




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
TYPICAL RIP-RAP OUTLET




INLET PROTECTION DETAIL

I wanted to take this opportunity to provide a quote for re-lining the casing of your Well 5. The camera survey that we recently performed indicated probable holes in a couple of casing joints.

First of all, the State requires that plans and specifications, drafted and submitted by a Professional Engineer, be submitted when the structure of the well is changed. The re-lining of the casing qualifies as a structural change. We are prepared to draft and submit those plans and specifications. We will install a 12" "K" on the bottom of approximately 260' of 12", .375 wall steel casing that is installed in the existing well. We will back fill between the original 16" casing and the new 12" casing with bentonite holeplug for the entire length. The cost to install the casing liner is.....\$21,471.60, which includes the fee to the State of Nebraska (\$100.00 plus 1/2 of 1% of the project cost); and applicable sales tax.

I have submitted the expected pump repairs in a previous letter. Just to refresh your memory, those repairs included all new column assembly; rebuild and re-machine the bowl assembly; the discharge head and stuffing box re-condition and re-installation labor. That cost was quoted at \$26,268.90, excluding applicable sales tax.

Dear Tim;

We have completed the inspection of the pump from Well 5. The following is what we recommend for repair.

The 4 stage bowl assembly did sustain some damage, but nothing that we can't rebuild or re-machine. We will replace all of the bronze bowl bearings; all bronze wear rings and the stainless steel bowl shaft. We will need to machine 1 of the bowl castings and install an oversized bronze bearing. We will also need to re-machine another of the bowl castings so that we can install an oversized wear ring. The existing bearing and wear ring turned in the castings. The cost to rebuild and re-machine the bowl assembly is.....\$ 2,865.75.

Since most of the column and line shaft assembly was operating without lubrication, and was actually swinging against the well, I recommend replacing the entire 200' of column, line shaft assembly, line shaft bearings and bearing retainers. The cost for the entire 200' is...\$17,464.60. There are line shaft bearings designed to "run dry" when no lubrication is present. The material is called Vesconite, and I believe this is a perfect application for the bearings. The adder to go with all Vesconite bearings is.....\$ 2,261.55.

The stuffing box assembly will need to be reconditioned and rebuilt at a cost of.....\$ 377.00.

I would expect re-installation & testing labor to be.....\$ 3,300.00.

We are scheduled to televise the well tomorrow, so that we can make sure there is no structural damage. Thank you very much and please contact me with any questions that you might have.



ORDINANCE NO. 2056

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF CRETE, NEBRASKA, TO AMEND THE CITY CODE OF THE CITY OF CRETE, CHAPTER 11, MUNICIPAL PLANNING; ARTICLE 2, ZONING REGULATIONS; SECTION 11-221, I-2 HEAVY INDUSTRIAL DISTRICTS; PROVIDING FOR REPEAL OF ALL ORDINANCES AND PARTS OF ORDINANCES IN CONFLICT HEREWITH; ORDERING THE PUBLICATION OF THE ORDINANCE IN PAMPHLET FORM, AND PROVIDING FOR A TIME WHEN THIS ORDINANCE SHALL BE IN FULL FORCE AND EFFECT.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF CRETE, NEBRASKA:

Section 1. That Chapter 11, Article 2, Section 11-221 be amended to read as follows:

§11-221 I-2 HEAVY INDUSTRIAL DISTRICTS.

A. INTENT: This District is intended to provide areas for activities and uses of a heavy industrial character, which permits the manufacturing or treatment of any goods from raw materials or any other activity with which hazardous processes, products or fumes are associated. It is the least restrictive of any district and provides for the widest range of industrial operation permitted by this Article.

B. PERMITTED PRINCIPAL USES: Any building or uses of a heavy industrial character, which permits the manufacturing or treatment of any goods from raw materials, not in conflict with any ordinance of the City or law of the State of Nebraska regulating nuisances or environmental pollutants.

1. Terminal yard, trucking.
2. Wholesale distribution and warehousing.
3. Manufacture and/or assembly of component parts.
4. Food processing and packaging.
5. Concrete batch plant cement, clay or pottery products manufacture.
6. Contractors construction equipment storage.
7. Fuel storage yard.
8. Machine shops.
9. Truck and tractor repair.
10. Mobile or modular home manufacturing.
11. Beverage bottling or distribution.
12. Raising of field crops and horticulture.
13. On-site signs.
14. Outdoor advertising business.
15. Sawmill, planing mill, including manufacturing or wood

products not involving chemical treatment.

It is further intended that activities proposing to locate in any of the areas designated Heavy Industrial shall satisfy the Planning Commission and the City Council that the activities conducted in the aforementioned areas shall conform to the pollution control standards in existence for the State of Nebraska. No use shall be permitted that does not conform to these minimum pollution control standards.

C. PERMITTED ACCESSORY USES: The following accessory uses and structures shall be permitted if the Principle Use or Structure is present.

1. A dwelling unit, including mobile home, for use by the owner, operator or caretaker of the industry.
2. Other uses normally appurtenant to the permitted uses when established in conformance with the space limits of this District.

D. SPECIAL EXCEPTION USES: A building or premise may be used for the following purposes in the I-2 Heavy Industrial District if a Special Use Permit for such use has been obtained in accordance with Section 11-239 of this Ordinance.

1. Animal sales yards, auctions and slaughter locker plant operation.
2. Gravel, sand or dirt removal, stockpiling, processing or distribution and sales thereof.
3. Retail sales of products constructed on-site.
4. Auto wrecking and salvaging operations thereof, sufficiently screened from public view.
5. One additional dwelling unit (in addition to that allowed under Permitted Accessory Uses), including mobile home, for use by the owner, operator or caretaker of the industry.
6. Co-location of additional cellular or communication antennas on an existing tower in conformance with the provisions of Section 11-528 of these Regulations.
7. Alternative energy systems utilizing Biomass, Geothermal, Hydropower, Solar and/or Wind sources in conformance with "Net Metering" per Nebraska State Statutes §70-2001 to 70-2005 (August 30, 2009, as amended.) shall also be in conformance with the provisions of Section 11-525 and 11-526 of these Regulations.
8. Outdoor Storage Containers.
9. [Composting facilities.](#)

E. PROHIBITED USES: All other uses and structures, which are not specifically permitted or not permissible, as special exception uses shall be prohibited from the I-2 Heavy Industrial District.

F. SPACE LIMITATIONS: All principal or accessory structures housing a use permitted only in the I-2 District shall be located at least 200 feet (60.96 meters) from any residential or commercial district boundary and not less than 100 feet (30.48 meters) from any other district, except a Light Industrial District boundary.

1. Height and area regulations. The maximum height and minimum lot requirements within the I-2 Heavy Industrial District shall be as follows:

G. MISCELLANEOUS PROVISIONS: The best practical means known for the disposal of refuse matter or water-carried waste, the abatement of obnoxious or offensive odor, dust, smoke, gas, noise or similar nuisance, shall be employed.

H. SIGN REGULATIONS: Signs within the I-2 Heavy Industrial District shall be in conformance with the provisions of Article 5, Section 11-519.01 of these Regulations.

I. PARKING REGULATIONS: Parking within the I-2 Heavy Industrial District shall be in conformance with the provisions of Article 5, Section 11-508 of these Regulations.

J. FENCE REGULATIONS: Fences within the I-2 Heavy Industrial District shall be in conformance with the provisions of Article 5, Section 11-502 of these Regulations.

Section 2. That the above section shall be codified as part of the Crete City Code as stated herein.

Section 3. All ordinances and parts or ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

It is further intended that activities proposing to locate in any of the areas designated Heavy Industrial shall satisfy the Planning Commission and the City Council that the activities conducted in the aforementioned areas shall conform to the pollution control standards in existence for the State of Nebraska. No use shall be permitted that does not conform to these minimum pollution control standards.

C. PERMITTED ACCESSORY USES: The following accessory uses and structures shall be permitted if the Principle Use or Structure is present.

1. A dwelling unit, including mobile home, for use by the owner, operator or caretaker of the industry.
2. Other uses normally appurtenant to the permitted uses when established in conformance with the space limits of this District.

D. SPECIAL EXCEPTION USES: A building or premise may be used for the following purposes in the I-2 Heavy Industrial District if a Special Use Permit for such use has been obtained in accordance with Section 11-239 of this Ordinance.

1. Animal sales yards, auctions and slaughter locker plant operation.
2. Gravel, sand or dirt removal, stockpiling, processing or distribution and sales thereof.
3. Retail sales of products constructed on-site.
4. Auto wrecking and salvaging operations thereof, sufficiently screened from public view.
5. One additional dwelling unit (in addition to that allowed under Permitted Accessory Uses), including mobile home, for use by the owner, operator or caretaker of the industry.
6. Co-location of additional cellular or communication antennas on an existing tower in conformance with the provisions of Section 11-528 of these Regulations.
7. Alternative energy systems utilizing Biomass, Geothermal, Hydropower, Solar and/or Wind sources in conformance with "Net Metering" per Nebraska State Statutes §70-2001 to 70-2005 (August 30, 2009, as amended.) shall also be in conformance with the provisions of Section 11-525 and 11-526 of these Regulations.
8. Outdoor Storage Containers.
9. Composting facilities.

E. PROHIBITED USES: All other uses and structures, which are not specifically permitted or not permissible, as special exception uses shall be prohibited from the I-2 Heavy Industrial District.

F. SPACE LIMITATIONS: All principal or accessory structures housing a use permitted only in the I-2 District shall be located at least 200 feet (60.96 meters) from any residential or commercial district boundary and not less than 100 feet (30.48 meters) from any other district, except a Light Industrial District boundary.

1. Height and area regulations. The maximum height and minimum lot requirements within the I-2 Heavy Industrial District shall be as follows:

G. MISCELLANEOUS PROVISIONS: The best practical means known for the disposal of refuse matter or water-carried waste, the abatement of obnoxious or offensive odor, dust, smoke, gas, noise or similar nuisance, shall be employed.

H. SIGN REGULATIONS: Signs within the I-2 Heavy Industrial District shall be in conformance with the provisions of Article 5, Section 11-519.01 of these Regulations.

I. PARKING REGULATIONS: Parking within the I-2 Heavy Industrial District shall be in conformance with the provisions of Article 5, Section 11-508 of these Regulations.

J. FENCE REGULATIONS: Fences within the I-2 Heavy Industrial District shall be in conformance with the provisions of Article 5, Section 11-502 of these Regulations.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF CRETE, NEBRASKA:

Section 1. That Chapter 11, Article 2, Section 11-230 part E be amended as follows:

§11-230 SPECIAL EXCEPTIONS. The City Council shall hear and decide only such special exceptions as are provided for by the terms of this Article; to decide such questions as are involved in determining whether special exceptions should be granted; and to grant special exceptions with such conditions and safeguards as are appropriate under this Article, or to deny special exceptions when not in harmony with the purpose and intent of this Article. A special exception shall not be granted by the City Council unless and until:

E. Before any special exception shall issue, the City Council shall make written findings certifying compliance with the specific rules governing individual special exceptions and that satisfactory provision and arrangement has been made concerning the following, where applicable:

1. Ingress and egress to property and proposed structures thereon with particular reference to automotive and pedestrian safety and convenience, traffic flow and in case of fire or catastrophe;
2. Off-street parking and loading areas where required, with particular attention to the items in 1 above and the economic, noise, glare or odor effects of the special exception on adjoining properties and properties generally in the district;
3. Refuse and service areas, with particular reference to the items in 1 above;
4. Utilities, with reference to locations, availability and compatibility;
5. Screening and buffering with reference to type, dimensions and character;

6. Sign, if any, and proposed exterior lighting with reference to glare, traffic safety, economic effect, and compatibility and harmony with properties in the district;
7. Required yards and other open space;
8. General compatibility with adjacent properties and other property in the district.
9. Composting. The following is a listing of additional items that will need to be submitted and/or negotiated as part of the submittal for Special Exceptions for a composting facility.

1. Odor

- a. Generation

- i. Quantify facility-wide individual Volatile Organic Compounds (VOC) constituent as a maximum potential pound-per-hour emission rate without air emission reduction. Refer to the list of individual VOC (Green, P.G., Kumar, A., et al. Impacts of Volatile Organic Compounds from Compost on Ozone Formation, UC Davis (pg. 20)) that have the potential to result from composting. Provide supporting calculations (for example, calculation spreadsheet) and assumptions used to quantify the maximum potential air emissions. Provide documentation of the source of emission factors and assumptions used.
 - ii. Quantify facility-wide individual hazardous air pollutant (HAP) emissions as a maximum potential pound-per-hour emission rate without air emission reduction. Refer to the list of individual HAP (NDEQ Hazardous Air Pollutant List by CAS Number (9 pages), 06-220, March 7, 2006). Provide supporting calculations (for example, calculation spreadsheet) and assumptions used to quantify the maximum potential air emissions. Provide documentation of the source of emission factors and assumptions used.
 - iii. Quantify facility-wide maximum potential pound-per-hour for both ammonia and hydrogen sulfide emissions without air emission reduction. Provide supporting calculations (for example, calculation spreadsheet) and assumptions used to quantify the maximum potential air emissions. Provide documentation of the source of emission factors and assumptions used.

- b. Levels at property lines and in ambient air (air the general public has access to)

- i. Complete an ambient air quality dispersion modeling analysis, using the recommended air dispersion modeling approach in section vi. below with and without anticipated air emission control strategies

and/or emission reduction technologies, to plot the following odor annoyance free isopleths for each individual VOC, individual HAP, ammonia, and hydrogen sulfide:

1. 99% odor annoyance free
 2. 98% odor annoyance free
 3. 97% odor annoyance free
 4. 96% odor annoyance free
 5. 95% odor annoyance free
- ii. Indicate the basis for the odor threshold used to determine the odor annoyance free isopleths as either an odor recognition threshold or as an odor detection threshold and the source of the value. The EPA document titled *Reference Guide to Odor Thresholds for Hazardous Air Pollutants Listed in the Clean Air Act Amendments of 1990* should be used for reference.
- iii. Five years of Lincoln, Nebraska surface and Omaha, Nebraska upper air data are generally recommended as a representative weather dataset for use in EPA's American Meteorological Society / Environmental Protection Agency Model (AERMOD).
- iv. A uniform cartesian receptor grid using 50-meter spacing is recommended. The center of the receptor grid should be located at the center of the facility's air emission sources.
- v. The City of Crete lies in a shallow valley. Any proposed facility will be located in the same valley. It is recommended that the terrain processor, AERMAP, be used to derive base elevations for the air emission sources, receptors, and buildings.
- vi. A recommended odor air dispersion modeling approach is described as follows:
1. Model each air emission source at its maximum potential pound-per-hour uncontrolled air emission rate for each individual VOC, individual HAP, ammonia, and hydrogen sulfide (baseline model) using AERMOD
 2. In a separate model run, each air emission source should be modeled at its maximum potential pound-per-hour controlled air emission rate for each individual VOC, individual HAP, ammonia, and hydrogen sulfide, using AERMOD
 3. Setup each model run to find each instance of a concentration that equals, or exceeds, the

recognition threshold or detection threshold (in micrograms per cubic meter)

4. Post-process each model run output using a program that calculates the percentage of time in the year the modeled pollutant would not exceed the recognition threshold or detection threshold (odor annoyance free percentages) accounting for hours described as missing by AERMOD - missing hours not included in modeled total hours
5. Plot the odor annoyance free percentages and overlay the plots on aerial maps to identify the location of the 99%, 98%, 97%, 96%, and 95% odor annoyance free isopleths in comparison with nearby residences and the City of Crete.
6. For each odor annoyance free level (99%, 98%, etc.) identify the distance (in kilometers) from the facility center-point to the most distant occurrence of the odor annoyance free level.

c. Odor and weather monitoring requirements

- i. If applicable, describe the facility's plans to monitor odor, including frequency of odor assessment and methods to detect potential odors originating from the facility.
- ii. Odor has a tendency to be more intense during light winds or calm wind conditions. Describe the facility's odor mitigation plans during light wind and calm wind conditions.
- iii. If applicable, describe the facility's plans to monitor weather, including data collection frequency and parameters planned to be monitored. Examples of parameters include: hourly average wind speed measured at 10 meters above ground level, hourly average wind direction measured at 10 meters above ground level, hourly average wind direction standard deviation measured at 10 meters above ground level, hourly average temperature measured at 2 meters above ground level, hourly total precipitation measured at ground level.
- iv. If applicable, describe the siting criteria the facility plans to use to install a weather monitoring station.

2. Facility Design

- a. Quantify the maximum compost production rate, in tons per day, for each product to be produced.

- b. Identify the individual material components to be composted and the anticipated composition of compost mixture. Identify the fractions by weight or percentages by weight of each individual material component in the anticipated mixture total.
 - c. Identify the bulking agent material and the quantity to be used as compost input, in tons per day.
 - d. Anticipated finished compost quantity, in tons per year
 - e. Anticipated use/disposal of material, in tons per day
 - f. For each source of air emissions, Identify air emission reduction strategies and/or technology proposed for use. If applicable, Provide technology-supplier information describing its intended use. Identify the minimum anticipated air emission reduction for each emission reduction strategy and/or air emission reduction technology (in fraction or percentage of reduction). Provide a basis for each air emission reduction value.
3. Anticipated traffic (or additional traffic) generated to and from site
- a. Identify the type of each haul truck to be used
 - b. For each truck type, Identify the empty weight of the truck, in tons
 - c. For each truck type, Identify the full weight of the truck, in tons
 - d. For each truck type, Identify the anticipated maximum distance to be travelled FULL one-way
 - e. For each truck type, Identify the anticipated maximum distance to be travelled EMPTY one-way

anticipated width (in feet), length (in feet), and height above ground level (in feet).

5. For each air emission point described as a proposed exhaust stack, vent, or exhaust point, Provide the following information:
 - a. The maximum potential pound-per-hour emission rate for each individual VOC, individual HAP, ammonia, and/or hydrogen sulfide
 - b. Minimum stack height measured from ground level to the top of the exhaust point (in feet)
 - c. Maximum stack exit diameter (in inches)
 - d. Anticipated exit velocity (in feet per minute)
 - e. Anticipated exit temperature (in Fahrenheit) - if applicable, list as "ambient"
 - f. Describe the anticipated orientation of the exhaust point as either (a) vertical, unobstructed, (b) vertical, obstructed (for example, with rain-cap), (c) horizontal, or (d) gooseneck (exhaust vents downward).
6. For each air emission source described as a fugitive air emission source (emissions not routed to a stack or vent), Provide the following information:
 - a. The maximum potential pound-per-hour emission rate for each individual VOC, individual HAP, ammonia, and/or hydrogen sulfide
 - b. The minimum height of air emission release measured from ground level to the release point (in feet)
 - c. The anticipated width (in feet) and length (in feet) of the air emission source
7. Screening (view) of the facility
 - a. Provide a Site Plan that shows applicable screening requirements for the proposed facility in accordance with current NDEQ requirements.
8. Location of facility
 - a. Provide an area map overlaying the proposed facility on an aerial map to show the location of the proposed facility in relation to existing residences. The map shall include a minimum of two (2) miles from the property boundary. Residences and existing city limits and extraterritorial jurisdiction (ETJ) should be shown on the map. Distances to nearest residence(s) shall be provided on the map.
9. Potential impacts to environment
 - a. Provide a summary of anticipated groundwater, surface water, solid waste or pollution impacts (i.e. blowing garbage, etc), or other similar impacts. This summary shall also include a plan to address the anticipated impacts.

10. Draft Operational Plan
 - a. Provide an overall operations plan that includes wet weather operation procedures, pest control (i.e. vermin, insect, and animal attraction and control), and other anticipated procedures, which includes how to address these and other anticipated instances. The overall operations plan shall also include a summary of anticipated compliance issues, and a plan as to how these issues will be resolved. For example, if operational or compliance issues occur, how will they be addressed?
11. Enforcement
 - a. The City may require a separate binding agreement for the site to address long term operational and compliance issues

Section 2. That the above section shall be codified as part of the Crete City Code as stated herein.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF CRETE, NEBRASKA:

Section 1. That Chapter 1, Article 3, Section 1-301 read as follows:

§1-301 APPOINTED OFFICIALS; ENUMERATED. The Mayor may, by and with the advice and consent of a majority of the City Council, have such departments and appoint such officials as may be established by ordinance which shall include an Administrator, Finance Director, Clerk-Treasurer, Deputy Clerk-Treasurer, Library Director, Public Works Director, Recreation Director, Engineer, Attorney, Emergency Management Liaison Officer and such other officials as may otherwise be required by law. All appointed officials may be removed at any time by the Mayor with the approval of the majority of the Council. All confirmations of appointments to such offices by the Council shall be made viva voce, and the concurrence of a majority shall be required. The vote by "yeas" and "nays" shall be recorded. BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF CRETE, NEBRASKA:

Section 1. That Chapter 1, Article 3, Section 1-301 read as follows:

§1-301 APPOINTED OFFICIALS; ENUMERATED. The Mayor may, by and with the advice and consent of a majority of the City Council, have such departments and appoint such officials as may be established by ordinance which shall include an Administrator, Finance Director, Clerk, Deputy Clerk, Library Director, Public Works Director, Recreation Director, Engineer, Attorney, Emergency Management Liaison Officer and such other officials as may otherwise be required by law. All appointed officials may be removed at any time by the Mayor with the approval of the majority of the Council. All confirmations of appointments to such offices by the Council shall be made viva voce, and the concurrence of a majority shall be required. The vote by "yeas" and "nays" shall be recorded. (Ref 16-308 RS Neb.) (*Amended by Ord. 1480, 02/15/00; 1994, 01/03/17*)

Section 2. That the above section shall be codified as part of the Crete City Code as stated herein.

Section 3. All ordinances and parts or ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

Section 4. This ordinance shall be published in pamphlet form and shall take effect and be in full force and effect from and after its passage and approval and publication as provided by law.

ITEMS OF INTEREST TO MUNICIPALITIES

- **Have you contacted your Senator(s) yet? HIGH PRIORITY – Please contact your Senator(s) and ask him or her to OPPOSE LB 472 authorizing a “COUNTYWIDE ONE-HALF CENT SALES TAX” with just a two-thirds vote of the county board (and no countywide vote), even on transactions subject to state sales and use tax in municipalities that already have a local option sales tax; this authority would apply to any county that has a federal judgment rendered against it by a federal court for a violation of federal law. Newly-elected Sen. Myron Dorn represents District 30, which includes part of Lancaster County and all of Gage County. (Four of the 13 municipalities in Gage County have a local option sales tax. Beatrice will go from 1.5 percent to 2 percent effective April 1, 2019. Cortland and Odell have a 1 percent local option sales tax and Wymore has a 1.5 percent.) Sen. Dorn informed the League staff and others that he introduced LB 472 to help Gage County pay for the \$28.2 million federal judgment relating to the “Beatrice 6” case. In addition to the \$28.2 million federal judgment, Gage County is facing about \$2 million more in attorneys fees. The League Executive Board met by telephone conference call on Jan. 8, 2019, and voted to strongly oppose the bill. The League Executive Board also strongly opposed LB 884 introduced in 2018 which would have authorized any county to impose a one-half cent sales tax on transactions subject to state sales and use tax in municipalities, even those that already have a local option sales tax; LB 884 would have required a countywide vote. Current law allows counties to impose a one-half cent countywide sales tax, subject to voter approval, but not on transactions in municipalities that already have a local option sales tax. (The League Executive Board also passed a motion strongly SUPPORTING legislation (LB 473) introduced by Sen. Dorn authorizing the State of Nebraska to give Gage County and other political subdivisions facing federal judgments a low-interest loan.)**
- **ALERT: The League has learned that Sen. Tom Briese from Albion will ask the Government, Military and Veterans Affairs Committee to kill his bill, LB 204, which requires voter approval for bonds under the Interlocal Cooperation Act.** Sen. Briese’s office has learned that most of the bonds issued under the Interlocal Cooperation Act are revenue bonds, not general obligation bonds, and he is less concerned about revenue bonds not having voter approval. Sen. Briese’s office indicated there is no need for opposition testimony since he will be asking the committee to kill his bill. The League would have testified against LB 204 at the committee hearing.

LBs 250, 338: League bills introduced during second week of session

Sen. Lynne Walz of Fremont introduced **LB 250**, which changes provisions relating to agricultural land that receives special valuation. Specifically, in counties with a population of **less** than 100,000 people, land qualifies for special valuation if the land is located outside the corporate boundaries of any sanitary and improvement district and the land is agricultural or horticultural. For counties over 100,000 in population, the current standards apply, which requires the agricultural or horticultural land be outside the corporate boundaries of a municipality in order to qualify for special valuation. A similar bill was introduced last year by Sen. Walz and was strongly supported by the City of Fremont and the League.

Sen. Justin Wayne of Omaha introduced **LB 338** that provides a “floor” for the wholesale price of gas. The bill amends Section 66-489.02(2) to provide: “The minimum average wholesale price of gasoline to be used to calculate the tax...for tax periods beginning or after July 1, 2019, shall be \$2.44.” LB 338 also requires Omaha to use funds from the Highway Allocation Fund to improve streets within the city with priority given to unimproved streets that may be considered substandard roads.

As background about why this bill is critically important for municipalities, then-state Sen. Deb Fischer introduced LB 846 in 2008 to change the gas tax formula. Under the new formula, part of the gas tax is to be calculated on the sales tax on the wholesale price of gasoline,

based on a six-month average recalculated on April 1 and October 1 of every year. Under LB 846, the rest of the gas tax continued being set on a fixed rate per gallon amount which is shared by the state, municipalities and counties. The Nebraska Department of Transportation has the benefit of a variable gas tax rate, which is designed to generate whatever amount of revenue is needed by the state to fund the budget for the Nebraska Department of Transportation. The primary purpose of LB 846 was to stabilize revenue for the Nebraska Department of Transportation while generating modest increases for municipalities and counties in the years to come.

The average wholesale price of gasoline discussed throughout the debate on LB 846 was expected to be \$2.44 per gallon by the time the new formula would take effect. With a \$2.44 per gallon average wholesale price, municipalities and counties would receive a little bit more money than prior years. The

\$2.44 per gallon average wholesale price of gas was projected based on the historical growth of gas prices for decades. Pursuant to the provisions of LB 846 passed in 2008, the amount of wholesale gas under the formula could not increase or decrease more than one penny every six months. Regrettably, no one could have predicted the economic downturn and plummeting wholesale price of gasoline that happened after LB 846 passed. In response to the plummeting wholesale price of gasoline, then-Sen. Fischer introduced LB 264 in 2009 that is similar to LB 338, introduced this year by Sen. Wayne. Unfortunately, LB 264 did not pass and municipalities lost millions of dollars in funds. With LB 338, there will be a floor on how low the wholesale price of gasoline can drop and will provide additional stability to the formula outlined in LB 846.

Thanks to Sen. Wayne and Sen. Walz for introducing these critically important pieces of legislation!

LB 291: League strongly supports proposals to collect state and local sales tax from out-of-state online retailers

One of the League's major legislative priorities this year is the collection of sales tax from on-line retailers. In 2018, the U.S. Supreme Court ruled in *South Dakota v. Wayfair (2018)* that states may charge sales tax on purchases made from out-of-state sellers, even if the seller does not have a physical presence in the state. Shortly after the decision, the Nebraska Department of Revenue announced it would start collecting sales tax on out-of-state online retailers beginning Jan. 1, 2019. Even with that announcement, the League and its coalition partners knew legislation was necessary.

The League, along with the Nebraska Retailers Association, met with the Department of Revenue to discuss the bill that implements the provisions of the *Wayfair* court decision. Although there may be changes that are needed down the road, **LB 291**, introduced by **Sen. Lou Ann Linehan** of Elkhorn, is the bill supported by the Nebraska Department of Revenue and the League.

LB 291 requires remote sellers (online retailers without a physical presence in our state) to collect and remit state and local sales tax if their retail sales in Nebraska exceed \$100,000 or their sales in Nebraska consist of 200 or more separate transactions. LB 291 also provides that retailers who operate "marketplaces" will be required to collect and remit sales tax.

So far, there are three additional bills dealing with the collection of online sales tax from out-of-state sellers, including: **LB 18 (Briese)** Adopt the Remote Seller Sales Tax Collection Act; **LB 284 (McCollister)** Adopt the Remote Seller and Marketplace Facilitator Act; and **LB 314 (Briese)** Adopt the Remote Seller Sales Tax Collection Act and change revenue and taxation provisions.

Passage of LB 291 increases revenue for the State of Nebraska and levels the playing field with our local brick and mortar retailers. Voters in over 220 cities and villages in Nebraska have enacted a local option sales tax and these municipalities would directly benefit from passage of LB 291. Of course, other municipalities without a local option sales tax also would benefit! LB 291 enables local retailers to be more competitive

with online retailers, which do not pay property taxes or contribute to local charities and community events.

The League will continue to update our members through the *Legislative Bulletin* on LB 291 including when the public hearing before the Revenue Committee is scheduled.

How to find out when a bill is scheduled for a public hearing

The weekly schedule of committee hearings is prepared for publication each Friday during session. The schedule is not available until after the Legislature adjourns for the day. The schedule is available in the Clerk of the Legislature's office and is published in the *Sunday*

Lincoln Journal Star, the *Sunday World Herald* and the *Unicameral Update*, the Legislature's weekly newsletter produced during session. The schedule also is included in the League's *Legislative Bulletin*.

LB 424: Land bank legislation introduced today

LB 424, introduced by **Sen. Dan Quick** of Grand Island, allows municipalities to join together to create land banks. Currently, only the city of Omaha has a land bank. In 2013, LB 97 was passed by the Legislature, which allowed the creation of land banks. Under that bill, only Omaha and cities in Sarpy County were authorized to create a land bank. Because of the success of the land bank in Omaha, many other municipalities have expressed interest in creating their own land banks.

With LB 424, any municipality may join with other municipalities to form a land bank using the

Interlocal Cooperation Act. The bill also allows municipalities to work with the Omaha land bank to provide administrative support. Many municipalities are looking forward to having this opportunity to create needed regional land banks to address the housing shortage in their communities!

Thanks to Sen. Quick for introducing this important piece of legislation! The League will continue to update its members through the *Legislative Bulletin* on when LB 424 is scheduled for its public hearing before the Urban Affairs Committee.

On-line sales tax bills to be heard Jan. 31

The Revenue Committee will hold its public hearing on three bills relating to on-line sales tax on Jan. 31. The three bills are:

LB 18 (Albion Sen. Tom Briese) Adopt the Remote Seller Sales Tax Collection Act;

LB 284 (Omaha Sen. John McCollister) Adopt the Remote Seller and Marketplace Facilitator Act; and,

LB 291 (Elkhorn Sen. Lou Ann Linehan) Change sales and use tax provisions.

One of the League's major legislative priorities this year is the collection of sales tax from on-line retailers. In 2018, the U.S. Supreme Court ruled in *South Dakota v. Wayfair* (2018) that states may charge sales tax on purchases made from out-of-state sellers, even if the seller does not have a physical presence in the state.

Shortly after the decision, the Nebraska Department of Revenue announced it would start collecting sales tax on out-of-state online retailers beginning Jan. 1, 2019. Even with that announcement, the League and its coalition partners knew legislation was necessary.

The League, along with the Nebraska Retailers Association, met with the Department of Revenue to discuss the bill that implements the provisions of the Wayfair court decision. Although there may be changes that are needed down the road, LB 291, introduced by Sen. Linehan, is the bill supported by the Nebraska Department of Revenue and the League.

LB 291 requires remote sellers (online retailers without a physical presence in our state) to collect and remit state and local sales tax if their retail sales in Nebraska exceed \$100,000 or their sales in

Nebraska consist of 200 or more separate transactions. LB 291 also provides that retailers who operate "marketplaces" will be required to collect and remit sales tax.

The League also will support LB 284, introduced by Sen. McCollister, which has similar provisions to LB 291.

The League will oppose LB 18 because it does not contain clarifying language that local option sales and use tax will be collected and remitted as provided under the Local Option Revenue Act. Also, LB 18 does not include retailers who operate "marketplaces."

Land bank bill scheduled for hearing Feb. 19

LB 424, introduced by **Sen. Dan Quick** of Grand Island, allows municipalities to join together to create land banks. Currently, only the city of Omaha has a land bank. In 2013, LB 97 was passed by the Legislature that allowed the creation of land banks. Under that bill, only Omaha and cities in Sarpy County were authorized to create a land bank. Because of the success of the land bank in Omaha, many other municipalities have expressed interest in creating their own land banks. With LB 424, any municipality may join with other municipalities to form a land bank using the Interlocal Cooperation Act. The bill also allows municipalities to work with the Omaha land bank to pro-

vide administrative support. Many municipalities are looking forward to having this opportunity to create needed regional land banks to address the housing shortage in their communities!

LB 103: League opposes additional requirements for passing a budget with a dollar amount more than the amount of taxes raised the previous year

On Jan. 24, the Revenue Committee held a hearing on **LB 103**, introduced by Elkhorn **Sen. Lou Ann Linehan**, Chair of the Revenue Committee. Sen. Linehan indicated that LB 103 would provide more transparency to the budget process. LB 103 states that *“when the annual assessment of property would result in an increase in the total property taxes levied by a county, municipality, school district, learning community, sanitary and improvement district, natural resources district, educational service unit, or community college, as determined using the previous year’s rate of levy, such political subdivision shall reduce its rate of levy for the current tax year so as to cause such rate of levy to produce no more than the amount of property taxes raised in the previous year and shall set its property tax request at the same amount as in the previous year unless...”* other requirements of the bill are complied with.

These requirements would include: 1) giving notice of the public hearing at least 30 days before the date of such hearing by the publication of a notice in at least one newspaper of general circulation in such political subdivisions AND in a prominent public location at which notices are regularly posted in the building where the governing body of the political subdivision regularly conducts its business; the notice would

have to meet size requirements and detailed information as provided in the bill; 2) the public hearing shall not be held at the same time as the annual budget hearing; and 3) if the governing body deems it necessary to increase the rate of levy and the property tax request more than the prior year, the governing body shall set the property tax request at an amount that would not exceed the lid on restricted funds in Sections 13-518 to 13-522 and/or the levy limit in Section 77-3442.

The League appreciates the fact that Sen. Linehan has indicated that she is willing to work with organizations opposing the bill. She stated in her opening remarks that the requirement to publish and post notice at least 30 days before the date of the hearing is not workable since political subdivisions receive the valuation number from the county on August 20 and need to certify their tax asking amount to the levying board by September 20. Sen. Linehan also is willing to work with the League and others to provide other options than publishing an expensive large notice in a newspaper of general circulation.

Thanks to the following organizations who testified with a **League representative** in strong opposition: **Kyle McGown**, representing the six largest educational groups (NASB, NSEA, School Admin-

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istrators, etc.); **Stephen Curtiss**, Finance Director, City of Omaha; **Greg Adams**, representing the Nebraska Community College Association; **Patrick Sullivan**, an attorney representing a number of SIDs and the City of Bellevue; and **Mark Johnson**, an attorney who also represents SIDs. The **City of Lincoln** and the **United Cities of Sarpy County** sent letters opposing the bill. Thanks to **Nancy Bryan**, Clerk/Treasurer of Stromsburg, for an excellent letter in opposition to the bill, which the League handed out to members of the Revenue Committee.

The Nebraska Association of County Officials testified in a neutral capacity.


