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A meeting of the Mayor and Council of the City of Bellevue was called to order by Mayor Rusty Hike at the Bellevue City Hall on the 5th day of November, 2019, at 6:00 p.m. Present were Council Members Bob Stinson, Paul Cook, Pat Shannon, Don Preister, Thomas Burns, and Kathy Welch. Absent: None.

Notice of this meeting was given in advance thereof by publication in the Bellevue Leader and posting in two public places, the designated method for giving notice and was also given to the Mayor and all members of the City Council. A copy of the affidavit of publication, the certificate of posting, and the council's acknowledgment of receipt of notice are hereby attached to these minutes. All proceedings shown hereafter were taken while the convened meeting was open to the public.

Pledge of Allegiance and Invocation

Mayor Hike led in the Pledge of Allegiance. Reverend Darryl Keeney, Lighthouse Baptist Church, 3919 Green Avenue, gave the invocation.

Open Meetings Act

Mayor Hike announced a copy of the Open Meetings Act is posted in the entry to the City Council Chambers.

Approval of the Agenda

Motion was made by Shannon, seconded by Burns, to approve the agenda.

Roll call vote on the motion was as follows: Stinson, Cook, Shannon, Preister, Burns, and Welch voted yes; voting no: none. Motion carried.

Approval of the Consent Agenda

Councilman Cook removed Agenda Items 16b, 16c, 16d, 16e, 16f, and 16g from the Consent Agenda.

<u>Motion</u> was made by Cook, seconded by Preister, to approve the amended consent agenda which included the following: approval of the Minutes from the October 15, 2019, City Council meeting; acknowledge receipt of the Minutes from the October 21, 2019 Board of Adjustment meeting; acknowledge receipt of the Minutes from the October 24, 2019 Planning Commission Meeting; and Approval of Claims. Mr. Rich Severson, Finance Director, stated he knew there were some concerns with the debt acquired with the recent annexations. This is an opportunity to take the higher priced debt because a SID does not have a double A plus rating and the ability to obtain the low interest rates the city has.

Ordinance No. 3976: Request to annex Lot 37, Orchard Valley. Applicant: City of Bellevue. (Land Use Planner)

Ordinance No. 3976, an ordinance to annex to the City of Bellevue, Sarpy County, Nebraska, certain lands, lots, and real estate lying within Lot 37, Orchard Valley, to the City of Bellevue, Sarpy County, Nebraska, and designating an effective date, was read by title only for the second time and presented for public hearing.

Mayor Hike opened the meeting to a public hearing to give opportunity for individuals to speak in favor of or in opposition to the application.

No one in the audience came forth to speak in support of or in opposition to the application. Mayor Hike declared the public hearing closed.

Mayor Hike stated the third and final reading of the ordinance will be at the Council meeting on November 19th.

Ordinance No. 3977: An Ordinance to amend Section 2-28 of the Bellevue City Code pertaining to executive sessions.

Ordinance No. 3977, an ordinance to amend Section 2-28 of the Bellevue Municipal Code pertaining to executive sessions of the City of Council; to repeal such Section as heretofore existing; and to provide an effective date of this ordinance, was read by title only for the second time and presented for public hearing.

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Mayor Hike opened the meeting to a public hearing to give opportunity for individuals to speak in favor of or in opposition to the application.

Ms. Bree Robbins, City Attorney, thanked the public for coming and for the feedback provided in emails and on social media. Tonight, she would like to address Ordinances No. 3977 and No. 3978 together. Ordinance No. 3977 pertains to closed session. Currently under Nebraska Law, Statute 84-1410 provides that public bodies can go into closed session. It is something that is routinely used in City Council meetings and other public body settings. The rules for closed session are all outlined in Statute 84-1410. It talks about what you can and cannot discuss in closed session. There is a lot case law which discusses topics for consideration in closed session. At any point in closed session, if you go above and beyond what the motion was for going into closed session, any Council Member can and should stop the conversation. It will then go out of closed session. This is important to remember, because when going into closed session, a public body is not talking about things outside of what that topic was to go into closed session. Additionally, there has to be a vote from City Council to even go into closed session. If City Council does not vote to go into closed session, then there would not be a closed session on that matter. Additionally, it is important to remember when in closed session, according to State law, you cannot take a vote. The City practices this and follows this continually. There are no votes occurring in closed session and there are no conversations about how votes are going to take place in closed session. There are no polls trying to figure out who is going to vote which way. If the item is an action item on the agenda, that warrants a vote, when coming out of closed session, the item will be voted on when coming out of closed session. If it is an action item, on the agenda for a vote, any Council member can discuss and disclose what occurred in closed session. If it is not an action item, such as a personnel matter or real estate negotiation, which are meant to be confidential as provided for in Statute. It is also currently provided for in City Code 2-28. The City Code states the information should be confidential and can only be disclosed upon a vote of the City Council. The City Code has not been changed; it is already confidential information. The issue is what happens if someone breaks the rule. If there is no set consequence, then people can break rules. Ordinance No. 3977 states if there is a breech in confidentially, it could be something that could be considered as misconduct under the other ordinance. This is the only change, the reasoning for the ordinance has not been changed, as it is already confidential. Additionally, there have been some concerns if laws are broken or if there is whistle blowing, if someone will be punished for it. There are already separate laws that account for this. If there is any criminal act happening in a closed session, whistle blowing, or a complaint is filed due to something unethical happening in closed session, there are laws that account for that. Any City Council member would be able to do that, there would be no sanction for that, as it is already accounted for in law. There is no breeching any of those rights afforded to any of the members on the Council.

Ms. Robbins referred to Ordinance No. 3978 regarding misconduct. There have been some comments heard that the ordinance is illegal and is taking away the rights of the voters. She assured the City has done their due diligence in looking at the law, city code, and other cities to try to create the best form of this ordinance. The City is taking into consideration the input received and will continue to do so. The State law allowing the City Council to pass the ordinance is Section 16-217. Nebraska revised statute has already been passed by the Nebraska Legislature. The first sentence states "A city of the first class by ordinance may provide for the removal of elective officials of the city for misconduct". The ordinance provides for filling vacancies if there is a removal from office. The vacancy is filled pursuant to Section 32-568 in State Statue.

Ms. Robbins explained when she was asked to look at this ordinance by Administration and by a Council Member, the first thing she did was to look at the law to see if it was something the City could do. If it wasn't something the City could do and the law did not support, nothing would have been done. There is a State Statute in place supporting the ordinance. Both Fremont and Grand Island have already passed ordinances that are currently on their books that provide for this exact measure. The only thing the City of Bellevue is doing is requiring a unanimous vote instead of a three-fourths vote. The City is also outlining what misconduct means so there is not a vague understanding of what misconduct is. This is the only thing that has changed from the other two cities that have this ordinance pursuant to Nebraska law.

Ms. Robbins advised she personally spoke with Mr. Frank Daley, Nebraska Accountability and Disclosure Commission. Together they reviewed Statute 16-217 together and had an in-depth conversation. Mr. Daley agreed the statute would provide any city of the first class with the ability to remove someone from office as poor misconduct is outlined in the statute. The proposed ordinance is in compliance with all Nebraska law. There is a section in the proposed ordinance that would allow for a hearing of misconduct to allow the hearing to go into closed session. Ms. Robbins suggested if the City Council approves the ordinance on third reading, the ordinance should be amended to remove that provision. Feedback was received this may cause unnecessary public embarrassment for minor complaints that could be handled in a different manor. Ms. Robbins recommended removing this language so if there is a hearing on misconduct so the hearing could happen in an open public forum. If it is not removed and there is a closed session, again no action would be taken inside closed session. The ordinance as written and as implemented if the City Council passes it, the Mayor, City Administrator, and City Attorney would have no power or authority to remove any official from office. The City Administrator's role is specifically outlined in the proposed ordinance and Policy Resolution. It amounts to receiving and processing the complaints and setting the matters for hearing before City Council. The City Administrator has no other authority, the City Administrator is not voting, the City Administrator is not removing anybody from office. Administrator processes the complaints, puts the complaints before the City Council, and the City Council will make the decision after the hearing if there is a sanction that is warranted. Additionally, the vote is set up to allow for a unanimous vote of all remaining Council members. If there is a Council Member at the hearing, it would take five votes to pass, if there was any type of sanction. The Mayor would not vote or

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be a tie breaker vote. The Mayor has no power in removing an elected official. Under 16-217, the City has the ability to craft this ordinance to provide for removal. This has been done in a way to where the Mayor or City Administrator is not removing anybody. The role the City Attorney would have in any of this, is asking questions at the hearing. This would allow evidence to be presented and allow everyone involved to present their side of the story. Nobody in the administration is removing or could remove anyone from city office. It would be up to the City Council to reach this decision.

Councilman Shannon questioned if the public could address both Ordinance No. 3977 and Ordinance No. 3978 during the public hearing.

Mayor Hike opened the meeting to a public hearing to give opportunity for individuals to speak in favor of or in opposition of Ordinance No. 3977 and Ordinance No. 3978.

Ms. Sarah Centineo, was present to speak on both ordinances. She stated the idea the people who would be accusing the City Council Members or Mayor would be sitting as jurors to decide on guilt or innocence. To have your accuser to decide if your guilty or innocent is contrary to how the democratic process works. This is unfair and there is no independent investigation. Other concerns are there is no outline or timeline on the proceedings. There is no clarification on who you cannot talk to after a closed session meeting. Another concern Ms. Centineo has is who would pay for the attorney for the person being accused. Ms. Centieno would like examples of how this process has worked in Fremont and Grand Island.

Councilman Shannon mentioned the Nebraska State Constitution Section 1-6 refers to trials. It states under a civil trial it requires conviction by a five/sixth majority. Therefore, the two cities the proposed ordinance is modeled after are in violation of the Constitution because they only require 75%. Ms. Centineo mentioned this is why she asked how the process has played out in the two cities. She inquired why the surrounding cities such as Ralston, Papillion, or Omaha, or cities in the Metro Area have not used this process.

Ms. Robbins mentioned the reason all cities may not use this process is they may not know it exist. Additionally, Section 16-217 refers to cities of the first class. Omaha is not a city of the first class, as it is a city of the metropolitan class. Lincoln is a city of the primary class. These cities are not of the same class. Ms. Robbins referred to the case, Shere vs. Wade County. This case refers to discipline. The accuser is also the judge and the executioner. The Supreme Court found in discipline type settings it is perfectly fine to be the accuser, the judge, and the executioner. There would need to be a hearing and a fair process and a right to potentially to appeal if they don't agree with that decision.

Ms. Centineo commented sometimes when things are legal, they aren't always the right thing to do. Ms. Robbins replied she feels this ordinance should be done, but it is not her decision. It is the City Council's decision. She explained she was asked if this is something the City is able to do under the law and it is absolutely something that can be done. She suggested if a person does not agree with it, she urges them to contact their Senator and deal with it under the Legislature. She advised this was passed in 1994 and has been reviewed and amended several times. The provision allowing cities of the first class allowing them to make an ordinance has not been struck or changed. Ms. Centineo questioned if it has been challenged. Ms. Robbins replied she is unclear if it has.

Ms. Robbins reiterated what the City of Bellevue is currently doing is absolutely legal, as there is a law in place.

Mr. Chuck Fredrick spoke in opposition of the proposed ordinance. He commented if people vote you in, they should be the ones to vote you out.

Mr. Jim Moudry stated he agrees with the item addressed this evening with the exception of the City Administrator only role within this ordinance is to process the charge. He mentioned under Section 3a. of the proposed ordinance it states "If after review the City Administrator determines that only a written reprimand would be appropriate, the City Administrator will meet with charged council member or Mayor, explain the charges, hear the council member or Mayor's position, and decide whether a written reprimand should be issued or whether no action should be taken". Mr. Moudry stated this means the City Administrator has the authority on his own to decide to issue a written reprimand. This should be something forwarded to the City Council for determination, not to just the City Administrator. Mr. Moudry commented elected officials are not employees of the City. The City Administrator should be in no position to issue discipline to the Council.

Councilman Shannon mentioned having the City Administrator involved in this process is a violation of Roberts Rules. Roberts Rules reserves any discipline to the body. The administrative branch cannot be involved whatsoever and this is one of the flaws in the ordinance. Mr. Moudry agreed.

Mr. Moudry referred to Section B, subparagraph 3, regarding the unanimous vote: "The Council finds or determine that the official in question is guilty of misconduct rendering him or her an unfit person to hold such office, then the City Council may then determine the appropriate sanction to be applied". He stated this statement implies they have already determined the appropriate sanction. The appropriate sanction being a written or public reprimand. The words rendering him or her an unfit person to hold such office should not be there.

Mr. Moudry inquired if Policy Resolution 35 could be addressed as well. Ms. Robbins replied yes.

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Mr. Moudry mentioned the principles of conduct and decorum which were in the resolution previously, now state any such violation may be considered misconduct and maybe subject to removal from office.

Mr. Moudry referred to the principles of conduct and decorum previously mentioned in Policy Resolution 35. The resolution has added any such violation may be considered misconduct and may be subject to the removal from office. Mr. Moudry stated he feels he is not sure all the things listed rise to the level of being misconduct by an elected official. He mentioned there are certain items that would be considered misconduct such as accepting gift, financial gain, using inflammatory or disparaging language. He recommended all the various conditions listed for misconduct should be reviewed, keeping the obvious ones. He reiterated the City Administrator has no authority to discipline elected officials.

Councilman Shannon questioned Mr. Moudry as a former elected official who sat on the Council, how he feels about the provisions in the ordinance which states any citizen can bring a complaint forward. Mr. Moudry commented it could lead to issues. The first step is having someone screen the complaints is good and the City Administrator is currently doing this. On the Council you can't please everyone all the time and people may be unhappy and come forward with a complaint.

Ms. Robbins thanked Mr. Moudry for his ideas and feedback. She explained the City Administrator was added in as the initial gatekeeper of the complaints. This is so there aren't citizens filing complaints against any of the Council members which would require a public hearing on every matter that comes in. By having a gatekeeper, it makes sure the initial requirements for filing a complaint are met and it ties into a misconduct that is outlined in Policy 35. Ms. Robbins commented she liked Mr. Moudry's suggestion with the City Administrator not making a decision for a written reprimand at the initial stage and passing it around to City Council in a more informal setting. Every complaint does not warrant a big public hearing. This suggestion will be review prior to third reading of the ordinance. Ms. Robbins referred to Mr. Moudry's suggestion on Section B, subparagraph 3, regarding the language of rendering him or her unfit already implying what the sanction would be. She commented this a great catch. It should find misconduct and then determine the sanction. This will be amended prior to third reading and presented to the Council. Ms. Robbins mentioned in regards to Policy 35, will be looked at word for word, to ensure all misconduct items are addressed. Additionally, in Policy 35, at the end of each rule already in place, states it could be considered for removal of office. This will be amended again to be considered potential sanction pursuant to 2-208. All items and suggestions will be taken into consideration.

Mr. Tom Richards spoke in support to the proposed ordinance. He explained the importance of educating oneself regarding the policies, procedures, and confidential information discussed in Closed Session meetings. He feels the progressive steps make sense, if some kind of disciplinary action is needed.

Mr. George Porter questioned if the Council votes an individual out, who votes a new Council Member in to replace the outgoing member. Mayor Hike advised he will present a name to the City Council and the City Council would have to vote the person in. Mr. Porter replied he is opposed to this and a recall should be done by the voters.

Mr. Brian Hanson commented he agrees with all the prior speakers. He feels the concept of misconduct is a very nebulous, as misconduct is perceived differently by individuals. He stated one of the key officials excluded from this proposed process is the City Council President. Mr. Hanson feels the Council President should be involved if there is an issue with the Council Members and Closed Sessions. He expressed concerns with a replacement process for Council Members. He stated the special election process is very costly to the City. Mr. Hanson questioned what Council Member brought the proposed ordinance forward. He stated there are no provisions in the City of Bellevue Ordinances on who can introduce ordinances.

Mayor Hike reminded the public, the public hearing is open in regards to Ordinance No. 3977, Ordinance No. 3978, and Policy Resolution No. 35.

Ms. Rose Ann Johnson mentioned she is a retired journalist. She commented Executive Sessions routinely give journalist heartburn. Journalists and the public do not know what goes on in Closed Session meetings. She stated removing someone from office is a very big deal. This should not be entrusted to four of five people to make this decision. She stated she doesn't argue under state law the proposed ordinance is legal, she feels it is not the right decision. Ms. Johnson explained journalist want as much information they can obtain to relay to the public, as it is their civic duty. She believes no elected official should be threatened with the loss of their office for speaking on a public matter. She questioned where the proposed ordinance is coming from and if it is necessary.

Mayor Hike requested clarification from Ms. Johnson. He inquired if she is saying a Council Member should come out of closed session and provide journalist with information and should not be penalized for doing so. Mrs. Johnson replied the Council Member should not be removed from office. Mayor Hike provided an example of what could happen in closed session. He questioned if the Council Member should be disciplined. Ms. Johnson stated the Council Member should not be removed from office. There are other sanctions to use. Mayor Hike inquired what other sanctions she is referring to. Ms. Johnson commented the information should be publicly announced with the explanation of what occurred. The voters would start a recall. Mayor Hike inquired how a Council Member who is discriminating, making sexual innuendos, or harassment should be disciplined. Ms. Johnson commented there are procedures in place to handle those situations. Again, those are items that should be brought out publicly. Mayor Hike replied he feels the ordinance is bringing this information into the public eye and

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allowing transparency. Ms. Johnson stated once again, she feels this should not be handled by four or five people.

Councilman Shannon commented the Mayor has no business correcting the Council.

Ms. Johnson stated she still has not had her question answered regarding where this proposed ordinance is coming from. Ms. Robbins commented she understands Ms. Johnson is there as a citizen, one who has prior experience in journalism. She stated she understands journalist want information to disseminate to the community which is appreciated. She explained if it is an action item, something that is to be voted on, then it will come out of closed session and there could be open discussion prior to a vote. Any questions could be answered if it is an action item. There would be no complaint, no hearing, or sanction. Ms. Robbins advised the problem is with non-action items, such as litigations, being discussed after a Closed Session meeting. She explained this has happened. She fears going into Closed Session because information is continually disseminated out of Closed Session that are not action items. It is concerning to have conversations with Council because of these issues. Additionally, if it is a personnel matter, under Nebraska Law, it is the personnel individual's right to request to go into Closed Session. This information is the employee's personal and confidential information. If there is no action item required and the information is leaked, this is a problem. The reason for Closed Session is not to hide items. The reason is because they are truly non-action items which need to be discussed in Closed Session.

Ms. Johnson replied she is not defending people for divulging information. She stated if someone feels they need to come out publicly with an item discussed in Closed Session, the threat of losing their Council seat is too much. It is an entitlement for the voter, not for five people. Ms. Robbins stated there are progressive sanctions outlined. It will start with the bottom level, with other steps for removal from office. Ms. Robbins explained if anyone comes out of Closed Session and provides information, there is no point in Closed Session. Discussion occurred on the Omaha City Attorney supporting Closed Sessions and how there have been no problems with Omaha City Council Members disclosing items.

Ms. Johnson reiterated again she feels this ordinance is going too far. The Open Meetings Law exist and there is a purpose for it. Councilman Shannon informed Ms. Johnson, if it makes her feel better, several of the Council Members that are level headed, have already sworn they will never allow any part of this to ever be used. They can pass it, they can be stupid, they can do anything they want. It is never going to be allowed to be used. Ms. Johnson stated in parting she asked the Council to consider how serious removal from office is.

Mayor Hike asked Councilman Shannon if he would like to point out the level headed Council Members. Councilman Shannon replied he would not, the public will see it when the Council votes.

Mr. John Masters spoke in opposition. He stated he has an issue with the Council Members being voted off. It is taking away his right as a voter to vote for his representative. He inquired how he could hold those voting his Council representative out of office accountable. Also, it seems if an individual Council Member has an issue with another Council Member, it allows the process to get started. He feels there are sanctions and a recall process in place already to take care of issues. He commented he feels this process is unnecessary. Closed Sessions are something the Council should be careful of. However, it has an effect of the public of being informed. Roles should be in place to make the Council accountable, but removal of office is going too far. This should be the voter's choice.

Ms. Nicole Leclerc has concerns with the definition of misconduct and how it will be decided. She feels the proposed ordinance is not leading to transparency.

Councilwoman Welch read the following statement: "I have been a victim of sexual harassing language in the past; and I can tell you that if it was an employee of the City of Bellevue, another government agency, or private enterprise, investigation and discipline would have been warranted. Under our current ordinances, there is no accountability and or no action can be taken against the perpetrator. This ordinance creates more transparency within our city government. This ordinance brings unprofessional and improper conduct and behavior to the public's attention. And while the first time may not warrant removal from office, the public may choose to not put up with this type of behavior. We hold our city employees to a high standard when they are conducting City business, and it should be no different for our elected officials. Thank you".

Councilman Shannon stated he has several letters and emails, sent in by people, requesting they be acknowledged and added into the record. Letter of opposition were received from Roxanne Hardebeck and the ACLU. Ms. Johnson had also sent in a letter as well as spoke earlier.

Councilman Stinson advised he has taken his stance on this on his City Council Facebook page. He believes it is the right of the people to remove Council Members from office. He will not be backing this ordinance. He stated if the people put them in office, they should be able to take them out.

Councilman Preister thanked everyone for their feedback. He stated this is a very serious issue for the well-being of the City. He referred to Councilwoman Welch addressing sexual harassment. He advised the focus is not on just what happens in Closed Session. This is addressing serious behavior and sexual harassment. There is the "Me Too" Movement going on right now. Women are standing up and not taking it. There are women in the City staff who are intimated and are not going to speak up, because it is a Council Member. This is a serious problem and at this point there is no best solution. The solution

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can be improved. He advised this process is done in a progressive fashion and is not immediate. It is more along three strikes and you're out. Councilman Preister summarized this is not about Closed Session, it's about a whole lot more that is potential to be inflicted. Some of which has already been. Councilman Shannon commented his concerns are the things not being addressed. He stated: "One of the things this does is makes Council Members City Officials, puts us under the City Administrator. That's the part of the ordinance I have the biggest heartburn with. I am not a City Official, I am an elected representative of the people. I do my job and I represent the people; and I talk to the media and I give them feedback, I answer their questions. When they start coming to us and asking us about real estate commissions and Council Members attending Closed Sessions illegally because they have a conflict. Or they start talking about other things going on in the City. It is our duty to answer their questions and give them the information they have". He summarized they need to be responsive to be transparent to the public. It's the things being swept under the rug that are not being addressed, that are bigger concerns.

No one else in the audience came forth to speak in support of or in opposition to the application. Mayor Hike declared the public hearing closed.

Mayor Hike stated the third reading and vote of the Ordinance No. 3977 will be heard at the Council meeting on November 19th.

Councilman Shannon questioned if the City Attorney is going to amend the Ordinance, if another public hearing could be heard to hear the final version. The public would then be allowed to comment on the changes made to the ordinance

Ms. Robbins explained there will be amendments based off feedback of the public and the City Council. Procedurally a motion should be made to table the third reading until December. Another public hearing would be held on November 19th. She advised a third reading could be done on November 19th and could be opened up for public hearing.

<u>Motion</u> made by Shannon, second by Preister, to table the item, hold a Public Hearing on November 19th, and hold the third and final reading on December 3rd.

Councilman Cook clarified if the vote is on Ordinance No. 3977, Ordinance No. 3978, and Policy Resolution 35. Ms. Robbins replied, it is on all three items. She suggested Councilman Shannon amend his motion to clarify.

<u>Motion</u> made by Shannon, second by Preister, to amend to address all three items, Ordinance No. 3977, Ordinance No. 3978, and Policy Resolution 35, table the item, hold a Public Hearing on November 19th, and hold the third and final reading on December 3rd. Roll call vote on the motion was as follows: Stinson, Cook, Shannon, Preister, Burns, and Welch voted yes; voting no: none. Motion carried.

Ordinance No. 3978: An Ordinance to amend Article IV, Chapter 2, of the Bellevue City Code by adding a new Section 2-208 regarding removal of elected officials for misconduct. (City Attorney). Policy Resolution 35: Approve amended Policy Resolution 35 regarding Principles of Conduct and Decorum. (City Attorney)

Ordinance No. 3978, an ordinance to amend Article IV, Chapter 2, of the Bellevue Municipal Code by adding a new Section 2-208 regarding removal of elected official for misconduct and to provide for the effective date of this ordinance, was read by title only for the second time and presented for public hearing.

Mayor Hike stated the public hearing was already held. A motion was made to hold another Public Hearing on November 19th and the third reading on December 3rd.

Ordinance No. 3979: Request to rezone Lots 1 - 72, and Outlots A-C, Belle Lago Replat 1, from RG-50-PS and RG-28-PS to RG-8-PS in order to facilitate a townhome development, Approval of the preliminary plat; Approval of the final plat, and Approval of the Second Amendment to the Belle Lago Subdivision Agreement for Lots 1 through 72, and Outlots through C, Belle Lago Replat 1. (Land Use Planner)

Ordinance No. 3979, an ordinance to amend the Official Zoning Map of the City of Bellevue, Nebraska, as provided for by Article 3 of Ordinance No. 3619 by changing the zone classification of land located at or about the southeast corner of 48th Street and Capehart Road, more particularly described in Section 1 of the Ordinance and to provide an effective date, was read by title only for the second time and presented for public hearing.

Mayor Hike opened the meeting to a public hearing to give opportunity for individuals to speak in favor of or in opposition to the application.

Mr. Larry Jobeun was present as the Attorney for the developer. He explained this is a continuation of the original replat of Belle Lago, which the Council approved some time ago. This request is for a preliminary plat, rezoning, and final plat, to allow for 72 single family townhome style units, and three outlots. The outlots include the roadway systems and drainage ways. This property was zoned as part of the original plat to RG-50-PS and RG-28-PS. The request is now for RG-8-PS. The project consists of a number of fourplexes and townhome style units, with two floor plans. One floor plan calls for 1,643 square feet with a value of \$213,900. The other floor plan has 1,515 square feet, with a value of \$203,900. All streets with the development are private and will be maintained by a Home Owners Association.

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Councilwoman Welch inquired who the builder of the homes is. Mr. Jobeun replied it is the Home Company. Councilwoman Welch commented this development brings affordable housing into the community.

No one else in the audience came forth to speak in support of or in opposition to the application. Mayor Hike declared the public hearing closed.

Mayor Hike stated the third reading of the ordinance will be heard at the Council meeting on November 19th.

Ordinance No. 3980: Request to rezone Lot 1, South Woods, Replat 3, from MH, BGH, and RG-8 to RG-8 for the purpose of an elementary school, Approval of a Conditional Use Permit, and Approval of Small Subdivision Plat Lot 1, South Woods, Replat 3. Applicant: Kenneth Hahn Architects. General Location: Fort Crook Road and Childs Road West. (Land Use Planner).

Ordinance No. 3980, an ordinance to amend the Official Zoning Map of the City of Bellevue, Nebraska, as provided for by Article 3 of Ordinance No. 3619 by changing the zoning classification of land located at or about Fort Crook Road and Childs Road West more particularly described in Section 1 of the Ordinance and to provide an effective date, was read by title only for the second time and presented for public hearing.

Mayor Hike opened the meeting to a public hearing to give opportunity for individuals to speak in favor of or in opposition to the application.

Councilman Preister commented this portion is only on the rezoning portion. The item has been delayed by the Planning Commission, as they held an additional meeting. He suggested suspending the rules of the third reading this evening and vote on the rezoning.

Dr. Cheryl Logan, Superintendent of OPS, spoke in support of the request. She thanked those who spoke directly with her regarding the request. The Omaha Public Schools currently serves 2,316 students from Sarpy County. Almost all of who reside is Bellevue. She assured OPS takes the responsibility to serve every single student very seriously, no matter where they are located. Dr. Logan explained the tax payers of the OPS district have passed two substantial bond issues in the last five years. These bonds totaled almost one billion dollars. OPS has made or is making nearly \$36 million in improvements to the OPS schools located in Bellevue. As part of the campaign, OPS made a commitment to construct a new elementary school. This will result in an additional investment of \$21 million. OPS intend to honor their commitment. The decision of placement of a new school was difficult. OPS goal was to make every effort to avoid displacing homeowners. From a transportation stand point, ease of access was considered while minimizing impact on residential neighbors. Schools are a critical fact of a neighborhood. Dr. Logan advised OPS came before the City Council nearly three years ago, on January 23, 2017. This was to provide an outline of the plans and to answer questions. OPS continued to work with the Planning Department on the request and appeared in front of the Planning Commission on three separate occasions. On July 25, 2019, the Planning Commission addressed safety concerns with the proposal. This was the first time OPS was made aware of any safety concerns with the proposal. Dr. Logan stated OPS would never build a school which would jeopardize student's safety. The student's safety is OPS' first priority. The concerns were taken to heart and OPS worked in conjunction with the Planning Department. Language was added to the proposed conditional use permit, in which OPS agreed to provide transportation, to every student living east of Fort Crook Road that would otherwise be within the one-mile walk zone. OPS also agreed to reroute bus traffic to avoid stacking near the adjacent railroad tracks. Sidewalks have also been redesigned to facilitate flow into the building, that avoided Fort Crook Road. Dr. Logan advised this is a tremendous project that will benefit the students, the neighborhood, the school district, and the City of Bellevue. Schools are great neighbors and increase property values. She offered a written copy of her remarks, a letter further outlining the districts position on the application, video of the City Council meeting, videos of the three Planning Commission meetings, and the staff recommendation made at each meeting into the record.

Mr. Tom Richards spoke in support of the rezoning and placement of the elementary school.

Mr. John Masters stated the Planning Commission has concerns with safety. He expressed the same interest. He mentioned Dr. Logan stated transportation would be provided to students living east of Fort Crook. He expressed concerns with students missing the bus crossing Fort Crook Road, as there is no safe way to cross. Another concern is with the bus stacking along Fort Crook Road impacting traffic along JFK.

Mayor Hike replied the bus stacking will take place along Nebraska Avenue, so there should not be any

Ms. Debra Duff advised she lives 300 feet within the proposed property. She requested clarification on the lots being rezoned and what the zoning request means.

Mrs. Tammi Palm, Land Use Planner, explained there are several parcels involved. She noted on the overhead rezoning map the location of the properties. She advised the school is requesting a rezoning to RG-8, which is a residential district. This rezoning request would facilitate the development of the school with a conditional use permit with City Council approval. Mrs. Palm mentioned property owners within 300 feet of the parcels will receive notifications on rezoning request and conditional use permit request.

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Ms. Duff questioned if the development will affect the field on Nebraska Drive which abuts the residential homes. Mrs. Palm advised it will not, explaining the development is on the east side of Nebraska Drive. Mrs. Palm advised if any of the neighbors have questions, they may contact the Planning Department at the number located on the bottom of the notification letters they received.

Mr. Kenneth Hahn was present as the Architect on behalf of Omaha Public Schools. He referred to the site plan for the development. There has been discussion on the bus routes. The buses will come in and out on Nebraska Drive, which is the street located to the west of the proposed development. The buses would come down Childs Road and enter a driveway located at the east end of the development. The students would be dropped off at the east end. The buses will be stacked in a safe manner. When the buses leave the site, they would get back out on Childs Road, go up Nebraska Drive, go north and toward Chandler Road. This plan would avoid any issues with any buses going toward the railroad tracks and Fort Crook Road.

Mayor Hike requested clarification on the bus service provided for the students, so they are not crossing Fort Crook Road.

Mr. Hahn explained the attendance area will be on both sides of Fort Crook Road. The students within a mile, on the west side of Fort Crook Road, will be asked to walk to school. There are sidewalks and pathways for the students. The front of the school faces towards Nebraska Drive, which is the way the students would enter the school. All students on the east side of Fort Crook Road will be required to ride the bus, instead of walking across Fort Crook Road.

Ms. Christine Jurgens commented she is in support of the school being built. She feels OPS has addressed the concerns of the safety issues. She referred to areas currently in the City of Bellevue, where Bellevue Public Schools are located, with safety concerns and issues.

Mr. Art Childers mentioned he doesn't have a problem with the school itself. His issue is with the railroad tracks. He stated he worked for the railroad for 38 years. Putting children by a railroad track is creating a very bad problem. He questioned what will happen if a child on the east side of Fort Crook Road misses a bus. He addressed the lack of sidewalks in the area. Mr. Childers mentioned he has concerns with an increase in traffic, road issues, and issues with the sewer system. He commented ten trains run a day at 45 mph and do not stop on a dime.

Mr. Brian Hanson commented he agrees with the Planning Commission on their recommendation. He stated he is troubled by the possibility there could be a derailment or spill of materials on the railroad tracks. He mentioned he has concerns with Childs Road being a treacherous road in the winter.

No one else in the audience came forth to speak in support of or in opposition to the application. Mayor Hike declared the public hearing closed.

Councilman Cook thanked Dr. Logan for meeting with or talking with Council Members. He mentioned he has concerns with eight to nine trains on average passing the school each day. If a student gets hurt, everyone will point a finger at the City. Another concern is the buses going through a residential neighborhood and going to Chandler Road, going back to the railroad tracks. Childs Road is a southern border of the school district. If you go across the street to the south, you will be in Bellevue Public School District. He expressed interest in the students crossing Fort Crook Road. He questioned how this issue will be addressed.

Mr. Hahn replied architecturally, he doesn't design issues on site of the project. The concerns are how to make the project work in the best and safest way. The conditions of Fort Crook Road have existed for many years. The architect firm wasn't involved in the selection of the land, they were hired to design the piece of land for the development of the school. He doesn't have an answer of how to make Fort Crook Road safe. The Planning Commission made a request for the team on the school development to have a meeting with Public Works Department and City Staff. The Traffic Engineer on the project was included in the meeting. The recommendation the team received from the meeting, was to not create a crosswalk because of the extreme difficulty to get across the street. The development team has done everything they possibly can to come up with ways for children to not cross Fort Crook Road.

Councilman Cook commented he understands the effort, however this was done after the selection of a site was made. He stated he has a problem with a child crossing the street. He feels a better selection of a site could have been made.

Mr. David Kramer was present as the Attorney for Omaha Public Schools. He stated he was involved in the initial site selection process. The Board considered five possible sites. One of the primary considerations was avoiding displacing people from their homes. He stated the options are limited with as many acres as the school requires. There is no location that OPS could select that wouldn't impact the neighborhood, impact traffic into a major artery, and wouldn't result in similar issues the proposed site presents. Mr. Kramer advised during this whole process the safety of the students has been the number one concern. OPS has worked with the Planning Commission and Planning Department to address safety concerns. There was extensive discussion with the Planning Commission regarding the construction of a crosswalk. Upon discussion with City departments agreed a crosswalk did not make sense. When students miss the bus, the parents or students can contact the school to arrange transportation. Mr. Kramer advised OPS does everything they can to provide a safe location and safe environment for the students.

Councilman Cook suggested the students who live on the east side of Fort Crook Road continue to attend Chandler View Elementary. He mentioned OPS should look at restructuring and build a school out west.

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Conversation ensued on this topic.

Councilman Burns left the Council Chambers at 8:28 p.m.

Councilman Cook stated this is not a good location for a school for safety reasons and that it is on a boundary between two school districts.

Dr. Logan advised the schools in the southern district are currently overcrowded. She mentioned Chandler View has several portables as is, there is no room to add additional students. The delay in this project has delayed the school from opening in 2021/2022 to 2022/2023. Four OPS schools will now be open in one year, which is a tremendous change for the entire southern portion of district. Dr. Logan stated young people deserve to be inside of buildings and not in portables. She explained there is already a hardship placed on the students as they have to leave the portables for specials and lunch. She stated they deserve better.

Councilman Burns returned the Council Chambers at 8:31 p.m.

Councilman Cook commented OPS is an outstanding school district. He reiterated his concerns are with the location and safety.

Mayor Hike inquired if OPS has a day time shuttle for kids who need rides that are late. Dr. Logan stated they do not have a shuttle. The caring staff would make sure to get the students to school.

Mr. Childers commented OPS has not addressed the safety of the students. He inquired if Camp Brewster Road will be blocked off on the north end.

Ms. Robbins questioned how many schools are in the OPS district. Dr. Logan replied 64 elementary schools. Ms. Robbins inquired if some of the schools are located off of busy roads with street lights and crosswalks. Dr. Logan replied yes. Ms. Robbins inquired even with every safety precaution possible if any accidents have happened. Dr. Logan replied yes. Ms. Robbins commented it is safe to say accidents can happen anywhere regardless of the safety precautions. Dr. Logan commented yes, it is important to revisit safety precautions for the students.

Ms. Robbins inquired if the City Council passes the request, and concerns are presented to OPS regarding a large number of students crossing the road, would OPS continue to be willing to work on alleviating any of those concerns. Dr. Logan replied yes, explaining OPS is constantly reviewing safety precautions.

Ms. Robbins confirmed safety is the number one priority for OPS. Dr. Logan stated yes, it is. Ms. Robbins inquired if OPS has done everything to account for the safety of students by modifying this in the conditional use permit. She questioned Dr. Logan if OPS is comfortable with everything they have done to account for safety and continue to listen to concerns and correct issues that surface. Dr. Logan replied she does.

Mayor Hike commented Fort Crook Road is the problem, not the school. The road is to wide. The Fort Crook Road Plan will take the road to four lanes which will make more connectivity. If this ever happens, this will resolve many problems. OPS is working around a problem Bellevue has with Fort Crook Road. He suggested installing no pedestrian crossing signs.

Councilman Preister complimented OPS on the wonderful programs, schools, and education. He mentioned the students are not being optimally educated due to conditions of overcrowding and portables. He stated he does not see any other available sites for the development of a school. This site does have safety concerns. It is hopeful in five years Fort Crook Road will be a different road. He feels OPS is doing the best they can to minimize safety concerns.

Councilman Preister stated there are two items before the Council this evening. Most of the discussion has been on the second one, the first one is on the rezoning. The rezoning will take the property from three different zonings to one zoning. He did not hear one person speak against the rezoning; the concerns have been with safety. He would like to suspend the rules and vote on only the rezoning.

<u>Motion</u> made by Preister, seconded by Welch, to suspend the rule for the third reading and vote on the rezoning.

Councilman Stinson stated he is against voting tonight as he is still on the fence. He wanted to take public comments into concern before voting.

Ms. Robbins advised the motion would be to suspend third reading which would require a vote to proceed. The vote would only be on Ordinance No. 3980 regarding the rezoning. The vote would not be on the conditional use permit. The rezoning request is for RG-8 to allow all the properties zoned the same. She explained Item 12e2., is a replat of the property in conjunction to the rezoning. It would make sense to vote on both items. If the Council votes on the rezoning and replat, leaving Item 12e1., on the table for future consideration, this would be for the conditional use permit allowing the building of the school.

Councilman Stinson stated RG-8 currently allows the building of a school. If the whole plat is zoned RG-8 they could build without the permission of the City Council. Ms. Robbins advised the conditional use permit would still need to be approved under the RG-8 zoning district.

Councilman Cook questioned why the rezoning should be approved tonight, if the conditional use permit may not pass. The rezoning would stay with the property for a potential different development. He stated he does not

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want to vote tonight. Ms. Robbins stated OPS is the owner of the properties. In order for the small subdivision to take place, the lots should be zoned the same. Mrs. Palm advised they do not need be zoned the same to do a replat.

Discussion occurred on the zoning of the parcels surrounding the development.

Councilman Preister advised his whole purpose was to help show OPS the City of Bellevue is not so difficult to deal with. They have gone to three public hearings in front of the Planning Commission and the project has been laid over another month. He wanted to show good faith, respect to the district, and respect OPS has taking precautions for the safety of the students. He stated after feedback from the Council he is withdrawing his motion.

Motion made by Preister, seconded by Welch, to withdraw the motion to suspend the third reading and voted on the rezoning.

Councilwoman Welch thanked Dr. Logan and Mr. Hahn for meeting with her and explaining the plans. She mentioned the concerns OPS has for safety, is also the concern of the City Council. She would like to come up with a solution to make this a win win for OPS and the City of Bellevue.

Mayor Hike inquired if OPS would not have a problem if there were no pedestrian crossing signs at the intersection. Mr. Kramer replied there would be no problem and they respect that. He advised the students and parents will be educated on the expectations of Fort Crook Road.

Mayor Hike stated the third reading of the ordinance will be heard at the Council meeting on November 19th.

As the water is pumped, it keeps coming up. With putting the water into the Brown River, which has the gates closed, it cannot get into the Missouri. The City is trying to find a solution to move the water to the Missouri.



On March 23, 2017, the Planning Commission recommended approval of a request to rezone Lots 1 through 75, and Outlots A through F, Belle Lago, being a platting of Tax Lot 15, except the irregular 400; located in the Northwest ¼ of Section 8, T13N, R13E of the 6th P.M., Sarpy County, Nebraska from AG to RG-50; and preliminary plat Lots 1 through 75, and Outlots A through F, Belle Lago. On April 24, 2017 the City Council approved the aforementioned request.
- 2. On August 24, 2017, the Planning Commission recommended approval of a request to rezone Lots 1 through 107, and Outlots A through H, Belle Lago, being a platting of Tax Lot 14 and Tax Lot 15, located in part of the North ½ of the Northwest ¼, Section 8, T13N, R13E of the 6th P.M., Sarpy County, Nebraska from AG to RE, RG-50-PS, and RG-28-PS; site plan approval for the purpose of single family residential and multi-family residential development; and preliminary plat Lots 1 through 107, and Outlots A through H, Belle Lago. On October 9, 2017, the City Council approved the aforementioned request.
- 3. On October 19, 2017, the Planning Commission recommended approval of a request to final plat Lots 1 through 81, and Outlots A through H, Belle Lago, being a

platting of Tax Lots 14 and 15, located in the Northwest ¼ of Section 8, T13N, R13E of the 6th P.M., Sarpy County, Nebraska. On November 13, 2017, the City Council approved the aforementioned request.

- 4. On December 20, 2018, the Planning Commission recommended approval of a request to rezone Lots 1 through 121, and Outlots A through G, Belle Lago South, being a replat of Lots 20 through 22, and Outlots B, G, and H, Belle Lago, and a platting of the Southwest ¼ of the Northwest ¼, all located in Section 8, T13N, R13E of the 6th P.M., Sarpy County, Nebraska from AG to RG-50-PS to RG-50-PS for residential development; and preliminary plat Lots 1 through 121, and Outlots A through G, Belle Lago South.
- 5. On August 22, 2019, the Planning Commission continued a request to rezone Lots 1 through 72, and Outlots A through C, Belle Lago Replat 1, being a replat of Lot 81, and Outlot F, Belle Lago, from RG-50-PS and RG-28-PS, to RG-8-PS for the purpose of multi-family residential development, with site plan approval; preliminary plat Lots 1 through 72, and Outlots A through C, Belle Lago Replat 1; and final plat Lots 1 through 72, and Outlots A through C, Belle Lago Replat 1, to the September 26, 2019 Planning Commission meeting.
- 6. On September 26, 2019, the Planning Commission recommended approval of a request to rezone Lots 1 through 72, and Outlots A through C, Belle Lago Replat 1, being a replat of Lot 81, and Outlot F, Belle Lago, from RG-50-PS and RG-28-PS, to RG-8-PS for the purpose of multi-family residential development, with site plan approval; preliminary plat Lots 1 through 72, and Outlots A through C, Belle Lago Replat 1; and final plat Lots 1 through 72, and Outlots A through C, Belle Lago Replat 1.

A. COMPREHENSIVE PLAN:

The Future Land Use Map of the Comprehensive Plan designates this area as medium density residential.

B. OTHER PLANS:

C. TRAFFIC AND ACCESS:

- 1. MAPA does not show interchange volume for this area.
- 2. Access will be from newly created private streets off of Lawnwood Drive. There will be no direct access to 48th Street from this development.

D. UTILITES:

All utilities are available or will be constructed to service this development.

E. ANALYSIS:

- 1. Dave Vogtman, on behalf of HRC Belle Lago, LLC has submitted a request to preliminary plat and final plat Lots 1 through 72, and Outlots A through C, Belle Lago Replat 1.
- 2. In conjunction with the platting, the applicant is also requesting a change of zone with site plan approval for Lots 1 through 72, and Outlots A through C, Belle Lago Replat 1, from RG-50-PS and RG-28-PS to RG-8-PS, for the purpose of multifamily townhome residential development.

The setbacks in the RG-8-PS zone would be as follows:

Front Yard	15 feet
Rear Yard	10 feet
Side Yard	3 feet
Street Side Yard	5 feet

This is a reduction from the typical RG-8 front yard zoning setback; the standard RG-8 lot has a 25 foot front yard setback.

- 3. The applicant is proposing four-plex townhome units, with each unit on its own lot. Proposed elevations have been provided by the applicant and are attached to this report.
- 4. This property was previously approved for a 120 unit apartment complex with RG-28-PS zoning. The current application is a reduction in density from the previously approved site plan.
- 5. The private streets and common areas will be maintained by a Home Owner's Association and will not be the responsibility of the city. There is a note on the site

plan stating such. This will also be laid out in an amendment to the Subdivision Agreement, which has been reviewed by the City Attorney and is attached to this report.

6. This application was sent out to the following departments/individuals for review: Public Works, Permits and Inspections, Chief of Police, Offutt Air Force Base, Fire Inspector, Sarpy County Planning Director, Sarpy County Public Works Department, Sarpy County IS/GIS/Public Safety, Metro Area Planning Agency, Metropolitan Utilities District, CenturyLink, Omaha Public Power District, Black Hills Energy, Cox Communications, and the Bellevue Public School District. The cover letter indicated a deadline to send comments back to the Planning Department, and also stated if the requested department did not have comments pertaining to the application, no response was needed.

The Public Works Department requested technical revisions to the preliminary plat, paving exhibit and profiles, grading exhibit, storm sewer, and sanitary sewer. The applicant's engineer has since satisfied these comments.

No other comments were received on this case.

- 7. The access for this development will be from two newly created private street connections off of Lawnwood Drive. This development will have no direct access to South 48th Street or Capehart Road.
- 8. A landscape plan has been submitted and is in conformance with the Zoning Ordinance regulations.
- 9. Staff believes this development is compatible with the surrounding neighborhood.





# I. GENERAL INFORMATION

## A. APPLICANT:

## **B. PROPERTY OWNER:**

## C. GENERAL LOCATION:

Fort Crook Road and Childs Road West

## D. LEGAL DESCRIPTION:

Lot 1, South Woods Replat 3, being a replat of Lot 2, Pendleton, and Lots 7 and 8 South Woods, located in the Southwest ¼ of Section 14, and the Southeast ¼ of Section 15, all located in T14N, R13E of the 6th P.M., Sarpy County, Nebraska.

## **E. REQUESTED ACTIONS:**

- 1. Rezone Lot 1, South Woods Replat 3, from MH, BGH, and RG-8 to RG-8
- 2. Small Subdivision Plat Lot 1, South Woods Replat 3
- 3. Conditional Use Permit for Lot 1, South Woods Replat 3

## F. EXISTING ZONING AND LAND USE:

MH, BGH, RG-8, Vacant/Industrial

## **G. PURPOSE OF REQUEST:**

The purpose of this request is to obtain a rezoning, small subdivision plat, and conditional use permit to allow for the construction of an elementary school.

### H. SIZE OF SITE:

The site is approximately 14.48 acres.

## II. <u>BACKGROUND INFORMATION</u>

### A. EXISTING CONDITION OF SITE:

A portion of the site contains a building once housed by Pendleton Mills. The remainder of the site is vacant and presently covered in vegetation.

## B. GENERAL NEIGHBORHOOD/AREA LAND USES AND ZONING:

1. North: Vacant/Industrial, RG-8 and MH

2. East: Fort Crook Road right-of-way/Industrial, MH

3. South: Single Family Residential, RS-84 and RD-60 (across Childs Road

West)

4. West: Vacant, RG-8 (across Nebraska Drive)

## C. REVELANT CASE HISTORY:

- 1. On July 25, 2019, the Planning Commission continued a request to rezone Lot 1, South Woods Replat 3, being a replat of Lot 2, Pendleton, and Lots 7 and 8, South Woods, from MH, BGH, and RG-8 to RG-8 for the purpose of an elementary school; conditional use permit for Lot 1, South Woods Replat 3, and small subdivision plat Lot 1, South Woods Replat 3. Continuation for the purpose of Omaha Public Schools working with the city on a safe route to school.
- 2. On August 22, 2019, the Planning Commission continued a request to rezone Lot 1, South Woods Replat 3, being a replat of Lot 2, Pendleton, and Lots 7 and 8, South Woods, from MH, BGH, and RG-8 to RG-8 for the purpose of an elementary school; conditional use permit for Lot 1, South Woods Replat 3, and small subdivision plat Lot 1, South Woods Replat 3. Continuation for the purpose of Omaha Public Schools working with the city on a safe route to school.
- 3. On September 26, 2019, the Planning Commission recommended denial of a request to rezone Lot 1, South Woods Replat 3, being a replat of Lot 2, Pendleton, and Lots 7 and 8, South Woods, from MH, BGH, and RG-8 to RG-8 for the purpose of an elementary school; conditional use permit for Lot 1, South Woods Replat 3, and small subdivision plat Lot 1, South Woods Replat 3.

## D. APPLICABLE REGULATIONS:

- 1. Section 5.15, Zoning Ordinance, regarding RG-8 uses and requirements.
- 2. Chapter 5, Subdivision Regulations, regarding small subdivisions.
- 3. Article 6, Zoning Ordinance, regarding Conditional Use Permits.

## III. ANALYSIS

## A. COMPREHENSIVE PLAN:

The Future Land Use Map of the Comprehensive Plan designates this area as medium density residential.

### **B. OTHER PLANS:**

None

## C. TRAFFIC AND ACCESS:

- 1. The most recent MAPA traffic data estimates approximately 18,800 vehicles per day along the north leg of the intersection of Fort Crook Road and Childs Road West, approximately 1,400 vehicles per day along the east leg, approximately 19,300 vehicles per day along the south leg, and approximately 2,800 vehicles per day along the west leg of this intersection.
- 2. The property will have two access points: one from Nebraska Drive, and one from Childs Road West.

## D. UTILITES:

All utilities are available to service this development.

### E. ANALYSIS:

- 1. Kenneth Hahn, on behalf of Kenneth Hahn Architects, is requesting approval of a rezoning, small subdivision plat, and conditional use permit for Lot 1, South Woods Replat 3, for the purpose of a new Omaha Public Schools elementary school.
- 2. A portion of the site contains a building once housed by Pendleton Mills, which will be demolished under this plan. The remainder of the site is vacant.
- 3. This application was sent out to the following departments for review: Public Works, Permits and Inspections, Chief of Police, Offutt Air Force Base, Fire Inspector, and Sarpy County Public Works. The cover letter indicated a deadline to send

comments back to the Planning Department, and also stated if the requested department did not have comments pertaining to the application, no response was needed.

Public Works Engineering Manager Dean Dunn requested a copy of the Traffic Impact Study, which was provided.

Captain Dave Stukenholz, Bellevue Police Department, expressed concerns for the safety of students crossing Fort Crook Road on foot. These concerns were passed along to the applicant, as well as their engineer and architect.

No other comments were received on this case.

- 4. The site plan shows an elementary school building with room for potential future portables, two playgrounds, a basketball court, as well as two outdoor learning areas.
- 5. The Zoning Ordinance requires one parking space per employee, and one space per 100 square feet of seating space in the auditorium or multi-purpose room (whichever is greater). The site plan shows 130 parking stalls, which is the number required by the ordinance.
- 6. The proposed landscape plan has been reviewed by staff and meets the requirements of the zoning ordinance.
- 7. A copy of the current and proposed Omaha Public Schools elementary school boundaries are attached. The applicant has indicated the proposed boundaries are subject to change, and are currently being reviewed with the community.
- 8. The proposed OPS elementary school boundaries have raised the question concerning the transportation of children to and from this school; specifically in regards to crossing Fort Crook Road.

Staff met with OPS and their construction team on August 14, 2019 in order to discuss this issue. OPS is proposing to bus the students who live on the *east* side of Fort Crook Road who attend this school, regardless of their proximity to the school building. School staff is proposing this as a solution to students walking to school and having to cross Fort Crook Road and the railroad tracks on foot. Please see the attached letter from OPS Chief Operations Officer Lisa Sterba regarding this matter.

Staff (including Public Works Director Jeff Roberts and Engineering Manager Dean Dunn) met with OPS and their construction team again on August 29, 2019 to discuss transportation issues. Although a crosswalk along Fort Crook Road was discussed, staff is not recommending this be done. The railroad tracks pose an issue as far as safety and connectivity. Additionally, the Public Works Department has indicated a crosswalk could encourage children to cross Fort Crook Road, and provide a false sense of security in doing so. As a result, staff is not recommending a crosswalk along

Fort Crook Road or a sidewalk connection to the railroad tracks. OPS has agreed to have buses transport students to the school via Chandler Road East to Nebraska Drive in order to avoid buses stacking across the railroad tracks adjacent to school property. Language has been added to the conditional use permit agreement to reflect this. Additionally, language has been added regarding bus driver training.

- 9. Per Section 6.06, the Zoning Ordinance requires no conditional use permit shall be granted unless the Planning Commission or City Council has found:
- 6.06.01 That the establishment, maintenance, or operation of the conditional use will not be detrimental to or endanger the public health, safety, moral, comfort, or general welfare of the community.
- 6.06.02 That the conditional use will not be injurious to the use and enjoyment of other property in the immediate vicinity for the purpose already permitted, nor substantially diminish and impair property values within the neighborhood.
- 6.06.03 That the establishment of the conditional use will not impede the normal and orderly development of the surrounding property for uses permitted in the district.
- 6.06.04 Adequate utilities, access roads, drainage, and/or necessary facilities have been or are being provided.
- 6.06.05 Adequate measures have been or will be taken to provide ingress and egress so designed as to minimize traffic congestion in the public streets.
- 6.06.06 The use shall not include noise which is objectionable due to volume, frequency, or beat unless muffled or otherwise controlled.
- 6.06.07 The use shall not involve any pollution of the air by fly-ash, dust, vapors or other substance which is harmful to health, animals, vegetation or other property or which can cause soiling, discomfort, or irritation.
- 6.06.08 The use shall not involve any malodorous gas or matter which is discernible on any adjoining lot or property.
- 6.06.09 The use shall not involve any direct or reflected glare which is visible from any adjoining property or from any public street, road, or highway.
- 6.06.10 The use shall not involve any activity substantially increasing the movement of traffic on public streets unless procedures are instituted to limit traffic hazards and congestion.

The Planning Department believes this application meets the criteria for approval of the Conditional Use Permit.

# IV. DEPARTMENT RECOMMENDATION

# **Current South Omaha Elementary and Middle School Boundaries**







Conditional Use Permit for Douglas County School District 00001

This Conditional Use Permit issued this _____ day of _____, 2019 by the City of Bellevue, a municipal corporation in the County of Sarpy County, Nebraska ("City") to Douglas County School District 00001, ("Applicant"), pursuant to the Bellevue Zoning Ordinance.

WHEREAS, Douglas County School District 00001, is the legal owner of Lot 1, South Woods Replat 3, located in the Southwest ¼ of Section 14 and the Southeast ¼ of Section 15, Township 14 North, Range 13 East of the 6th P.M., Sarpy County, Nebraska, consisting of approximately 14.48 acres, more or less ("Property"). Applicant desires to use the Property for the purpose of an elementary school; and

WHEREAS, Applicant has applied for a conditional use permit for the purpose of using the Property as described above; and

WHEREAS, the Mayor and City Council of the City of Bellevue are agreeable to the issuance of a conditional use permit to the Applicant for such purpose, subject to certain conditions and agreements as hereinafter provided (the "Permit").

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT KNOWN THAT subject to the conditions hereof, this Permit is issued to the Applicant to use the Property for the purpose described above, said use hereinafter being referred to interchangeably as a "Permitted Use" or "Use".

#### **Conditions of Permit**

The conditions to which the granting of this Permit is subject are as follows:

- 1. Development and operation on the Property is governed by this Permit. The rights granted by this Permit are transferable and any breach of any terms hereof shall cause Permit to expire and terminate, subject to the rights of the Applicant to cure such default or deficiency as set forth in this Permit.
- 2. In respect to the proposed Use:
  - a. A site plan showing the Property's boundaries, proposed structures, parking, access points, and drives, is attached hereto and incorporated herein as Exhibit "A." A landscape plan is attached as Exhibit "B."

- b. The Property shall be developed and maintained in accordance with the site plan (Exhibit "A") and all other exhibits, if any, of this Agreement. Any modifications to the site plan must be submitted to the Planning Department for approval. Modifications of any other document or exhibit shall be subject to approval of the City, as directed by the City Administrator, unless otherwise expressly provided in the document or exhibit to be modified.
- c. Applicant hereby indemnifies the City against, and holds the City harmless from, any liability, loss, claim or expense whatsoever (including, but not limited to, reasonable attorney fees and court costs) arising out of or resulting from the acts, omissions or negligence of the Applicant or its agents, employees, assigns, suppliers or invitees, including, but not limited to, any liability, loss, claim or expense arising out of or resulting from any violations of any applicable environmental or safety law, rule or regulation relating to the Applicant's Use of the Property.
- 3. The Applicant's right to maintain the Use of the Property, as contemplated by this Permit, shall be based on the following conditions:
  - a. A periodic inspection to determine compliance with the conditions of this Permit. The Permit may be revoked only upon a finding by the City that there is a material violation of the material terms of this Permit if the violation occurs after written notice from the City to Applicant and opportunity to cure in the time and manner described below.
  - b. Construction of the Use authorized by this Permit must be initiated within 24 months after the date of the approval of this Permit otherwise such Permit shall become void.
  - c. Applicant may maintain an elementary school facility on the Property.
  - d. Applicant shall provide transportation to all students living on the east side of Fort Crook Road.
  - e. All obsolete or unused structures, accessory facilities or materials with an environmental or safety hazard shall be abated and/or removed from the Property at Applicant's expense within twelve (12) months of cessation of the Use of the Property.
  - f. All signage on Property related to Use shall be in conformance with the City Zoning Ordinance.
  - g. Applicant shall record this Permit with the Sarpy County Register of Deeds at Applicant's expense.
  - h. Applicant shall ensure that its transportation practices avoid stacking busses across the railroad tracks adjacent to the Property by primarily utilizing Nebraska Drive to Chandler Road for its bus routing. Applicant shall also require appropriate training of its bus drivers and its contractor's bus drivers regarding such stacking practices.
- 4. Notwithstanding any other provision herein to the contrary, this Permit, and all rights granted hereby, shall expire and terminate as to a Permitted Use hereunder upon the first of the following to occur:
  - a. Applicant's abandonment of the Permitted Use. There shall be a presumption that the project on the Property has been abandoned if the Applicant fails to use the Property for the Permitted Uses for any twelve (12) consecutive month period.
  - b. Cancellation, revocation, denial or failure to maintain any federal, state or local permit required for the Use, and such cancellation, revocation, denial or failure to maintain any federal, state or local rights are provided under laws, rules and regulations governing said permit.
  - c. Applicant's breach of other terms hereof and its failure to cure such breach in the time and manner set forth below.
- 5. In the event the Applicant fails to promptly remove any safety, environmental or other hazard or nuisance from the Property, or upon the expiration or termination of this Permit the Applicant fails to

promptly remove any remaining safety, environmental or other hazard or nuisance, the City may at its option (but without any obligation to the Applicant or any third party to exercise said option) cause the same to be removed at Applicant's cost (including, but not limited to, the cost of any excavation and earthwork that is necessary or advisable in connection with the removal thereof) and the Applicant shall reimburse the City the costs incurred to remove the same. Applicant hereby irrevocably grants the City, its agents and employees, the rights, provided notice is furnished to the Applicant along with a reasonable time to remove or cure such hazard, to enter the Property and to take whatever action as is necessary or appropriate to remove any such hazards, nuisances in accordance with the terms of this Permit, and the right of the City to enter the Property as may be necessary or appropriate to carry out any other provision of this Permit.

- 6. If any provisions, or any portion thereof, contained in this Permit are held to be unconstitutional, invalid, or unenforceable, the remaining provisions hereof, or portions thereof, shall be deemed severable, shall not be affected, and shall remain in full force and effect.
- 7. The conditions and terms of this Permit shall be binding upon Applicant, its successors and assigns.
  - a. Delay of City to terminate this Permit on account of breach of Applicant of any terms hereof in accordance with the terms hereof shall not constitute a waiver of City's right to terminate this Permit, unless the City has expressly waived said breach. A waiver of the right to terminate upon any breach shall not constitute a waiver of the right to terminate upon a subsequent breach of the terms hereof, whether said breach be of the same or different nature.
  - b. Cure Rights. Notwithstanding any other provision of this Permit to the contrary, Applicant shall be entitled to notice and opportunity to cure a breach of this Permit as follows. City will notify the Applicant of any breach of this Permit. Cure shall be commenced and completed as soon as possible and in all cases within thirty (30) days after City provides notice of breach; provided, however, in any case that cure cannot be completed within 30 days, additional time will be allowed, so long as cure is commenced within the time required in this Section b and diligently pursued and completed as soon as possible, and allowing additional time does not present or increase risk of harm to persons or property. City shall have the right to terminate this Permit if a breach is not timely cured.
  - c. Nothing herein shall be construed to be a waiver or suspension of, or an agreement on the part of the City to waive or suspend, any zoning law or regulation applicable to the premises except to the extent and for the duration specifically authorized by this Permit.
  - d. Any notice to be given by City hereunder shall be in writing and shall be sufficiently given if sent by regular mail, postage prepaid, addressed as follows:





#### Sec. 2-208. Removal of Elected Official for Misconduct.

Any elected official of the City may be removed from office for misconduct. Misconduct has been outlined in Policy Resolution 35, however said misconduct is not an exhaustive list of misconduct. Removal from office for misconduct may be initiated as follows:

- a. Upon the filing of written charges signed and verified by the person(s) making the claim(s) and provided to the City Clerk within sixty (60) days of the alleged incident. The City Clerk shall then provide a copy of the written charges to the City Administrator who shall have a Resolution created for the next regularly scheduled City Council meeting. The Resolution shall set a time and place for hearing on the written charges and shall attach the written charges to the Resolution. The Resolution shall set the time for hearing on the charges not less than five (5) days nor more than fourteen (14) days subsequent to the passage of such Resolution.
- b. At such hearing, the official whose conduct shall have been called into question shall have the right to be present to interrogate witnesses, to be represented by counsel, and either in person or by counsel make a statement or argument to the council regarding the allegations made against him or her. These matters may be held in closed session upon the majority vote and approval of the remaining council members and mayor.
- c. The city attorney shall act as prosecuting attorney and shall have the right to examine or cross examine each witness presented and to make any statement or argument to the council.
- d. If upon such hearing, the council shall by a three-fourths vote of all the council members (with the exception of the official who is charged with the misconduct), find or determine that the official in question is guilty of misconduct rendering him or her an unfit person to hold such office, then the city council may declare such office vacant and such office shall then be vacant forthwith. The City Council may impose sanctions as outlined in Policy Resolution 35 other than removal of office if they deem a lesser sanction is appropriate or warranted.
- e. If there is a vacancy on the city council or a vacancy of the Mayor, such vacancy shall be filled pursuant to Neb. Rev. Stat. § 35-568(3).

If the written charge is filed by a citizen, the citizen must be a resident of Bellevue and must list their home address in the written charge. The City Clerk shall then provide a copy of the written charges to the City Administrator.
  - i. The City Administrator, after receiving the written charges from the City Clerk will review the written charge to ensure that 1) it was timely filed, 2) that the written charge was signed and verified, 3) that if it was filed by a citizen that their home address is listed in the written charge and that they are a resident of Bellevue, and 4) that the written charges specifically identify misconduct as outlined in Policy Resolution 35.
  - ii. If after review those requirements are not met, the matter will be administratively closed by the City Administrator and said closure will be documented and kept in the City Clerk's office and the individual filing the written charge will be notified by mail (if mailing address was listed) by the City Clerk.
  - iii. If after review, those requirements are met the City Administrator will review the file of the council member or Mayor who is charged with the misconduct to determine the history, consider progressive sanctions, and determine the severity of said written charge.
    - a.If after review the City Administrator determines that only a written reprimand would be appropriate, the City Administrator will meet with the charged council member or Mayor, explain the charges, hear the council member or Mayor's position, and decide whether a written reprimand

should be issued or whether no action should be taken. The decision of the City Administrator will be provided to the council member or Mayor and placed in the file of the charged member. All members of the City Council and the Mayor will be notified in writing if a written reprimand is placed in another member's file. The individual(s) filing the written charge will be notified in writing that the matter has been handled internally.

- b.If after review the City Administrator feels said written charge could warrant a public reprimand, removal from a committee, loss in seniority, or removal from office, the City Administrator shall have a Resolution created for the next regularly scheduled City Council meeting. The Resolution shall set a time and place for hearing on the written charges and shall attach the written charges to the Resolution. The Resolution shall set the time for hearing on the charges not less than five (5) days nor more than fourteen (14) days subsequent to the passage of such Resolution. Media of Nebraska strongly opposes recently proposed amendments to Bellevue Ordinance #3978 and Policy Resolution 35.

Media of Nebraska is a non-profit 501(c)(6) corporation that was formed in 1977 by members of the Nebraska broadcast and print media to pursue freedom of information through open meetings and public records as mandated by Nebraska law. As journalists, we have a responsibility to the citizens of our state to serve as a watchdog on these matters.

It is our opinion that adding language that provides harsh penalties, including removal from office, for violating these arbitrary rules of conduct does not serve the interests of the citizens of Bellevue. These proposals would have a chilling effect on the release of information to which the citizens are entitled.

While the Nebraska Open Meetings Act provides very restrictive guidelines for the use of executive session – and criminal sanctions for violating the law – it has been our experience that executive sessions are sometimes used when they are not warranted. Not every contract, real estate purchase or personnel matter needs to be discussed in secrecy. The public interest is often better served with open discussion. Additionally, participants during an executive session may discuss matters outside the narrowly specified reasons for that session, and they should feel free to talk publicly about those matters.

We don't believe that members of the Bellevue City Council should be allowed to remove a lawfully elected official from office for speaking publicly on any matter. That is a decision for voters as provided in the recall statutes.

When attempts are made to silence open discussion, the public may well ask: "What are you hiding?" At a time when there is great public distrust of government, we would hope that the Bellevue City Council would work toward greater transparency – not less.

#### Issue/Misconceptions:

1. "Only voters should have the power to remove someone from his or her elected office."

#### Facts:

1. The statement is an opinion and there is nothing to substantiate this opinion in case law or statutes that states that "only voters should have the power to remove someone from his or her elected office."

Neb. Rev. Stat. 16-217 specifically states that a "city of the first class by ordinance may provide for the removal of elective officers of the city for misconduct. The city may create any office that it deems necessary for the good government and interest of the city. The city may provide for filling vacancies which occur in any elective office, except the mayor or member of the city council, by appointment by the mayor with the consent of the city council to hold his or her office for the unexpired term. Whenever the city council fails to consent to any appointment made under this section by the mayor by the close of the second regular city council meeting following the announcement of the appointment, the vacancy shall be filled by a special election to be held as prescribed by ordinance in the ward in which such vacancy exists. A vacancy in the office of the mayor or on the city council shall be filled as provided in section 32-568."

<u>Current Administration is simply exercising its rights afforded to a city of the first class pursuant to the statute that our Legislatures enacted in 1994 and did not modify in 2016 when reviewed.</u>

### Issue/Misconceptions:

2. "Punishing officials for sharing private city information could deter them from highlighting abuses of power."

#### Facts:

2. This is false statement and the logic is flawed. If the ordinance is enacted, it affords a councilperson an opportunity to bring abuses of power to forefront to include citizens in open forum. Closed sessions are a normal and necessary function of any public body and items that are

not made public by a vote or action item should remain confidential, otherwise it impairs the functioning of the public body and the entire intent and purpose of a closed session. Our City Code 2-28 already outlines the procedure for executive sessions and already stated that no party to a closed session shall disclose to any person the content or substance of any discussion which took place during such executive session unless the city council shall authorize the disclosure of such information by a majority vote. If there is fear of a crime or "whistleblowing" there are laws that would protect any member if that information were disclosed, the ordinances proposed currently before the council would not infringe on any rights afforded by law. The City has and maintains decorum and misconduct rules as outlined in Policy Resolution 35, but there was no enforcement of the same should they be violated. Nebraska law specifically allows a city of the first class to implement an ordinance that calls for the removal of an elected official for misconduct, these ordinances comply with Nebraska Law. They are not designed to ousts individuals who are not liked or hinder a member's ability to vote and voice their opinion and concerns, that will remain encouraged. These are meant to set up a standard of decorum and hold individuals accountable for continually violating the same.

#### Issue/Misconceptions:

3. "Current Administration shutting down the voice of citizens of Bellevue." "Current Administration came into office and immediately shut down the voice of the citizens of Bellevue with Ordinance 3928."

#### Facts:

3. The statement is an opinion and there is nothing to substantiate this opinion in case law or statutes. Section 16-217 allows the citizens of Bellevue and City officials an avenue aside from recall to hold an elected official accountable for his/her actions that constitute misconduct. In other words, Section 16-217 affords the people, the voters, the taxpayers, as the constituents of this great City the opportunity for greater transparency of the government and to alleviate any concerns of distrust of the government. It holds a person accountable his/her actions/choice both positive or negative. It creates the opposite... a larger voice for the citizens.

Statements made regarding Ordinance 3928 are simply not true. On February 11, 2019, citizens came forward in opposition and some spoke in favor as with city officials. On February 26, 2019, the following took place regarding Ordinance 3928 pursuant to our official Minute Record: Ordinance No. 3928: Amending Section 2-30 of the City Code pertaining to City Council Order of Business (Third Reading) Ordinance No. 3928, an ordinance to amend Sections 2-30 of the Bellevue Municipal Code pertaining to the City Council's order of business; to repeal such section as heretofore existing; and to provide for the effective date of this Ordinance, was read by title only for the third and final reading.

Motion was made by Welch, seconded by Shannon, that Ordinance No. 3928 be adopted.

Motion was made by Shannon, seconded by Welch, to amend Ordinance 3928, which includes striking Public Requests to be heard and adding Approved Citizen Communication to the Order of Business set in code.

Council discussion ensued. Councilman Burns left Council Chambers at 7:27 p.m. and returned at 7:29 p.m.

Roll call vote on the amendment was as follows: Stinson, Cook, Shannon, Preister, Burns, and Welch voted yes; voting no: none. Motion carried.

Roll call vote on the motion as amended was as follows: Stinson, Cook, Shannon, Preister, Burns, and Welch voted yes; voting no: none. Motion carried.

Motion was made by Shannon, seconded by Welch, to approve Council Policy Resolution 39. Roll call vote on the motion was as follows: Stinson, Cook, Shannon, Preister, Burns, and Welch voted yes; voting no: none. Motion carried.

#### Issue/Misconceptions:

4. What is misconduct and malfeasance? How are they defined?

#### Facts:

4. Neb. Rev. Stat. 28-924 provides a definition of misconduct as "(1) A public servant commits official misconduct if he knowingly violates any statute or lawfully adopted rule or regulation relating to his official duties. (2) Official misconduct is a Class II misdemeanor."

Black's Law Dictionary defines misconduct as, "Any unlawful conduct on the part of a person concerned in the administration of justice which is prejudicial to the rights of parties or to the right determination of the cause; as "misconduct of jurors," "misconduct of an arbitrator." The term is also used to express a dereliction from duty, injurious to another, on the part of one employed in a professional capacity, as an attorney at law, (Stage v. Stevens, 1 Denio [N. Y.] 267,) or a public officer, (State v. Leach, 60 Me. 58, 11 Am. Rep. 172.)

Black's Law Dictionary defines malfeasance as, "the wrongful or unjust doing of some act which the doer has no right to perform, or which he has stipulated by contract not to do. It differs from "misfeasance" and "non-feasance," (which titles see.) See 1 Chit. Pr. 9; 1 Chit. PI. 134; Dudley v. Flemingsburg, 115 Ky. 5, 72 S. W. 327, 00 L. R. A. 575, 103 Am. St. Rep. 253; Coite v. Lynes, 33 Conn. 115; Bell v. Josse-lyn, 3 Gray (Mass.) 311, 63 Am. Dec. 741."

The terms misconduct and malfeasance cannot be considered vague as these terms are clearly defined and will be followed. Further, it is known that we follow Robert's Rule of Order for our council meeting sessions.

#### **Dear Committee Members:**

The City of Bellevue is in receipt of your written correspondence dated October 21, 2019, and received by our offices on October 25, 2019. The hereinafter is our response.

Thank you for the time and talent you have shown to the City of Bellevue in drafting your correspondence in opposition to Policy Resolution 35 and Ordinance #3978. It is our hopes that after the committee members review our response, it will dispel any rumors, misunderstandings and show that both the ordinance and policy resolution allow the opportunity to show more transparency with this current administration than has ever been shown with past administration.

Nebraska Revised Statute § 16-217 specifically states that "A city of the first class by ordinance may provide for the removal of elective officials of the city for misconduct." It then explains that any vacancy in the office of the mayor or the city council shall be filled as provided in section 32-568. We also have statutes that explain how an official commits official misconduct, how an official is removed from office and how an official violates his/her oath of office.

Section 16-217 allows the citizens of Bellevue and City officials an avenue aside from recall to hold an elected official accountable for his/her actions that constitute misconduct. In other words, Section 16-217 affords the people, the voters, the taxpayers, as the constituents of this great City the opportunity for greater transparency of the government and to alleviate any concerns of distrust of the government. It holds a person accountable his/her actions/choice both positive or negative. Accountability as a virtue, is seen as a quality in which a person displays a willingness to accept responsibility, a desirable trait that we as citizens require in all elected officials, public officials and government agencies; hence, in this use, accountability is a positive feature. As a mechanism, accountability is when that desirable trait also creates an obligation of elected officials to explain his/her actions; hence in this use, most times it is seen as positive, but also creates a negative for those officials who do not want to be held accountable for what could be considered wrongful actions, i.e. misconduct and malfeasance.

The City of Bellevue is not the only City and has chosen the option to enact a City Code to show more transparency. Fremont has a city code that specifically states that any elected official of the city may be removed from office for misconduct of malfeasance. Their process outlines that written charges may be filed, a hearing before the council will be set, the charged member has the right to present their side of the story at the hearing and be questioned by the City Attorney. If after hearing the council by three-fourths vote finds that the officer is guilty of misconduct rendering him or her unfit to hold office, the council may declare such office vacant and the office would then be vacant. Grand Island has an identical ordinance. The differences between their ordinances and the ones proposed before this council are essentially that we have outlined what constitutes misconduct, have outlined a progressive sanction standard, and are requiring a unanimous vote for removal of office.

The City has and maintains decorum and misconduct rules as outlined in Policy Resolution 35, but there was no enforcement of the same should they be violated. Nebraska law specifically allows a city of the first class to implement an ordinance that calls for the removal of an elected official for misconduct, these ordinances comply with Nebraska Law. They are not designed to ousts individuals who are not liked or hinder a member's ability to vote and voice their opinion and concerns, that will remain encouraged. These are meant to set up a standard of decorum and hold individuals accountable for continually violating the same.

Further, closed sessions are allowed pursuant to Nebraska Revised Statute § 84-1410 and are often utilized by public bodies. Closed sessions can be utilized to protect the public interest or for the prevention of needless injury to the reputation of an individual. Closed sessions can be held for strategy sessions with respect to collective bargaining, real estate purchases, pending litigation, or litigation which is imminent. It can be utilized to discuss deployment of security personnel or devices, for evaluation of the job performance of a person and other items as outlined in the statute. There must be a vote to go into closed session. The discussions in closed session are restricted to the matters set forth in the motion for going into closed session.

The meeting will be reconvened in open session BEFORE any formal action may be taken. No votes or discussion on how individuals will vote can take place in closed session. If a matter is an action item (i.e. voting on the purchase agreement) the vote will occur during open session and members of the council are free to discuss the matter during the discussion period, there would be

no sanctions for them discussing items that become public by a vote on the item. There are already rules in place in Neb. Rev. Stat. 84-1410 that state that any member of any public body shall have the right to challenge the continuation of a closed session if the member determines that the session has exceeded the reason stated in the original motion, the challenge and disposition shall be recorded in the minutes. The ordinances currently proposed would not hinder a member's ability to do this as it is a right afforded pursuant to law. If there is fear of a crime or "whistleblowing" there are laws that would protect any member if that information were disclosed, the ordinances proposed currently before the council would not infringe on any rights afforded by law.

Closed sessions are a normal and necessary function of any public body and items that are not made public by a vote or action item should remain confidential, otherwise it impairs the functioning of the public body and the entire intent and purpose of a closed session. Our City Code 2-28 already outlined the procedure for executive sessions and already stated that no party to a closed session shall disclose to any person the content or substance of any discussion which took place during such executive session unless the city council shall authorize the disclosure of such information by a majority vote. This is in the code, the issue is, there was nothing in the code to account for a situation wherein this code was violated. The new 2-28 before the council outlines that any dissemination or disclosure could be considered misconduct and then handled according to 2-208. If there is a rule that specifies how things should operate, it means nothing if there is no enforcement ability.

In summary, we invite the entire committee to attend our upcoming City Council meeting scheduled for November 5th at 6:00 p.m. At this meeting, the public is encouraged to attend and voice any concerns, so that we may make clear the transparency that this affords the citizens of Bellevue of their current and future administration of elected officials.

#### ORDINANCE NO. 3978

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND ARTICLE IV, CHAPTER 2, OF THE BELLEVUE MUNICIPAL CODE BY ADDING A NEW SECTION 2-208 REGARDING REMOVAL OF AN ELECTED OFFICIAL FOR MISCONDUCT AND OTHER SANCTIONS TO PROVIDE FOR THE EFFECTIVE DATE OF THIS ORDINANCE.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BELLEVUE, NEBRASKA.

Section 1. That Section 2-208 of Chapter 2, Article IV of the Bellevue Municipal Code is hereby added to read as follows:

#### Sec. 2-208. Removal of Elected Official for Misconduct.

Any member of the Bellevue City Council or the Mayor (hereinafter referred to as "elected official") elected official of the City may be removed from office for misconduct or receive other sanctions as outlined herein. Misconduct has been outlined in Policy Resolution 35, however said misconduct is not an exhaustive list of misconduct and other misconduct may be identified pursuant to City Code or State Law. Sanctions, including removal from office for misconduct, shall be Removal from office for misconduct may be initiated as follows:

- a. Upon the filing of written charges signed and verified (in front of a notary public) by the person(s) making the claim(s) and provided to the City Clerk within sixty (60) days of the alleged incident. If the written charge is filed by a citizen, the citizen must be a resident of Bellevue and must list their home address in the written charge. The City Clerk shall then provide a copy of the written charges to the City Administrator and copy all elected officials.
  - i. The City Administrator, after receiving the written charges from the City Clerk will review the written charge to ensure that 1) it was timely filed, 2) that the written charge was signed and verified, 3) that if it was filed by a citizen that their home address is listed in the written charge and that they are a resident of Bellevue, and 4) that the written charges specifically identify misconduct. as outlined in Policy Resolution 35.
  - ii. If after review the those requirements in a(i) are not met, the matter will be administratively closed by the City Administrator and said closure will be documented and kept in the City Clerk's office and the individual filing the written charge will be notified by mail (if mailing address was listed) by the City Clerk. All elected officials will be notified of this action. If any elected official contests the closure of the complaint, they may have a Resolution created as outlined in a(iii)

and the Resolution shall be set for the next regularly scheduled City Council meeting.

iii. If after review, the those requirements in a(i) are met the City Administrator will review the file of the council member or Mayor who is charged with the misconduct to determine the history, consider progressive sanctions, and determine the severity of said written charge. shall have a Resolution created for the next regularly scheduled City Council meeting. The Resolution shall set a time and place for hearing on the written charges and shall attach the written charges to the Resolution as Exhibit "A". The Resolution shall be placed on the next regularly scheduled meeting for council consideration. At said council meeting, the council shall decide by majority vote whether the written charge shall move forward for a formal hearing before the Council or whether it should be dismissed. The accused elected official shall abstain from the vote. If the Council votes to approve the Resolution, the written charge shall be set for hearing not less than seven (7) days nor more than forty-five (45) days subsequent to the passage of the Resolution. Said hearing may be set for special hearing. If the Council does not approve the Resolution, the matter will be deemed dismissed and the City Clerk will notify the individual filing the written charge via mail (if mailing address was listed).

If after review the City Administrator determines that only a written reprimand would be appropriate, the City Administrator will meet with the charged council member or Mayor, explain the charges, hear the council member or Mayor's position, and decide whether a written reprimand should be issued or whether no action should be taken. The decision of the City Administrator will be provided to the council member or Mayor and placed in the file of the charged member. All members of the City Council and the Mayor will be notified in writing if a written reprimand is placed in another member's file. The individual(s) filing the written charge will be notified in writing that the matter has been handled internally.

If after review the City Administrator feels said written charge could warrant a public reprimand, removal from a committee, loss in seniority, or removal from office, the City Administrator shall have a Resolution created for the next regularly scheduled City Council meeting. The Resolution shall set a time and place for hearing on the written charges and shall attach the written charges to the Resolution. The Resolution shall set the time for hearing on the charges not less than five (5) days nor more than fourteen (14) days subsequent to the passage of such Resolution. The City Clerk shall notify the individual who filed the written charges of the time and place of said hearing by mailing notification to them at the address stated in their written charges, or if the charges were filed by a city official, employee, or city staff, notice may be sent via e-mail.

- iv. If the City Council approves the Resolution and sets the matter for hearing, the City Clerk shall notify the individual who filed the written charges of the time and place of said hearing by mailing notification to them at the address stated in their written charges, or if the charges were filed by a city official, employee, other elected official, or city staff, notice may be sent via e-mail. The City Clerk shall also email the approved Resolution to the accused elected official and notify him or her of the date and time of the scheduled hearing.
- v. If the matter is set for hearing, At such hearing, the elected official whose conduct shall have been called into question shall have the right to be present to interrogate witnesses, to be represented by counsel at his or her cost, and either in person or by counsel make a statement or argument to the council regarding the allegations made against him or her. The individual(s) bringing forth the alleged misconduct submitting the written charge shall be present at the hearing in order for the hearing to proceed. These matters may be held in closed session upon the majority vote and approval of the remaining council members and mayor. The accused, either personally or through counsel if represented, shall have the right to confront and cross-examine their accuser. All hearings will be recorded via audio recording.
- vi. The city attorney shall act as prosecuting attorney and shall have the right to examine or cross examine each witness presented or call witnesses and to make any statement or argument to the council.
- vii. The hearing shall be limited to the charges as outlined in the written charge only.
- viii. If the hearing is not concluded prior to 10:00 p.m., the council may, by motion to continue and majority vote, end the hearing and re-schedule the hearing for the next regularly scheduled meeting or special meeting.
- ix. If upon such hearing, the council shall by a unanimous majority vote of all the council members (with the exception of the elected official who is charged with the misconduct), find or determine that the elected official in question is guilty of misconduct rendering him or her an unfit person to hold such office, then the city council may then determine the appropriate sanction to be applied. including declaring such office vacant. The sanction to be applied shall be made by motion and voted upon by the council in a separate motion apart from the finding(s) and shall be agreed upon by a majority vote of all the council members (with the exception of the elected official who is charged with the misconduct). If removal from office is the sanction proposed, the vote shall be unanimous (with the exception of the elected official who is charged with the misconduct). The determination after hearing and any sanction applied shall be made during an open meeting on the record and shall be memorialized in writing by a Resolution. The City Council is committed to following a model of progressive sanctions for allegations of misconduct. When deemed appropriate the City Attorney shall disclose any prior sanctions. The following sanctions may be imposed by the City Council if there is a finding that the elected official in question is guilty of misconduct as charged.

- a. Written reprimand This sanction would include a written letter outlining the misconduct violation, date of occurrence, and that the elected official was counseled on said matter. A written reprimand may be administered by the City Administrator as outlined in City Code 2 208 or by the City Council after hearing. A copy of the written reprimand will be provided to the accused member elected official and to all other members of the council and the Mayor. A written reprimand should be used as a corrective step or warning to the elected official member for specific misconduct allegations that are not severe in nature but that are violations of City Code or this policy. State Law or Policy Resolution 35.
- b.Public reprimand This sanction would include a verbal admonishment during an open meeting of the City Council and would outline the reason for the reprimand. A public reprimand may only be administered by the City Administrator, council, or Mayor the City Council after a hearing as outlined in City Code 2 208 and a unanimous vote on the matter. The date, time, and nature of said public reprimand will be memorialized in writing and contained in the member's file with the City. A public reprimand should be used for corrective action if prior written reprimands were not effective or when the severity of the misconduct warrants a public admonishment due to the nature of the complaint.
- c.Removal from committee assignment(s) and/or Loss of Seniority This sanction would include a finding after a hearing as outlined in City Code 2-208-that the elected official's member's behavior warrants action greater than a written reprimand or public reprimand and that due to the elected official's member's behavior he or she should be removed from specific committee(s) or lose seniority within the council. The removal from a committee or loss of seniority may only be administered by the City Administrator, council, or Mayor City Council after hearing as outlined in City Code 2 208 and a unanimous vote on the matter. The date, time and sanction outlined herein will be memorialized in writing and contained in the member's file with the City. Removal from a committee or committees and loss of seniority should be used if the misconduct would lose public trust or council trust for the elected official member to remain on the committee or keep the seniority position, if the misconduct impacts the operations of the committee or the offense was committed during a committee meeting or directed toward another committee member or member addressing that committee.
- d.Removal from Office –This sanction should not be imposed unless progressive sanctions were previously implemented or when the elected official's member's misconduct is determined to be severe or egregious. This sanction would include a finding after hearing as outlined in City Code 2 208 that the elected official's member's behavior warrants removal from office and that due to the elected official's member's behavior he or she

should be removed from office and that due to the member's behavior he or she should be removed from office. This sanction may only be administered by the City Administrator, council, or Mayor City Council after hearing as outlined in City Code 2-208 and a unanimous vote on the matter. The date, time, and findings will be memorialized in writing and contained in the member's file with the City. Removal from office should be used if the misconduct is so severe or egregious that it loses the public's trust or council's trust in the elected official's member's ability to continuing serving the City of Bellevue in their current capacity or when the elected official's member's misconduct has already been addressed through progressive sanctions but continues to be repeated.

- x. If the council votes to remove the charged elected official from office, the office shall be declared vacant and such office shall be vacant forthwith. If the office is declared vacant, such office shall then be vacant forthwith. The City Council may impose sanctions as outlined in Policy Resolution 35 other than removal of office if they deem a lesser sanction is appropriate or warranted. The determination after hearing and any sanction applied shall be made during an open meeting and not in closed session.
- xi. If there is a vacancy on the city council or a vacancy of the Mayor, such vacancy shall be filled pursuant to Neb. Rev. Stat. § 35-568(3).

Section 3. This Ordinance shall take effect and be in full force November 30, 2019 fifteen (15) days after it is passed and signed by the Mayor.

#### POLICY RESOLUTION 35

#### PRINCIPLES OF CONDUCT AND DECORUM

It is the belief of the members of the Bellevue City Council that the proper operation of democratic government requires that public officials and employees be independent, impartial and responsible to the people; that public deliberations and actions be conducted in an atmosphere free from personal animosity and hostility; that governmental decisions and policy be made in proper channels of the government structure; that public office not be used for personal gain; and that the public have confidence in the integrity of its government. In recognition of these goals, the City Council adopts the following principles of conduct and decorum for meetings of the City Council, which rules may be amended and/or rescinded at any time. If any portion of these rules of conduct and decorum are found to conflict with any City ordinance or State law, the provisions of City ordinance or State law shall be followed.

### <u>Principles of Conduct and Decorum</u> for Meetings of the City Council.

The principles of conduct and decorum shall consist of the following:

- (a) The Mayor, members of the City Council, City officials and employees shall (i) respect and adhere to the American ideals of government, rule of law, principles of public administration and high ethical conduct in the performance of public duties; (ii) represent and work for the common good of the City and not for any private interest; (iii) refuse to accept gifts of favors or promises of future benefits which might compromise or tend to impair independent judgment or action; and (iv) provide fair and equal treatment for all persons and matters coming before the City Council. Any such violation may be considered misconduct and such person may be subject to removal from office.
- (b) Any statements made during City Council meetings by the Mayor, members of the City Council, City officials and employees, or members of the general public shall not involve personal, impertinent, or slanderous attacks on individuals, regardless of whether the individual so

attacked is an elected official, a city official or employee, or a member of the general public. Any such violation may be considered misconduct and such person may be subject to removal from office.

- (c) During City Council meetings, the Mayor, members of the City Council, City officials and employees, or members of the general public shall not, by conversation or otherwise, delay, interrupt, or disrupt the proceedings of the City Council nor disturb any individual while speaking, or refuse to obey the orders of the presiding officer regarding the rules of conduct and decorum. Any such violation may be considered misconduct and such person may be subject to removal from office.
- (d) Any issue presented for consideration by the Mayor, members of the City Council, City officials and employees, or members of the general public, shall be made to the City Council as a body through the presiding officer and shall not be directed solely to the Mayor, any particular member of the City Council, any City official or employee or any member of the general public.
- (e) The use of profane, vulgar, inflammatory, threatening, abusive or disparaging language or racial or ethnic slurs directed at the Mayor, any particular member of the City Council, any City official or employee or any member of the general public shall not be tolerated. Any such violation may be considered misconduct and such person may be subject to removal from office.
- (f) The Mayor, members of the City Council and City officials shall not knowingly violate any statute or lawfully adopted rule or regulation relating to his/her official duties. Any such violation may be considered misconduct and such person may be subject to removal from office.
- (g) The Mayor, members of the City Council and City officials shall not commit a wrongful or unjust doing of some act in which the doer has no right to perform, or which he/she has stipulated by contract not to do. Any such violation may be considered misconduct and such person may be subject to removal from office.

#### SANCTIONS.

Sanctions permissible to be imposed shall consist of the following:

- (a) A vacancy may exist on the City Council if a Council member is absent more than a third of the regular meetings, and a vacancy shall exist on the City Council if a Council member is absent more than five consecutive regular meetings, unless the absences are excused by a majority vote of the remaining members. This procedure, by law, requires notice and a hearing be provided to the Council member pursuant to Neb. Rev. Stat. § 19-3101.
- (b) Members of the public who do not follow proper decorum after a warning in a public hearing may be barred from further testimony at that meeting or removed from the Council chambers.
- (c) City Council members or the mayor who intentionally or repeatedly do not follow proper decorum may be reprimanded, formally censured by the Council and/or lose seniority or other committee assignments. Serious infractions of the code of conduct could lead to other sanctions as deemed appropriate by the City Council, including removal of the elected official for misconduct as outlined in Section 2-208 of the City Code.
- (d) It is the responsibility of the City Administrator to initiate action if an elected official's behavior may warrant sanction or if a complaint is brought against an elected official.
- (e) If a violation is outside the observed behaviors of the Mayor or City Council, the alleged violation should be reported to the City Administrator who will then investigate on the report and take the next appropriate action.
- (f) These actions can be, but are not limited to: discussing and counseling the individual on violations; recommending sanction to the full City Council to consider in a public meeting; filing of written charges pursuant to Sec. 2-208 of the Bellevue City Code, or

recommend any other sanction options for Council consideration as he/she deems fit.

- During City Council meetings and while conducting city business, the Mayor, members of the City Council, City officials and employees, or members of the general public shall not, by conversation or otherwise, delay, interrupt, or disrupt the proceedings of the City Council nor disturb any individual while speaking, or refuse to obey the orders of the presiding officer regarding the rules of conduct and decorum. Any such violation may be considered misconduct and such person may be subject to removal from office as outlined in City Code 2-208.
- (d) Any issue presented for consideration by the Mayor, members of the City Council, City officials and employees, or members of the general public, shall be made to the City Council as a body through the presiding officer and shall not be directed solely to the Mayor, any particular member of the City Council, any City official or employee or any member of the general public.
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- (f) The Mayor, members of the City Council and City officials shall not knowingly violate any statute or lawfully adopted rule or regulation relating to his/her official duties. Any such violation may be considered misconduct and such person may be subject to removal from office as outlined in City Code 2-208.
- (g) The Mayor, members of the City Council and City officials shall not commit a wrongful or unjust doing of some act in which the doer has no right to perform, or which he/she has stipulated by contract not to do. Any such violation may be considered misconduct and such person may be subject to removal from office as outlined in City Code 2-208.

#### SANCTIONS.

Sanctions permissible to be imposed shall consist of the following:

- (a) A vacancy may exist on the City Council if a Council member is absent more than a third of the regular meetings, and a vacancy shall exist on the City Council if a Council member is absent more than five consecutive regular meetings, unless the absences are excused by a majority vote of the remaining members. This procedure, by law, requires notice and a hearing be provided to the Council member pursuant to Neb. Rev. Stat. § 19-3101.

- (d) It is the responsibility of the City Administrator to initiate action if an elected official's behavior may warrant sanction or if a complaint is brought against an elected official. This process should be followed as outlined in City Code 2-208.
- (e) If a violation is outside the observed behaviors of the Mayor or City Council, the alleged violation should be reported to the City Administrator who will then investigate on the report and take the next appropriate action as outlined in City Code 2-208.
- (f) The City of Bellevue is committed to following a model of progressive sanctions for allegations of misconduct. Misconduct violations may be addressed by:
  - i. Written reprimand This sanction would include a written letter in the council member or Mayor's file outlining the misconduct violation, date of occurrence, and that the council member or Mayor was counseled on said matter. A written reprimand may be administered by the City Administrator as outlined in City Code 2-208 or by the City Council after hearing. A copy of the written reprimand will be provided to the accused member and to all members of the council and the Mayor. A written reprimand should be used as a corrective step or warning to the member for specific misconduct allegations that are not severe in nature but that are violations of City Code or this policy.

#### POLICY RESOLUTION 35

#### PRINCIPLES OF CONDUCT AND DECORUM

It is the belief of the members of the Bellevue City Council that the proper operation of democratic government requires that public officials and employees be independent, impartial and responsible to the people; that public deliberations and actions be conducted in an atmosphere free from personal animosity and hostility; that governmental decisions and policy be made in proper channels of the government structure; that public office not be used for personal gain; and that the public have confidence in the integrity of its government. In recognition of these goals, the City Council adopts the following principles of conduct and decorum for meetings of the City Council and when conducting city business, which rules may be amended and/or rescinded at any time. If any portion of these rules of conduct and decorum are found to conflict with any City ordinance or State law, the provisions of City ordinance or State law shall be followed.

## <u>Principles of Conduct and Decorum</u> for Meetings of the City Council.

The principles of conduct and decorum shall consist of the following:

(a) The Mayor, members of the City Council, City officials and employees shall (i) respect and adhere to the American ideals of government, rule of law, principles of public administration and high ethical conduct in the performance of public duties; (ii) represent and work for the common good of the City and not for any private interest; (iii) refuse to accept gifts of favors or promises of future benefits which might compromise or tend to impair independent judgment or action; and (iv) provide fair and equal treatment for all persons and matters coming before the City Council. Any such violation may be considered misconduct and such person may be subject to removal from office as outlined in City Code 2-208.

- (b) Any statements made during City Council meetings or when conducting city business, by the Mayor, members of the City Council, City officials and employees, or members of the general public shall not involve personal, impertinent, or slanderous attacks on individuals, regardless of whether the individual so attacked is an elected official, a city official or employee, or a member of the general public. Any such violation may be considered misconduct and such person may be subject to removal from office as outlined in City Code 2-208.
- (c) During City Council meetings and while conducting city business, the Mayor, members of the City Council, City officials and employees, or members of the general public shall not, by conversation or otherwise, delay, interrupt, or disrupt the proceedings of the City Council nor disturb any individual while speaking, or refuse to obey the orders of the presiding officer regarding the rules of conduct and decorum. Any such violation may be considered misconduct and such person may be subject to removal from office as outlined in City Code 2-208.
- (d) Any issue presented for consideration by the Mayor, members of the City Council, City officials and employees, or members of the general public, shall be made to the City Council as a body through the presiding officer and shall not be directed solely to the Mayor, any particular member of the City Council, any City official or employee or any member of the general public.
- (e) The use of profane, vulgar, inflammatory, threatening, abusive or disparaging language or racial or ethnic slurs directed at the Mayor, any particular member of the City Council, any City official or employee or any member of the general public shall not be tolerated. Any such violation may be considered misconduct and such person may be subject to removal from office as outlined in City Code 2-208.
- (f) The Mayor, members of the City Council and City officials

shall not knowingly violate any statute or lawfully adopted rule or regulation relating to his/her official duties. Any such violation may be considered misconduct and such person may be subject to removal from office as outlined in City Code 2-208.

(g) The Mayor, members of the City Council and City officials shall not commit a wrongful or unjust doing of some act in which the doer has no right to perform, or which he/she has stipulated by contract not to do. Any such violation may be considered misconduct and such person may be subject to removal from office as outlined in City Code 2-208.

#### **ORDINANCE NO. 3981**

Ward 5 shall contain the part of the City of Bellevue beginning at the intersection of 25th Street and Harrison Street, south on 25th Street to Childs Road, being the south line of Section 16 14 13, then west along said south section line to its intersection with the Bellevue city limits, then beginning in a northerly direction along the Bellevue city limits to its intersection with Harrison Street, then east on Harrison Street to the point of beginning.





This is to inform you that a review of your 2019 Consolidated Plan Annual Action Plan has been completed. The grant assistance which you are receiving is Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funds in the amount of \$355,531.

If you are planning to charge any expenses as indirect costs to the grant, you must complete the indirect cost chart for the grant before returning the agreement. Also, of particular note are the requirements for compliance with the Universal Numbering System and System for Award Management (SAM) and the Federal Funding Accountability and Transparency Act (FFATA). A primary goal of the Department is to reduce housing discrimination, affirmatively further fair housing through CPD programs and promote diverse, inclusive communities. To that end, we encourage your community to take all measures necessary to ensure compliance with the Fair Housing requirements associated with these funds. A copy of your Consolidated Plan/Annual Action Plan was provided to the Office of Fair Housing and Equal Opportunity for review. No comments were received.

You are encouraged to continue to vigorously promote full partnerships between the City of Bellevue and its non-profit service providers, neighborhood organizations, the economic community and private citizens as you implement your Consolidated Plan. In the process of transforming plan elements into projects, the quality of success will depend in large part on the closeness of cooperation among all the Consolidated Plan partners. We offer our continued support and technical assistance during the coming year to help forward the objectives of the Consolidated Plan.

- (g) CDBG funds may not be provided to a for-profit entity pursuant to section 105(a)(17) of the Act unless such activity or project has been evaluated and selected in accordance with Appendix A to 24 CFR 570 "Guidelines and Objectives for Evaluating Project Costs and Financial Requirements." (Source P.L. 113-235, Consolidated and Further Continuing Appropriations Act, 2015, Division K, Title II, Community Development Fund).

- Nearly 50 participants enjoyed the library's first Bunco for Books: Halloween Edition on Tuesday night, Oct. 29. Those taking part were encouraged to play the game with books as prizes. This event resulted from a collaboration of the Adult Services Department and the Children's Department.
- On Wednesday, Oct. 30, teens were invited to participate in a crafting event to make their own "pet ghosts" in anticipation of Halloween. In addition they could hang out with friends, enjoy a snack, and watch a spooky movie in this after-school activity.
- o The Children's Department planned two Halloween related activities for Thursday, Oct. 31. In the morning children and their families could participate in the 1000 Books Before Kindergarten Halloween party. The event was geared for children not yet in kindergarten who are currently registered in the library's 1000 Books Before Kindergarten early literacy program. Children and their parents were encouraged to attend in costumes. In the afternoon children and their families were invited to stop by anytime between 4 and 6 p.m. to enjoy Halloween crafts and refreshments.
- The second distribution of free one-day passes for the Omaha Children's Museum was held on the morning of Saturday, Nov. 2. Twenty-five passes were handed out on a first-come, first-served basis to families who had previously not received a pass, and all passes were gone within 20 mininutes. The passes are made possible through a partnership of the Omaha Children's Museum and the Friends of the Bellevue Public Library.
