Wakefield's Hassler Wins D-1 Berens Coaching Award

Leading his team to a 6-2 record with wins against state-ranked Lutheran High Northeast and GACC helped Wakefield head Coach Mike Hassler win the 2018 Berens Coaching Award for Class D-1.

Every night was a playoff night for Wakefield football again in 2018, and the Trojans made the most of them, going 6-2 with six straight wins to close out the season. Three of them against powerful teams like Lutheran High Northeast, Guardian Angels Central Catholic and Wisner-Pilger.

Even finishing 6-2 with all those quality wins would do the Trojans no good when it came time for the post-season as due to the school's student count the program was once again ineligible for the playoffs.

Didn't matter. Not to the players and not to Head Coach **Mike Hassler**, Huskerland's 2018 winner of the Class D-1 Berens Coaching Award.

"We had the potential to have a great season. The pieces were in place and we finally felt we had the culture in place to allow us to be successful on Friday Nights," says Coach Hassler. "I knew since we couldn't make the playoffs I needed to bring the playoffs to my boys so when I requested our non-district schedule for the new cycle I tried to think of the three toughest teams in our area, and that was Howells-Dodge, Lutheran High, and (eventual state champion) Creighton.

"I told the boys I believed we were good enough to play with anyone in the class, and if we wanted to be the best we needed to play and beat the best."

Wakefield lost its first two games, to state champion Creighton (62-38) and Howells-Dodge (26-16). The following week came that crazy 70-66 win over Lutheran High and later the win over GACC (38-22) and the season-ending victory over Wisner-Pilger (50-8).

"We had several important moments during the season and to me the first was losing a key player on our line a week before we opened against a really good Creighton team," says Coach Hassler. "We had to reshuffle our line on both sides of the ball and a couple players had to swallow their egos and make position changes, which they did without complaint. On top of that Esgar Godinez, our playmaker at running back, got a high ankle sprain in the first quarter of the Creighton game that hampered him all the way up to the GACC game. So because of a couple tough breaks we came out of the gate 0-2.

Things could have gone a couple of different ways for the Trojans at that point - there they sit, 0-2 with no hope of making the playoffs anyway - and the Wakefield team took the high road, avoiding internal conflict and putting together one of the most impressive winning streaks of the season.

"At that point a lot of guys could have started pointing fingers and blaming each other or we could pull together closer as a family and fight even harder," says Coach Hassler. "We held it together as a team and that led to the second key moment of the season, which was our score-fest against Lutheran High in the third game of the year. That was a huge win for us."

From that point on there was no stopping the Trojans as they finished the season a deceptively good 6-2 and ranked No. 4 in Class D-1 by *Huskerland Prep Report*.

"Every so often a team comes along that is just special and these boys were exactly that," says Coach Hassler. "It was the hardest it has ever been on me as a coach to see this season come to an end. We were having so much fun every day on the practice field and on Friday nights. When we walked off that field after the (regular season finale) Wisner-Pilger game we knew we had accomplished what we had set out to do."

As for winning the Berens Coaching Award, Hassler sees this award, and all others his team has soaked in since the end of the season, as the cherry on top of an unforgettable season of football.

"I am honored to receive the 2018 Berens Coaching Award for Class D-1. Success, accomplishments, and awards come because of the people you surround yourself with, and I've been very fortunate to have a lot of wonderful people in my life," says Coach Hassler. "I would put my coaching staff of **Mike Clay, Eric Burenheide**, and **Ryan Dougherty** up against any other in the class. My senior boys invested so much of their blood, sweat, and tears into this program, it will be hard to not see them in the huddle next year.

"And most importantly my wife, the football widow, who deserves credit for taking care of our daughter Laura and holding down the fort so I can invest my time and full effort into this football program. Without her making that sacrifice we wouldn't have accomplished what we did. I don't know if I can ever truly let her know how much I appreciate what she does every fall."

Superintendent's Report

December 8, 2018

- **1. Goal #1:** Wakefield Community School will provide students an education that develops relationships utilizing a relevant curriculum that infuses technology providing 21st Century learning for all students. (Curriculum, Americanism & Technology)
 - a. Last month I visited with you about my understanding of state statute 79-724 Americanism. The board is required to have an Americanism Committee of three individual appointed at the beginning of each year (January) that is responsible for insuring that the American historical experience is taught to all school children. "One of the first duties of our educational system is to conduct its activities, choose its textbooks and arrange its curriculum in such a way that the love of liberty, justice, democracy and America will be instilled in the hearts and minds of the youth of our state." I have attached a copy of the Americanism statute for your review.

The original policy was passed in 1949, during the time of McCarthyism in America. Our committee is not required to meet four times a year and may meet as frequently as it chooses and during times of social studies curriculum review. The policy also requires the school to hold various patriotic activities like Veterans Day, Presidents Day, Constitution Day and daily "Pledge of Allegiance" for grades k – 12 during the school year. After emailing Karen Haase, I am comfortable that the Wakefield's Board is in compliance with statute 79-724.

b. Heartland Counseling concluded school based counseling for sixth grade and ninth grade this year. The sixth grade students received drug education using the Lion's Quest curriculum and the ninth grade received drug education through the "Prime for Life" curriculum. Lion's Quest curriculum targets basic development of goals and decision making relate to healthy choices in regards to alcohol, tobacco, and other drugs, as well as basic education related to health, interpersonal and legal/punitive consequences regarding the use of these drugs.

The 9th grade counseling services using "Prime for Life" targets basic concepts about the development and prevention of development of alcohol and drug related problems including but not limited to drug addiction, alcoholism, legal/punitive consequences, health impacts and other factors. I have attached copies of the pre and post survey results and their summary conducted by Heartland reflecting our students score differences. 96% of sixth grades reflect positive growth in their understanding of the curriculum. The ninth grade survey reflect 79% growth in students participating in the program.

- **2. Goal #2:** Wakefield Community School will make an efficient use of all resources. (Business & Finance)
 - a. The budget for December reflects that the district is 3.58% under budget for the year. Local General Fund tax receipts in was \$102,398. General Fund balances as of December 1, 2018 are General Fund \$1,073,119; Depreciation Fund \$574,350; Employee Benefit Fund \$28,504; Lunch Fund \$147,060; Bond Fund \$38,760; Special Building Fund \$682,891; Qualified Capital Purchase Undertaking Fund (QCPUF) \$179,602; Interim Fund \$4,768 and Student Fees Fund is \$6,218. Total unencumbered funds all funds is \$2,735,276. Comparing our general fund percent of budget remaining we are at 77.74% compared to the previous year of 78.05%
- **3. Goal #3:** Wakefield Community School will facilitate communication with staff, parents, patrons, and students (Public and Personnel Relations)
 - a. The Wakefield Allen Softball Survey was reviewed by the Wakefield Allen Joint Special Committee on Cooperative Athletics. Students in grades 4 10 were surveyed six questions. Examining Fall Sports the girls 52.9% currently participate in volleyball. 2% of the girls participate in football and 44.9% did not participate in a fall sport. The third question asked student interest in softball as a fall high school sport and if they had participated in summer softball in the past, which years they participated. 85% of the girls did not participate in summer softball. 4th grade 42 girls played softball, 5th grade 31 girls participated, 6th grade 24 girls played softball, 7th grade 17 girls participated in softball, 8th grade 8 girls played softball, 9th grade 4 girls played summer softball and no 10th grade girls played softball.

The fourth survey question is "Do you plan to continue to play softball during the summers? Responses were 45% would not play softball, definitely yes was 16.7%, Not planning to continue is 20.3%, while 13% of students stated they might play and 4% did not know if they would play softball.

The fifth question involved rating their commitment to playing softball in the fall while in high school. 45% of the students do not plan to play softball, 27% were unsure, 16% thought they might try out for softball, while 5% were pretty sure they would participate every year, and 6.5% were definitely planning to play softball every year (9 students). I have enclosed a copy of the survey results for your review.

The sixth question asked the question about Wakefield – Allen adding softball team, which would play in the fall available to students starting their 9th grade year, which sport would you play. The results were 48.6% plan to play volleyball, 14.5% would

plan to play softball and 13.8% were unsure if they would play a sport and 19.6% would not play a sport.

§ 79-724. American citizenship; committee on Americanism; created; duties; required instruction; patriotic exercises; duties of officers.

An informed, loyal, just, and patriotic citizenry is necessary to a strong, stable, just, and prosperous America. Such a citizenry necessitates that every member thereof be fully acquainted with the nation's history and that he or she be in full accord with our form of government and fully aware of the

liberties, opportunities, and advantages of which we are possessed and the sacrifices and struggles of those through whose efforts these benefits were gained. Since youth is the time most susceptible to the acceptance of principles and doctrines that will influence men and women throughout their lives, it is one of the first duties of our educational system to conduct its activities, choose its textbooks, and arrange its curriculum in such a way that the love of liberty, justice, democracy, and America will be instilled in the hearts and minds of the youth of the state.

- (1) Every school board shall, at the beginning of each school year, appoint from its members a committee of three, to be known as the committee on Americanism. The committee on Americanism shall:
 - (a) Carefully examine, inspect, and approve all textbooks used in the teaching of American history and civil government in the school. Such textbooks shall adequately stress the services of the men and women who achieved our national independence, established our constitutional government, and preserved our union and shall be so written to include contributions by ethnic groups as to develop a pride and respect for our institutions and not be a mere recital of events and dates;
 - (b) Assure themselves as to the character of all teachers employed and their knowledge and acceptance of the American form of government; and
 - (c) Take all such other steps as will assure the carrying out of the provisions of this section.
- (2) All American history courses approved for grade levels as provided by this section shall include and adequately stress contributions of all ethnic groups (a) to the development and growth of America into a great nation, (b) to art, music, education, medicine, literature, science, politics, and government, and (c) to the war services in all wars of this nation.
- (3) All grades of all public, private, denominational, and parochial schools, below the sixth grade, shall devote at least one hour per week to exercises or teaching periods for the following.

purpose:

(a) The recital of stories having to do with American history or the deeds and exploits of American heroes;

(b) The singing of patriotic songs and the insistence that every pupil memorize the Star-Spangled Banner and America; and

(c) The development of reverence for the flag and instruction as to proper conduct in its

presentation.

(4) In at least two of the three grades from the fifth grade to the eighth grade in all public, private, denominational, and parochial schools, at least three periods per week shall be set aside to be devoted to the teaching of American history

from approved textbooks, taught in such a way as to make the course interesting and attractive and to develop a love of country.

(5) In at least two grades of every high school, at least three periods per week shall be devoted to the teaching of civics, during which courses specific attention shall be given to the following

matters:

(a) The United States Constitution and the

Constitution of Nebraska;

(b) The benefits and advantages of our form of government and the dangers and fallacies of Nazism, Communism, and similar ideologies, and

(c) The duties of citizenship, including active participation in the improvement of a citizen's community, state, country, and world and the value and practice of civil discourse between

opposing interests.

- (6) Appropriate patriotic exercises suitable to the occasion shall be held under the direction of the superintendent in every public, private de nominational, and parochial school on Lincoln's birthday, Washington's birthday, Flag Day, Memorial Day, and Veterans Day, or on the day preceding or following such holiday, if the school is in session.
- (7) Every school board, the State Board of Education, and the superintendent of each school district in the state shall be held directly responsible in the order named for carrying out this section, and neglect thereof by any employed appointed official shall be considered a dereliction of duty and cause for dismissal.

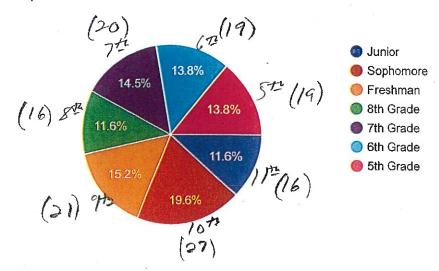


Softball Survey---Wakefield-Allen

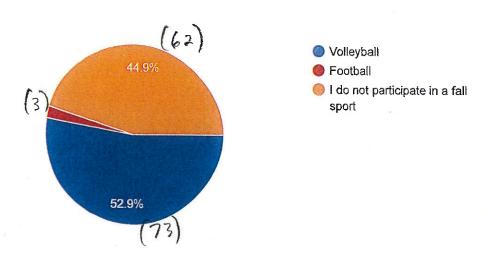
What grade are you in school?

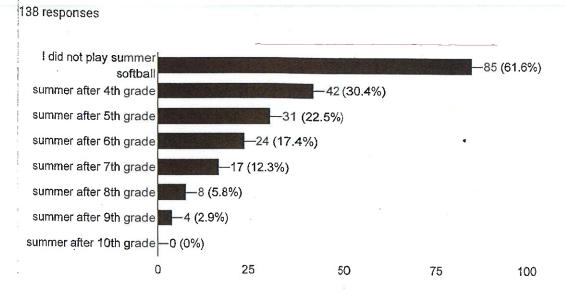


Which fall sport do you currently participate in?

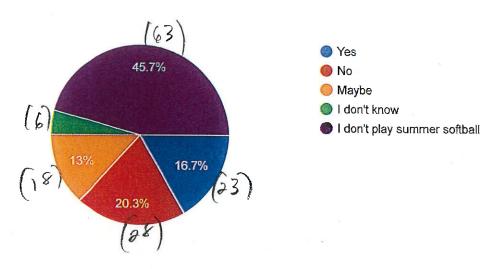


Wakefield and Allen schools are examining student interest in softball as a fall sport in high school. If you have played summer softball in the past, in which years did you play? (Mark all the apply)



Do you plan to play to continue to play softball during the summers?

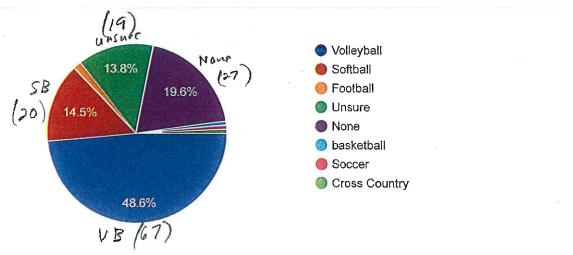

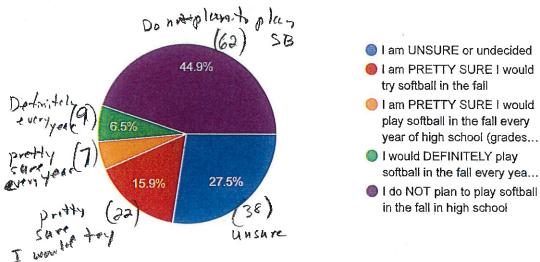
their 9th grade year. When you become a 9th grader (or older), which fall sport do you think you would be interested in?

Welcome to December. Another State Education Conference is in the books. 1,200 people ascended upon La Vista one final time for a week of learning, networking and engagement amongst peers.

With the November elections behind us, roughly 400 individuals will be starting their first term as locally elected school board members in January. NASB conducted New Board Member Workshops in five locations within the past few weeks in Gering, North Platte, Grand Island, Norfolk and La Vista teaching participants all they're in store for.

We now know the makeup of the Legislature as well. What has technically already begun with retreats in Nebraska City in mid-November, the 2019 Legislative Session official kicks off on Wednesday, January 9th for the 90-day session.

ELEMENTARY PRINCIPAL REPORT

- Students participated in the annual Halloween Parade through the senior center and along Main Street.
- 4-6 graders participated in a fall celebration.

SECONDARY PRINCIPAL REPORT

- During the Nov. 12 faculty meeting, we began to "dig deeper" into the Pre-ACT data, as well as discussed ACT prep activities.
- We are now able to use iPads for MAP testing, which means we can test all students at one time.
- The football team completed their season with a record of 6-2, and undefeated in district play. The volleyball team finished 13-17. Winter Sports practices began Nov. 12, with 15 wrestlers, 23 boys basketball players and 29 in girls basketball.
- Wakefield School hosted the annual Veteran's Day Program on Monday, Nov. 12 at 9:00 in the main gym. The program was followed by the monthly community club meeting, held in the multipurpose room.

• The One-Act did their public performance on Nov. 10. The Conference One-Act competition is at Ponca on Nov. 13. They will also be performing for the student body on Nov. 21. District Competition is at Stanton on Nov. 27.

SUPERINTENDENT REPORT

- The career and technical education committee met last week reviewing Wakefield's reVision action plan approved by NDE. Examining the CTE programs as well as community feedback out CTE programs will 1) align all CTE classes with Nebraska Career Readiness Standards; 2) Provide student with real-world work/career experiences; and 3) Prepare students for high demand, high skilled occupations that require some college, no degree or a higher level of educational attainment than high school. Initial team discussion focused on expanding career readiness skills through job shadowing activities, career preparation skills and by developing business leader mentorship and internships for our students. The team discussed possibly initiating a junior and senior interview day.
- Last Wednesday Allen and Wakefield conducted a softball survey of girls in fifth through eleventh grades. A total of 138 girls participated in the survey. Survey data will be presented to the Allen-Wakefield Board Special Committee for review and discussion. Both boards will review the data at their December board meetings.
- NSAA Region 3 meeting was held in Norfolk on Wednesday. Mr. Brenn and Mr. Clay presented
 a proposal to adjust eight-man numbers with a calculation for poverty percentages for schools
 above the 50 percentile. Region 3 proposed NSAA conduct a nine-man football classification
 study. The addition of 9-man football would enable those C-2 schools an opportunity to continue
 junior varsity programs that are struggling to participate in 11-man due to low participation
 numbers.

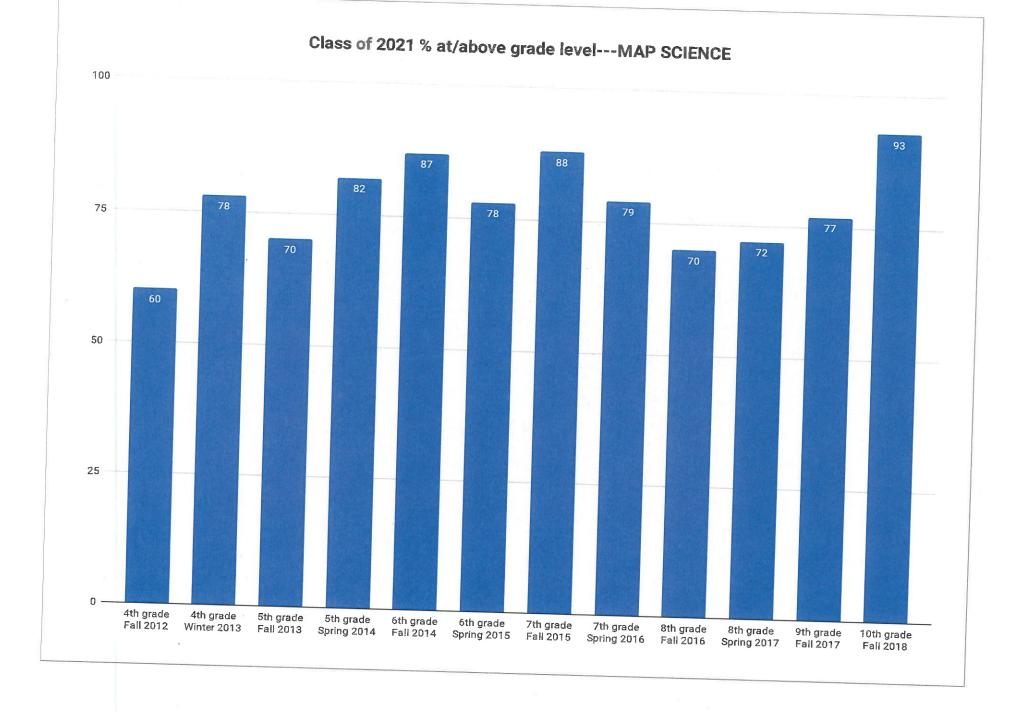




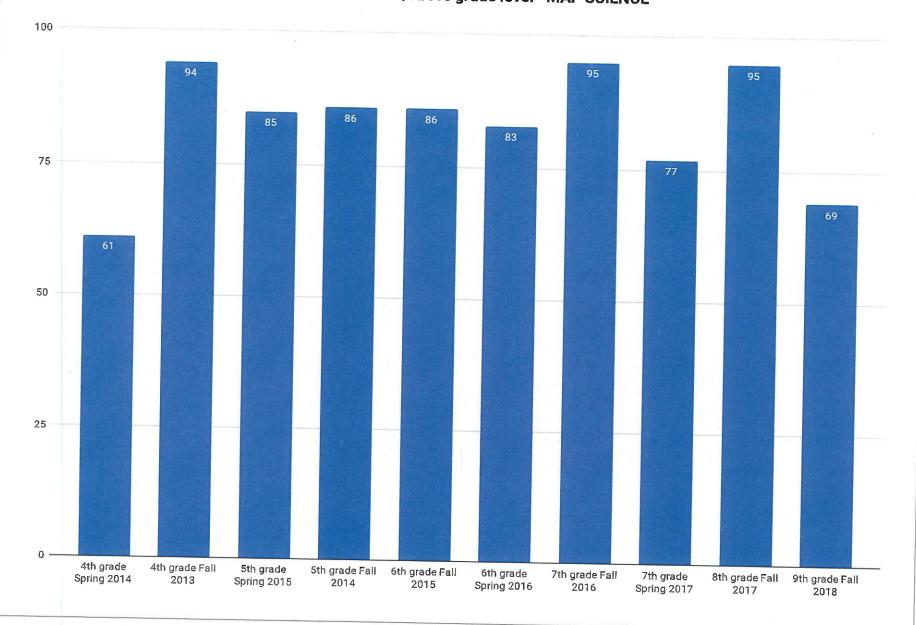


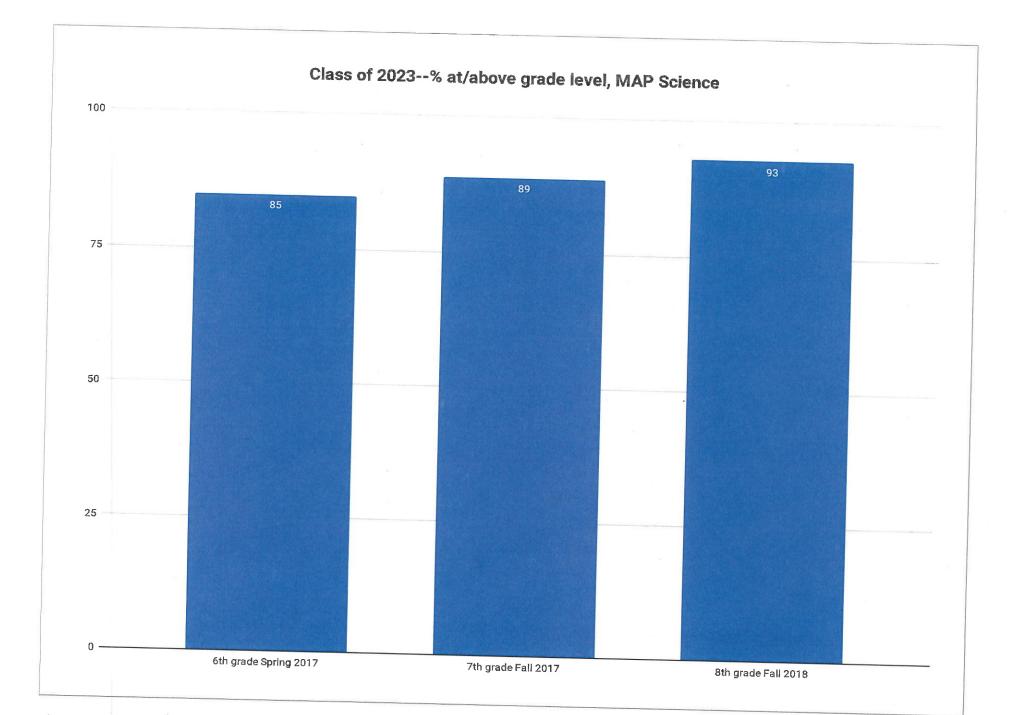
Class of 2020 % at/above grade level---MAP SCIENCE

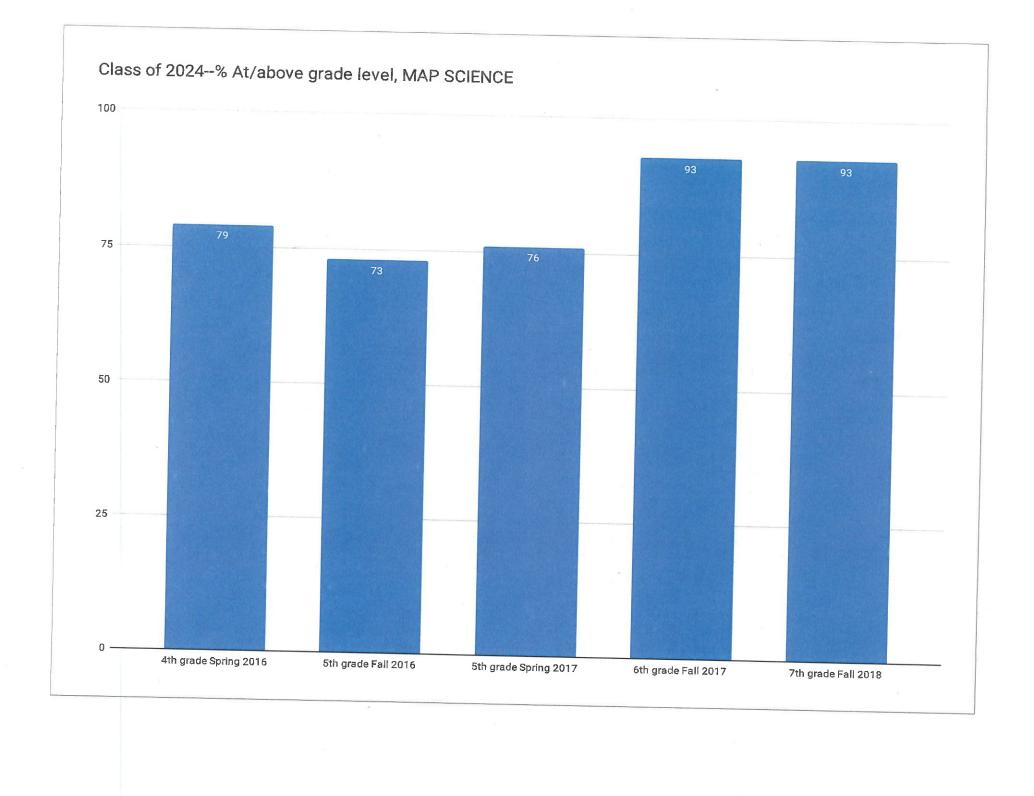




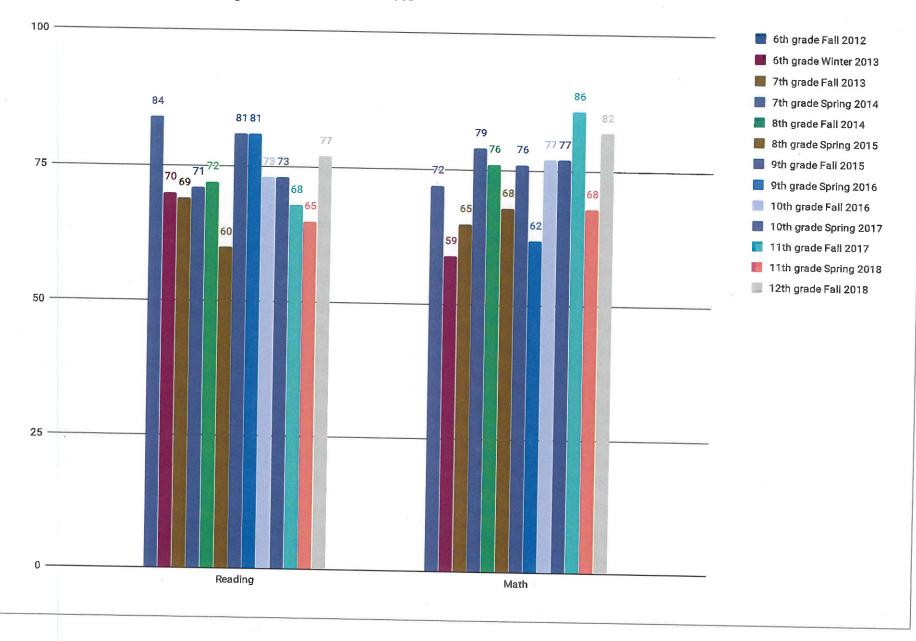


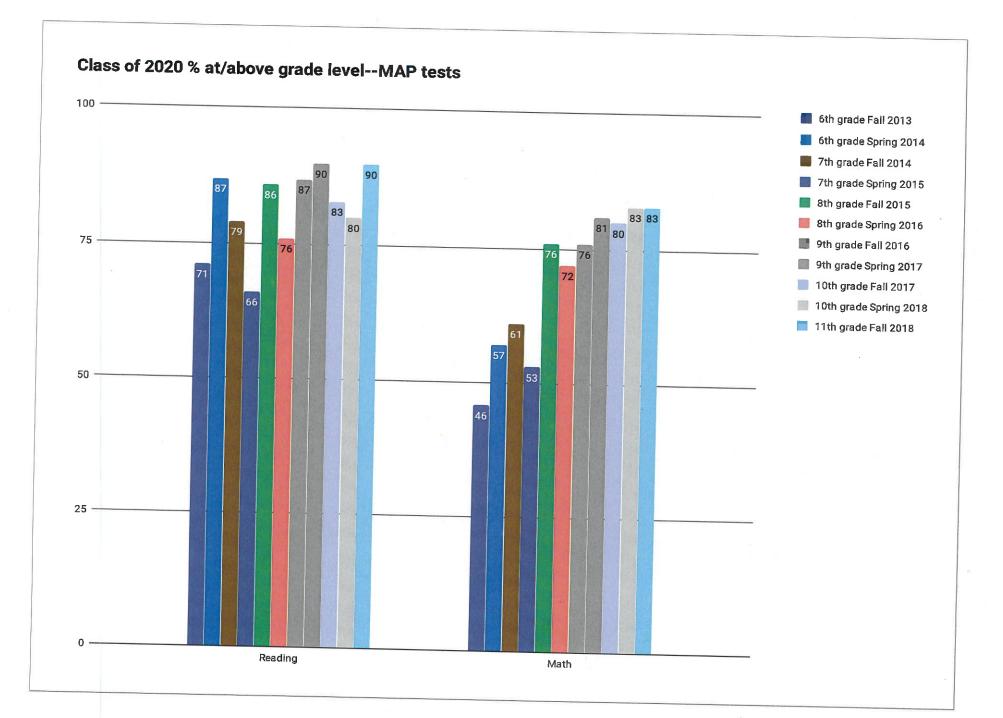






Class of 2019 % at/above grade level--MAP tests
