**V. Reports- Elementary** updated the Board on Kindergarten registration for the 22-23 school year. Read Across America was celebrated at all schools. **Middle School** has student lead conferences in February. On February 24<sup>th</sup> 150 students received Learn, Grow, Lead awards. **High School** reported registration meetings here held this month. Congratulations to the Dance Team, Cheer Team and the Wrestling team for their outstanding finishes in state competitions. **Student Services** provided information to the Board regarding enrollment numbers and ELL updates. **Curriculum and Assessment** reported grades 3-8 will take the NSCAS- Growth ELA and NSCAS- Growth Math tests starting March 21<sup>st</sup>. Grades 5-8 will take the NSCAS Science test. The English Language Arts Committee for grades 6-8 are continuing to finalize core curriculum materials. **Superintendent** advised the Board of 168<sup>th</sup> Street road work to be started shortly. The District's general fund cash flow continues to show positive results. Enrollment numbers for 22-23 were reviewed. **Construction-** The construction report was reviewed stating Stratford Elementary and Bennington South Middle School construction is progressing nicely and projected to finish on time. **Coordinator Report-** Rob Uchtman presented the Board with information regarding recent initiatives, construction projects, fiber WAN, upcoming projects, ECF funding and integration. **Lobbyist-** Julia Plucker was present to discuss bills of interest and legislative updates. **Spotlight Report-** Drs. Hoge and Thoedel presented the Board with information on the Cognia Accreditation review taking place April 3<sup>rd</sup>-7<sup>th</sup>. A five member team will conduct over 125 interviews with the Board, Superintendent, building level leadership, school leadership teams, instructional staff, 3<sup>rd</sup>-12<sup>th</sup> grade students and parents. **Strategic Planning-** Goal #2 was discussed focusing on personalized education.

Discuss Return to Learn Plan-** The document was presented to provide guidance to students, staff, parents and community members about the District's safety and educational protocols that will align with the four different levels of risk, or tiers. The District continues to communicate out any guidance it receives from local and state health departments through its Friday Notes.

**VII.A. Discussion and Approval of Bids for Replacement of High School HVAC Equipment (Chillers)-** The District received a bid from MMC to upgrade the HVAC equipment at the High

School this summer. MMC's timeline allows for the upgrade to be completed on or before August 1<sup>st</sup> of 2022. The District requested two other companies submit bids for this work.

**I. Call Meeting to Order-** Board President Mark Byars called the meeting to order at 5:32 P.M., noting the Open Meetings Act, a copy of which was located at the Board table, governed the meeting.

**II. Consider Option Enrollment Applications for the 2022-2023 School Year-** The deadline for option enrollment applications was March 15, 2022. The District has received 12 option enrollment applications to date.

**MOTION PASSED:** Motion to reject the Option Enrollment list for the 2022-23 school year as presented due to grade level and/or program capacity for 2022-2023 school year. **III. Discuss, Consider and Take Action to Approve a temporary construction easement with Douglas County, Nebraska, relating to certain improvements along 168th Street near Rachel Snowden Parkway-** Douglas County representatives and Mr. Aldridge have prepared a temporary easement document required by Douglas County and their contractor for road work and construction associated with 168th Street this summer.

**MOTION PASSED:** Motion that the Board of Education of this School District should, and does hereby, authorize, approve and ratify the temporary construction easement by and between Douglas County, Nebraska, and this School District relating to certain roadway improvements along 168th Street and that the Board hereby approves and adopts the attached Resolution. **IV. Discuss, Consider and Take All Necessary Action with regard to selecting the Construction Management at Risk method of construction delivery for a proposed new high school facility project under the Political Subdivisions Construction Alternatives Act -**

Legal counsel for the school district, Mr. Derek Aldridge, and Mr. Curtis Johnson, a representative from the school district's architectural firm, have educated and made recommendations to the Building and Finance Committee to design and construct a new high school under policies and practices related to the Construction Management at Risk method of construction delivery. This agenda item, and its subsequent motion, is to have

the board of education formally approve the Construction Management at Risk method of construction delivery as outlined in policy 902.06.

**MOTION PASSED:** Motion that the Board of Education for this School District should and does hereby select the Construction Management at Risk construction delivery method pursuant to the Nebraska Political Subdivisions Construction Alternatives Act and Board policy for a proposed new high school facility project, and hereby delegates to and directs the Superintendent of Schools, or designee, along with selected legal counsel, to initiate and carry out all actions necessary to comply with the requirements of the Act, including but not limited to the development and issuance of a Request for Proposals for the position of Construction Management at Risk for the project; provided that letters of interest shall not be required. **V. Discuss, Consider and Take All Necessary Action with regard to adopting the Construction Management at Risk selection criteria and the evaluation point values for a proposed new high school facility project-** If the motion in IV is approved, then the Board should move forward with the Request for Proposal process as outlined in policy 902.06. The Request for Proposals includes many components, one of which is the development and publication of an evaluation procedure. The evaluation procedure, including the criteria for evaluation of Proposals, the relative weight of each criterion, the interview process, the contract negotiation process and the contract execution process are all outlined in Policy 902.06.

### April 11, 2022

#### Assessment

- ❖ The NSCAS testing window opened March 21<sup>st</sup> and will continue through April 29<sup>th</sup>. Make-up tests may be completed through the first week in May. Students in grades 3-8 are taking the NSCAS-ELA and NSCAS-Math tests. Students in grades 5 and 8 are also taking the NSCAS-Science test. Science will have new proficiency levels set this summer to match the more challenging standards set in 2017.
- ❖ Students in grade 11 participated in the state ACT which is the state test for high school. Students took the ACT for English, Reading, Math, Science, and Writing on Tuesday, March 22<sup>nd</sup> in the morning. Students are receiving score reports to their personal myACT account, but the school and district will not receive scores until all schools across the state are complete and data is confirmed later this summer.
- ❖ Students in grades K-2 will complete spring MAP testing and benchmark assessments during the last week in April and through the first weeks in May. These assessments are important to provide data to accurately measure progress through the school year.

#### Curriculum

- ❖ The District Committee on Social Emotional Learning has made their final recommendation for grades K-12. Dr. Hoge and Dr. Thoendel are working with the publisher to determine final costs. Members of the Committee will work by grade level to develop guiding curriculum materials for the District.
- ❖ The 6-8 English Language Arts Committee has selected materials for use in English and Reading courses. Dr. Hoge and Dr. Thoendel are working with the publisher to determine final costs. Dr. Hoge will work with the team to complete additional reviews on all novels that will be used in a grade level.
- ❖ Summer School preparations are underway for elementary, middle, and high school students. The numbers of elementary students invited to summer school is increasing significantly from prior years. This increase in numbers is due to growth in enrollment and the link to IRIP numbers. The Nebraska Reading Improvement Act requires a summer program for students to be offered to students on an Individualized Reading Improvement Plan (IRIP). Due to these increasing numbers summer school will be provided at two elementary buildings, Pine Creek and Bennington Elementary.

- ❖ Summer school for high school students focuses on credit recovery. Two sessions will be offered June 6-24 and July 6-26. Credit recovery courses are offered through an online program, except for Algebra 1 which will be taught by one of our math teachers. Approximately 40 seats will be available for each session.

### **School Improvement**

- ❖ The District's AdvancED-Cognia Accreditation External Review took place April 3<sup>rd</sup> - 7<sup>th</sup>. The External Review Team included: Dr. Nancy Golson, Lead Evaluator, Alabama; Dr. Teresa Perkins, Assistant Lead Evaluator, Doane University, Nebraska; Ms. Amy Bybee, Asst. Superintendent CIA, Kansas; and Mr. John Schultz, Former Principal and Teacher, Omaha. The areas of Commendation were a Collaborative Culture that Prioritizes Student Growth and Excellence and Effective Stakeholder Involvement. Areas for Improvement included: Implement documented, formalized, transparent systematic frameworks for monitoring and evaluation of systemic processes and Utilize longitudinal data to drive improvement process. The final report will be received early in the Summer and we can plan to review it at the June Board-Administrator Workshop.

### **Staff Development**

- ❖ The Professional Learning Committee and the Technology Committee make recommendations and work with the Tech and CIA Departments to provide summer professional learning opportunities. Teachers may participate in self-paced certification programs for Google, Hapara, Clever, and other district software. Teachers may also register for learning opportunities during the District "Bootcamp Week" which will be August 1-5. Both half day and full day courses are offered on curriculum topics, special technology tools, and a variety of other topics presented by teachers, math & reading specialists, Ms. McKenzie White, Technology Integrationist, Mr. Uchtman, Technology Coordinator, Dr. Hoge, and Dr. Thoendel.

## Superintendent Notes – April 2022

1. The Youth Soccer Club hosted a tournament over two weeks ago. It was estimated that the tournament brought approximately 105 teams and their fans to our community from Friday evening through Sunday. You would have noticed this if you had occasion to drive on Bennington Road from 168<sup>th</sup> to 156<sup>th</sup> Street a few weeks ago. You would have seen hundreds of youth and their families playing on high school, middle school and Bennington Elementary fields from dawn until dusk. This past weekend, we had several softball and baseball teams visiting our field as well. This was a good example of the community's usage of school facilities for a multitude of things.
2. 22/23 personnel update for interviews, hires, and transfers: We have eleven (11) certificated staff and no District Office support staff openings for the 22/23 school year at this time. Current openings are listed in TalentEd at this time. We have hired 59 new certificated staff for the 22/23 school year and approved 11 transfers to new positions for next year. The breakdown is; 26 elementary, 16 middle school, 10 high school, 7 district positions and 11 reassignments/transfers. We have interviewed, or have scheduled interviews for an elementary teacher, elementary counselor and a possible interview with a HS Science teacher. The Board will have approved 42 new certificated positions and they will have approved 28 resignations for various reasons after tonight's meeting. We will onboard 70 new certificated employees if we fill the eleven (11) open positions before next year and assuming we have no additional resignations!
3. Bennington Public Schools will receive an estimated \$74,000 from the federal government. The federal Coronavirus Aid, Relief and Economic Security Act provided \$60.8 million to Nebraska school districts to cover expenses related to the pandemic. The CARES Act II is estimated to provide Bennington Public Schools an additional \$277,000 and Act III funds are estimated to be \$623,000. The funds can be used for anything from meal planning to the purchase of devices for distance learning to teacher training, and most notably, to help close the student achievement gap caused by a loss of instructional time due to the pandemic. The amount of money districts will receive is tied to the amount of federal Title I money they normally receive. The Administration will provide the Board a plan for the use of these funds in the near future.
4. The District has calculated preliminary 2022-23 revenue figures from various sources this past month. At this point, with preliminary state aid and property tax figures, it looks as though Bennington will receive approximately \$5.7 million more in revenue than the previous year. Gains in revenue were seen across the board. As stated in the previous month, the Douglas County Assessor is projecting an increase of over \$251 million in assessed property valuation for a 13.9% increase over last year. It remains to be seen if this number will hold after property value protest hearings this summer. We also received preliminary state aid calculations that have factored in state aid cuts that are being discussed by state senators. Projections have the district gaining approximately \$2.64 million in state aid over the previous year. I did factor in a larger increase in delinquent taxes based on the current economic factors and reduced some one-time funding line items in the general fund budget to arrive at an estimated increase in funding for next year at \$5,701,000. These figures have been shared with the Curriculum Committee as they deliberate curriculum and personnel proposals for the 2022-23 school year. With a five-year history of 12.31% student growth, it continues to be important to maintain some flexibility in current budgets with an eye to the future. In short, last year's state budget was \$42,497,000. An addition of \$5.7 million to the general fund would result in an increase of 13.41%. The Midwest Consumer Price Index (CPI or Inflation) for the past year is reportedly averaging 8.0%. We may be behind in budgeting considering our five-year average increase in student population and normal inflation (Growth/9.98% + Inflation/8.0% - Revenue Growth/13.41% = -4.57%).
5. Bennington's School Wellness Policy 508.13 (508.13R1) provides a framework for health awareness and promotes a healthy environment for our students. The school wellness policy is a federal requirement that has been in effect since 2006. As part of the requirements, the district is to assemble a committee of parents, students, nutrition services staff, board members, administrators, physical education teachers and community members. This committee is required to meet on an annual basis. The school wellness committee will focus on improving health and wellness outcomes for our students by promoting student wellness in all of our school buildings. In addition, the committee is to review and recommend changes to the school wellness policy to the school board. The School Wellness Committee will meet on May 6th, 2022 from 7:30 am - 8:30 am in the district office.
6. I would like the Board to consider changing the regular board meeting in June to a Board/Administrator workshop. We could start earlier and have a working dinner. We should discuss several things that would affect the future of the district. These could include things like planning for the opening of two school buildings, policy modification, district growth, strategic planning and several curricular issues.

**Curriculum & Americanism Committee Notes**  
**March 30, 2022**  
**1940 Conference Room**

The Curriculum & Americanism Committee of the Bennington Board of Education met on March 30, 2022, at 5:00 PM in the 1940 Conference Room. Board members present were Kara Neuerth and Valerie Calderon. Administrators in attendance were Dr. Haack, Dr. Hoge, and Dr. Thoendel. The Curriculum Committee (the Committee) met for the third time this school term to review curriculum and personnel proposals for the 2022-2023 school year.

Dr. Haack opened the meeting with a review of budget available for proposals. Budget numbers are a very close estimate since the District has received confirmation of most numbers. Estimates of Douglas County property taxes were received with a growth of 13.43% for an increase of \$2,618,321. State aid was certified on February 23<sup>rd</sup> and there is an increase of \$2,642,741. Also included in this preliminary budget is the five-year average for OAR funds, for a total estimated revenue increase of \$5,701,945. Part of the annual budget increase must include the negotiated agreement and other salary increases at approximately \$1,515,000, plus the estimated increase in operating costs to open two new schools at \$450,000, and additional salary costs in Salary Scale Movement at \$109,000, for a total of \$2,297,000. Dr. Haack pointed out an additional amount of approximately \$1,675,000 would be available through non-reoccurring items from the 2021-2022 budget. The Board of Education approved \$2,337,207 in the first round of proposals at the December Board meeting and \$1,549,835 in the second round of proposals at the January Board meeting. This would leave about \$1,137,863 available in the budget, but it is not recommended to spend all of this on proposals at this time.

Dr. Haack shared some information about the hiring process and continuing contract deadlines that impact the pool of available certificated staff to hire. He then shared a modification to the Elementary Spanish program in that classified staff assigned to this program would now have benefits and an increased number of days assigned. Next, Dr. Hoge shared the color-coded complete list of proposals. She explained which had been approved and those which had been modified during the process before approval.

The Committee began its review of outlined proposals with Dr. Haack pointing out that the list of proposals exceeded the available budget estimate, so not all proposals could be approved at this time.

The Committee discussed the list of proposals from the high school which included an extensive list of extra duty positions primarily due to growth in the student enrollment. A Key Club sponsor (Proposal #93) is recommended to be added to the Extra Duty schedule as this club has met the requirements for the establishment of a new club. Additional positions for coaches were discussed for Football (Proposal #73), Boys' Basketball (Proposal #81), Track (Proposal #76), Softball (Proposal #82), and Unified Track (Proposal #84) due to the growth in participation and the number of teams sponsored. Proposal #83 would add another sponsor to assist with the high school Student Senate and all of the activities this student organization is responsible for. Proposal #75 would expand the Academic Coach positions at the high school to serve more students as this is a key intervention provided for struggling high school students. This would add two days each week to the support currently provided. Proposal #74 would give the high school three Activity Aide positions, one for each season, to assist with the set up and supervision at these activities. The Committee noted that this is an opportunity for leadership positions within the District. A Streaming Coordinator (Proposal #85) would allow a staff member to train and supervise students working on the video streaming at activities. The Committee will recommend approval of these high school proposals.

The Committee reviewed Proposal #30 for 1.0 FTE additional Exploratory Middle School Teacher. This teaching position will be for a Speech and Drama Teacher at Bennington South MS to be able to keep the exploratory courses identical. Proposal #18 is for additional Instrumental Music Teachers. A full-time high school instrumental music teacher has been hired and the administration is proposing to add one full-time middle school instrumental teacher. This relieves the stress for the high school instrumental teacher to run the middle school and high school programs. The proposed instrumental teacher would serve both middle schools, one in the morning and one in the afternoon. A part-time accompanist (Proposal #37) will be needed to assist with vocal music at Bennington South MS. The next proposal is to hire two Library Paraprofessionals (Proposal 33), one for each of the Middle Schools. This proposal was to hire a Library Media Specialist for Bennington South MS, but the administration is recommending to operate each library with a paraprofessional and have the current Library-Media Specialist move between the two buildings. This structure would meet the requirements of Rule 10 to keep the school library open all day.

The Committee reviewed the request for one additional elementary teacher (Proposal #41) due to class-size. Dr. Hoge reminded the Committee that there will not be a perfect balance of student-teacher ratios across all grade levels and all buildings. There will be some larger sections and some smaller sections but the overall district average will continue to be

below 21 students per section. There was a proposal of an additional 0.5 FTE for Elementary Spanish (Proposal #54) and since we had approved an unfilled 0.5 FTE from the 2021-2022 school year for this position, the position for the 2022-2023 school year will be advertised as 1.0 FTE. The final elementary proposal was added due to an oversight for core staffing of health and library paraprofessionals for Stratford Elementary (Proposal #94). The Committee will recommend approval of these three proposals.

The Committee moved on to discuss District proposals for Student Services. Proposal #66 recommends the addition of 1.0 FTE for a High Ability Learning (HAL) Teacher. The District rate of identification for HAL students is higher than the state average. This is an area that pulls both ways for the administration and Committee because HAL students must be identified, but no specific services must be provided by statute. The Committee recognizes the community expectation and priority placed on these services and strongly supports the continuation of these services to students in the District. Proposal #69 requests additional Paraprofessional positions to support Special Education. The administration recommends the addition of 2.0 FTE positions at this time. The Committee discussed the challenge to hire personnel in these classified positions and recognizes that not all of the currently approved positions have been filled. All of these discussed proposals are due to student enrollment growth and increased needs of students. The Committee will recommend moving forward with these proposals.

The Committee discussed a District proposal for a 1.0 FTE Payroll Clerk (Proposal #58). This work is currently being completed by the Coordinator of Business with support from other District staff and building secretaries. We continue to learn from our auditors that as we grow, it becomes a priority to separate processes to protect the District. The Committee will recommend approval of this proposal.

### General Legislative Update

Today is the 57th day of the session (three days left) and it is the final day for a bill to move on Select File debate. They plan to debate as many Select file bills as possible and to stay until 11:59 pm tonight if they have to, to get it done. This morning and early afternoon, the legislature debated LB 773, the constitutional carry bill. The bill failed to advance on a cloture vote with only 31 votes. Hopefully the last filibuster of the session.

Tuesday and Wednesday will be final reading and resolution debate. Any bill that passes on final reading by Wednesday, April 13, is ensured the opportunity to attempt an override of a Governor veto. This timeline ensures that Governor Ricketts cannot pocket veto any legislation that passes. A pocket veto is an indirect veto of a legislative bill, where the Governor retains the bill, unsigned until it is too late for the Legislature to deal with it or override that veto.

### Education Bills

Today the legislature advanced LB 1218 from Select File to Final Reading. LB 1218 would provide \$1,000 in loan forgiveness to student teachers under the Attracting Excellence to Teaching Program. An individual would have to provide service for a full academic semester within a public or private school and meet certain requirements to qualify. The committee amendment on the bill also contained the provisions of LB945, introduced by Sen. Linehan. Under the proposal, the state Department of Education would provide qualifying teachers \$5,000 per year in loan repayment assistance for up to five years. To qualify for assistance, an individual must be a Nebraska resident teaching full time at a public or private school or performing dual-credit instructional duties for public or private school students while employed full time at a public or private nonprofit college or university in Nebraska.

LB 888, a bill intended to ensure that Nebraska students receive education on the Holocaust and other acts of genocide advanced to Final Reading on April 7 after lawmakers amended it to

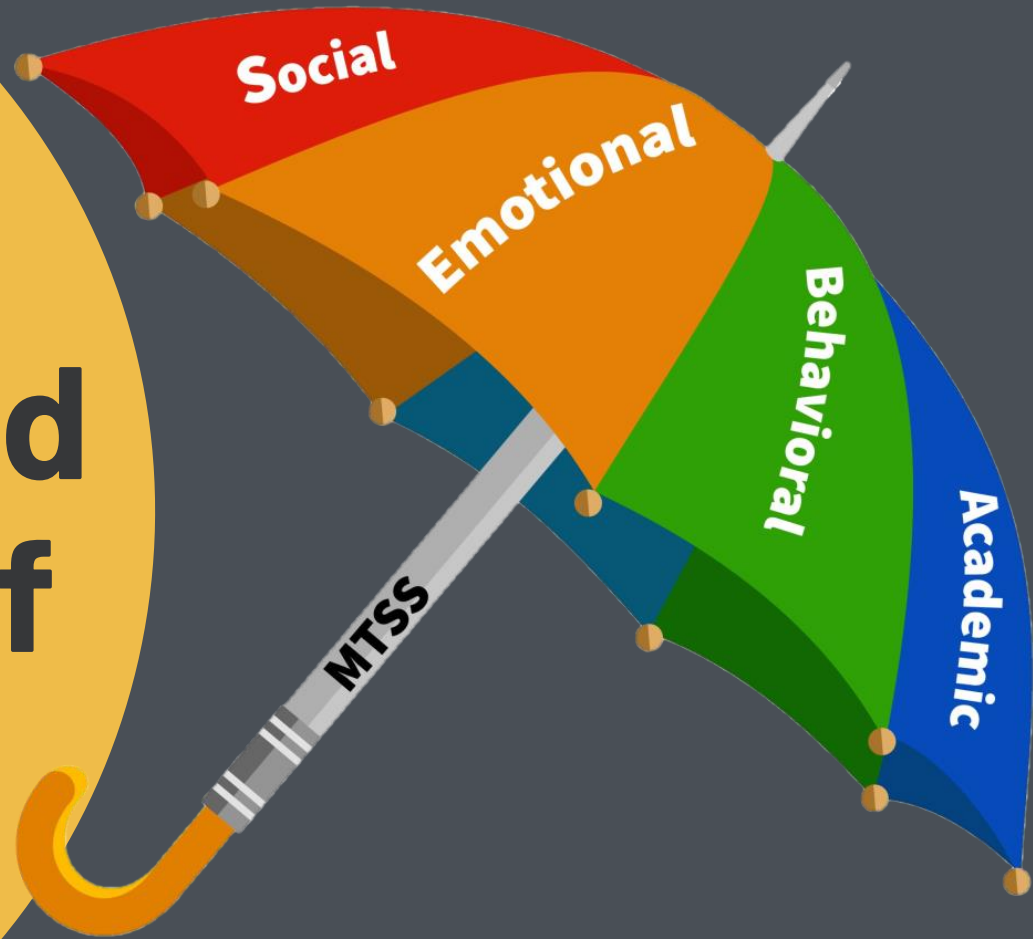
clarify which events those lessons would cover. Under an amendment introduced by Sen. Bostelman on select file, the board could adopt education standards related only to acts of genocide as recognized by the U.S. Congress or the United Nations as of Jan. 1, 2022, which includes acts of genocide in Armenia, Bosnia, Darfur and Rwanda as well as the genocide committed against the Yazidi by the Islamic State.

### Tax Bills

The legislature passed LB 873 last week. The bill cuts individual and corporate income tax rates, speeds up the phaseout of state taxation of Social Security income and expands a program intended to offset the amount of property taxes used to fund education. Nebraska's top individual income tax rate are reduced in several steps from the current 6.84 percent to 5.84 percent by tax year 2027. The bill also includes the phased-in reduction of the state's top corporate income tax rate approved by the Legislature last year. The bill will cut the rate from the current 7.5 percent to 5.84 percent by 2027. Also included is an exemption all Social Security income from state income taxation, to the extent that it is included in federal adjusted gross income, by tax year 2025.

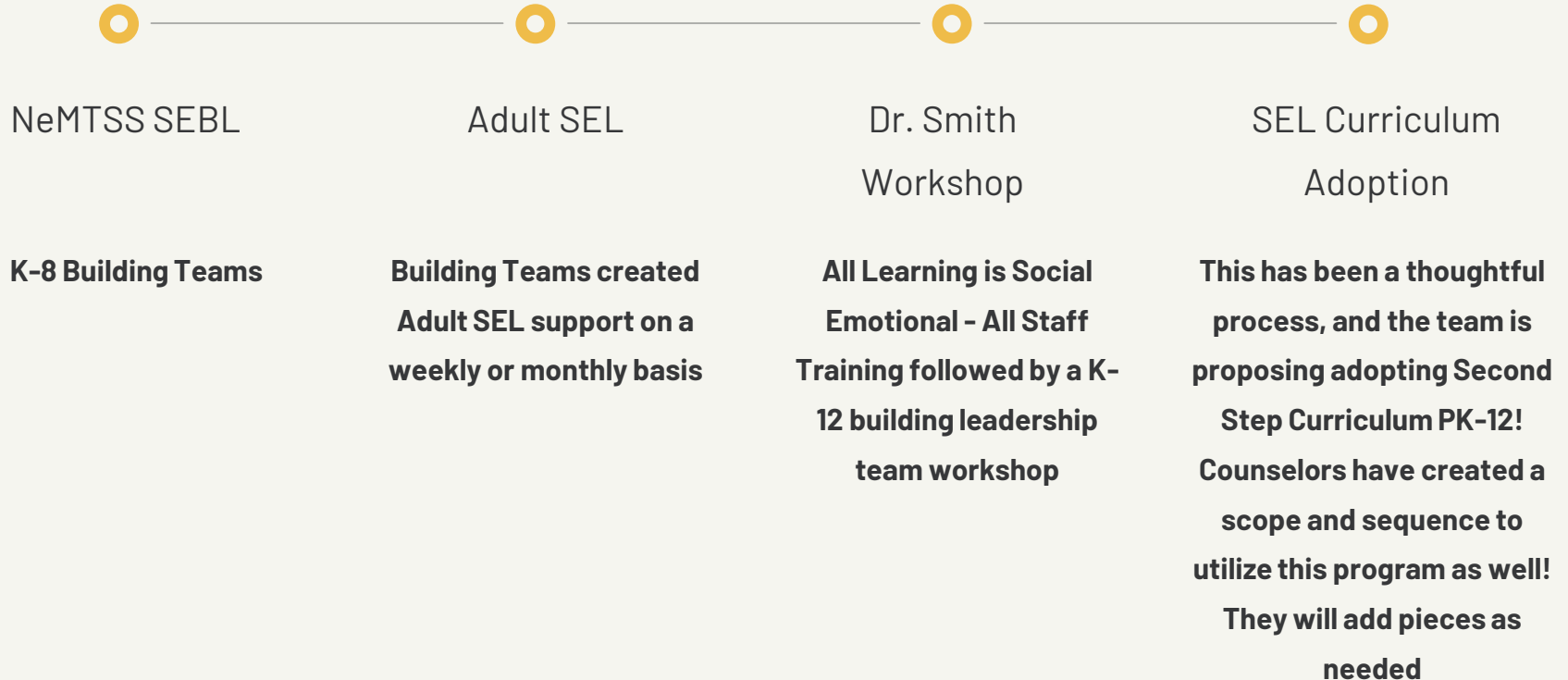

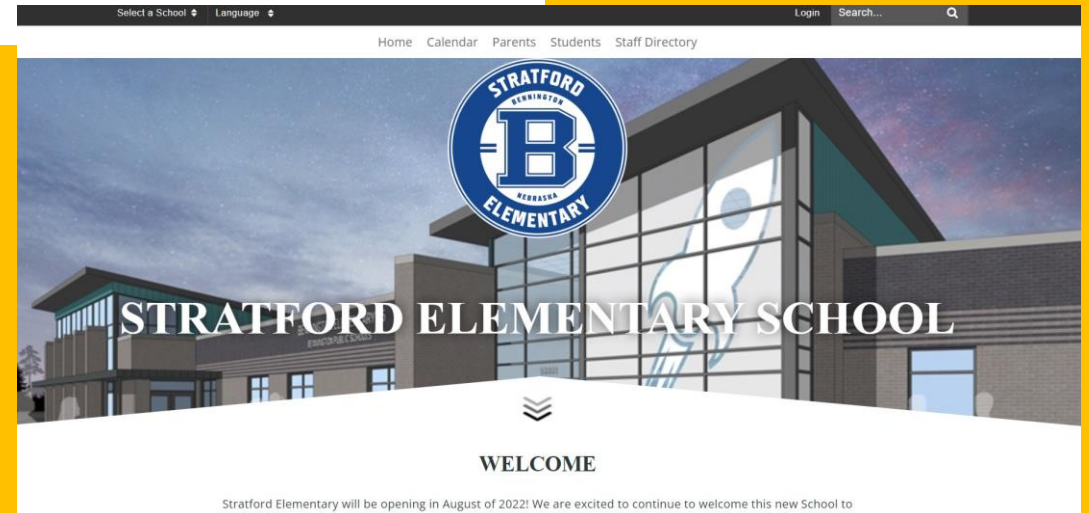

The number of young musicians within the Bennington School District continues to grow, which brings a higher demand for instruction through the summer months. Students are becoming more engaged in all aspects of the program and we want to build on their progress.

A stipend of \$4000 is being requested for compensation. The time and structure utilized in 2021 will be replicated. The successes of the previous years were due to the Board's support of new initiatives that I would like to continue into summer 2022.

Rehearsals in the summer for high school marching band members are devoted to the learning and memorization of the marching curriculum. This has proved successful and students were prepared early on so the focus could shift to visual instruction when school was back in-session. These rehearsals would be offered the three weeks preceding Band Camp.

The supplemental learning that occurs during Freshmen Band Camp has been crucial to the success of previous marching seasons and we wish to continue this trend. The Freshmen will report the two weekdays before the start of band camp to learn fundamentals of marching and procedures for marching band to better prepare them for the marching season.

The additional rehearsals with the full band following Freshmen Band Camp has proved essential to bridging the gap between incoming Freshmen and returning veterans and allowed the development of consistent learning outcomes within the ensemble.

Lastly, lessons with drum majors, as well as dedicated time developing the Leadership Team will be utilized throughout the summer months.

An investment in this summer program will kick-start the learning process that will elevate the success of both the marching band and concert band facets of the program. Thank you for your support of the Band Program in Bennington and for giving me the opportunity to lead these students!
