregate, it would influence the judgment made by a reasonable user of the report on compliance about the District's compliance with the requirements of the federal programs as a whole.

As part of a compliance audit in accordance with GAAS and, in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*, and/or any state or regulatory audit requirements, we exercise professional judgment and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit. We also identify and assess the risks of material noncompliance, whether due to fraud or error, and design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks.

E. Starting in the 2026-27 contract year, teachers may earn up to two (2) Incentive Days per year, which can be used or paid out. To qualify for the first Incentive Day, a teacher must have four (4) or fewer absences of benefitted leave (ex. Emergency/Sick Leave, Leave Without Pay, Personal Leave) during the previous school year. To qualify for the second Incentive Day, a teacher must have two (2) or fewer absences of benefitted leave during the previous school year. Donated sick leave, activities leave, and professional leave will not count against a teacher in earning incentive days.

An Incentive Day, when used, will not count towards the maximum number of leave days a teacher can use to qualify for Incentive Days in the following year. An Incentive Day may be used in at least one (1) day increments during the school year after the year it is earned. Incentive Days will not accumulate.

ii. Teachers may request payment in lieu of using Incentive Days and will receive the following payment:

- First Incentive Day will receive one hundred dollars (\$100)

- First and Second Incentive Day will receive a total of two hundred fifty dollars (\$250)
- * Request for payment must be made by June 1. Payment will be made in June payroll.

Retirees and those resigning effective at the end of the current school year and who qualify for Incentive Leave will provide written notice to the Director of Human Resources (or designee) by December 1 of the current school year. Payment will be made in June.

Drawn days may not be used in conjunction with any other negotiated leave provisions and are available to teachers in increments of at least one (1) day.

If a staff member uses benefitted leave to miss more than one in-service day, they will be ineligible to earn incentive leave for the following year.

Teachers identified by the Board as potentially being RIF'ed may be offered the option of terminating their employment with the Meade School District 46-1 and accepting a payment commensurate to the early retirement schedule (5.11 of this document). 1.) Amend Chapter 1, Part IV, Section 1, Subsection D of the SDHSAA By-Laws.

C. Eight Semester/Twelve Trimester Rule. A student shall be eligible for four first semesters and four second semesters OR twelve trimesters of interscholastic competition while enrolled in grades 9-12. For the purpose of this subsection, enrollment and attendance in school or participation in one or more contests shall count as a semester/trimester of eligibility. Once a student enrolls as a ninth grader, all semesters/trimesters must be consecutive unless waived as per Article VII, Section 3 (I), page 18 of the Constitution.

D. Four Semester/Six Trimester Middle School Participation Rule. Middle school students shall be eligible for four consecutive semesters OR six consecutive trimesters of high school interscholastic competition while enrolled in grades 7-8. The four semesters/six trimesters begins when the student enrolls as a 7th grader or is a student enrolled in alternative instruction as set forth in SDCL 13-27-3, must be consecutive, and are not dependent upon actual participation in high school level interscholastic competition (the four semesters/six trimesters start at enrollment/recognition as a 7th grader, not upon participation in high school competition). Upon initial completion of the 8th grade (four semesters/six trimesters of 7th and 8th grade), the student shall begin their eight semesters/twelve trimesters of high school eligibility. No “redshirt” or “reclassification” years will be recognized.

NOTE: Attendance Defined: If the student is used in the ADM count, full or partial day, they are considered to have attended school.

Rationale: Clarifies the intent of the previous year’s amendment limiting middle school participation in varsity sports to four semesters/six trimesters, specifies that “redshirt” and “reclassification” years between 8th grade and 9th grade are not recognized.

Positives- Provides clarity to schools and families on a question that is being asked on an increasing scale of “can my child repeat 8th grade for sports before starting 9th grade”, “can my child homeschool for a year after 8th grade before entering 9th grade and not have their high school eligibility start?”, and “can my child homeschool and do a year of club sports between 8th and 9th grade before starting their high school eligibility?” The answer to all of those questions is No; the whole concept of redshirting and reclassifying for the purpose of sports goes against the concept of education-based activities.

Negatives/Things to Look For- Parents need to be aware of this rule and need to know that if they do this, the high school eligibility clock starts after completion of 8th grade and their child may run out of eligibility a year sooner than they anticipated. We need to be clear with parents on this rule so there are no surprises.

There may be legitimate reasons why a student would need to be held back a year between 8th and 9th grade. For that situation we have our hardship process to examine the situation individually.

2.) Amend Chapter II, Part I, Section 1, Subsection J of the SDHSAA By-Laws as follows:

J. The eligibility of a student is not affected by a transfer from a school that closes. **The transfer cannot occur until the date of the school closure or the end of the school year in which the school closes. End of school year would include the end of all SDHSAA state championships for the school year.** A student living in a district that does not support and maintain a high school may be declared eligible at a high school that regularly serves that district to which the student commutes daily.

RATIONALE: Existing language is not specific that when a school closes, the transfer cannot take place until after the school closes. We have had questions the last few years regarding schools that are going to close (or are rumored to be closing) and parents wanting a free transfer prior to the school closing. This amendment clarifies that it cannot occur until the school closes.

Positives- Provides clarity to parents, students, and schools of schools that are closing, as well as the surrounding area schools who will be absorbing those students at the closure of the school.

Negatives- We will continue to get questions from families who want to transfer early and families who desire to transfer early to get a head start on academic and athletic participation at the new school.

3.) Amend Chapter I, Part III Section IV of the SDHSAA By-Laws as such:

SECTION 4. POST GRADUATE PARTICIPATION. Student eligibility terminates at graduation, with the exceptions listed below. Graduation means graduation from a traditional school setting, graduation from an alternative instruction setting, graduation from an online school setting, or completion of a GED program.

Exceptions:

1. Students who graduate at the end of the first semester/first or second trimester are eligible until the first day of classes of the second semester/second or third trimester.
2. High school graduates are permitted to participate in inter-school meets or tournaments sanctioned by the Association during the summer months immediately following a second semester/third trimester graduation date.

~~Notwithstanding Section 1 of this chapter, high school graduates may be permitted to participate in inter-school meets or tournaments sponsored by the Association during summer months immediately following such graduation, unless the Board of Directors rules otherwise in the case of any such tournament or meet.~~

Rationale: This clarifies that completion of a high school program, an online high school degree program, graduation from an alternative instruction high school degree program, or graduation/completion of a GED program constitutes graduation and terminates eligibility with the listed exceptions.

Positives- Provides clarity to schools, students, and parents on what constitutes graduation and what happens if you graduate early.

Negatives- Still quite a bit of grey area on what constitutes “graduation” from some listed programs, and manipulation could occur. With the increased use of alternative instruction, homeschool collectives, microschools, and self-guided online degree programs we will likely have to continue to work through these scenarios to address them as they come.

THIS AGREEMENT made the 11th day of May 2026, between Bergman Construction, PO Box 665, Sturgis, SD 57785("Contractor"), and Meade School District 46-1 of Sturgis, SD 57785 ("Owner," which refers both to the singular and plural).

WITNESSETH, in consideration of the mutual covenants hereinafter set forth, Owner and Contractor agree as follows:

1. Services to Be Performed. Contractor shall furnish the trucks and drivers necessary to haul all the material removed from the Woodle Field Project, (estimated at 3,500 cubic yards) to a property owned by the contractor. Mammoth Sports Construction, LLC will provide the equipment necessary to load the contractor's trucks.

2. Contract Price.

a. Contract Price. \$1.00

b. Change Agreements. In addition, the contract price shall be increased according to any additions or changes, made in accordance with mutually agreed upon written Change Agreements. To be valid, all Change Agreements must be signed by the Owner and Contractor, describe the nature of additions, deletions, or modifications to the services to be performed, and describe Corresponding adjustments in the Contract price and time for completion. No verbal Change Agreement shall be permitted. Any adjustment in the Contract price will be determined by mutual agreement and the prior approval of the Owner and Contractor before starting the work involved in the change.

c. Terms of Payment. Owner shall be paid as follows: Payment upon completion of the agreement. The making of progress payments, if any, by Owner to Contractor, subcontractors, or material suppliers, does not constitute or imply acceptance of any portion of the Work until final payment is made.

3. Time of Completion.

a. Time of Completion. The services to be performed under this Agreement shall commence on or around the 18th day of May 2026 and be substantially completed when Mammoth Sports Construction, LLC has determined that excavation of the site is complete.

b. Extension of Time of Completion. The completion date may be extended by the mutual written agreement of the parties, including change orders.

4. Permits and Approvals. Contractor shall be responsible for determining which state and local permits are necessary for performing the specified work and for obtaining and paying for the permits.

5. Warranty. Contractor warrants that all work shall be completed in a good workmanlike manner and in compliance with all building codes and other applicable laws.

6. Site Maintenance. Contractor agrees to be bound by the following conditions when performing the work under this Agreement:

7. Subcontractors. Contractor may, at its discretion, engage subcontractors to perform services under this Agreement. Contractor shall, however, remain solely responsible for proper completion of this Agreement.

8. Independent Contractor Status. Owner and Contractor are not partners, joint-venturers or involved in any employment relationship whatsoever, and nothing in this Contract shall be deemed to create or imply any such relationship. Contractor is not Owner's employee, nor are Contractor's employees or subcontractors. Contractor and Owner agree to the following rights, consistent with an independent contractor relationship:

- a. Contractor has the right to perform services for others during the term of this Agreement.
- b. Contractor has the sole right to control and direct the means, manner, and method by which the services required by this Agreement will be performed.
- c. The Contractor or Contractor's employees or subcontractors shall perform the services required by this Agreement; Owner shall not hire, supervise, or pay any assistants to assist Contractor or otherwise attempt to complete the services to be performed.
- d. Owner shall not require Contractor or Contractor's employees or subcontractors to devote full time to performing the services required by this Agreement.
- e. Neither Contractor nor Contractor's employees or subcontractors are eligible to participate in any employee pension, health, vacation pay, sick pay, or other fringe benefit plan of Owner.

9. Taxes. Contractor shall be responsible for all excise taxes incurred by Contractor while Contractor performs services under this Agreement, and for any interest or penalties incurred due to late payment or nonpayment of any excise taxes. Contractor shall be responsible for all other taxes incurred by contractor.

10. Insurance.

a. Contractor's Insurance. The Contractor agrees to keep in force at Contractor's expense such liability insurance during this Contract term as will protect Contractor from claims, under worker's compensation and other employee benefit laws, for bodily injury and death, and for property damage, that may arise out of the work, in a commercially reasonable amount determined by the Contractor in light of the Contract price and Contractor's obligations under this Contract and the related Warranty. Contractor agrees to provide proof of insurance to Owner upon request.

b. Owner's Insurance. The Owner agrees to keep at Owner's expense during this Contract term premises liability insurance coverage and property damage insurance on the Work at the site to its full insurable value, including the interests of Owner, Contractor, and subcontractors, against fire, vandalism, and other perils ordinarily included in extended coverage. Losses under such insurance will be adjusted with and made payable to the Contractor and Owner as their interests appear, subject to the requirements of a mortgagee's loss payable clause. Owner agrees to provide proof of premises liability and property damage insurance coverage to Contractor upon request.

11. Terminating the Agreement. Either Owner or Contractor may terminate this Agreement at any time by giving 14 days written notice of termination. Contractor shall be entitled to full payment for services performed prior to and including the date of termination.

12. Default. Time is of the essence of this Contract. In the event a breach is claimed by any party in the terms of the Contract Documents, except as waived by final payment, the aggrieved party will notify the other of such claimed breach and the party alleged to have breached this Contract will have 10 days from receipt of notice to correct the breach. All notices of breach will be by certified mail and will be deemed received on the earlier of actual receipt or three days after the date of mailing. If the alleged breach is not corrected within 10 days, then the non-defaulting party shall have all rights at law or equity. The laws of the State of South Dakota shall govern this contract.

13. Notices. All notices and other communications in connection with this Agreement shall be in writing and shall be considered given as follows:

- a. When delivered personally to the recipient's address as stated on this Agreement;
- b. Three days after being deposited in the United States mail, with postage prepaid to the recipient's address as stated on this Agreement; or
- c. When sent by fax or electronic mail, such notice is effective upon receipt provided that a duplicate copy of the notice is promptly given by first class mail, or the recipient delivers a written confirmation of receipt.

14. Liens or Encumbrances. Contractor agrees Contractor will not permit the filing of any claims, liens, or encumbrances on the real property described herein at any time during the term of this Agreement. If any mechanic's or other liens or encumbrances are filed during the term of this agreement, Contractor agrees the same shall be removed

within 30 days after Contractor has knowledge of said lien; provided, however, that Contractor shall not be required to so remove any lien which is filed as a result of a bona fide dispute, unless said disputed lien can be bonded. In that event, Contractor agrees to provide a bond and secure the removal of said lien pending resolution of the dispute. In the event a lien cannot be bonded, Contractor agrees to use due diligence in removing such lien from the property by appropriate legal action or otherwise. The parties agree that the violation of the provisions of this paragraph shall constitute a default hereunder.

15. Written Memorandum. This Agreement constitutes a memorandum of the final meeting of the minds between the parties hereto of all prior negotiations had by the parties in reference to all matters covered herein; and, this agreement is to be binding upon the respective heirs, executors, administrators and assigns of the parties hereto. No modification or amendment of this Agreement shall be valid unless in writing and signed by all parties hereto.

16. Indemnification. Contractor shall perform its services hereunder in a reasonable manner and take reasonable precautions not to damage District real property or improvements or the property of District employee's and students.

Contractor shall indemnify and hold District harmless against all liability or loss, and against all claims or actions based upon or arising out of (i) damage or injury, including death, to persons or property caused or sustained in connection with the performance of this Agreement or conditions created thereby, or based upon the violation of any law, rule or regulation, including the defense of any such claim or action; and (ii) from and against all costs, attorney's fees, and expenses and liabilities incurred in the defense of any such claim, action, or proceeding brought against District by reason of such claim. Such indemnification obligation shall survive the termination of this Agreement for any reason.

17. Acknowledgments.

a. By signing this Contract, any legal entity executing this Contract warrants and represents that: (a) such entity is in good standing with the State of South Dakota; (b) all necessary actions have been taken to make this Contract (including the Contract Documents) lawfully binding upon the entity; and , (c) the individual signing this Contract is duly authorized and directed by the entity to execute the same in the name of the entity.

b. Contractor acknowledges this Contract was prepared by Owner's attorney and that Owner's attorney is not representing the Owner. Contractor has been advised Contractor has the right to have this Contract and all related documents reviewed by Contractor's separate legal counsel if Contractor so elects.

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Serious breaches of standards of behavior may result in out of school suspensions or expulsions from school. A principal is authorized to suspend pupils for not more than ten school days and a Superintendent is authorized to suspend pupils for not more than 90 days. The period of expulsion may extend beyond the semester in which the violation, insubordination, or misconduct occurred. Any expulsion for consumption or possession of beer or alcoholic beverages may not extend beyond ninety school days.

Any student having a firearm, or air gun, whether the firearm or air gun is designed, adapted, used, or intended primarily for imitative or noisemaking purposes, or any dangerous weapon at school, except as authorized by law, shall be disciplined accordingly and referred to law enforcement authorities as necessary. This policy shall be implemented in a manner consistent with IDEA and Section 504.

A suspension may be imposed but is not limited to when a student's behavior creates a threat to his own or other's safety or imposes a threat to property or premises or creates a serious disruption of the school environment. Behavior such as fighting or committing an assault on another; stealing; vandalism; possessing weapons, explosives or other prohibited materials; making a false alarm or terroristic threat; lewd or threatening behavior or language; possession of drugs; or possession of beer or alcoholic beverages on the school premises or at school activities may result in suspensions.

Hearing procedures as established by state regulations will be followed by all students who receive long-term suspensions or expulsion.

- In case of a suspension by the Superintendent for more than ten school days, the Superintendent will schedule a hearing before the Board of Education, and the hearing shall be scheduled within ten (10) school days of the first day of the student's suspension.
- Additional procedures mandated by state and federal law apply to special education students.

NOTE: Statute states that no school board may impose a lesser consequence than those established in SDCL 13-32-9 but may by board policy adopt more strict consequences for adjudication, conviction, informal adjustment or court-approved diversion program, or a suspended imposition of sentence or suspended adjudication of delinquency, for possession, use, or distribution of controlled drugs or substances or marijuana. Statute also says the suspension "may" be reduced and the student "may" be allowed to practice during the period of suspension. To avoid discriminatory application, it is ASBSD's recommendation that the Board decide, for policy purposes, if the suspension period is to be reduced upon the student meeting the requirements, and if reduced to what extent, and whether the student may participate in practice during a period of suspension.

Suspension from Extra-Curricular Activities:

If a student is adjudicated, convicted, the subject of an informal adjustment or court-approved diversion program, or the subject of a suspended imposition of sentence or suspended adjudication of delinquency, for possession, use, or distribution of controlled drugs or substances or marijuana, or for ingesting, inhaling, or otherwise taking into the body any substance as prohibited by statute, the student shall be suspended as follows:

First offense: The student shall be suspended one year which shall be reduced to thirty calendar days if the student participates in an assessment with a certified licensed addiction counselor. If a suspension for a first offense is reduced to 30 calendar days, the student is ineligible for a minimum of two SDHSAA sanctioned events. If two sanctioned events for which the student is ineligible do not take place within the reduced suspension period, the student's suspension remains in effect until two sanctioned events for which the student is ineligible have taken place. Students who are ineligible to participate in activity events, competitions, and performances shall be allowed to participate in practices.

Second offense: The student shall be suspended for one year. The one-year suspension for a second offense shall be reduced to 60 calendar days if the student completes an accredited intensive prevention or treatment program. If the suspension for a second offense is reduced, the student is ineligible for a minimum of six SDHSAA sanctioned events. If a suspension is reduced pursuant to § 13-32-9, a suspension for a second offense shall make the student ineligible for a minimum of six SDHSAA sanctioned events. If six sanctioned events for which the student is ineligible do not take place within the reduced suspension period, the student's suspension remains in effect until six sanctioned events for which the student is ineligible have taken place. Students who are ineligible to participate in activity events, competitions, and performances shall be allowed to participate in practices.

A suspension begins on:

1. The day following the notification to a school administrator by the Unified Judicial System that a student has been adjudicated, convicted, the subject of an informal adjustment or court approved diversion program, or the subject of a suspended imposition of a sentence or a suspended adjudication of delinquency for possession, use, or distribution of controlled drugs, substances, or marijuana as defined in chapter 22-42, or for ingesting, inhaling, or otherwise taking into the body any substance prohibited by § 22-42-15 and the school administrator gives notice to the SDHSAA and the students; or
2. The day following the student's admission to a school administrator that the student committed an offense enumerated in subdivision (1), which shall be made with the student's parent or guardian present if the student is an unemancipated minor, and the school administrator gives notice to the SDHSAA.

A suspension that is reduced pursuant to this policy is only in effect during the SDHSAA'S activity year, which begins on the first day of its first sanctioned event and concludes on the last day of its last sanctioned event. A reduced suspension that is not completed by the end of one activity year shall carry over to the next activity year.

For events to count toward the minimum number of events for which the student is ineligible following a reduction in the suspension for a first or second offense, the student must participate in the entire activity season. Failure of a student to complete the entire activity season results in the student being ineligible for one year from the date of adjudication, conviction, the subject of an informal adjustment or court approved diversion program, or subject of a suspended imposition of sentence or suspended adjudication of delinquency. A suspension that is not completed by the student during one activity season carries over to the next activity season in which the student participates.

Third offense: Upon a third or subsequent adjudication, conviction, diversion, or suspended imposition of sentence for possession, use, or distribution of controlled drugs or substances or marijuana, or for ingesting, inhaling, or otherwise taking into the body any substances as prohibited by statute, by a court of competent jurisdiction, the student is ineligible to participate in any extracurricular activity.

You are hereby notified that the Meade School Board has determined that _____ should be suspended for _____ days.

You are further notified that this action is being referred to the Meade School District's ~~Placement Committee~~ IEP team, which shall immediately make a determination of whether the conduct causing the suspension arises from the student's disability or handicapping condition. If it is found to arise from the student's condition, a new individualized education program (IEP) will be ~~established~~ established, and the suspension shall thereafter cease.

If the action for which the discipline is imposed ~~did~~ does not arise from the student's handicapping condition or disability, the student will continue to receive special education and related ~~services,~~ but services but will be suspended from all other aspects of the school. The District may apply to circuit court to exclude the student from school if there is a substantial likelihood that maintaining the current placement is likely to result in injury to the pupil or others.

Finally, you are notified that you have available to you the due process rights of the state and federal special education laws.

Student Suspension and Expulsion – Students with Disabilities

1. General Due Process

The suspension or expulsion of a student with a disability who is served under an Individualized Education Program (IEP) shall include the same general due process procedures afforded to all students. Additional consideration and procedural safeguards shall apply as required under the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA).

2. Change in Placement

Any suspension that exceeds ten (10) consecutive school days, or a series of removals that constitute a pattern totaling more than ten (10) cumulative school days in a school year, constitutes a change in placement and triggers additional procedural protections, including prior written notice and the right to due process.

3. Manifestation Determination

Prior to imposing a long-term suspension or expulsion, the District shall conduct a manifestation determination to determine whether the conduct in question was caused by, or had a direct and substantial relationship to, the student's disability. If the conduct is determined to be a manifestation of the student's disability, the IEP Team shall revise the student's IEP, including behavioral interventions as appropriate and the long-term suspension shall terminate upon implementation of the revised IEP.

4. Conduct Not A Manifestation

If the team determines that the student's conduct was not caused by the student's disability, the student may be disciplined in the same manner and for the same duration as similarly situated students without disabilities.

5. Educational Services During Removal

For any removal beyond ten (10) school days, the District shall ensure the continued provision of educational services sufficient to enable the student to continue to participate in the general education curriculum and to progress toward meeting the goals set out in the student's IEP.

6. Parental Rights and Due Process

If the parent of a student with a disability or the District disagrees with any decision regarding placement or with the manifestation determination, the decision may be appealed by requesting a hearing by filing a due process complaint with the SD Department of Education.

7. Stay-Put Provision

During the pendency of any due process proceeding, the student shall remain in the current educational placement unless the parent and District agree otherwise or the student is placed in an interim alternative educational setting as permitted under IDEA.

Student Suspension and Expulsion – Students Protected Under Section 504

1. Due Process and Change in Placement

The suspension or expulsion of a student protected under Section 504 shall include the same general due process procedures afforded to all students. Any disciplinary removal that exceeds ten (10) consecutive school days, or a series of removals that constitute a pattern totaling more than ten (10) cumulative school days within a school year, constitutes a change in placement and triggers additional procedural safeguards under Section 504.

2. 504 Team Review and Notice

Prior to any disciplinary removal beyond ten (10) cumulative school days, the District shall provide written notice of a meeting and convene the 504 Team to review the student's current plan to determine whether the plan remains appropriate.

3. Manifestation Determination Process

If the Section 504 Team determines that the student's current Section 504 Plan is appropriate, the Team shall conduct a manifestation determination to determine whether the conduct in question was caused by, or had a direct and substantial relationship to, the student's substantially limiting health condition. In making this determination, the Section 504 Team shall review relevant and reliable information from competent professionals that is sufficiently recent to allow for an accurate understanding of the student's current educational needs.

4. Conduct Determined to Be a Manifestation

If the 504 Team determines that the student's conduct was caused by the student's substantially limiting health condition, the Team shall review the appropriateness of the student's current placement and accommodations. If the placement is determined to be inappropriate, the Team shall revise the 504 Plan and offer an appropriate placement or accommodation option. Disciplinary removal beyond ten (10) school days shall not proceed.

5. Conduct Not a Manifestation

If the 504 Team determines that the student's conduct was not caused by the student's substantially limiting health condition, the student may be disciplined in the same manner and for the same duration as similarly situated students without disabilities.

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The possession and use of illicit drugs and the unlawful possession and use of alcohol is wrong and harmful, and illegal except when used as directed (prescription drugs) by a physician. Students are prohibited from using, selling, attempting to sell, possessing, distributing, delivering, transferring, concealing, or being under the influence of alcohol and/or other drugs or materials/substances represented to be a narcotic drug, depressant, or controlled substance (including tobacco, nicotine, and alcohol), or chemical substances which affect psychological functions or affect the educational system of the school. ~~For the purpose of this policy: Tobacco means any substance or item, in any form, including e-cigarettes/vapor, containing tobacco and/or nicotine.~~ Students shall not engage in alcohol and/or drug use/abuse nor possess paraphernalia specific to the use of alcohol and/or other drugs.

Students who use prescription drugs or medical cannabis authorized by a licensed physician do not violate this policy if the students conform to the prescription and appropriate school policies.

This policy is in effect on premises owned, leased, or maintained by the school district, at all school-related activities on and off campus, on vehicles used to transport students to and from school or to other activities, and in vehicles parked on school property. Student and parent members of the school community are expected to know and understand the policy provisions and their mandatory nature. A copy of the policy is available on request and available online in the School Board Policy Handbook. Compliance with this policy is mandatory for all students.

In accordance with Federal Drug Free Schools and Campuses legislation (Section 5145 of the Drug-Free Schools and Communities Act), the Board authorizes the use of programs aimed at facilitating awareness, prevention, and intervention regarding the use/misuse of alcohol and other drugs.

1. The primary responsibility for helping students seriously involved with alcohol and other drugs lies with the students and their parents. The District will recommend that students with alcohol and other drug abuse problems seek professional assessment from a trained chemical dependency counselor or a licensed physician trained in chemical dependency.
2. The Board authorizes District efforts to provide a supportive school environment for students harmed by alcohol and other drugs.
3. School chemical abuse prevention programs could provide:
 - a) group experiences
 - b) individual counseling
 - c) such other services as are judged to be necessary by school personnel and other involved agencies
 - d) programs for persons who desire more information

e) programs for those who need help with intervention in an existing problem (their own or someone else's)

f) programs for those who need help completing the goals of a rehabilitation program.

Students who violate this prohibition will be subject to disciplinary sanctions as provided in the discipline plans of the administrative units, up to and including suspension and/or expulsion. Students who violate this prohibition also will be referred to appropriate legal authorities for prosecution.

Students had the opportunity to get up close to a Black Hills Life Flight helicopter and even experience being "cuffed and stuffed" with the Meade County Sheriff's Office!

The remainder of the day focused on the importance of conservation and responsible land management. Students learned how protecting soil, water, and wildlife habitats keeps our land productive for future generations. A water station gave kids a hands-on look at water quality and why maintaining proper pH levels is important for ecosystems, livestock, and agriculture. They also explored the role of forest management, including how thinning forests can reduce wildfire risk and help keep ecosystems healthy.

Hands-on learning continued with West River Electric, where foremen talked with students about the dangers and responsibilities of working on high-line wires. Kids even got the chance to stand in a bucket truck, learning firsthand about the safety measures linemen take every day to keep communities powered.

Atall Spring Program: This Thursday, May 7 at 5:30 PM, Atall School will hold a kindergarten graduation ceremony, while also honoring our 8th grade graduates (who have a separate all-rural school ceremony), and celebrating the end of the year with a short program!
