NWEA Testing: We completed NWEA testing with freshman and sophomore students. Our students completed assessments in reading, math, language, and science. We saw impressive growth from the fall to the spring in many of these areas. A big thank you to Mr. Williams for his efforts to coordinate the logistics of the NWEA assessments and to our staff who administered the tests. NWEA testing results are critical elements of our balanced assessment plan. Student performance on these assessments provides important indicators of student growth, improvement and intervention needs.

ACT Results: We are really encouraged from the results that we have received so far on ACT testing. We are still waiting for official results but we are adding 13 new students to our 28 plus portion of the Wall of Academic Distinction.

Freshman Transition Activity: We had freshman students from Seward Middle School, Our Redeemer, and St. John's at Seward High School the afternoon of Wednesday, May 1st for transition activities. We began by leading a processional into the gym similar to what the students will experience in four years during their graduation ceremony. They were seated in a graduation formation for some welcoming remarks. The students then experienced lunch at Seward High School prior to getting a tour of the building, learning about academic planning, activities, and athletics at Seward High School. Current SHS students along with counselors, teachers, and administration were involved in the transition activities. The goal of the event was to help our students to feel as comfortable as possible with the transition to Seward High School. We will have our annual freshman orientation night in August.

PRIDE Rally: The fourth pride rally was on Tuesday, May 7th to include our seniors before they departed. We honored many great students from clubs, academics, to character, and activities. It was a great day to be a Jay!

Graduation: The Seward High School graduation will take place at 2:00 p.m. on Sunday, May 12th. As of right now we have 101 students slated to walk. The structure of the ceremony will be similar to previous SHS graduations. Please let us know if you are planning to attend.

Here's what has been going on in the Special Services office since the beginning of April:

The following reports/activities were completed:

- -ESSA Title 1A Non Public Schools Consultation meeting and NDE report uploaded for review
- -Special Education Non Public School Consultation meeting with St. John's, St. Vincent's and Our Redeemer
- -Seward County Sixpence Grant written with ESU #6 staff and uploaded for NDE review
- -Special Education Post -School Outcomes report completed and uploaded for NDE review
- -IDEA MOE (Maintenance of Effort) Compliance Standard report completed and uploaded for NDE review

Professional Development news:

On April 30th to May 4th, I attended the Young Children Conference in New York, along with Katie Radcliffe and Morgan Wiesner-Kozisek, our Sixpence Home Visiting staff.

The content presented at this conference included Mindfulness in the Classroom, Becoming Digital in the World of Early Childhood, Becoming Trauma Smart, Using Children's Literature to Introduce STEAM into the Curriculum, ACEs (Adverse Childhood Experiences) and Trauma Treatment, and STEM activities for the EC classrooms.

Our state level Sixpence consultant recommended my attendance at the conference and I greatly appreciated this opportunity. The topics covered aligned directly to our new strategic plan as well!

New End of the Year Activities:

The special education Extended School Year (ESY) service budget has been drafted and approved. Special education staff members will serve fifty-five students ages birth to 19 this summer. Three less students will be served this year compared to last year and due to a decision to not contract for a service the cost is roughly \$4800 less. These services greatly impact the success of specific students' transition from home based services to preschool center-based services, grade level to grade level, or building-to-building. Our dedicated staff members understand this and because of that dedication we have not had to look outside of our usual staff for individuals to cover ESY services. That is not that case for many districts.

Other end of the year "to do items "include 1) the required Annual ELL Program review which is set for May 13th and 2) the completion of the PEAK grant application which is due May 17th.

The ELL program review provides the opportunity to review ELL services and needs. I'm pleased to share that we just received our ELPA 21 results for this school year and of the 6 students evaluated, 50% have now officially tested out of ELL services for the coming year. Mrs. Jocelyn Gray has provided services to our ELL students and her efforts have truly impacted these students.

We will be on our third year of the special education PEaK (Positive Engagement and Knowledge project) grant next year. This grant has provided us the opportunity to bring in Dr. Tina Bogran to the district for professional development focused on the Marzano Instructional framework twice and the opportunity for the development of an MTSS (Multi Tiered System of Support) team that has attended a total of 7 days of training on implementing the MTSS initiative. Looking forward to the 2019-2020 grant year, the focus will be on attendance at more MTSS trainings, and the opportunity to bring Dominique Smith, a national speaker on social-emotional mental health topics, to the District in October.

In closing, once again I have attached the current student counts for all special service programs below. At this time there are still **10** special education referrals yet to complete and all of them are Birth to Age Five referrals! Let me know if you have any questions.

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May 2019 Board Report for Curriculum and Staff Development

Board Members,

April was busy with testing at all levels. We started off with ACT at the high school which was executed very well by SHS staff and administration and the students were focused and ready to go! We then completed the NSCAS at the elementary and middle school level and we are wrapping up with the NWEA at the middle and elementary school. We also had great engagement from students, staff, and administration with these tests. I am thankful for the great colleagues I work with that work to ensure all students have the opportunity for success with these tests.

Curriculum

I will be providing you an overview of our proposed health education materials for your review as well as a continuum for Human Growth and Development. One of our hopes for the health materials was that there would be information to support teachers with social and emotional health. Materials at all levels meet this goal as well as provide support to teachers in the area of physical health, nutrition, etc. The Human Growth and Development units are very similar to past years and we will be using some of the same materials. Our recommendation takes into account the recommendations of the committee while also considering the needs of our community. The scope and sequence and the materials for these units will be provided to you for your review.

Instruction

We are wrapping up year one with the new teacher evaluation system. We have some fine tuning to do, but overall, we are very pleased with how the year went. The model has put emphasis on our instructional model and understanding the model at a very deep level. We are having great conversations about teaching and learning and our teachers are getting the opportunity to self-reflect on their teaching and identify strengths and weaknesses of the lesson. Our evaluation committee will meet this summer to make minor adjustments to the evaluation model.

Staff Development

Our last PLC meetings were held this week. For the most part, these meetings were celebration meetings, where teachers shared their reflections and celebrations from their

teacher evaluation goals. This was a great opportunity to highlight our successes and share with each other ideas to consider for future years when it comes to teacher evaluation goals. Teachers were also given a PLC survey where they were able to provide feedback on the PLC process. We will share this feedback with the administration team and make any revisions needed over the summer.

Assessment

As stated above, we have been busy in the area of assessment. While these tests are one small measure of our success, they are an important tool to give us information about our programs, curriculum, and the individual needs of each child.

Now compare a fireworks show to many lectures, sales presentations and customer service experiences. They often start off strong but instead of ending with a bang, they fizzle. The sales presentation that has a great hook in the beginning but doesn't leave a lasting impression at the end. The speech that makes you glad it's over instead of making you want to hear more. The restaurant server who makes a great first impression but is nowhere to be found when you want to pay the bill and leave. The teacher who fails to inspire his students to take action at the end of the lesson. The hotel that welcomes you when you arrive but ignores you when you leave. The store that has great merchandise but fails to create a memorable experience. The examples are numerous but the solution is simple. Whatever your job or business add some fireworks to your work. Think of ways you can create a grand finale and leave a lasting impression. Finish your speech or sales presentation with a bang and give your audience a reason to clap at the end. Americanism Board Report 2018-2019

Board Members.

The Americanism Committee met on 4-17-19 at Seward Middle School to discuss the current curriculum and where American Civics are taught at various grade levels. You will find detailed information about civics instruction in the report below. We also discussed the implications of the new American Civics Law and here are a few points what we discussed:

- 1) Next year, at the beginning of the year, the school board must appoint form its members a committee of three, to be known as the committee on American Civics.
- 2) This committee will hold no fewer than two public meetings annually with at least one where public testimony is accepted. Minutes will be kept at these meetings showing the time and place of the meeting and details of all matters discussed.
- 3) The committee will examine the social studies curriculum and ensure it is aligned to the standards.
- 4) We also discussed the mandate that one of three assignments must be given to students prior to the completion of 8th grade and 12th grade. The choices are the Naturalization test, attendance at a meeting of a public body, or a project/paper on a person or event commemorated by a holiday.

Elementary:

- Stories are read and/or shared about American heroes and famous Americans from the
 past such as Washington, Lincoln, etc. These Stories may be part of a unit within our
 reading series, a selected instructional theme by the teacher, related to the time of year
 (for example, Presidents' Day in February), a study of reading genre such as
 biographies, etc.
- Students are taught the Star-Spangled Banner and America in music classes in addition to performing American folk songs on guitar and voice and doing American folk dances.
- Third Grade holds a patriotic music program every other year
- The pledge of allegiance is recited in each classroom every morning followed by the school rules.
- American History and government are taught in 4th grade, as is Nebraska history and the study of our state government.
- Every other year we have a Veteran's Day assembly/program. We honor all veterans of every branch of the military in Seward County.
- Presidents' Day is a topic for instruction in February.
- The components of citizenship are always taught throughout our school wide behavior program and through our daily expectations of our students, i.e. how we treat each other, respect or our flag and the meaning of the stars and stripes, etc.
- Constitution Day is recognized on September 17th, per board policy.

- Students in 3rd grade participate in a Wax Museum which involves researching and giving an oral presentation about a famous historical figure
- Students in 2nd grade learn about the history of the American flag.







Further, sexuality education materials, including instructional strategies and activities, must not use shame or fear based tactics.
