Internal Board Policies - Methods of OperationPublic Participation at Board MeetingsA. Attend

Members of the public shall be permitted to attend and to speak at board meetings. They will not be required to identify themselves as a condition for admission to the meeting.

The Board may allow advisors, consultants, and other persons who are not Board members to appear at the meeting via telephone or other similar means.

The chair has the authority to assure that people conduct themselves in an orderly manner at the meeting. Undue interruption or other interference with the orderly conduct of business will not be allowed. The chair may order persons who are disorderly to be removed from the meeting.

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B. Hear

The board will, upon request, make a reasonable effort to accommodate the public's right to hear the discussion and testimony presented at the meeting.

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C. Record

Members of the public may use recording devices (tape recorder, video camera, etc.) to record any part of a meeting of a public body, except for closed sessions. No recording, other than note taking, shall be done without informing the President in advance. The President shall control the placement of the recording device so the device does not obstruct the view of Board members or other members of the public attending the meeting and does not otherwise interfere with the meeting.

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D. Access to Written Materials

At least one copy of all reproducible written material to be discussed at an open meeting will be made available at the meeting for examination and copying by members of the public.

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E. Speak

Members of the public will be permitted to speak at Board meetings at which a public forum is on the Agenda. Members of the public may also speak when invited to make a presentation or when recognized by the chair. The Board is not required to allow members of the public to speak at each meeting. However, the Board will not forbid public participation at all meetings.

Members of the public will not be required to have their name be placed on the agenda prior to the meeting in order to speak about items on the agenda.

Members of the public who desire to address the Board will be required to identify themselves.

The President or chair for the meeting shall have the authority to establish reasonable time limits for individual speakers and for the duration of public forum sessions.

Speakers will be permitted to address the Board consistent with free speech rights. However, offensive language, defamatory remarks, and hostile conduct will not be tolerated. Further, charges or complaints against a school employee shall not be made for the first time at a public Board meeting without having followed the school's complaint procedure.

Consequently, the decision was made by the Election Commissioner to conduct the election through the mail-in process. Facing the largest mail-in election in the state, LPS took on a major communication effort to inform a voting base that exceeds 160,000. This idea started with discussions about the many jobs available in the industry and the need for schools to better inform students on the wide array of careers available in the industry--careers for all students, not just those with an interest in agriculture. The three school districts developed an interlocal agreement and partnered with four of the largest seed companies in Seward and York counties. All pooled resources and hired a part-time teacher to help develop the curriculum, a career fair, and to help with the logistics during the 2013-14 school year. The first official academy class begins in the 2014-15 school year.

The Teen CERT program trains teenagers in the following: 1) Extinguishing small fires; 2) Conducting light search and rescue; 3) Providing assistance to those who are injured; 4) Setting up medical treatment areas; 5) Assisting emergency responders; 6) Identifying and anticipating hazards; 7) Reducing fire hazards in the home and workplace; and 8) Helping reduce survivor stress (in the event of an emergency). In addition to learning about what has been accomplished, participants will have the opportunity to learn about the Bayard Public Schools' long-term plan to sustain this training to improve safety and readiness within the school community. This presentation will include perspectives from students, school administrators, and a public safety consultant.

A comprehensive Pyramid of Interventions that enable all students to be successful has been developed. Weekly HUDDLE meetings are held with high school counselors, administration, and the superintendent, where everyone makes commitments to one another for the upcoming week. We meet each individual at-risk student and focus on the relationship building process to re-engage them in school. E7 "IMPOSSIBLE" EXCELLENCE

Last year, two of the eight schools making up the Hastings Public Schools earned national recognition from two different organizations. Both earned this recognition by not letting their challenging demographics halt their efforts to produce academic excellence. The first school to earn such recognition was Alcott Elementary. Alcott was named a "National Model PLC School at Work" by All Things PLC in the spring of 2014. At the time, only one other school in Nebraska (Papillion-La Vista South High School), had earned this distinction. The second HPS school to earn national recognition was the Middle School. In the fall of 2014, the Middle School was named a "MetLife/NASSP Breakthrough School." The Middle School was the first school in Nebraska to earn such an award and one of only 80 schools in the nation to be so named. 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
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Dear Dr. Schroeder and School Board,


