Custodians and summer help continue to clean and prepare classrooms for next Fall. Teachers are moving into and setting up their new assigned rooms. Administration is preparing handbooks to send in for printing, reporting to the state, schedules, and in-service planning. Many teaching staff members have/are attending educational workshops in the areas of technology, educational methods, educational theories and other related topics that will positively impact the students in their classes. Several staff members are taking college courses over the summer working towards Master's Degrees in Education. Mr. Heier attended the PBL World Conference in June. At the conference he learned more about Project Based Learning, including how to help implement PBL into a school system through support of classroom teachers and involvement of patrons both in and outside of the school. Outdoor Classroom

The prevalence of overweight children ages 6 to 11 has more than doubled in the last 20 years, increasing to 18.8% in 2004, and the rate among adolescents has more than tripled (CDC 2007). Overweight and obese children suffer from a myriad of health problems, including higher risks of cardiovascular disease, diabetes, bone and joint problems and sleep apnea (Ogden 2006).

These health problems are so severe that researchers warn of the possibility that for the first time in American history, *life expectancy may actually DECREASE because of the health impacts of the current childhood obesity epidemic* (Olshansky et al 2005). (Allen Cooper, NOLE, p. 87)

“A natural outdoor play and learning environment is outdoor space at an early childhood education center that includes diverse features designed to promote structured and unstructured physical activity, play and learning” (Cooper, 2015).

A substantial body of research indicates that outdoor learning and play environments which include diverse natural elements advance and enrich all of the domains relevant to the development and health and well being of young children (Cooper, 2015). Literature indicates that playing and learning in an outdoor area designed with educational prospects in mind, provides a wide array of health, learning, and social/emotional benefits for children that cannot be copied within a typical, indoor classroom.

Health benefits are perhaps the first thing people consider when designing an outdoor classroom. These benefits include physical fitness and gross motor development. Fjoroft showed that children who play outdoors are generally healthier than those who spend less time outside (2011). This study also indicated significant improvement in coordination, balance, and agility. Other health benefits are related to nutrition: fruits and vegetables are consumed more often by children who grow their own food (Bell & Dymont, 2008). A surprising benefit is related to an improvement in a child's eyesight as more time spent outdoors is related to reduced rates of nearsightedness (myopia) in children and adolescents (Rose et al., 2008).

As adults, we may view outside play as just that -play-. But in reality, this playful activity is a crucial component in the development of the brain. Research shows us that many of the tasks that children must develop can be most effectively learned through outdoor play (Johnson, et al., 2010). “Learning by doing” creates more neural networks (connections in the brain) in the brain (Hannaford 2005). Exposure to the outdoors increases the ability to focus and improves other cognitive abilities. In fact, just proximity to and views of the outdoors provides this ability to focus, even in older children (Wells, 2000). Academic performance has increased social studies, science, language arts, and math scores in the United States when students use outdoor classrooms and other forms of nature experiences (American Institute for Research, 2005). According to a 2005 study released by the California Department of Education, children who learned in outdoor classrooms increased their science test scores by 27 percent. The gains also extend to reading and math (Cleaver, year). Not only are improvements noted in these academic areas and learning, but ADHD symptoms lessen and concentration increases with spending time outdoors (Taylor et al., 2001).

Social/ emotional health consists of many components including levels of perceived stress, self-image and self-confidence. There is much research demonstrating advantages of time spent in “green spaces.” Taylor (2001) confirmed going to parks and gardens reduced stress and mental fatigue. Kuo & Sullivan found children in public housing who were exposed to natural areas showed less mental stress, less hostility, and violence (2001).

The evidence is strong. Time spent in a high-quality green environment leads to advancements in a child’s health, learning, gross motor development and mental health.

How Green Classrooms are Reconnecting Kids to Nature quotes “It’s not merely the act one going outdoors,” says Day, “but you tie it back to the curriculum in an applied way, then things start to happen.”

Superintendent's Report - August 2017

1. Solar Eclipse - On Monday August 21, we will be attending the solar eclipse event hosted by the Central City Public Schools. As is stand right now, the elementary students and staff will be departing from Genoa and Silver Creek around 8:30 that morning. I am calculating about an hour for the trip, unloading, dealing with traffic and returning to Genoa to pick up the secondary folks. When the buses arrive in Genoa, we will immediately load for the trip back to Central City.

After the event, we will bring the elementary students and staff back to their respective buildings, then head back to pick up the secondary staff and students. I am hoping to have everyone back to Genoa by 4:30.

We still have some details to work out. As soon as we have finalized our plans, we will place them on web site.

2. Future plans for the yard of the pre-school - Annette Swantek will present her idea about creating an outdoor classroom for the pre-K students. I have attached a document that provides you with some background knowledge for this idea.

3. New School Bus - The new school bus will be here this week. Unfortunately, the air conditioning will not be installed until June. We will need the passenger capacity for the solar eclipse trip. It takes from five to seven weeks to install the AC unit.

We will not be charged for the AC installations until it is installed.

4. September meeting - I am planning to move the September Regular meeting back to the 18th. With the budget hearing and approve, I think it best to keep our work session on the the 11th focused on the use of the Superintendent's Evaluation instrument. Dr. Kent Davis from McREL will be here that evening to continue our work on that.

Dr. Davis will be working with principals and me on Tuesday concerning their evaluation process.

5. Our pre-school was again approved by the State Board of Education. Please refer to the attached letter.

6. I would like you permission to attend the Ed Leader 21 Conference in Atlanta on October 2nd through the 5th. This conference focuses of many of the item I have spoken about as the district works to prepare our students for life once they graduate from Twin River.

Creating a profile of a graduate, implementing the 4 C's into the curriculum, other districts sharing their experiences as they have implemented the 4 C's and created their Profiles will be shared.

I am planning to take Mr. Metzger and a couple of teachers to this conference, too.

7. Who would like to attend the State School Board Convention in November? 15th thru the 17th.

The School Board Regional meeting will be in York on Wednesday, September 13th.

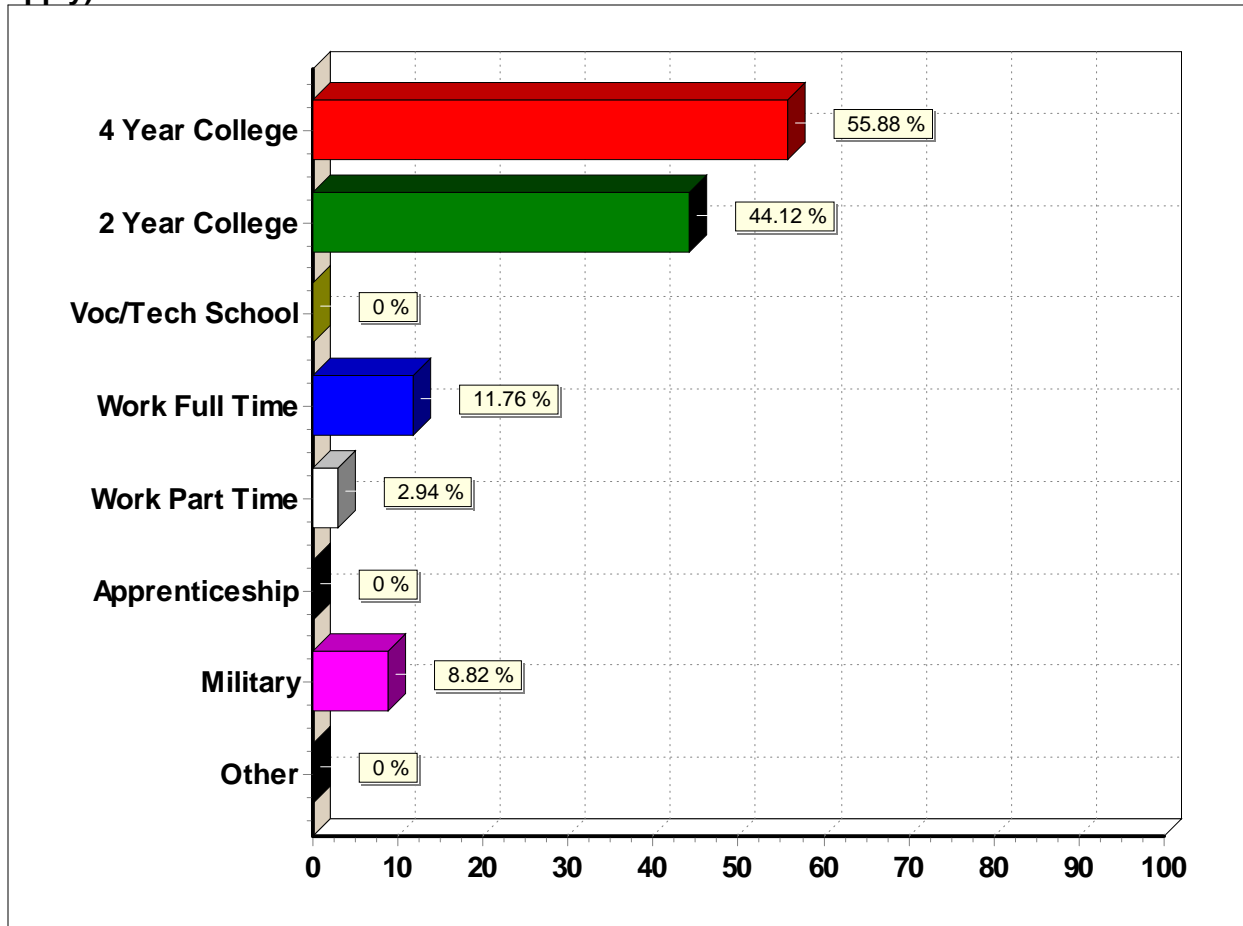


Senior Exit Survey Class of 2017

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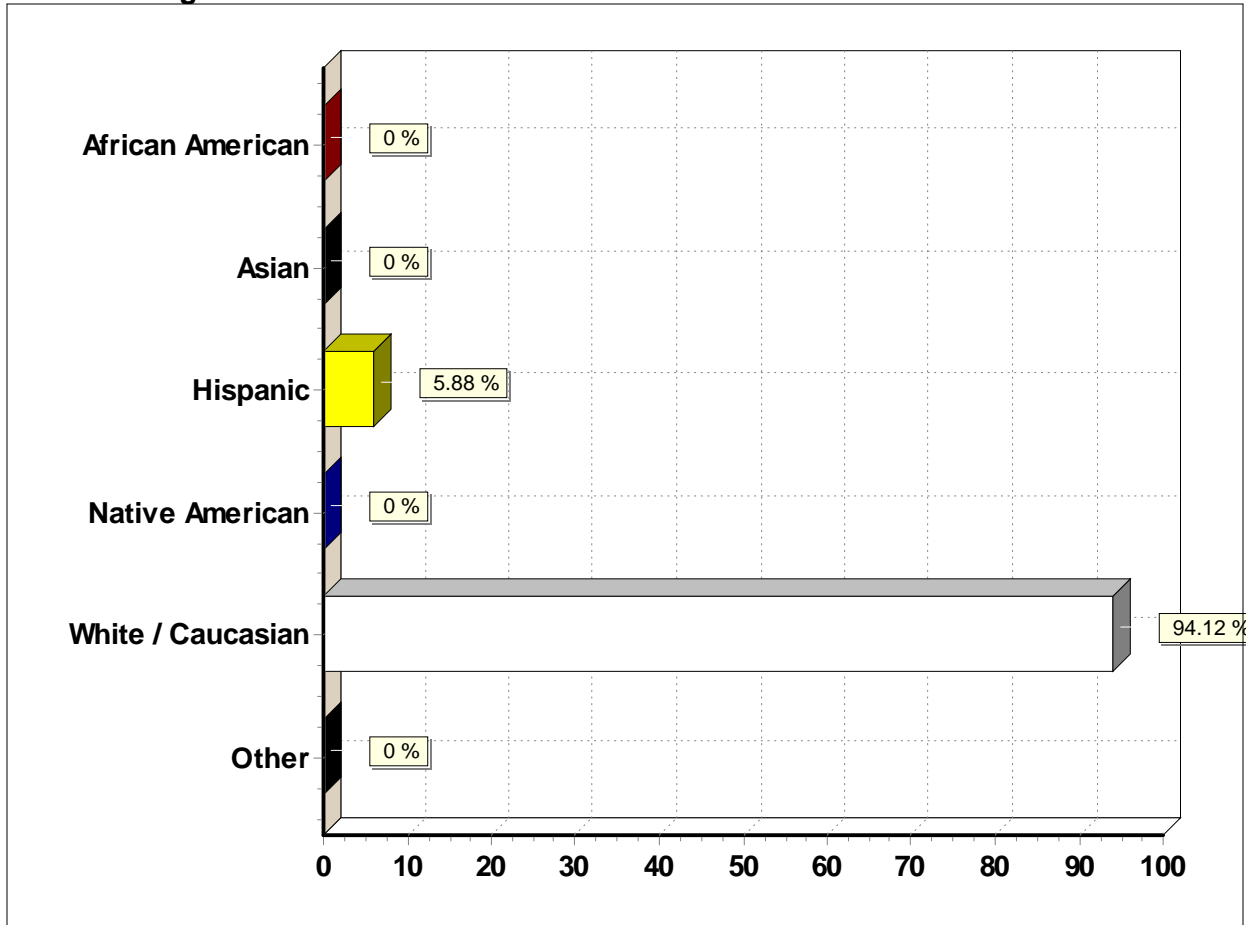

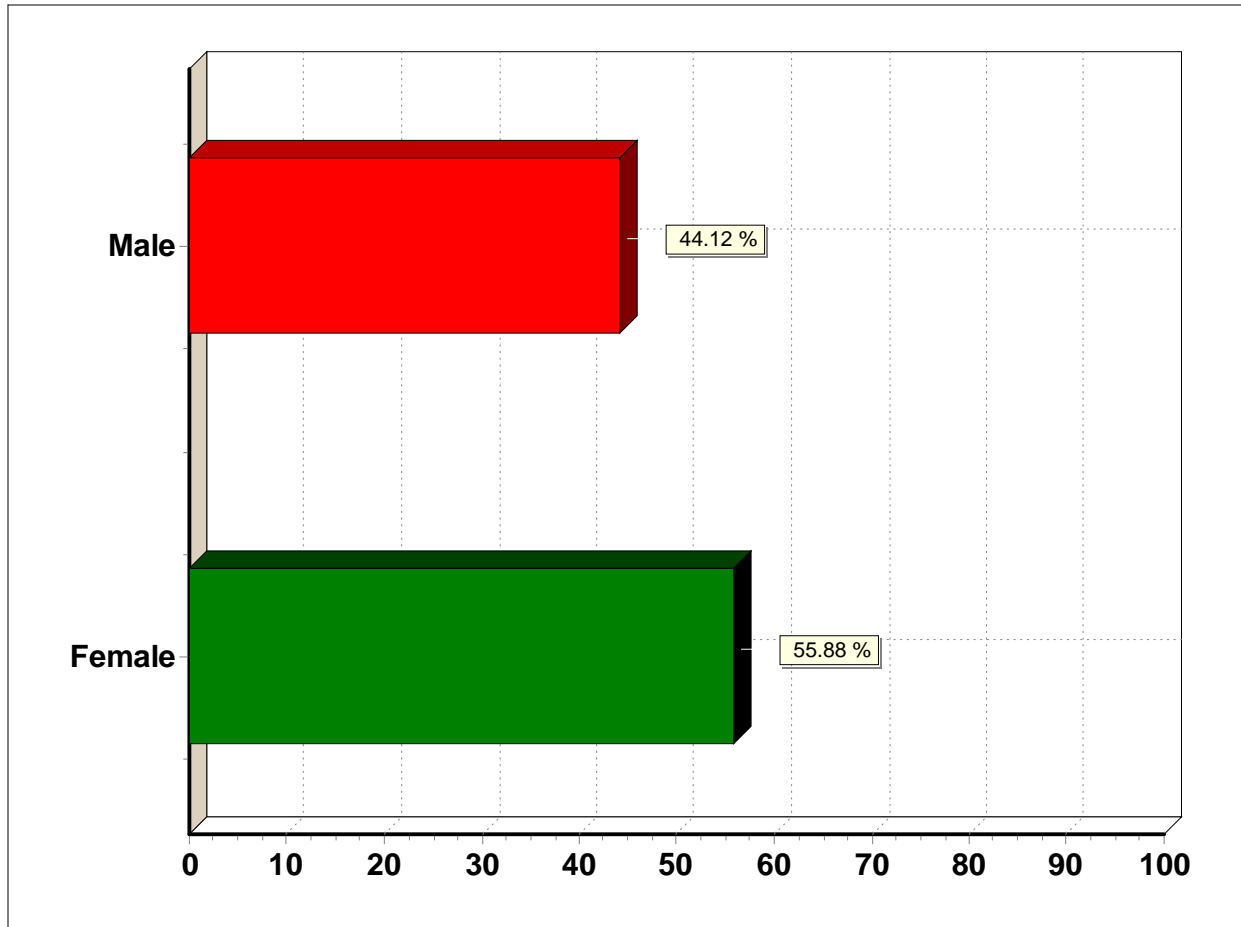
