The team finished as Novice Champion & Varsity Runner-Up at Boone Central, Varsity Champion at Howells/Dodge, Varsity Champion at Lindsay and Varsity Runner-Up at Humphrey. The East Husker Conference South Division Meet will be at Clarkson on Saturday, February 25th and districts at Wayne State College on Wednesday, March 15th. The Junior High Boys basketball teams completed their seasons against Aquinas this afternoon/evening. The JV Girls & Boys Basketball teams have completed their seasons. The varsity girls won their sub-district tournament and will now play in the district final against Howells-Dodge on Friday, February 24th at CCC-Columbus starting at 7:00 pm. The Boys finished their regular season last Friday against Humphrey St. Francis. The 9th grade (C team) teams ended their seasons against Boone Central/Newman Grove on February 6th. Sub-district play for the boys will begin this Tuesday against Cross County at York HS. The Twin River wrestling team competed in districts at Aquinas on February 10th & 11th. Sergey Parry qualified for the state tournament for the second year in a row and he wrestled in Omaha beginning last Thursday. Other sessions that he has attended were concerned with High Plains School District's use of drone technology in their curriculum, a review of open meetings laws, Title IX and legal issues to watch as they develop. 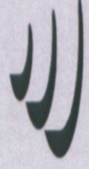

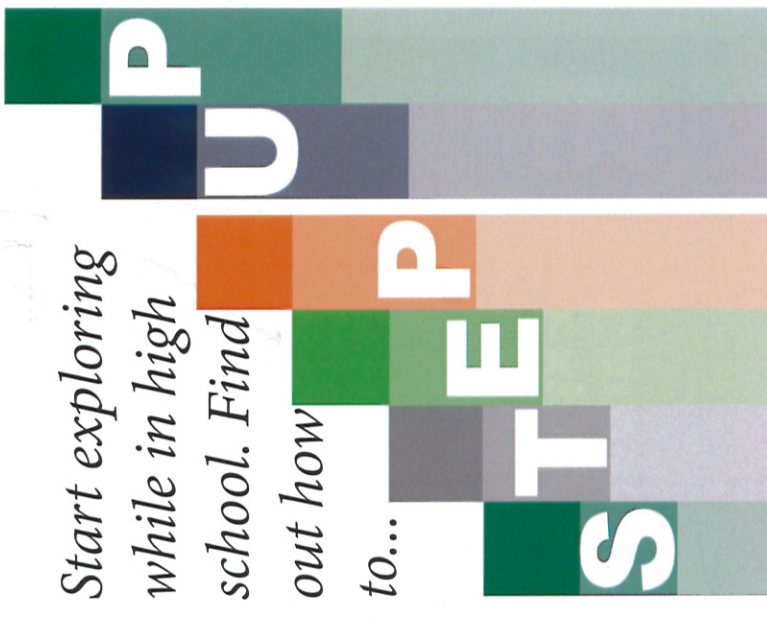

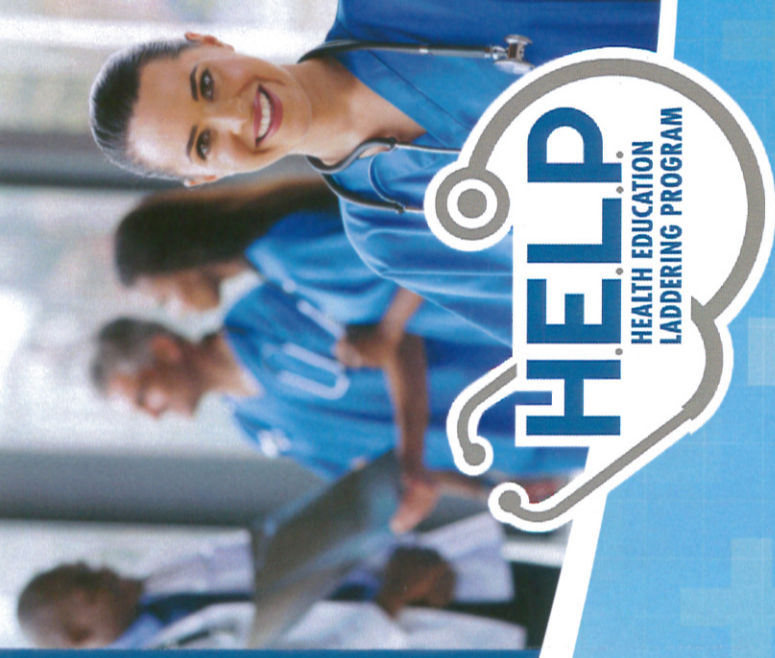

## AMENDMENTS TO LB 595

Introduced by

1. Strike the original sections and insert the following new sections:

Section 1. Section 79-254, Reissue Revised Statutes of Nebraska, is amended to read:

79-254 Sections 79-254 to 79-294 and sections 2 and 3 of this act shall be known and may be cited as the Student Discipline Act.

Sec. 2. (1) If a student becomes physically violent toward himself or herself, a teacher, an administrator, or another student, a teacher or administrator may use necessary physical force or physical restraint to subdue such student until such student no longer presents a danger to himself or herself, the teacher, the administrator, or the other student.

(2) If a student exhibits destructive behavior toward school property, a teacher or administrator may use physical restraint to subdue such student until such student ceases the destructive behavior or the student is removed from the classroom.

(3) Any action by a teacher or administrator pursuant to subsection (1) or (2) of this section shall not be considered corporal punishment pursuant to section 79-295.

(4) Any teacher or administrator defending himself or herself, another teacher or administrator, or a student pursuant to subsection (1) of this section, or protecting school property pursuant to subsection (2) of this section, shall not be subject to legal action or administrative discipline unless such teacher or administrator acted in a grossly negligent manner.

Sec. 3. (1) A teacher may remove a student from a class if the teacher:

(a) Has documented that such a student has repeatedly interfered with such teacher's ability to communicate effectively with the students in such class or with the ability of students in such class to learn;

(b) Determines such student's behavior is so unruly, disruptive, or abusive that it seriously interferes with such teacher's ability to communicate effectively with the students in the class or with the ability of the students in the class to learn; or

(c) Determines such student has committed other disruptive acts that merit discipline under the Student Discipline Act.

(2) If a teacher removes a student from a class pursuant to this section, the principal of the school may place such student into another appropriate classroom, into in-school suspension, or into an alternative education program. The principal may not return such student to a class taught by such teacher without the teacher's consent unless such return is required pursuant to the Special Education Act or the federal Individuals with Disabilities Act, 20 U.S.C. 1400 et seq. If the teacher does not consent to the student's return to the teacher's classroom, within three school days following the student's removal, a conference shall be held with the teacher and the parent or legal guardian of such student in the presence of the principal or the principal's designee for the purpose of determining the causes of the problem and developing a plan implementing possible student behavior improvement mechanisms. Following the conference, the principal may readmit such student to the teacher's class.

(3) A principal or other administrator shall not coerce a teacher to consent to the return of a student to a class from which such student was removed pursuant to this section.

(4) A teacher shall not be subject to legal action or administrative discipline for removing a student from a class pursuant to subsection (1) of this section unless such teacher acted in a grossly negligent manner.

Sec. 4. Original section 79-254, Reissue Revised Statutes of Nebraska, is repealed.

We are approaching the halfway point in the 2017 Session. Monday, March 13th, represents the 45th business day, which signifies several key events. First, the end of public hearings is coming soon and, second, senator and committee priority bills have been designated. *(See below for updates on several priority measures, including bills related to retirement, student discipline, and reading proficiency.)*

Another important upcoming event is the April meeting of the Economic Forecast Advisory Board. The Legislature will need to wait to see if tax revenue forecasts are nudged upward or downward by the board in order to determine the final biennial budget.

What's fairly certain at this point is that any pending measure that contains a fiscal impact to the state will have a tough road for passage. We need to be watching carefully for measures that may not have a fiscal impact to the state but represent an unfunded mandate to schools.

### Retirement Committee Advances Bill to Create New Tier: Modified Rule of 85

This morning the Legislature's Retirement Committee voted 5-0 to advance **LB 415**, which would create a third tier in both the School Employees Plan and the OPS Plan. The new tier would apply to employees hired on and after July 1, 2018 under the committee amendments to the bill.

The original version of LB 415 provided for a Rule of 90 with a minimum age of retirement at 60 along with at least 30 years of experience. The School Plan utilized a Rule of 90 until 1998 when legislation was passed to implement the Rule of 85 (minimum retirement age 55).

Senator Mark Kolterman introduced LB 415, in part, to address rising criticism about defined benefit plans and associated costs. There are lawmakers who still favor abandoning the DB concept in favor of lesser expensive cash balance plans. To address concerns about cost and sustainability, Senator Kolterman offered LB 415, which would maintain the defined benefit plan for future generations of educators but with a more modern approach to a minimum retirement age.

NCSA and NRCSA supported LB 415 while NSEA opposed the measure. Through negotiations and compromise, the bill, as advanced, would provide for a modified Rule of 85 with a minimum retirement age of 60. This new rule would apply to new employees hired on or after July 1, 2018. *It does not affect current plan members.*

Other provisions of LB 415 include:

*Definition of Termination:* Amends the definition of "termination" in the School Employees Plan to clarify that termination does not occur:

1. if the member enters into an employee-employer relationship in any capacity with the same employer or any other school district and there are less than 180 days between the time the employment ceased and the new employment began; or
2. if the member accepted an early retirement incentive and within 36 months subsequently provides service in any capacity to the same or another school district.

*Prearranged Agreements:* Requires the employer and the member to certify under penalty of prosecution, that prior to the member's retirement, there was no prearranged agreement to return to work with the same school district in any capacity including under contract or temporary staffing agency, and to certify that there was no prearranged agreement to work for any other school district.

*NOTES:* LB 415 is a priority measure for the Retirement Committee. The committee's plan is to submit the committee amendments to the state's actuary for analysis of funding impact of the modified Rule of 85 with minimum retirement age of 60 along with the return to work provisions. The bill may or may not pass in the 2017 Session depending a number of factors, including whether the Legislature has sufficient time to debate the bill and also the results of the actuarial analysis.

## Student Discipline Bill Prioritized

Senator Mike Groene has prioritized a bill he introduced to modify the Nebraska Student Discipline Act. **LB 595** would add new sections to the Student Discipline Act relating to use of physical force or physical restraint or removal from a class in response to student behavior.

## Reading Proficiency Measure Prioritized

On March 7th the Education Committee heard public comment on **LB 651**, introduced by Senator Lou Ann Linehan. The bill would create the Nebraska Reading Improvement Act and require that each public school student's progression from one grade to another be determined, in part, upon proficiency in reading.

Senator Linehan prioritized the measure on March 9th.

The bill was heavily opposed during the public hearing, including expert testimony from various school districts and curriculum groups (NASCD and Learning Forward).

The bill requires that an accelerated reading intervention program must be provided to all students in kindergarten, first grade, second grade, and third grade who are identified as having a reading deficiency based upon state-approved local or statewide assessments administered within the first 30 days of the school year.

NDE reports that most school districts currently utilize a local formative assessment to determine reading proficiency. The department further reports that if the state were to develop and implement a reliable and valid assessment to determine reading proficiency for students in grades K-3, the cost would be "significant." The approximate cost to develop a third grade-level NeSA instrument is reported to be \$1 million, according to department personnel.

The fiscal impact of the bill will be a challenge to its advancement, but we encourage our members to contact their own state senator and discuss the legislation. (Click [here](#) to view the introduced version of LB 651.)

## Superintendent's Report

1. NRCSA Legislative Day – We heard from Chairs of various legislative committees, including Senator Groene from North Platte. As we are still in the early stages of the session, there was nothing too controversial or concerning.....yet. I did attend the hearing on school vouchers. The vast majority of those in attendance did not support vouchers.
2. Strategic Plan – Facility Committee – The committee determined some priorities for the district and its buildings. Two of the top priorities are the replacement of windows at the Silver Creek site and the remodeling of the 501 building to accommodate the wrestling program. I would like to assemble the Board's Building and Grounds Committee to further discuss these ideas.
3. Ball Field Maintenance – On Wednesday, March 8<sup>th</sup>, I attended a workshop with the City Council to discuss the future of maintaining the ball fields in Genoa. This was a work session. The discussion focused on the city's role in maintaining the fields. The school district was not asked to provide assistance.
4. EHC Conference Meeting – We determined the regular season champions for both divisions of the conference. Twin River boys are co-champions of our division.

## **AGREEMENT**

### **CONTRACTED LEVEL I, II, AND III SPECIAL EDUCATION SERVICES**

**THIS AGREEMENT**, made and entered into this 27 day of February 2017 by and between Educational Service Unit 7 of the State of Nebraska, hereinafter called "Servicing Agency" and Twin River hereinafter called "District".

#### **WITNESSETH:**

- 1.** That the Serving Agency does hereby agree that it will furnish to the District the following described Special Education services which meet the requirements of the State Department of Education. All rates are subject to the approval of the State Department of Education, and will be provided to the district prior to the district's budget preparation.
- 2.** That the Serving Agency does hereby agree it will furnish to the District the following described special education services as follows:
- 3.** Services shall be provided only to children who qualify for such services as specified in State Department of Education, Special Education Rules and Regulations (Rule 51).
- 4.** The Servicing Agency shall supply recorded information on each child for whom services are contracted. The Servicing Agency agrees that it will confer with the School District personnel for purposes of evaluating each child's progress.
- 5.** The placing of a child in said program shall be made by joint decision of the Servicing Agency, the District, parents and/or guardians, and other members of the IEP team.
- 6.** The Servicing Agency agrees to perform the services and the District agrees to pay in accordance with the Servicing Agency rate schedule as approved by the Nebraska State Board of Education. This schedule shall be in full force and effect during the school year of 2017-2018 commencing no earlier than August 01, 2017 and ending no later than July 31, 2018.
- 7.** The Servicing Agency retains the right to designate personnel to provide services. All personnel provided by the Servicing Agency shall be endorsed to provide their respective services.
- 8.** Policies regarding sick leave, personal leave, and professional leave shall be determined by the negotiated agreement with the Servicing Agency for personnel providing services to the District.
- 9.** In the event that school district's programming requirements and needs change at any time subsequent to and during the term of this agreement, the costs to the school established by this agreement, shall in mutual agreement between ESU 7 and the school district be adjusted and prorated and the parties may agree. Nothing in this paragraph, however, shall be construed to entitle the school district to abrogate this contract or declare it void. The district shall be obligated to pay all sums specified by this contract as due and owing the ESU 7 regardless of changes in circumstances within the district during the course of this contract. The ESU 7 shall, however, be obligated to meet with the school district and discuss in good faith alternatives to mitigating expense,

reallocating staff, and other resources within the bounds of the law and as the ESU 7 may in its sole discretion determine to be in the best interest of ESU 7 and the school district. Any and all changes or expenses incurred by ESU 7 in the course of performing its obligations pursuant to this agreement, or in preparing to do so, shall become due and payable by school district to ESU 7 upon billing in a manner consistent with the billing provision of this agreement.

10. If, for any reason the District does not pay as agreed, the Servicing Agency may cancel this contract and forthwith, without notice, refuse further services to said district, but the District shall not be relieved from paying for services rendered by the Servicing Agency to the said District to date of termination of service.

11. The School District agrees that its payments will be made upon receipt of billing from the Servicing Agency.

12. It is understood and agreed, that in the event of any reason this contract does not comply with the State's requirement, it will be changed in accordance therewith, upon written notice by the Servicing Agency to the District and advising the District of the required changes to meet State requirements.

13. It is agreed this contract between the Servicing Agency and district must be signed by the District Board or Representative and returned to the Servicing Agency by March 22, 2017. The Servicing Agency's Board will then sign and return a copy of the contract to the District.

This agreement shall be binding upon the parties hereto and their successors. The persons executing this Agreement on behalf of the respective parties specifically acknowledge and represent that they have value authority to bind the party to whose benefit this Agreement had been executed.
